Mayor: 'Looks like Fiji'

Thomason approves Big Spring water at Council meeting

At Tuesday evening's Big Spring City Council meeting, Mayor Shannon Thomason responded to a recent CBS 7 reported headlined "Some Spring residents dealing with yellow water" by comparing a sample of Big Spring water to a popular retail brand of bottled water, and taking swigs of the sample.

"Looks like Fiji," Thomason said of the bottled sample he later said was pulled from a Big Spring fire hydrant in the 1700 block of Kentucky.

The demonstration was in response to the CBS 7 report presented by news anchor Mary Kate Hamilton and reporter Kate Porter, which features a video featuring Hannah Saldivar, a homeowner in the area, describing a history of yellow water emerging from her faucets.

"Imagine turning on the sink and seeing yellow water come out," Hamilton said. "Well, that's what some people in Big Spring experience every day."

Following the Council meeting, Thomason said water going into the residence is clean, and suggested that discoloration might have occurred in the home's pipes, between the city's meter and the home's

Larry Nix was born April 26, 1940, in Big Spring Texas to Hoyle and Maude Nix. He graduated from Big Spring High School in 1958. Larry showed an early interest in music and when he was 8 years old, he was asked to sing with his dad, Hoyle and the West Texas Cowboys. The song he chose was "I Overlooked An Orchid." Larry said he was a

Editor's Note: Each year little nervous and started the song singing the bridge instead of the verse. He said, "it worked out ok."

Hoyle's base player left the band in 1957 just as Larry had turned 17, Hoyle asked Larry if he could play bass in the band. He did not say much but he got the job playing the big upright. He said he played lots of 2/4 and 4/4rhythm patterns and never got his fingers to where he didn't have to tape them to keep from getting blisters. Brother Jody said "Larry's salvation was when Fender built an electric bass and they sent one to the Bob Wills band. Hoyle and the West Texas Cowboys played a dance with Mr. Wills and Hoyle asked Luke Wills if he would let Larry try out the new electric bass. If Bob Wills had one in the band it was ok with Larry. Uncle Ben Nix had been showing Larry lots of chords on the guitar and it was easy to convert over to bass. Larry worked with Hoyle for 28 years and played on many of the good records in the late 50's including the 1959 version of "Big Balls In Cowtown."

When Hoyle passed away in August of 1985, Larry's little brother Jody, took over the band. Larry loved playing in the band however, he had other obligations and a full-time job with Fina Refinery. By the year 2000, Jody



water taps.

"This (the clear water sample) is representative of the water going up to her meter," Thomason said. "From the meter to the house could be a different story." Thomason said homeowners are responsible for maintenance of water pipes within their homes, while the city's responsibility for maintenance ends with the water meter on each

Thomason's demonstration occurred at the end of the council meeting, as part of his comments during the "Council Input" portion of the meeting. The item was not on the meeting's agenda for any type of action.

In other business, the council approved three ordinances on first reading.

The first of the three amended the 2020-21 budget for the purchase of a riding lawnmower for the Mc-Mahon-Wrinkle Airpark. The amount approved for the purchase was \$20,000. "The airport uses a lot of tools and equipment, but

probably the most use of all are the mowers that we have," said Airport Director Jim Little. "We have a lot of acreage and very rough terrain out there with all the prairie dog holes and mounds and other irregular terrain."

Little reported that the Airpark had already received one new lawnmower this year for a mower that failed, but a second mower has now failed.

City Manager Todd Darden reminded the council that they had already authorized the purchase and now simply needed to approve the budget amendment. The motion passed 7-0.

The second budget amendment transferred \$370,000 from the city's Utility Fund to the Convention and Visitor's Bureau to create additional parking space for the Municipal Auditorium. "In last year's budget we had budgeted parking

for the auditorium, and due to COVID, we did have to stop that project," CVB Director Hayley Herrera said. "We do still need that additional parking." Herrera said the CVB would pay the money back

to the Utility Fund through an installment plan.

The council approved the item 7-0.

The third budget amendment consolidated several items in the Big Spring City Code relating to boards and committees. The item included a clause relating to the city's Animal Rescue and Adoption Committee, but City Attorney Andrew Hagen explained that the proposal erroneously included wording in relationship to that committee which applied to counties with populations exceeding 75,000, and the laws could be interpreted as also applying to cities in those large counties. More populous areas have different rules for their Animal Rescue committees than do less populous areas.

