
Summer meal program through BSISD has started

When it meets Wednesday, the Howard County Junior College District Board of Trustees will contemplate a five-year strategic plan for Howard College's campuses that will guide the college's vision through 2026.

The board will meet at 12:30 p.m. Wednesday in the Big Spring campus' Fireplace Room in the Student Union building.

Presentation of the college system's strategic plan will take place in the Visioning/Future Directions section of the meeting's New Business portion. Relating to the item, the board plans to discuss a webinar report from the Board of Trustees Institute; the college system's role, mission, purpose,



HCJCD's strategic priorities, goals and objectives; strategic measurements; and a report and program demand analysis from Economic Modeling Specialists International (EMSI), an economic analysis and employment data

In other business, the board will consider an agreement for the acquisition of student information system software and

a report on the district campuses' response to the COVID-19 pandemic.

The college's 75th Anniversary initiatives will also be under consideration, including a resolution and grants from the Big Spring Area Foundation and the McGary Regan Foundation; and a donation from the Delek oil company.

The board will also work on its upcoming budget, including a report on legislative appropriation for Fiscal Years 2022-23; a presentation on the Howard County Appraisal District's Certified Estimate of Value; a report on federal funding; and consideration of the colleg es' financial focus for Fiscal Year 2022.

The meeting will also include consideration of the colleges' performance measures and outcomes, including affirmation of the district's quarterly investment report and accountability measures including operational, financial, and student success indicators.

The board will consider purchasing including a competitive sealed proposal on window replacement and retrofitting; and requests for proposals on electrical and plumbing services.

Other item the board will consider are a resolution authorizing an auction

tant to plan for it with the ever changing dynamic of the pandemic," Salvation Army Lt. Charlsie Godwin, said. "With this said, we are looking for ways to fill in the gap as the Boys and Girls Club is primarily funded by community's charitable donations."

As with many fundraisers, there is more than one way to show your support. The day of the event the community is encouraged to purchase a plate, with funds going to the Boys and Girls Club. Leading up to the fundraiser, those wanting to help out can donate items needed for the event. According to the request by Double L BBQ, the items needed include: fold over containers, picnic packs (silverware), cases of water, bread, onions, and homemade dessert items.

Additionally, the press release directs local citizens to the website at www.KnoWhat2Do.com for tips on dealing with a weather emergency.



John Middleton comes from a long line of West Texas Cowboys. He was born into a ranching and rodeo family and grew up riding and roping until the sun went down, loving every minute spent on a horse. His parents were the late Harry and Janet Middleton. They both encouraged and fostered his love of ranch life and of being a cowboy.

John participated in many rodeos through the years both state-wide and nationally. He tried his hand at steer wrestling and team roping but it was calf roping that was always his favorite event in which to compete. In 1967, he won the Texas High School State Championship in calf roping and went on to compete in the National High School Rodeo Finals in Elko, Nevada, finishing in 4th place.

John graduated from Big Spring High School and attended South Plains Junior College before transferring to Texas Tech University as a member of the Rodeo Team. John made many memories throughout his time rodeoing in college. It was there he met his future wife, Cindy. John and Cindy were married in 1974 and started ranching the land he had grown up loving as a boy.

Soon, John became a proud father of two daughters, Kim and Lauren. Some of the happiest times were days spent with his family of four raising club lambs, actively participating in 4-H as both a



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



Houston Astros take combined no-hitter into 8th, rout Baltimore Orioles 10-2

BALTIMORE — Jake Odorizzi pitched five outstanding innings in another sign of progress after his arm issues, and Houston won its eighth straight game.

A no-hitter would have been nice, but the Astros have plenty of other things to feel good

Odorizzi and the Houston bullpen took a bid for a combined no-hitter into the eighth inning Monday night, eventually settling for a 10-2 victory over the Baltimore Orioles. Houston now leads the AL West by a game over Oakland, which lost at Texas.

The 31-year-old Odorizzi missed more than a month with a strained muscle in his right arm. This was his fifth appearance and fourth start since returning. He retired his first 13 batters before walking DJ Stewart on a full count in the

"I'm happy with the way I'm progressing," Odorizzi said. "I knew it was going to be a process. I stuck to that process, and I feel more and more comfortable every time I'm on the mound."

