It's still the middle of summer, but fall will be rolling around before you know it, and local kids will be heading back to school. Here's the scoop on registration for lomarily by grade rather than location of residence, with one exception. Pre-K students all attend Kentwood Early Childhood Center 2500 Merrily; Kindergarteners through second graders all attend either Marcy Elementary School, 2101 Wasson Dr., or Moss Elementary School, 3200 Fordham, determined by residence. A map of the two schools' attendance zones can be found on the district's website. All BSISD third graders attend Washington Elementary, 1201 S. Birdwell Lane; fourth graders attend Goliad Elementary School, 1801 S. Goliad; and fifth and sixth graders attend Big Spring Intermediate School, 2000 S. Goliad. Seventh and eighth graders attend Big Spring Junior High School, 624 E. Sixth Street; and ninth-12th gradSchool, 707 E. 11th Place.

Students enrolling in a Big Spring ISD school for the first time should bring the following information to registration: an official birth certificate for each child (not a hospital copy); an official Social Security card (or non-U.S. Citizen passport) for each child; current immunization records for each child; the enrolling parent's valid driver's license or state-issued picture ID card; the enrolling parent's proof of residence (such as a water, electricity or gas bill, or lease or mortgage in the enrolling parent's name); and, if the enrollment is by a non-birth parent, legal guardianship documents must be provided. In addition, for Pre-K eligibility, students must meet one of the following requirements and present documentation to that effect during registration: Educationally disadvantaged, military dependent, foster care, bilingual, homeless, or Star of Texas (child of a first responder).

City urges residents to move cars for seal-coat project

City of Big Spring crews began work on another seal coating project yesterday. No set ending date was given by the city; a city representative said the project would continue until it is finished, and that the amount of time it will take depends on factors such as weather.

The project is targeting the following locations: Vines Avenue from Birdwell

to Circle; Arizona Street from Tucson to Sunset; Tucson Road from Birdwell to Tulsa; Kenney Street from Circle to East 11th Place; Circle Drive from East Fourth Street to Tucson; and South Goliad Street from East Fourth Street to East 10th Street.

The city asks that residents in the affected areas remove



all vehicles from the roadways in order to allow the crews to complete the work efficiently. If the vehicles block the roadwork, an attempt will be made to contact the owners by knocking on doors in the area. If crews are unable to contact owners, vehicles which block the roadwork will be towed as a last resort at owners? expense.

During the project, citizens will be per-

mitted to park vehicles on the sidewalk and/or yard, but should be removed as soon as the roadwork is complete in your area.

It's that stage of year that football is setting up to kick off. This is likewise correct for the annual YMCA flag football league. The flag football club is an exceptional practice for the newer kids to master the game's fundamentals. Since it's flag football, it also will help reduce some of the contact as well.

This will be the eighth year that the YMCA has put on this great flag league, and it will be the fifth year that the NFL will sponsor the league. Since this is an NFL flag league, all the teams will be named after actual NFL teams, and they will also receive that team's jersey for this forthcoming year. It's a fun way for the kids to get to know more about the NFL and all of its teams. The YMCA is under the NFL flag football umbrella, the teams can travel and compete in tournaments all around the United States if they desire.

The league will split down into age group divisions. They will have a three to four-year-old age group. There will likewise be a five to seven-yearold age group. An eight to ten year-old age group and an 11-14-year-old age group. Registration for the league is accessible now and will run until Aug, 11. The cost for the league is \$73 if you are a member of the YMCA, and it will be \$78 if you are not a member. This price will include the jerseys, flags, pretty much everything, and anything needed for this flag football league.

As with any league, they are regularly searching for volunteers to help coach these youths to learn how to play the great game of football. The coach's meeting will start at the end of the registration. Practices will begin in the latter part of Aug. After all, the coaches are determined. US women shut out the noise in quest for 5th gold medal

TOKYO — The U.S. women's national soccer team is in a bubble of its own making for the Tokyo Olympics, and it's not just because of coronavirus restrictions.

The World Cup champions have become adept at shutting out all the outside noise — the seemingly endless social media debates, the TV punditry and even the trash talk that comes with being the best in the world.

"I think, especially the players that have been through these major tournaments, you figure out how to stay in the best mental headspace and sometimes that's compartmentalizing, that's focusing on one thing at a time and trying not to let the noise get into what we like to call the bubble," defender Becky Sauerbrunn said. "So like, secure the bubble, protect the bubble."

The women's Olympic soccer tournament starts on Wednesday. The United States, the top-ranked team in the world and the favorite to win, opens against Sweden at Tokyo Stadium.

The Americans are vying for their fifth gold medal, more than any other national team. They can also become the first women to win an Olympic gold following a World Cup title. in terms of being able to go for a walk or just get outside, go grab a coffee that sort of thing. That's not available to us," defender Kelley O'Hara said. "But at the end of the day we've all been doing it for a month now with national team, so it's the reality of the tournament, of the situation, of the Olympics this year. You just kind of take it in stride and make do with what you can."

The United States had a pre-tournament camp in Miyazaki before arriving in Tokyo on Friday in preparation for Sweden, the team that knocked the Americans out of the 2016 Olympics in the quarterfinals.

