Watch out for kids in school zones

Registration for Forsan, Coahoma and Big Spring has been taking place, and families are preparing to head back to school schedules. Big Spring ISD students will be heading into the 2020-2021 school year, on Aug. 18, and with classes starting school zones which have been stagnant and empty for the past five months - will be seeing increased traffic again, which means it's time to raise awareness for safety precautions. Forsan will be heading back on Aug. 12 and Coahoma will be back in the classroom beginning Aug. 11, each also having their designated school zones.

School lights will once again start flashing serving as a reminder to slow down, be extra cautious, and adhere to school zone laws. School zones will be active Monday through Friday between 7 a.m. - 9:30 a.m. and 2:30 p.m. - 4:30 p.m.



dropping the speed limit in those areas to 20 mph. The lights on School Zone signs will begin flashing again, and the Big Spring Police Department reminds the community while in a school zone the speed limit is strictly enforced during the designated hours.

"Our citizens need to remember during school time hours there will be more vehicle congestion around the schools and roads adjacent to the schools," Big Spring Police Department Chief Chad Williams, said.

In addition to the reduced speed limits in school zones, use of wireless communication devices is prohibited in school zones. However, according to Chief Williams, wireless communication is allowed in school zones if a hands-free device is used or the vehicle is stopped. Patrol officers will also be watching to ensure seat belts are being worn as required by law.

"While Covid-19 has had an impact on numerous aspects of our lives over the past several months, and it could possibly have an impact on the traffic in the school zones, we are planning and anticipating the increased traffic flow," Chief Williams said. "We want to remind our citizens to be vigilant while driving in and around school zones for children walking to and from school.

The 22-year old woman lives with intellectual and developmental disabilities, and has had several surgeries recently to relieve intracranial hypertension. But her infectious smile and wonderful spirit has drawn her a big fan club locally.

"Everybody in town knows her. She's quite popular," Savannah's mom Candice said. "She's loved. We can't make a Wal-Mart trip short because everybody knows her."

Recently, the Big Spring Centennial Lions Club decided to thank Savannah for making Big Spring a better place to live by getting her a new set of wheels.

"We've helped out with the Lions Club before, and they always get a kick out of her," Candice said. "David (Stives) from the Lions Club called me and told me about the program that they had learned about, that San Angelo had bicycles, They give bicycles to the handicapped."

The bicycles available through the program are designed to be easy to use.

"They're three-wheeled bicycles, and they have various ones. They have foot pedaled, hand and foot pedaled, and just hand pedaled," Candice said. "We thought we were just going to get a foot pedaled one, but this bicycle you can do with your feet, or you can (move levers back and forth with your hands) and it powers the bicycle. Or you can do both at the same time."

Savannah has had her new bike – bright red, naturally – for about a month now.

"I like it!" she said. "I'm still trying to get the hang of it. They all have baskets in the back, so I could bring stuff when I go places."

Savannah said she prefers using just her feet on flat or downhill grades, but tackles the uphill slopes with both feet and hands.

"Only on my street...our street. We live on the base, and our road kind of loops around," Savannah said. "I just use it for exercise for now. Maybe when I get really good at it, there's a Dollar General near us and a DK. I could go there if I get really good at it. I can't turn around right now. I just go back



A tax rate of \$0.236777 per \$100 valuation has been proposed by the governing body of Howard County Junior College District.

The no-new-revenue tax rate is the tax rate for the 2021 tax year that will raise the same amount of property tax revenue for Howard County Junior College District from the same properties in both the 2020 tax year and the 2021 tax year.

The voter-approval rate is the highest tax rate that Howard County Junior College District may adopt without holding an election to seek voter approval of the rate.

The proposed tax rate is not greater than the no-new-revenue tax rate. This means that Howard County Junior College District is not proposing to increase property taxes for the 2021 tax year.

A PUBLIC MEETING TO VOTE ON THE PROPOSED TAX RATE WILL BE HELD ON August 30, 2021 AT 12:30 pm AT Howard College Student Union Building/Fireplace Room, 1001 Birdwell Lane, Big Spring, Texas 79720.

The proposed tax rate is also not greater than the voter-approval tax rate. As a result, Howard County Junior College District is not required to hold an election at which voters may accept or reject the proposed tax rate. Some children may be hard to see due to their size and may not be watching for cars, and as drivers we need to be cognizant of that." Drivers are encouraged to not only be on

high alert when driving through school zones, but also to exercise patience as they travel through or around school zones, especially during the first few weeks back. During the first few weeks, parents and students may be adjusting to a new campus, new routine and/or new traffic routes which could lead to increased congestion.

"The community can help us as this new school year approaches by making sure they are giving themselves plenty of time when leaving for work, especially if their route includes traveling through one or more school zones," he said. "Also, regardless if there are other vehicles or children around, adhering to the school zone speed limit of 20 and removing all distractions

while driving through school zones to ensure everyone stays safe." According to Chief Williams, police

officers will be patrolling school zones throughout the school year and drivers are expected to adhere to school zone laws while driving in the area.