Thomason suggested an amendment to the proposed change to correct the error, and the board approved the amendment and the ordinance both 7-0. In other business, the council approved a 90-day

extension to a "Meet and Confer" agreement between the City of Big Spring and the Big Spring Professional Firefighter's Association (BSPFFA) Local No. 2922 of the International Association of Firefighters. The agreement, first ratified in January 2016, has been renewed and extended several times since then.

"Meet and Confer" is a style of discussion regarding contracts between an employer (the city) and a union (BSPFFA).

Darden said the meeting between the city and union is scheduled Thursday. The council approved the extension unanimously.

unanimously proved during the meeting, the council designated Darden, Assistant City Manager John Medina, and Finance Director Sandra Smith as investment officers and busirepresentatives for the city; acknowledged the receipt of Big Spring EDC minutes from the May 18, 2021, meeting; and approved authorization for the Big Spring Police Department to apply for a 50 percent Bureau of Justice Assistance Grant for the purchase

of body armor.

Oakland Athletics race to large, early lead, defeat Texas Rangers 13-6

ARLINGTON, Texas — Matt Chapman and Ramon Laureano hit two-run home runs in the first two innings and Cole Irvin earned his second straight win as the Oakland A's capitalized early on Texas' unorthodox sequence of pitchers, racing to an early nine-run lead on the way to a 13-6 win over the Rangers on Tuesday night.

Laureano, Mark Canha and former Rangers All-Star Elvis Andrus had three hits apiece as the A's banged out a season-high 15 hits and snapped a three-game losing streak to win for the 10th time in 14 games.

"Nobody panicked (after Monday's 8-3 loss to Texas)," said Andrus, who went 0 for 4 Monday in his first game against Texas, where he had spent 12 seasons. "We knew we needed to come in hot."

Irvin (5-7) cruised through four scoreless innings on 40 pitches before allowing four runs on four hits and a hit batter in the fifth.

Taylor Hearn (2-2), making his second start in 38 major league appearances and the first since his MLB debut in April 2019, was chased early. He was charged with four runs in the first inning on two hits and three walks, throwing 34 pitches and recording two outs.

Texas manager Chris Woodward had said he hoped to get about 50 pitches from Hearn before turning to veteran starter Jordan Lyles, who gave up four home runs in 4 1/3 innings in his most recent start last Wednesday at Houston.

"Talking to (Hearn) before the game, I don't think it was a nervous thing," Woodward said. "He just didn't have good command. I mean, he was all over the place."

Eli White and Joey Gallo homered in the seventh and eighth innings to account for Texas' other

The Rangers were trying to win consecutive games for the first time since May 21-23, after snapping a six-game losing streak Monday. Texas has 20 of its last 24 games.

Hearn began the game by walking Canha on four pitches, then served up Chapman's homer to dead center. When Woodward brought in Brett de Geus with two out and the bases loaded in the inning, Andrus hit a two-run single up the middle.

Laureano homered to center in the second off de Geus. Lyles came on to start the third inning, allowed two runs on three hits and then worked five scoreless on two singles. After Lyles departed, Oakland added four runs on five hits in the ninth inning off Demarcus Evans.

The Rangers scored four runs in the fifth on RBI hits by Willie Calhoun, Charlie Culberson, White and Adolis Garcia.

Greinke, Astros beat Orioles 3-1 for 9th straight win

BALTIMORE— Dusty Baker has been around long enough to know what it takes for a team to get on a lengthy winning streak.

After watching Zack Greinke stymie the Baltimore Orioles on Tuesday night for Houston's ninth straight victory, Baker was asked to explain the reason behind the Astros' most successful run since the 2019 season.

"We're getting good starting pitching," the longtime manager declared. "That's where it starts."

Greinke took a four-hitter into the eighth inning and Myles Straw had two RBIs in Houston's gritty 3-1 win. One night earlier, starter Jake Odorizzi pitched five hitless innings to spark a 10-2 rout of the lowly Orioles.

Greinke (8-2) allowed one run and five hits with four strikeouts and a walk over 7 1/3 innings. Facing the Orioles for the first time since 2010, the 37-year-old righty permitted only one runner past second base in lowering his ERA to 3.56.

The 18-year veteran attributed his solid outing to re-discovering his command of the fastball.

"It hasn't been that great," Greinke

acknowledged. "I can't remember when it was good. It's been a while."

On this night, he was overpowering. "The guy knows how to pitch," Orioles outfielder DJ Stewart said. "He's been getting outs and doing this for a long, long time. He keeps you off balance with fastball, curveball, change-

Brooks Raley got two strikeouts in the eighth and Ryan Pressly finished for his 11th save in 12 tries.