Australia plays New Zealand in the second match of the night at Tokyo Stadium. Twelve women's teams are divided into three groups for the tournament, which is being played at six stadiums across the country.

There are a pair of Wednesday matches at the Sapporo Dome: Britain plays Chile and host Japan play Canada. Additionally, China plays Brazil and Zambia plays the Netherlands at Miyagi Stadium.

As captain of the United States, Sauerbrunn is tasked with keeping her side focused.



There's reason to believe they'll do just that. The group is undefeated in 44 straight games, the second-longest unbeaten streak in team history. It's a deep squad with a formidable attack: Seventeen of the players were on the World Cup squad.

Christen Press has been directly involved in 37 goals in her last 37 matches, with 16 goals and 18 assists. Megan Rapinoe, the unabashedly outspoken winger with purple hair, leads the team with seven goals this year.

Quietly holding down the defense is goalkeeper Alyssa Naeher, who has six shutouts in nine starts this year.

Naeher is perhaps the leader on the team when it comes to shutting out the noise. She eschewed all social media during the team's run in France two years ago, and often worked on crossword puzzles before matches to chill out before games.

"Everything's all about compartmentalizing," the softspoken Naeher said.

Of course, it will likely be a bit easier to stay focused at this tournament. Ja-

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pan is in a state of emergency because of rising coronavirus cases. As a result, the athletes participating will be in their own team or individual bubbles with strict CO-VID-19 protocols. And no fans will be allowed.

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"It's a skill that I think everyone needs to learn, especially in these major tournaments, because they're not easy," Sauerbrunn said about compartmentalizing. "There's a lot of stress, there's a lot of noise and so learning to knock that out, block that out, is really important."

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

Opening lead — queen of spades.

This deal comes from a team-offour match. At the first table, South wound up in six clubs doubled after North had opened with a weak twoheart bid.

West led the queen of spades, on which declarer played low from dummy. East followed with the deuce, in effect asking his partner to stop playing the suit. (Had East wanted another spade lead, he would have played a higher spade.) But

West, ignoring his partner's request that he shift to a different suit, continued with a spade.

For declarer, this was manna from heaven. He ruffed the spade, cashed the ace of clubs, led a heart to dummy's king, returned the ten of clubs to his jack, drew East's last trump and claimed the rest of the tricks. West's failure to lead a diamond at trick two, the obvious shift, allowed declarer to score 1,090 points instead of losing 100.

The deal demonstrates the importance of partnership cooperation on defense. Perhaps West was constitutionally unable to bring himself to lead away from the king of diamonds at trick two and decided instead to make the "safe" lead of another spade. Then, too, East could have overtaken his partner's queen and cashed the ace of diamonds.

Oddly enough, this result was only a small part of a double disaster for their team. At the other table, their teammates, sitting North-South, allowed their opponents to play six spades doubled, making with an overtrick, for a score of 1,860 points! Declarer ruffed South's king-of-clubs lead in dummy, finessed the queen of spades and easily took the rest of the tricks.

The successful team thus gained 2,950 points on this one deal!





Today's Highlight in History:

On July 21, 1944, American forces landed on Guam during World War II, capturing it from the Japanese some three weeks later.

On this date:

In 1861, during the Civil War, the first Battle of Bull Run was fought at Manassas, Virginia, resulting in a Confederate victory.

In 1925, the so-called "Monkey Trial" ended in Dayton, Tennessee, with John T. Scopes found guilty of violating state law for teaching Darwin's Theory of Evolution. (The conviction was later overturned on a technicality.)

In 1954, the Geneva Conference concluded with accords dividing Vietnam into northern and southern entities.

In 1969, Apollo 11 astronauts Neil Armstrong and Edwin "Buzz" Aldrin blasted off from the moon aboard the ascent stage of the lunar module for docking with the command module.

In 1972, the Irish Republican Army carried out 22 bombings in Belfast, Northern Ireland, killing nine people and injuring 130 in what became known as "Bloody Friday."

In 1980, draft registration began in the United States for 19- and 20-year-old men.

In 1999, Navy divers found and recovered the bodies of John F. Kennedy Jr., his wife, Carolyn, and sister-in-law, Lauren Bessette (bih-SEHT'), in the wreckage of Kennedy's plane in the Atlantic

In 2000, Special Counsel John C. Danforth concluded "with 100 percent certainty" that the fed-eral government was innocent of wrongdoing in the siege that killed 80 members of the Branch Davidian compound near Waco, Texas, in 1993.

In 2009, prosecutors in Cambridge, Massachusetts, dropped a disorderly conduct charge against prominent Black scholar Henry Louis Gates Jr., who was arrested by a white officer at his home near Harvard University after a report of a break-in.

In 2011, the 30-year-old space shuttle program ended as Atlantis landed at Cape Canaveral, Florida, after the 135th shuttle flight.

In 2008, former Bosnian Serb In 2008, former Bosnian Serb leader Radovan Karadzic (RA'-doh-van KA'-ra-jich), one of the world's top war crimes fugitives, was arrested in a Belgrade suburb by Serbian security forces. (He was sentenced by a U.N. court in 2019 to life imprisonment after being convicted of genocide, crimes against humanity and war crimes.)
