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Veteran Support Officer office opens back for in-person visits

Veterans in Big Spring and the surrounding areas once again have on-site access to the Department Service Officer. The office was forced to close for in-person appointments for safety concerns due to the pandemic. But with COVID numbers easing up recently, the office is opening the doors once again.

"Any veteran who is needing assistance with forms, filing claims, or understanding benefits is eligible to come into our office and utilize our services," Greg Lindsey, Department Service Officer at the George H. O'Brien Jr. VA Medical Center, said.

The VSO (Veteran Service Officer) is a local veteran service representative trained to help veterans or veterans' families, better understand and walk through the process of applying for available VA benefits, such as compensation, education, vocational rehabilitation and employment, home loans, life insurance, burial benefits, and healthcare. During the pandemic, while the in-person appointments had stopped, those who were needing assistance were able to seek help through virtual visits. The virtual visits were in response to the CDC and VHA guidance as a result of the pandemic.

"There are those veterans and families that may not understand the pro-

cess, which can be a difficult process, and I can help walk them through it," Lindsey said. "I am here to offer guidance and help through the process, fill out forms, and provide support through VA claims."

The VSO office is located at the front of the George H. O'Brien Jr. VA Medical Center facility, in Big Spring, in Room 147A. To schedule an appointment or to ask questions, call Monday through Friday between 8 a.m. and 4:30 p.m. at 432-263-7361 ext. 7604.



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the support service. This month, the Cross Roads Young Marines partnered with Ornelas to help six more families with their items, just in time for this month's Large Item/Bulk Item pick up. The pick up takes place in each district twice a year.

"I had spoken with Carrie (Rodman) previously and she had mentioned any time I needed their (Young Marines) help to let her know. I reached out to her and Saturday morning the young men and women were present and ready to help," he said. "I am very thankful for the Young Marines and their help." Ornelas continued, "Working together

we can make a difference in our community. One person can make a difference, but when we work together that impact becomes even bigger. I am reissuing the challenge to all the districts, as we go through the second round of Large Item Pick Up, to partner with a local organization and offer help to those who can't get their items to the curb. This is a great time for not only organizations to reach out and help, but for neighbors to help neighbors, family and friends to come together and offer a lifting hand."

The second round of Large Item Pick Up will continue through the end of the year.

The schedule for 2021 is as follows: District 2 pickup is Aug. 18 with last day to schedule pickup is Aug. 16; and District 3 pickup is Sept. 15 with last day to schedule pickup is Sept. 13; District 4 pickup is Oct. 20 with the last day to schedule pickup is Oct. 18; District 5 pickup is Nov. 17 with the last day to schedule pickup is Nov. 15; and District 6 pickup is Dec. 15 with the last day to schedule pickup is Dec. 13.

The program is designed to support residential customers only and is not open to businesses. Once the resident has called to set up a pick up for the pick up day, items are to be placed on the curb no later than 7 a.m. on the day of pickup. Items should not be bagged, boxed or placed in any other type of container.

A reminder of eligible pick up items are:

doors, carpet, furniture, appliances, cardboard boxes, scrap metal, and mattresses. Items that are not eligible for pick up include: tree brush or limbs, household trash, garbage, or any material in plastic bags, hazardous materials (chemicals and petroleum products), automotive parts, batteries, or tires, construction, remodeling, or demolition debris such as shingles, wallboard and lumber, tires, dirt, rocks, concrete or ceramic tile, TV and electronics.

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

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Reflections: Olympics-Running the Race

pening ceremonies for the world summer Olympics scheduled for this Friday, July 23 in Tokyo, Japan after a year of delay due to Every Olympics results in incredible stories of courage, discipline, determination, and faith. Perhaps none is more inspiring than Eric Liddell who competed in the 1924 Paris Olympics. His story was captured in the film Chariots of Fire that won the Oscar for Best Picture at the Academy Awards in 1982.

earned a national reputation for his speed in the 100 meter dash. The Paris Olympics would determine whether he was, as many believed, the fastest man in the world. His cousin, Jenny, tried to convince him to give up his running and fulfill his commitment to serve as a missionary in China. He responded, "Jenny, God made me, and he made me fast. When I run, I feel his pleasure." At 22, he qualified for the Olympics and sailed

A native of Scotland, Liddell had

from England with his teammates. In Creator of the ends of the earth route, he had a crisis of faith.

As a devout Christian, Eric held a strong conviction about observing the Sabbath and had long refused to



compete on Sunday. He learned that the 100 meter race for which he had trained was scheduled for Sunday. Crestfallen, but consistent with his convictions, he refused to compete.

Instead, he agreed to switch to the 400 meter, an event for which he had not prepared. The film portrays

"Do you not know? Have you not heard?

The following week, Eric Liddell ran in the 400, an event for which many had written him off. He not only won the gold, he set a new world record. When someone asked him how he ran the race, he said, "I ran the first 200 meters as fast as I could, then, with God's help, I ran the second 200 faster."

