BSISD approves team-up with YMCA for after school program

Need a place for your kids to go in the afternoons after school this year? A new partnership between the Big Spring ISD and the Big Spring YMCA might have just the option you're looking for.

"The YMCA partnership is going to provide after school care on our Kindergarten through Fourth Grade campuses," said BSISD Director of Education and Assessment Dr.Raemi Thompson. "That is very huge. Parents will be able to sign up at Marcy Monday night during Meet the Teacher Night, and at Goliad and Washington on Tuesday night during their Meet the Teacher Night."

Thompson said YMCA personnel will supervise the students on their BSISD campuses.

"Kids will be able to stay after school on campus until 6 p.m.," she said. "The YMCA will provide them with a snack, will help them with any homework, and will supervise them through interactive play."

Although the personnel will be compensated by the Y, the program might provide an opportunity for BSISD paraprofessionals to supplement their earnings.

"They might hire our paraprofessionals, because it will be the end of their school day," Thompson said. "And they've already been background checked, they've already been fingerprinted, and they can continue their relationship with kids that they know. So some kids, if they need that child care after school, they can just sign them up and they will go to the gym after school. They'll have access to the gym, the cafeteria, and the playground after school until 6 p.m."

Thompson said there is a cost for the program. Contact the Big Spring ISD at 432-264-3600, or attend your child's Meet the Teacher Night as mentioned above, for more information.

In other business, Thompson reported on preliminary STAAR testing results for the test taken in the Spring semester of 2021, last school year.

"I was on a webinar today, and the state results are going to come out Friday the 13th for me, and publicly they're going to be announced next week," she said. "We are going to be rated – like every other school district in the state of Texas – 'Not Rated because of COVID Disaster.' Period, end of story. That is the rating. It's not that we didn't get a rating, that is the rating."

Thompson reported that Big Spring's scores on the assessment were mixed, but in line with state and regional averages.

"We did take assessments, so we are going to report those results to you," Thompson said. "These results reflect who was in the chair when we took the test last May. That's all

was in the chair when we this is. It's just, who took the STAAR test, and how did they do? It doesn't take into account kids who took it online. I don't know from these results who was remote and showed up to

Alive in Christ hosting blood drive; blood supply in Texas running low



take it online, or who was remote and didn't show up to take it online. I don't know any of those things based on these reports here."

Thompson also reported on goals for student progress mandated by Texas House Bill 3, which uses assessments to compile statistics on the percentage of students who are "Approaching Grade Level," "Meeting Grade Level," or "Mastering Grade Level," as well as those who "Did Not Meet Grade Level." Results are subdivided by various student "sub-populations," including race, economic background, English language learner, etc. Thompson referred the school board to a projected chart and reported that, while Big Spring's students met some of its stated goals, "In red, by sub-pop, you are going to see that we did not meet most of them." The school board also awarded bids for Career and Technical Education Supplemental Instructional Supplies and Equipment. No information about the companies or bid amounts was reported to the public during the meeting. The school board unanimously approved minutes from the July 15 school board meeting and the regular financial

BSISD Chief Financial Officer Susan Bryan asked the board to approve a preliminary tax rate for the district's 2021-22 fiscal year. In the near future, the district will host a public hearing regarding the proposed budget and tax rate. At Bryan's recommendation the board set the preliminary maintenance and operations tax rate at 89.23 cents per \$100 valuation, and the debt service rate at 12.27 cents per \$100 valuation, totaling \$1.0150 per \$100 valuation.

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

Something to think about.

"Whoever walks in integrity walks securely, but whoever takes crooked paths will be found out." \sim Proverbs 10:9

Do you remember discussing "integers" in school? The teacher probably told you that inte-



gers were "whole numbers". Essentially, they are "undivided". Integrity comes from the same the root word meaning "wholeness". People of integrity are "undivided", which means they are the same person even when no one is watching. What you see is what you get. You can trust them. In a world full of "deepfakes" and constant "spin", integrity is increasingly rare, valuable, and worth protecting.

Usually our integrity is initially compromised in the small things.

We don't wake up one morning and say to ourselves, "I think I'll rob a liquor store today." More often we are faced with small compromises of our integrity. C.S. Lewis once wrote, "The safest road to hell is the gradual one - the gentle slope, soft underfoot, without sudden turnings, without milestones, without signposts." What he was saying was we must resist the temptation to compromise in small things because small compromises will ultimately lead to big consequences.