Straw hit a solo shot in the second inning and singled in the tiebreaking run in the seventh before Chas Mc-Cormick added a sacrifice fly in the

"He's using the whole field, he's turning on the ball," Baker said of Straw, the No. 8 hitter in the lineup. "We're just glad he's doing his thing. We need him, especially at the bottom of the order there."

Riding their longest streak since a 10-game run in May 2019, the Astros own the best record in the AL (45-28). Houston has won seven straight series after taking the first two of this three-game set.

Baltimore has lost 12 of 13 and owns the AL's worst record (23-50). Righthander Jorge López (2-9) gave up two runs and five hits over 6 1/3 innings but was outdone by Greinke.

Straw put the Astros up 1-0 with his third home run in 432 career at-bats. The liner to left was initially ruled a double, but the call was overturned after a replay showed the ball clearing the 7-foot wall — and the glove of leaping outfielder Austin Hays — before bouncing back onto the field.

Baltimore used a walk, a single and a fly ball by Cedric Mullins to tie it in the third.

López was lifted in the seventh after McCormick led off with an infield hit. Straw greeted Hunter Harvey with an opposite-field bloop to right that landed in front of a diving Stewart, and by the time the outfielder retrieved the ball and got it to the plate, McCormick had already scored.

REST FOR THE WEARY

Astros SS Carlos Correa was given the day off after going the distance Monday night in a game that lasted 3:40 and featured rain delays totaling 1 hour, 41 minutes. Baker originally planned to sit Correa later this week in Detroit before the Monday marathon "kind of messed up our plans."

Texas extends CWS stay, knocks out Volunteers with 8-4 win

OMAHA, Neb. — Freshman nerves? Apparently there's no such thing to Texas relief pitcher Tanner Witt.

With the Longhorns in an elimination game at the College World Series and Tennessee on the verge of a big inning in a one-run game, Witt got the call with two runners on base and one out.

The moment was not too big for Witt. He embraced it.

"I love that big stage, big atmosphere," he said. "I feel I only get better in those situations because that's what I live for."

Witt threw 5 2/3 innings in his longest outing as a collegian, and the No. 2 national seed Longhorns eliminated Tennessee with an 8-4 victory Tuesday.

Silas Ardoin provided the key hit — a tie-breaking, two-run single — and was part of a crucial double play that helped the Longhorns (48-16) pick up their first win in Omaha since 2014. No. 3 Tennessee (50-18), which lost its opener to Virginia 6-0, went two-and-out in its first appearance since 2005.

"Sometimes baseball is a crazy game," the Vols' Pete Derkay said. "First day we kind of just didn't show up like we were capable of doing. Today, they were

Witt (5-0) allowed only three singles, walked none and struck out two. He pitched three 1-2-3 innings and no Tennessee runners made it past first base after the fourth inning.

"Future of Texas pitching is in good hands," left fielder Eric Kennedy said. 'As a freshman he's the most poised pitcher I've ever seen. Nothing fazes him.

He's been nails all season, and that just continued

on the biggest stage.

"I know a lot of guys, if that was their first appearance, they would be walking a bunch of guys or not have their stuff. But he was able to do what he's been doing all year."

Witt threw 78 pitches -25 ore than his previous high — and never had a doubt he would go out to pitch the ninth.



"I felt my best stuff was later in my outing and that's big," he said. "It's elimination games. You've got to do whatever you can for your team to win. That's all I was trying to do. I wasn't focused on how long I was going or how short I

watched from the stands in his orange polo and white ballcap.



right, and some days you guess everything wrong. That's the way it often goes, yet some guesses in bridge are not really guesses at all, if you stop to reason them out. Assume you're in four spades and

West leads the eight of clubs. Let's say you duck East's jack and take the king with the ace at trick two. You want to get to dummy to take a trump finesse, so you lead a diamond, on which West follows low, and you're now faced with a harrowing guess — whether to play the jack or the king. If West has the queen, you should play the jack; if West has the ace, you should play the king. How can you resolve such a prob-

lem without seeing the East-West cards? Do you toss a coin, do you pray to the gods of chance or do you instead search for whatever clues might be available? Oddly enough, all the information

you need to resolve the issue is available, but you might have to work a bit to come up with the right answer. Here's how you go about it: You

know from the first two plays that East started with the K-Q-J of clubs. You also know that you can't make the contract unless East has the king of spades, which you plan to finesse against if and when you get to dummy.

Once you decide, of necessity, to credit East with the king of spades, you can't also credit him with the ace of diamonds, since he surely would have opened the bidding if he had that card. So you go up with the king of diamonds, take the trump finesse and wind up making the contract instead of going down two, which is what would happen if you played the jack from dummy.