The next year, Eric Liddell left

for China, where he served as a missionary until his death as a prisoner in a Japanese internment camp in 1945. He was buried behind the Japanese officers' quarters at Weifeng in the Shandong Province, 6.5 hours north of Beijing. A memorial headstone was later erected at the site with the quote, "They shall mount up with wings as eagles. They shall run and not faint."

Few ever compete in the Olympics, but all of us must run our own race. With the first century Olympics in the background, Scripture says, "Let us also lay aside every encumbrance and the sin which so easily entangles us, and let us run with endurance the race that is set before us, fixing our eyes on Jesus, the author and perfecter of faith," (Hebrews 12:1-2 NIV).

Olympic Athletes to look for in the coming Olympic games

After a unique delay of one year because of the global pandemic, the Olympic opening ceremonies will kick off this Friday, July 23, in Tokyo. While there will plenty of names, you should already recognize, ill give you several more athletes to keep an eve out for in these Olympic games.

Let us start with one of the most significant names in all the games. Simone Biles, Biles is now 24 years old. She is a five-time gymnastic world champion and the defending Olympic champion. Biles was the most dominant gymnast at the 2016 games in Rio, and guess what? She has gotten even more dominant since that time. They generally considered Biles the gymnastics GOAT, and she could win five gold medals in Tokyo. If she can pull off the remarkable feat, she would go down in the history books. It would tie an Olympic record for most medals earned by a female gymnast. Soviet legend Larisa Latynina currently holds the record. The one big thing to watch for Biles in this Olympics will be if she completes the much-talked-about Yurchenko double pike vault. You may also see her try a double-twisting double-back dismount on the beam. We expect her to attempt a double layout with a half twist and triple twisting double back on the floor. We can watch what could go down as the greatest female gymnast of all time at her best this should be something unique to witness.

Sunisa Lee may be one of the best gymnasts not named Simone Biles. Lee, who is only 18 years old, fished second to Biles at the American Olympic trials and had a higher four-event total on day two of the trials. That was the first time any gymnast has topped Biles on any day in the last eight years. Lee is the first Hmong American to qualify for the U.S. Olympic gymnastics team. Her parents John and Yeev emigrated from Laos to the U.S. As children. Lee has one of the most arduous bar routines in the world, and she could be in contention for a gold medal in that event.

We keep the gymnastic train going with one of the top men for the U.S. Team. Brody Malone. A two-time NCAA all-around champion, the 21-yearold beat six-time national champion Sam Mikulak in June to win his first senior all-around title. He also backed up that performance with a great showing at the trials to lock in an automatic spot on the team. Malone grew up in Georgia, and as a child, he loved hunting, fishing. He was even involved in rodeo, where he excelled in roping events. In addition, we know Malone for one of the most exciting high-flying bar routines in the entire world. He earned the top score at the trials with his bar routine and should be in the running for a medal.

I'll switch it up to track and field, where the veteran Allyson Felix will make her last Olympic appearance. She will compete in the 400-meter race and possibly the 4x400 relay, along with the new event 4x400 mixed-gender relay. Tokyo will be Felix's fifth Olympics and her first as a mother. Felix, 35, gave birth to her daughter, Camryn, in 2018. If she can medal in Tokyo, she will tie Carl Lewis's record for the most Olympic medals by an American track and field athlete.

Noah Lyles, 23, will make his Olympic debut in Tokyo. He is the reigning world champion in the 200 meters and won the U.S. Olympic trials in June. Lyles is the top-ranked sprinter in the world in the 200 meters and has the fastest time in the world this year at 19.74 seconds. He tried to qualify for the shorter 100 meters as well, but failed to qualify for that event. Lyles will be the favorite to take home the gold medal in his lone race.

Let's move on to Sydney McLaughlin. The women's 400-meter hurdles will be one of the most anticipated events of the whole Olympics. McLaughlin, who is only 21 years old, will go head to head with reigning Rio gold medalist and U.S. Teammate Dalilah Muhammad. McLaughlin was just a mere 16 years old at the last Olympics and was the youngest American to compete in an Olympic

track and field event since 1972. At the U.S. Track and field Olympic trials in June, she set a world record. She became the first woman to ever break the 52-second barrier with a fantastic time of 51.90. If you 're wondering whose record she broke, well, it was Muhammad's who beat McLaughlin at the 2019 world championships. This will be a must-watch T.V. event if these two meet up in the Olympic final. One thing is for sure, after that performance at the trials, McLaughlin has her sights set on a gold

Carli Lloyd will make her third Olympic appearance. The United States women's soccer star will look to add her third gold medal of a magnificent career. Lloyd is a two-time world champion and is only the third player in international soccer history to reach 300 appearances for her National team. At 39, Lloyd will be the oldest player ever to represent the USWNT at an Olympic game. She and the women's team will look to bounce back from an opening game upset to Sweden, a game they lost

Megan Rapinoe is another USWNT star. She has an iconic look with her pink hair and pose. Rapinoe will also make her third Olympic appearance Rapinoe was named the FIFA Women's Player of the Year in 2019. She has helped lead the U.S. Team to two World Cup titles.