Jesus clearly taught, "Whoever can be trusted with very little can also be trusted with much, and whoever is dishonest with very little will also be dishonest with much." (Luke 16:10) It is important that we don't allow even the smallest things to dilute our personal integrity.

As I thought about the importance of integrity this morning, it reminded me of a story I recently read about a High School basketball coach. After coaching Blue Collar Bulldogs basketball team for 18 years, Coach Cleveland Stroud finally won a state championship game. Stroud recalled that "it was the perfect night" when they won. "A night you dream of." He was carried around the gym on the shoulders of his triumphant players and their proud parents. The local paper put his picture on the front page. But the excitement was short-lived.

Two months after the championship, during a routine grade check, Stroud discovered that one player was academically ineligible. The young man had only played 45 seconds during the regional qualifying tournament. He struggled for a little bit with the decision, but finally reported the error to the league and forfeited their trophy.

When the team gathered in the locker room to lament their loss, he told them, "Boys, you've got to do what is honest, what is right, and what the rules say. People forget the scores of basketball games, but they don't ever forget what you are made of. Winning is an important thing for any team, but your principles have to be higher than your goals."

It is always the right time to do the right thing. If you've been struggling with a decision, let me encourage you to do what is right simply because it is the right thing to do. Nothing is worth compromising your integrity.

May others find us to be whole, complete, and un divided people with principles that are higher than our goals.

Reflections: Going the Extra Mile

I went to Walmart the other day. Something I do as a part of the middle-class ritual. Sometimes I visit other stores with fewer choices and higher prices just to avoid crowds. But Walmart has most the things I need and I can wear my sweat pants and no one notices.



While at Walmart, I thought I would pick up a few items for my diet. I am trying to lose weight again. Three peaches, two bags of frozen vegetables and a box of rice. I didn't think these staples would get me through a pre-season football game, but maybe, if I eat enough vegetables and rice, it will keep me out of trouble.

I was clearly under the express limit of 20 items, so I went to the express check out and got in line. I stood behind a young Hispanic

woman who was obviously pregnant and had a small child on her hip. She started emptying her cart onto the counter. In all she had well over forty items, including a few cases of coke and a large sack of potatoes. She piled up the counter not once, but twice.

I smiled and was patient. The cashier was apologetic that she did not see the woman's cart before she unloaded it. Several customers behind me rolled their eyes, groaned, and asked if the girl couldn't read. I waited, smiled, bought my items and did not complain. "Maybe she made a mistake and got in the wrong line," I thought. Anyway, we ought to give a break to a young woman with a child on her hip and a baby in her womb. She is

trying to feed and take care of her family. I am just trying to stay on a diet. I was feeling rather good about myself for not complaining or rolling my eyes.

After I got home, I started thinking. Why didn't I offer to help the young woman? I could have lifted the potatoes and cases of coke. I could have helped her with her basket. Maybe I could have offered to pay for her grocery bill. Was it enough to simply smile and not complain? I could imagine Jesus saying, "Don't be so smug. If I had been there, I would have helped the girl."

"Okay, Lord," I said. "I am listening." But some times "going the second mile" is hard to do. Not so much because I don't want to do it, but because I simply miss the opportunities.

Jesus gave us the concept of "going the extra mile" in his Sermon on the Mount. "Whoever compels you to go with him one mile, go with him two," (Matthew 5:41). He also gave us the clearest example of "going the extra mile" when he told us the story of the Good Samaritan, (Luke 10:30-37).

Every day we have opportunities to "go the extra mile." To do something unexpectedly nice for someone. They occur when we are going about our daily lives, at work, at school, shopping, where ever we go, whatever we do. We just need to open our eyes and see others the way Jesus sees them. Sometimes it is the little things that change the world.

Hebrews 4:16 talks about boldness. The difference between boldness and arrogance is the cross of Christ. By His own death on the cross, He became the end of the Law for righteousness to all who believe. Christ's once-forall finished sacrifice empowers us to come boldly to God's throne of grace. We do not come to His throne by means of our own purity or faithfulness; to do so would be arrogance. Torrens' 9th-inning single sends Mariners over Rangers 2-1

SEATTLE — Luis Torrens hit a ninth-inning single to score the winning run, and the Seattle Mariners beat the Texas Rangers 2-1 on Wednesday night.

