Inmate assault reported at FCI Big Spring on Sunday, July 4

Editor's Note: A press release was issued Sunday afternoon regarding an incident at the FCI Big Spring facility. The release reads as follows:

On Sunday, July 4, 2021, at approximately 6:15 p.m., an inmate was assaulted at the Federal Correctional Institution (FCI) Big Spring in Big Spring, Texas. Responding staff immediately initiated life-saving measures. Staff requested emergency medical services (EMS) and life-saving efforts continued. The inmate was transported by EMS to a local hospital for treatment.

The incident was immediately contained and the institution remains secure.

The Federal Bureau of Investigation was notified. No staff or other inmates were injured, and at no time was the public in danger.

FCI Big Spring is a Low security level facility that currently houses 851 male offenders. Additional information about the Federal Bureau of Prisons can be found at www.bop.gov.

Once a luxurious southern getaway on a rustic lake, then reduced to a dilapidated crash pad, the Summer House is now the grisly scene of a nighttime mass murder in "The Summer House" (AUCD F PAT J) by James Patterson. Eyewitnesses point to four Army Rangers, known as the Ninja Squad, recently returned from Afghanistan. To ensure that justice is done, the Army sends Major Jeremiah Cook, a veteran and former NYPD cop, to investigate. But the major and his elite team arrive in sweltering Georgia with no idea their grim jobs will be made exponentially more challenging by local law enforcement, who resists the Army's intrusion and stonewall them at every turn. As Cook and his squad struggle to uncover the truth behind the condemning evidence, the pieces just won't fit and forces are rallying to make certain damning secrets die alongside the victims in the murder house. With his own people in the cross-hairs,

even if it means returning to a hell of his own worst nightmare.

One phone call is all it takes to lure real estate photographer Mallory Aldiss back to her family Rhode Island beach home in "A Week at the Shore" (AUCD F DEL B) by Barbara Delinsky. It's been 20 years since she's been gone, running from the scandal that destroyed her parents' marriage, drove her and her two sisters apart, and crushed her relationship with the love of her life, Jack Sabathian. Twenty years during which she lived in New York, building her career as a photographer and raiding her now-teenage daughter, Joy. But a threatening phone call makes it clear that something has brought the past forward again, something involving Mallory's father. Compelled by concern for her family and by Joy's wish to visit her mother's childhood home, Mallory returns to Bay Blue where conflicting loyalties will be faced and painful truths revealed. In just seven watershed days on the Rhode Island coast three women will test the bonds of sisterhood, friendship, and family, and discover the role that love and memory plays in defining their lives.

The small town of Lachlan, Florida, was rocked last year when two bodies were uncovered in the roots of a fallen tree "A Justified Murder" - Medlar Mystery series #2 (AUCD F DEV J) by Jude Deveraux. Despite their lack of investigative experience, Sara Medlar; her niece, Kate; and Jack Wyatt found themselves at the center of the mystery, working together to reveal the truth behind a decades-old secret in the sleepy town. After a narrow escape, they vowed to never again involve themselves in something so dangerous until Janet Beeson is murdered. When Janet's body is discovered, everyone is shocked by the violence of the attack. The sweet little old woman has been shot, stabbed and poisoned, but no one can imagine who would want to harm one of the town's kindest, most helpful residents. Sara, Kate and Jack are determined to leave this case to the professionals. But they are soon bombarded by townspeople eager to tell their stories and clear their names with the trio who solved the Morris murders. Even the sheriff is hoping they'll lend their skills to a crime that seems to have no explanation and no motive.

that there are more secrets buried in quiet Lachlan than anyone could have imagined.

He appears in the darkness like a ghost, made of shadows and fear, the Midnight Man in "The Dark Corners of the Night" (AUCD F GAR M) by Meg Gardiner. He comes for the parents but leaves the children alive, tiny witnesses to unspeakable horror. The bedroom communities of Los Angeles are gripped with dread, and the attacks are escalating. Still reeling from her best friend's close call in a bombing six months ago, FBI behavioral analyst Caitlin Hendrix has come to Los Angeles to assist in the Midnight Man investigation and do what she does best, hunt a serial killer. Her work is what keeps her going, but something about this UNSUB, unknown subject, doesn't sit right. She soon realizes that this case will test not only her skills but also her dedication, for within the heart of a killer lives a secret that mirrors Caitlin's own past. Hesitancy is not an option, but will she be able to do what must be done if the time comes?