Today's Highlights in History:

On June 23, 1972, President Richard Nixon signed Title IX barring discrimination on the basis of sex for "any education program or activity receiving rederal financial accidence" federal financial assistance."
(On the same day, Nixon and White House chief of staff H.R. Haldeman discussed H.A. Haldeman discussed using the CIA to obstruct the FBI's Watergate investigation. Revelation of the tape record-ing of this conversation sparked Nixon's resignation in 1974.)

On this date:

In 1888, abolitionist Frederick Douglass received one vote from the Kentucky delegation at the Republican convention in Chicago, effectively making him the first Black candidate to have his name placed in nomi-nation for U.S. president. (The nomination went to Benjamin

In 1904, President Theodore Roosevelt was nominated for a second term of office at the Republican National Convention in Chicago.

In 1931, aviators Wiley Post and Harold Gatty took off from New York on a round-the-world flight that lasted eight days and

In 1947, the Senate joined the House in overriding President Harry S. Truman's veto of the Taft-Hartley Act, designed to limit the power of organized labor

In 1956, Gamal Abdel Nasser was elected president of Egypt.

In 1969, Warren E. Burger was sworn in as chief justice of the United States by the man he was succeeding, Earl Warren.

In 1985, all 329 people aboard an Air India Boeing 747 were killed when the plane crashed into the Atlantic Ocean near Ireland because of a bomb authorities believe was planted by Sikh separatists.

In 1988, James E. Hansen, a climatologist at the Goddard Institute for Space Studies, told a Senate panel that global warm-ing of the earth caused by the "greenhouse effect" was a reality.

In 1993, in a case that drew widespread attention, Lorena Bobbitt of Prince William County, Va., sexually mutilated her husband, John, after he'd allegedly raped her. (John Bobbitt was later acquitted of marital sexual assault; Lorena Bobbitt was later acquitted of malicious wounding by reason of insanity.)

In 1995, Dr. Jonas Salk, the medical pioneer who developed the first vaccine to halt the crip-pling rampage of polio, died in La Jolla (HOY'-ah), California, at age 80.

In 1997, civil rights activist Betty Shabazz, the widow of Malcolm X, died in New York of burns suffered in a fire set by her 12-year-old grandson; she was 61. (Malcolm Shabazz pleaded guilty to arson and other charges and was placed in juvenile detention.)

In 2009, "Tonight Show" side-kick Ed McMahon died in Los Angeles at 86.

Ten years ago: Republicans pulled out of debt-reduction talks led by Vice President Joe Biden, blaming Democrats for demanding tax increases as part of a deal rather than accepting more than \$1 trillion in cuts to Medicare and other government programs. "Columbo" actor Peter Falk died in Beverly Hills, California, at age 83.

Five years ago: Floods tore through parts of West Virginia, killing 23 people and destroying or damaging thousands of homes, businesses, schools and infrastructure. Britain voted to leave the European Union after a bitterly divisive referendum campaign, toppling Prime Minister David Cameron, who had led the campaign to keep Britain in the EU. A shorthanded and deeply divided Supreme Court deadlocked 4-4 on President Barack Obama's

immigration plan to help millions living in the U.S. illegally, effectively killing it. In a narrow victory for affirmative action, the Supreme Court upheld, 4-3, a University of Texas program that took account of reactions. 4-3, a University of Lexas program that took account of race in deciding whom to admit. Appalachian music patriarch Ralph Stanley, 89, who helped define the bluegrass sound, died in Sandy Ridge, Virginia.

One year ago: A private funeral for Rayshard Brooks, a Black man who was shot by a white police officer outside an Atlanta restaurant, was held at Ebenezer Baptist Church, where the Rev. Martin Luther King Jr. once Baptist Church, where the Rev. Martin Luther King Jr. once preached. The Louisville police department fired an officer involved in the fatal shooting of Breonna Taylor more than three months earlier, saying Brett Hankison had shown "extreme indifference to the value of human life" when he fired ten rounds into Taylor's apartment. (A second officer was also fired; Hankison is facing charges of endangerment.) Tennis player Novak Djokovic said he and his wife tested positive for the coronavirus after he played in exhibition matches he organized in Serbia and Croatia without social distancing; he was the fourth player to come down with COVID-19 after taking part. Major League Baseball issued a 60-game schedule for a season to start in late July in empty ballparks. Saudi Arabia said that because of the coronavirus, only "very limited numbers" of people could perform the annual hajj pilgrimage. Segway said it would end production of its two-wheeled personal transporter.