Maikel Franco hit a two-run homer with one out in the eighth off Brandon Bielak, breaking up the no-hitter. Odorizzi and reliever Cristian Javier held the Orioles without a hit through

The start of the game was delayed by rain for an hour, and there was also a 41-minute rain delay during the top of the eighth. That came after the teams played for a while in a driving rain,

with puddles forming in the infield.

"This grounds crew — they appear like they're used to rain delays," Astros manager Dusty Baker said. "Every time I've been here in a three-day period, there's always been a rain delay, so I give the grounds crew a lot of credit for doing a great

Bielak came on to pitch the bottom of the eighth for Houston. After he hit Austin Hays in the back of the helmet with a breaking ball — just the second baserunner for Baltimore — Franco sent a drive to deep center field.

Earlier in Franco's at-bat, Bielak appeared to have thrown strike three, but he didn't get the call from plate umpire Angel Hernandez.

Stevie Wilkerson followed with a single up the middle, and the Orioles finished with two hits.

Houston was looking to pitch the seventh nohitter in the majors this season. That would have matched 1990, 1991, 2012 and 2015 for the most since 1900, one shy of the record eight in 1884 the first season overhand pitching was allowed. In a season when pitchers have dominated —

and on the day umpires began checking them for illegal foreign substances — Odorizzi (2-3) didn't seem the least bit bothered. He struck out nine and threw 86 pitches, three shy of his season The Astros threw the most recent combined no-

hitter in the majors, when Aaron Sanchez, Will Harris, Joe Biagini and Chris Devenski blanked Seattle on Aug. 3, 2019.

There has only been one no-hitter at Camden Yards in Baltimore. That was by Boston's Hideo Nomo on April 4, 2001.

Yordan Alvarez hit a three-run homer in Houston's five-run third inning. Keegan Akin (0-3) allowed five runs in four-plus innings.

"It wasn't very fun," Orioles manager Brandon Hyde said. "We struggled offensively and gave up 10 runs, and there was ... the eighth inning with the rain."

COMFORTABLE MATCHUP

Odorizzi has gone five straight starts against Baltimore without allowing an earned run.

"There's a lot of guys I had never faced before tonight," Odorizzi said. "I don't know. Sometimes you just do well against certain teams, certain mounds. I kind of enjoy pitching here. It's got a good backdrop.'

Rangers end 6-game skid with 8-3 win over Elvis and the A's

ARLINGTON, Texas — Kyle Gibson couldn't really get comfortable on the mound, and that had nothing to do with new mandatory checks by umpires looking for foreign substances.

"I've only used rosin pitching my whole life. So they said, 'Hey, nothing looks sticky here, let's move on," said Gibson, who pitched into the sixth inning to help the Rangers end another losing streak.

Andy Ibañez and Jose Trevino hit three-run homers to back Gibson as the Rangers snapped a six-game losing streak with an 8-3 win over the Oakland Athletics and Elvis Andrus in the shortstop's return to Texas for the first time since getting traded. It was the fourth time this season the veteran right-hander started a win that ended a losing streak of at least three games for his team.

"That third inning, just kind of felt like I was fighting myself all night after that and I was just trying to find a pitch I could throw for a strike," Gibson said. "Just one of those weird nights, probably the first time in a while that I didn't feel comfortable with my delivery, didn't feel comfortable with where the ball was going."

Ibañez hit his first major league homer as part of a five-run first against Frankie Montas (7-7). The 28-year-old Cuban infielder made his big league debut last month and was recalled Monday after four homers his last nine games at Triple-A Round Rock.

Trevino hit a 420-foot drive to straightaway center for an 8-2 lead in the sixth, one batter before Montas was pulled.

"Playing with a five-run lead right from he beginning kind of puts everybody at ease a little bit. And you have your best guy on the mound," manager Chris Woodward said. "That probably wasn't obviously Gibby's best start, but he still found a way to to get us into the sixth inning."