Peralta 7 scoreless innings for Detroit Tigers in 7-3 win at Texas Rangers

ARLINGTON, Texas—Wily Peralta threw seven scoreless innings in his longest big league outing since 2016 and the Detroit Tigers beat the Texas Rangers 7-3 on Monday night.

No. 9 batter Zack Short homered for the Tigers, who have won three in a row and five of six. Former Rangers outfielder Nomar Mazara twice drove in a run without a hit.

Peralta (2-1), back in the majors only three weeks, struck out six without a walk while throwing 61 of 91 pitches for strikes. The right-hander allowed only three hits in his fourth start for Detroit.

"I know that if I'm healthy 100%, I'm going to be able to do my job, and that's what I'm doing right now. I'm thankful to the team for this opportunity," Peralta said. "I just need to get used to (starting) again, and right now I feel very comfortable."

Kolby Allard (2-5) struck out a career-high nine in his 5 1/3 innings, and only two of the five runs scored against the Texas lefty were earned.

The Rangers avoided a shutout with back-to-back homers with two outs in the ninth off reliever Bryan Garcia. All-Star right fielder Joey Gallo's 21st homer was an opposite-field, two-run shot to left before Jonah Heim also went deep.

"Outside of Kolby and a couple of homers in the ninth, that was probably our worst game of the year," Rangers manager Chris Woodward said. "We didn't really stick to the plan we talked about with Peralta. He was good, don't get me wrong. He mixed up his speeds and executed some pitches."

The 32-year-old Peralta was released by Kansas City midseason two years ago and spent all of 2020 as a free agent before going to spring training this year with the Tigers on a minor league deal and starting the season at Triple-A Toledo.

"He was late to camp, and didn't get an opportunity, but hung with us until we needed him, and it's big for him and big for our team," Tigers manager A.J. Hinch said. "Hard to complain about anything that's he's doing right now."

Peralta made 120 starts for Milwaukee from his debut in 2012 until the Brewers moved him to the bullpen midway through the 2017 season, and was a reliever for all 79 of his games for the Royals in 2018 and 2019. He hadn't pitched at least seven innings since back-to-back starts in 2016 (Aug. 30 and Sept. 6).

Detroit went ahead to stay in the fourth when Miguel Cabrera had a leadoff single and later scored as Mazara reached on a fielder's choice grounder.

Dominant Luka: Doncic, Slovenia headed to Tokyo Olympics

Most of the members of Slovenia's basketball team charged toward Luka Doncic moments after the final buzzer sounded Sunday, determined to get him onto their shoulders and carry their best player around the court in celebration.

How fitting.

He lifted them, so they lifted him. Doncic and Slovenia are headed to the Olympics for the first time, after winning 96-85 at Lithuania on Sunday to clinch a spot in the Tokyo Games. Doncic — the MVP of the tournament in Kaunas, Lithuania — was simply brilliant: 31 points, 11 rebounds and 13 assists, the first triple-double by any player in any of the four Olympic qualifying tournaments that were played in the past week to determine the last four teams in the Olympic

"I don't care about the MVP," Doncic said. "We won here. We're going to the Olympics, the first time in our country. It's amazing. I think every kid dreams about being in the Olympics. I did, too. So, here we are. We fought really, really hard and I think we deserve to be here."

The game was tied 52-52 at halftime, and Slovenia opened the third on an 11-2 run. Lithuania eventually closed within 71-69, but a 14-0 run by Slovenia put Doncic's club in control for

And when the last few seconds ticked away, Doncic threw his arms skyward in celebration.

"We're making history for our country," Doncic said. "We can just go up from here."

Lithuania was one of four nations playing host to Olympic qualifiers that ended Sunday, all four being winner-take-all events, one team from each region making the Tokyo field. And all four home teams, which

figured to have major advantages by being at home, fell short of the Olympics. Slovenia beat Lithuania in the final, Croatia and Canada lost semifinal games — and Serbia, the reigning Olympic silver medalists, were stunned in a regional final Sunday by

"A huge disappointment," Lithuania coach Darius Maskoliunas said. "We lost at home. We expected a bette sult."