It was the Mariners' major league-leading 38th one-run game, 24 of them wins.

Jarred Kelenic drew a bases-loaded walk to tie the game 1-all in the sixth inning.

The rookie then doubled off Dennis Santana (1-2) to begin the ninth, moved to third on Jake Fraley's one-out single and scored on Torrens' drive to the wall in right-center.

"That's what we need, that kind of energy ... and that was the difference today," Torrens said of the rookie center fielder's hustle play.

Asked if there was any chance he was going to pull up, Kelenic said: "Negative. (I thought) I've got to get to second and put some pressure on them."

Drew Steckenrider (4-2) pitched the ninth for the win. Four relievers

combined to give up just one hit over 3 2/3 innings to keep the Mariners in it.

"It hasn't been easy, but our pitching certainly has given us a chance," Mariners manager Scott Servais said.

The Rangers have lost seven of eight after snapping a 14-game road losing streak Tuesday night against the Mariners.

Seattle starter Taylor Anderson gave up one run and six hits in 5 1/3 innings in his first home game with the Mariners since being acquired from Pittsburgh. But the Mariners couldn't get anything going against Spencer Howard and Taylor Hearn, Texas starters who've been paired together for several weeks.

Howard struck out three while giving up two hits in three innings. Hearn lasted four innings as manager Chris Woodward prepares him to return to the rotation next week. He allowed just two hits and struck out three, but hurt himself with four walks.

Hearn hit J.P. Crawford with a pitch to start the sixth, then after two pop outs, gave up a single and a nine-pitch walk to Abraham Toro. A four-pitch walk to Kelenic tied the game. It was the second game in a row a Texas pitcher walked in the tying run late.

"There was a lot of pressure there," Woodward said of Hearn, "and he just couldn't execute the pitch."

Nathaniel Lowe doubled to lead off the second and scored on D.J. Peters sacrifice fly to put Texas up 1-0 in the second.

How Can I Help My **Neighbor?**

Dear Annie: |

have a neighbor who is 90 years old. Her only caregiver was her adult son, who just died last week after a long struggle with opioid addiction. Since then, I and another neighbor have been checking on her several times a day, as she needs a lot of care. We've been grocery shopping for her, picking up prescriptions and running errands. We've also got a meal train going with other neighbors on the street. The problem is what to do long-term. She needs a high level of care, as she's disabled and not easily able to get around the house herself. In fact, she just got out of the hospital a few days before her son died, after a fourweek stay. I've contacted social services multiple times, but they've yet to show up. I believe she's an extreme fall risk. Do you know of any options?

She has no other

family nearby. Her only living relatives are on the opposite coast and are in their 80s. We're at a loss for what to do, but it feels like an emergency. -- Scared for My Neighbor

Dear Scared:

What a tragic situation. My heart goes out to this woman. In the short term, would it be possible for her to return to the hospital until she has homecare services in place? It's dangerous for her to be on her own right now, and she doesn't have anyone able to stay with her. That is an emergency worthy of hospitalization.

Then, help her come up with a long-term plan. If she has Medicare, she should be eligible for some home health care services. Medicare doesn't cover 24/7 home care, just part-time care up to 28 hours per week. (Learn more at https:// www.medicare.gov/ coverage/homehealth-services.) From what you've shared, it

sounds like she might need round-the-clock care at this point. If she has Original Medicare, that would cover a 100-day stay in a skilled nursing facility. You might ask if she would authorize you to speak with her health care providers so that you can help her make an informed decision. I wish her the best, and I commend you for extending her a hand in a time of need. The world needs more neighbors like you.

Dear Annie: I feel your advice didn't go far enough when responding to "Am I Wrong," the man whose fatherin-law is constantly making jabs at him about his kids' religious training and other matters. He was ready to divorce his wife over the FIL's mistreatment. You essentially encouraged him to be patient with his wife and not hold her dad's behavior against her. I disagree. His wife should have stood up to her parents years ago. She should

have said: "Mom, Dad, I love you, but if you continue to make disparaging remarks about my husband or me, you will be seeing a LOT less of us. Have I made myself clear?" That's it. Hard stop. At this point, the letter writer and his wife need to work with a licensed marriage and family therapist to learn how to present a united front to her parents. -- Debbie

Dear Debbie:

Seeing a marriage counselor would be an excellent idea for this couple, as the father-inlaw has saddled them with plenty of baggage over the years that they'll need to unpack if they're to live happily together. Thanks for the note.