"Each year we see traffic complaints from citizens as the new school year starts. Again, this usually works itself out within a couple of weeks," Chief Williams said. "We do work with BSISD to assist with any traffic issues each year." The BSPD also offers a few safety tips for

those students who will be walking to and from school: Parents should plan a safe route for their

Young children, if possible, should walk

with an adult or older students Children should not horseplay while walking to or from school including pushing or shoving each other or chasing each

other when near the street Children should be reminded not to take rides from strangers or anyone if it was not arranged with their parents first Watch for

cars while crossing the street, driveways and intersections. Children crossing street should always at the curb or edge of the street, look in all directions for traffic and

While crossing, continue watching traffic.

Regardless of who wins the job, Fisher and Dickey are counting on the team's veterans to help make his transition to starter easier.

"The one thing you have to guard against with a new quarterback is the feeling they have to make every play, and everything is all on their shoulders," Dickey said.

SPEEDY SPILLER

Running back Isaiah Spiller is expected to power Texas A&M's offense after running for 1,036 yards as a sophomore last season. Spiller was a Doak Walker Award

finalist in 2020 after ranking third in the SEC by averaging 103.6 yards rushing a game in a year where the Aggies ranked second in the league in yards rushing a game.

"He's as good a running back as there is, as far as making people miss, running between the tackles, catching the ball out of the backfield, and then we can line him up in the slot," Dickey said. "He's a playmaker out there."

Texas A&M's running game should get a boost this season with the development of Devon Achane, a sprinter on the track team, who ran for 364 yards on just 43 carries as a freshman last season.

The game already circled on many calendars is Oct. 9 when Texas A&M hosts top-ranked Alabama. The Ag gies will try to snap an eight-game skid to the Crimson Tide and get their first win in the series since a 29-24 victory in 2012 in Johnny Manziel's Heisman Trophy-winning season.

The schedule also includes home dates against Auburn and South Carolina and visits to Missouri and LSU.

Prescott's preseason plan cloudy as Cowboys bring camp home

FRISCO, Texas (AP) — Dak Prescott's only chance to play in the preseason will be this week, and the star quarterback of the Dallas Cowbovs still isn't fully cleared after pulling himself from practice at training camp in California on July 28 with a right shoulder injury.

There's a chance Prescott will go into the opener against Super Bowl champion Tampa Bay without having taken a snap in a game since the severe ankle injury that ended his 2020 season in Week 5.

Before the club's first camp practice at team headquarters Monday night after three weeks on the West Coast, coach Mike McCarthy said Prescott won't play in the preseason if he doesn't get into the home exhibition opener against Houston on Saturday night.

"We'll see how the week goes, but there's no urgency from my perspective to see Dak play against Houston," McCarthy said. "This is more about we don't want to create a setback possibly."

Prescott, who signed a club record \$160 million, four-year contract in March, is throwing more in practice than he did for the first two weeks after feeling pain in his throwing shoulder while warming up for practice.

The 2016 NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year made

about two dozen throws during individual work at the team's indoor practice facility on Monday before sitting out the 11-on-11 work again.

Prescott had his second MRI over the weekend,

and the injury is progressing as planned after the Cowboys consulted the medical staffs of the New York Yankees and Texas Rangers and followed their recommendation of rest. Before the Cowboys left California, Prescott said

he hoped to play against the Texans. That appeared less likely with him still watching team drills Mon-"I'm a go-go-go guy. I always want to be in the

action," Prescott said last week. "I think the more reps are better, better for me. But something like this you can't stress it too fast. It's just the risk versus the reward at this point, and I've got to know what I'm playing for, and that's to be ready for this season."

Prescott said doctors believe the injury "was a little bit of a freak thing," although the two-time Pro Bowler also says it could have been an aggressive plan with throwing, including in the early stages of rehab from the compound fracture and dislocation of his ankle that led to two surgeries.

Receiver CeeDee Lamb isn't concerned about missing quality time with Prescott, who will go at least three weeks without team work in practice. The team changed the schedule for the first week of camp at home and won't practice Tuesday.

For Lamb, the presence of Prescott matters as much as anything after the injured QB missed most of last season.

"He's definitely done a great job of just being around us in the locker room," Lamb said. "His presence is there. His leadership is evident. Everything remains the same. It's just not having him out here. It's tough, but I'm sure I'll see him again

The first camp practice for fans at home in two years included the return of receiver Amari Cooper, who had offseason ankle surgery. Defensive end DeMarcus Lawrence joined Cooper on the physically unable to perform list at the start of camp and still hasn't worked back into team drills.

Cooper had one catch in team drills that drew a "Coooooop" call from a crowd that filled about half of the team's 12,000-seat indoor practice field, which also serves as a high school stadium.

"I know for a fact that he wishes he could be out there in Oxnard also," Lamb said. "Just going out there, playing for him, playing through him, and whatever he sees, he'll help me be better."

NOTES: DT Neville Gallimore and TE Sean McKeon are expected to miss significant time after getting injured in the second preseason game against Arizona. Gallimore dislocated his left elbow, and McKeon has a high ankle sprain.