Kevin Durant makes his third U.S. Men's basketball team. He helped lead the team to gold in both the 2012 and 2106 games. Durant, who is now 32, won back-to-back NBA championships as a member of the Golden State Warriors in 2017 and 2018. He made his first-team USA appearance more than a decade ago when he led the U.S. To the 2010 FIBA world championship title. At the 2012 Olympic games, Durant set a U.S. record for total points scored in an Olympic basketball tournament with 156. He nearly matched that mark in the 2016 games with 155 points. Durant enters the Olympics ranked second in U.S. men's Olympic basketball history with 311 career points, only 25 points behind Carmelo Anthony's record of 336.

Sue Bird will try to help the U.S. Women's basketball team to its seventh straight gold medal in the Olympics. Bird is the oldest current player in the WNBA at 40. She is the only WNBA player to win a championship in three different decades. Her combined nine Olympic and FIBA World Cup medals are the most of any basketball player, male or female worldwide. This will be Bird's fourth Olympic team dating back to the 2004 games. She is engaged to World Cup champion soccer player Megan Rapinoe, making them a genuine Olympic power couple.

Katie Ledecky is a five-time Olympic gold medalist in swimming and is the defending champion in the 200-, 400- and 800-meter freestyle races. She will also be the hands-down favorite to win the 1500 meter freestyle, making its Olympic event debut in Tokyo. The 24-year-old will seek to three-peat in the 800-meter freestyle on July 30. If she wins, it will be her third consecutive gold medal in the event. She will join Dawn Fraser(100-meter free) and Krisztina Egerszegi (200-meter backstroke) as the only women to win the same event at three straight Olympic games. Ledecky will also try to pull off an accomplishment that no women and very few men have ever done. She will try to win the 200- and the 1500 meter freestyle races on the same day, July 27. Why do I even mention this? Well, in the history of the modern games, only five men have won the 200- and the 1500 meter freestyle, and never in the same session; it would indeed be a remarkable accomplishment if she can pull it off.

They widely considered Caeleb Dressel to be the "next Michael Phelps" the sprint superstar is a sixtime world champion and the world record holder in the 100-meter butterfly, 100-meter individual medley, and 50-meter freestyle. However, at the Rio games, Dressel went under the radar. He won two gold medals, but they were all in relay events, and he won no individual medals. Since that time, he has blown away the competition by winning

a record eight medals, including six golds, at the 2019 World Aquatics Championships. He also won every single event he competed in at the trials last month. Dressel will compete in three individual events, the 50- and 100-meter freestyle and the 100-meter butterfly; he will also be in four different relay events. He will be the favorite to win gold in all of his individual events, so the young man could walk away with seven gold medals. This could be history in the making for the American swimmer.

Cat Osterman is a softball legend; the former Texas Longhorn was a star of the 2004 and 2008 Olympic teams that brought home gold and silver, respectively. Pass 1. Two spades. You should enthu-

siastically welcome East's spade overcall and take advantage of it by cuebidding the suit. This tells partner that game is certain, probably in hearts, and that a potential for slam exists. An alternative action, if you play "splinter bids," would be to bid three spades, indicating four-card support for hearts, a singleton or void in spades, and enough strength for game opposite a simple one-heart response. Partner might have any of the following hands for his one-heart

- **♦** J63 **♥** K10852 **♦** O7 **♣** O84
- ♦ 863 ♥ AK8532 ♦ 9 ♣ 753 **♦** K852 **♥** K963 **♦** 832 **♣** 76


With the first, a small slam is virtually certain; with the second, a grand slam is probable; and with the third, partner will have his hands full just making game.

2. Four hearts. Under the circumstances, it is best to raise to game in hearts with only two baby trumps. You have a sound opening bid facing partner's opening bid, which means there's a game somewhere. With partner unable to support clubs or spades, and apparently unwilling to play notrump, there is no real choice but to undertake the game in hearts. Partner should have seven hearts or six very good ones when he bids the suit three times. He might have any one of these hands:

- **↑** K73 ♥ AQJ983 ♦ J6 **↑** 86 **↑** J86 ♥ KQJ7543 ♦ A8 **↑** 10
- **♦** K5 ♥ AQ98754 **♦** K7 **♣** 63 and with each of these you belong in
- four hearts. **3. Six notrump.** This is one of those occasions when reaching the

best contract is simply a matter of arithmetic. Partner's rebid of two notrump indicates 18 or 19 points and a balanced hand. Adding your 15 points to partner's, you have the 33 points in the combined hands that make slam a favorable proposition.