Slovenia will be placed in Group C for the Tokyo Games, one of the three four-team groups at the Olympics. Slovenia will play Argentina on July 26, Japan on July 29 and reigning World Cup champion Spain on Aug. 1. The top two teams in each group, plus two wild-cards, will make the Olympic quarterfinals.

"It's just one of the best feelings," Doncic said. "We worked hard for this."

Vlatko Cancar scored 18 for Slovenia, which got 16 from Jaka Blazic and 13 from Mike Tobey.

Jonas Valanciunas, Arnas Butkevicius and Mantas Kalnietis each scored 14 for Lithuania, which will miss the Olympics for the first time since getting its independence from the Soviet Union; it had been to each of the past seven Olympics, starting in 1992.

Eimantas Bendzius scored 11 and Marius Grigonis added 10 for Lithu-

BELGRADE, SERBIA REGION ITALY 102, SERBIA 95

Italy went into Serbia and pulled off a stunner, eliminating the team that finished second behind the U.S. at the 2016 Rio de Janeiro Games.

Nico Mannion scored 24 points, Achille Polonara scored 22 and Italy reached the Olympics for the first time since the 2004 Athens Games — leading by as many as 24 before a tunned arena in Belgrade.

Simone Fontecchio scored 21, Stefano Tonut added 15 and Alessandro Pajola added 10 for Italy. The Italians will be Group B at the Tokyo Olympics, facing Germany — another winner on Sunday — on July 25, Australia on July 28 and Nigeria on July 31.

Danilo Andjusic scored 27 for Serbia, while Filip Petrusev scored 22 and Ognjen Dobric added 17.

Health big issue for swimming's Tokyo-bound Campbell sisters

Cate Campbell got "a huge wake-up call" when she went in for a routine checkup and discovered that she had skin cancer on her right arm.

Younger sister Bronte Campbell deals with so many aching muscles, bones and joints that she says "it feels like it's every part of me."

Even before the coronavirus pandemic, the Australian swimming siblings have had their share of health concerns.

None of that stopped them from qualifying for the Tokyo Olympics: Cate in the 50- and 100-meter freestyle and Bronte in two relays. Both are also slated to compete on a heavily favored Dolphins' team aiming for a third straight gold in the 4x100 free relay — on the first day of swimming finals July 25.

Relays and medals quickly became an afterthought three years ago, though, when Cate was diagnosed with a Stage 1 melanoma.

"I just went in for a routine skin check and the dermatologist just didn't really like the look of one of the moles, which had been on my arm my whole life and I hadn't noticed any changes," Cate said during a video interview with The Associated Press.

The mole had to be removed, as well as some surrounding tissue, leaving a nasty scar on her biceps.

"Fortunately that was it for me," Cate said "Got all the cancer cells and I was in the clear.... If you can catch it early it's very, very treatable — like myself. But if you leave it untreated, it can have some really serious consequences." Cate now uses her Instagram account to promote skin care and sun protec-

"It could potentially save someone's life," she said. "Power of social media,

Both Campbells are among Australia's most well-known athletes, with each winning titles in the 100 free — swimming's signature event — at back-to-back

world championships: Cate in 2013 and Bronte in 2015. Bronte improved on Cate's performance by sweeping gold in the 50 and the 100 in Kazan, Russia, in 2015 after Cate combined silver in the 50 with her 100 victory in Barcelona two years earlier.





provides a case in point. At most tables, North-South wound up in six spades. However, only one declarer managed to take 12 tricks on a hand where only one trick should be lost

with proper play.

It isn't hard to figure out why so many declarers failed to make the slam. They chose to crossruff, trumping hearts or clubs in dummy and ruffing diamonds in their hand.

However, there aren't enough trumps and top tricks in the combined hands for this approach to succeed. Even if declarer were able to score all eight of his trumps separately (not possible, of course, after a trump lead), these tricks plus the three side aces do not add up to 12.

The simple mathematics of the situation was duly noted by the one declarer who made the slam. After determining that he was sure to fall short of his goal by adopting a crossruff, he decided instead to establish dummy's diamonds.

He won the spade lead with dummy's ten, cashed the ace of diamonds and trumped a diamond, felling West's king. He then overtook the jack of spades with the queen, cashed the spade ace and conceded the jack of diamonds to East's queen.

Dummy's remaining diamonds were now good, and the six of spades provided the entry to them. With the two singletons in dummy covered by South's aces, the slam was home.