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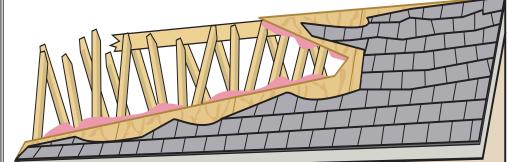





1. Three spades. The only other bids to consider are three notrump and four clubs, but neither would paint as accurate a picture as three spades.

A three-notrump bid would miss the mark on several counts. To begin with, it would be dangerous to play at this contract, since the opponents might be able to collect five (or more) diamond tricks at the outset. Also, three notrump would conceal your support for spades. Partner should have five spades in this sequence, so you are obliged to show three-card support at this point. A four-club rebid would be wrong for the same reason.

2. Four clubs. You can't raise partner to four hearts, since he might have only a four-card heart suit. Four clubs indicates a hand with minimum high-card values for the previous


jump, and at the same time confirms the length and power of your club suit.

3. Four spades. It's important to let partner know about your excellent spade support and also that your jump to three clubs was based on maximum high-card values. Note that this hand has 17 high-card points, while the two previous ones had only 15. The hope is that partner will continue toward a slam once he knows his anemic spades are facing powerful three-card support.

4. Three notrump. This is a somewhat risky bid with only one diamond stopper and no guarantee that you can run your club suit, but the only other possible bids - three spades and four hearts — are even more dangerous.

5. Four hearts. Here there is a reasonably good chance for a slam, but you can do no more at this point than raise to game. Allowance must be made for the possibility that partner might not have much of a hand, and that he might have stretched a bit in responding to three clubs (which was not a forcing bid).

If partner has three of the four missing key cards — the A-K of hearts, ace of spades and king of clubs - he will presumably appreciate their value for slam purposes. But the impetus for a slam must be provided by partner, not you.



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

Today in History

Today is Friday, Aug. 13, the 225th day of 2021. There are 140 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History:

On August 13, 1910, Florence Nightingale, the founder of modern nursing, died in London at age 90.

On this date:

In 1521, Spanish conqueror Hernando Cortez captured Tenochtitlan (teh-natch-teet-LAHN'), present-day Mexico City, from the Aztecs.

In 1704, the Battle of Blenheim was fought during the War of the Spanish Succession, resulting in a victory for English-led forces over French and Bavarian soldiers.

In 1846, the American flag was raised in Los Angeles for the first time.

In 1860, legendary sharp-shooter Annie Oakley was born in Darke County, Ohio.

In 1889, William Gray of Hartford, Conn., received a patent for a coin-operated telephone.

In 1932, Adolf Hitler rejected the post of vice chancellor of Germany, saying he was prepared to hold out "for all or nothing."

In 1942, Walt Disney's ani-mated feature "Bambi" had its U.S. premiere at Radio City Music Hall in New York, five days after its world premiere in London.

In 1961, East Germany sealed off the border between Berlin's eastern and western sectors before building a wall that would divide the city for the next 28 years.

In 1967, the crime caper biopic "Bonnie and Clyde," starring Warren Beatty and Faye Dunaway, had its U.S. premiere; the movie, directed by Arthur Penn, was considered shocking as well as innovative for its graphic portrayal of violence.

In 2003, Iraq began pumping crude oil from its northern oil fields for the first time since the start of the war. Libya agreed to set up a \$2.7 billion fund for families of the 270 people killed in the 1988 Pan Am bombing.

In 2004, TV chef Julia Child died in Montecito, California, two days short of her 92nd birthday.

In 2017, in a statement, the White House said President Donald Trump "very strongly" condemned individual hate groups such as "white suprema-cists, KKK and neo-Nazis;" the statement followed criticism of Trump for blaming the previ-

ous day's deadly violence at a white supremacist rally in Charlottesville, Virginia, on 'many sides.'