Andrus got a nice ovation when he came to bat in the second inning. It kept getting louder, and he eventually stepped out of the batter's box with a smile on his face and tipped his helmet to the crowd.

"No surprise that he got the type of reception that he did. Monday night, good crowd, probably a lot had to do with Elvis coming back to town and playing. I think we all got a little choked up too," A's manager Bob Melvin said. "He's meant so much to this city and this team and been with them so long."

Many in the announced crowd of 20,259 got Andrus bobbleheads when entering the building. Those were initially part of planned giveaways last year that never happened since the Rangers played the 2020 season without fans in their new ballpark because of the coronavirus pandemic.

Andrus was traded just before spring training after deciding last offseason that Isiah-Kiner Falefa would move to shortstop after winning a Gold Glove at third base last season. Andrus was the longest-tenured player in Texas, the starting shortstop for 12 seasons and lone player remaining from the franchise's only World Series appearances in 2010 and 2011.

Andrus, hitting .220 after going 0 for 4, reached on an error by Kiner-Falefa in the eighth but was promptly retired when Sean Murphy hit a liner right at first baseman Nate Lowe, who turned and tagged out Andrus for a double play.

Gibson (5-0, 2.17 ERA) struck out three and walked three giving up two runs over 5 1/3 innings. The right-hander has made 15 consecutive starts without a losing decision, though that streak includes his first career opening day start, when the Rangers had its only other five-run first this season. Gibson then gave up five runs while recording only one out in the bottom of the first at Kansas City.

Since that opener, Gibson has given up more than two runs in a start only once.

The A's had a couple of two-out walks before getting a hit off Gibson, on Murphy's one-out solo homer in the fifth. Matt Olson and Ramón Laureano had back-to-back doubles to open the sixth.

Montas struck out six, but gave up eight runs and nine hits in 52/3innings.

"It was really humid, I got sweat all on my palms," Montas said. "That made the ball slippery."

SHORT HOPS

Murphy has eight homers overall, three in the last six games. ... Texas had at least multiple homers driving in at least three runs in the game game for only the third time since the start of the 2019 season.

RETURN FOR ELVIS

The Rangers got outfielder/designated hitter Khris Davis and switch-hitting catcher Jonah Heim from the A's in the Andrus deal. Davis is now a free agent after being designated for assignment June 8. He hit .157 with two homers and five RBIs in 22 games after missing the first 34 games of the season with a left quad strain. Heim has started 28 games.

UP NEXT

The Rangers said afterward that Taylor Hearn (2-1, 2.84) would start Tuesday instead of Jordan Lyles (2-5, 5.68 ERA), who gave up four home runs over 4 1/3 innings in his last start. The Rangers haven't won consecutive games since sweeping three games against Houston from May 21-23. Lefty Cole Irvin (4-7, 3.89) is on the mound for Oakland.



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
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

The bidding: East South West North 1 NT Pass 3 NT

Opening lead — queen of spades. It is not unusual for a declarer, after the play has concluded, to realize that he could have made a contract he failed to make. This is all the more annoying if it turns out that the winning play, regardless of how unusual it might be, was called for by the situation he faced.

Consider this deal where West led the queen of spades against three notrump. South took the queen with the king and cashed the A-Q of diamonds. When West discarded a club on the second diamond lead, declarer continued with a diamond to the king and conceded the diamond ten to East's jack, establishing dummy's nine as a trick. East then returned a spade to dummy's ace.

After cashing the nine of diamonds, declarer tried a heart finesse that succeeded, but he had to go down one because he could not get back to dummy to repeat the heart finesse. In all, he scored eight tricks consisting of two spades, two hearts and four diamonds.

Declarer quickly acknowledged that he had bungled the play. When West showed out on the queen of diamonds at trick three, South should have overtaken the queen with the king and taken a heart finesse. After the finesse succeeded, he could next play a diamond to dummy's 10-9-6, losing to East's jack, and later take a second heart finesse to make the con-

Granting that this series of plays is much easier to find if one sees all four hands, the fact remains that it is the right line of play on its merits. Once the diamonds don't break, declarer should reason that he cannot make the contract unless East holds the king of hearts, and he should adapt his play accordingly.