Ten years ago: Seven people were killed when a stage collapsed at the Indiana State Fair during a powerful storm just before a concert was to begin. In the Republican presidential race, Rep. Michele Bachmann won the Iowa straw poll; Texas Gov. Rick Perry officially declared his candidacy. In eastern Pakistan, al-Qaida gunmen kidnapped an American development expert, Warren Weinstein. (Weinstein was killed in a U.S. drone strike in Jan. 2015.)



12 **Baylor infractions decision comes amid** scrutiny of NCAA role

The NCAA infractions committee's decision against punishing Baylor for its mishandling of sexual assault allegations in a sprawling scandal involving football players was jarring -- even to the committee.

Joel Maturi, the chief hearing officer and a member of the committee for eight years, said the case was troubling for the seven-person panel, which included three women: Crimes being dealt with legally and in other forums were clearly tied to athletics, but off the table for NCAA punishments.

An association that governs athletic competition between schools has nothing in its vast bylaws that directly deals with the worst transgressions committed by Baylor.

"We all agreed the conduct was egregious. In some ways, we've never had discussions where we've wanted to penalize an institution. We've always gone into hearings trying to find out the truth and come to a right and fair conclusion," Maturi said Wednesday after the committee released its findings in a highly critical 51-page report.

"Here, in many ways, many of us felt that there should be some penalty," said Maturi, a former Minnesota athletic director. "But the fact of the matter is, we could not come to that conclusion based on the bylaws that exist before us."

The allegations against Baylor surfaced in 2016 and alleged that coaches and staff shielded football players from punishment and failed to take action on allegations of sexual assault or other violence. The infractions committee said the question it wrestled with was whether those athletes were given an "extra benefit" in the form of more lenient treatment than other students -- and the answer was no.

The actual mishandling of sexual assault claims by the school was deemed out of the NCAA's jurisdiction.

Legal experts say this is probably the right choice for an organization in the midst of dramatic change. The NCAA, stung earlier this year by a Supreme Court ruling against it in an antitrust case, is looking at ways to decentralize some of its governance. Just this week, the NCAA named a 23-person panel that will suggest changes to its constitution, setting the stage for a major overhaul.

NCAA President Mark Emmert alluded to the coming changes in a statement issued after the Baylor decision.

"This is a clear demonstration of why the association needs transformational change to create alignment between authority and responsibility to address the most critical issues in college sports" Emmert said.

Gabe Feldman, director of the sports law program at Tulane, said what happened at Baylor may have been "illegal, immoral and unethical" but that doesn't make it an NCAA violation.

"I think the underlying question that needs to be asked by the NCAA and other sports governing bodies on the collegiate and professional levels is: Do we want our sports governing bodies to be in a position where they have to enforce the law?" Feldman said. "If that's the position we're in, we have much bigger problems. We need law enforcement to enforce the law."

Nebraska law professor Jo Potuto, a former infractions committee chair and her school's faculty athletic representative, said the NCAA should not

be responsible for punishing every misdeed by an athlete, coach or athletic department.

"It think it's really a fundamental misconception of the NCAA's role," she said.


Potuto pointed to the NCAA's attempt to punish Penn State for the Jerry Sandusky scandal as setting a bad precedent with the public.

The NCAA broke from its usual procedures when it handed Penn State a jaw-dropping \$60 million penalty, plus postseason bans and scholarship restrictions for the football program. The fine was challenged in court and some of the penalties were rolled back.

Feldman said the NCAA doesn't have the expertise nor is it given the authority by its member schools to investigate Title IX allegations. which were prominent in the Baylor scandal. The question of jurisdiction also came up in an academic misconduct case involving North Carolina four years ago.

"For a variety of reasons, the NCAA is limited in what it can do, it's limited by what its rules say it can do," Feldman said. "It's not the NCAA saying we care about an improper benefit of \$1,000 more than we care about sexual assault. It's our jurisdiction covers the improper benefits. It doesn't cover these other areas."

Linda Livingstone, Baylor's president since 2017 and part of the new NCAA constitutional convention committee, said she understands the perception that Baylor wasn't punished severely enough by the NCAA. The football program was placed on four years of probation for rules violations between 2011 and 2016, including secondary impermissible benefits and drug testing violations.



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