Dear Mr. Becker: I suffer from nightmares — bridge nightmares, that is — and I've been having the same dream for many years now. I've seen quite a few psychiatrists about it, but they don't seem to be able to do a thing for me, whether they know

how to play bridge or not. I'm not a particularly good player myself, but I play even worse when I'm asleep. What happens is that I'm always dealt the East hand — I recognize it each time by the four deuces — and my partner, the idiot, opens the bidding with two hearts.

I don't think he has a genuine

strong two-bid — even though he has 10 sure tricks in his hand — but that's beside the point. The bidding thereafter doesn't go the same way every time, but somehow South always winds up playing the hand in seven spades!

I always double him — call it a compulsive double if you will — and he always redoubles and makes the grand slam. This comes to a tidy 3,140 points, and, frankly I can't afford to lose that many points on one deal, even when I'm asleep.

West invariably leads the king of hearts. Declarer takes it with the ace and returns the queen of clubs. I cover with the king, and South wins with the ace, catching my partner's jack. He then enters dummy with a diamond, leads the six of clubs and lets it ride.

South next repeats the finesse against my nine, cashes a high club, discarding a heart from dummy, and ruffs a heart with the four of spades. After that, with six tricks to go, he crossruffs the hand as I sit by helplessly undertrumping everything he

plays. My hope is that by writing to you about my terrible dilemma, perhaps it will somehow go away.

Dear Annie: I am a real estate broker responding to "Middlewoman," who expected a referral fee for recommending a friend for web design.

Any expectation of a referral fee needs to be communicated up front. If a referral fee is going to be paid, the person providing goods or services needs to know the amount ahead of time so they can take that into consideration when bidding on the job.

"Middlewoman's" friend may have quoted a lower price for a friend of a friend. If she later learns she is expected to pay a referral fee, that could mean she makes no profit at all.

Communicating expectations is the key. I agree with you that a friend should not charge a fee for recommending a friend. If the two friends are in the same line of business and one refers a client to another because,

for some reason, they cannot do the job themselves, then a referral fee might be appropriate. That does not seem to be the case here. It did not cost "Middlewoman" anything to mention a name. -- Need to Be

Today in History
Today is Wednesday, Aug. 18, became the 36th state to

the 230th day of 2021. There are 135 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History:

On August 18, 1894, Congress established the Bureau of Immigration.

On this date:

In 1587, Virginia Dare became the first child of English parents to be born in present-day America, on what is now Roanoke Island in North Carolina. (However, the Roanoke colony ended up mysteriously disappearing.)

In 1846, during the Mexican-American War, U.S. forces led by Gen. Stephen W. Kearny occupied Santa Fe in presentday New Mexico.

In 1920, the 19th Amendment to the Constitution, guaranteeing American women's right to vote, was ratified as Tennessee approve it.

In 1954, during the Eisenhower administration, Assistant Secretary of Labor James Ernest Wilkins became the first Black official to attend a meeting of the president's Cabinet as he sat in for Labor Secretary James P. Mitchell.

In 1958, the novel "Lolita" by Vladimir Nabokov was first published in New York by G.P. Putnam's Sons, almost three years after it was originally published in Paris.

In 1963, James Meredith became the first Black student to graduate from the University of Mississippi.

In 1969, the Woodstock Music and Art Fair in Bethel, New York, wound to a close after three nights with a mid-morning set by Jimi Hendrix.

In 1983, Hurricane Alicia slammed into the Texas coast, leaving 21 dead and causing more than a billion dollars' worth of damage.

In 1988, Vice President George H.W. Bush accepted the presidential nomination of the Republican National Convention in New Orleans.

In 1993, a judge in Sarasota, Fla., ruled that Kimberly Mays, the 14-year-old girl who had been switched at birth with another baby, need never again see her biological parents, Ernest and Regina Twigg, in accordance with her stated wishes. (However, Kimberly later moved in with the Twiggs.)

In 2014, Missouri Gov. Jay Nixon ordered the National Guard to Ferguson, a suburb of St. Louis convulsed by protests over the fatal shooting of a Black teen. Don Pardo, 96, a durable radio and television announcer known for his introductions with a booming baritone on "Saturday Night Live" and other shows, died in Tucson, Arizona.

In 2017, Steve Bannon, President Donald Trump's top White House strategist, was forced out of his post by Trump. (Bannon would step down as Breitbart News chair-man in January 2018 after the release of a book in which he criticized Trump and members of his family; he was pardoned by Trump in the final hours of Trump's term after being charged with diverting money from donors who believed the money would be used to build a wall along the southern border.)

Ten years ago: President Barack Obama and European leaders demanded that Syrian President Bashar Assad resign saying his brutal suppression of his people made him unfit to lead. Vice President Joe Biden met with Chinese Vice President Xi Jinping in Beijing.

Five years ago: For the first

time since declaring his presidential run, Republican Donald Trump offered an apology to those who might have been hurt by his caustic comments, saying he regretted some of what he had said "in the heat of debate." Former NFL star Darren Sharper was sentenced by a federal judge in New Orleans to more than 18 years in prison for drugging women in order to rape them — double the sentence recommended by prosecutors. At the Rio Games, Jamaica's Usain Bolt completed an unprecedented third consecutive sweep of the 100- and 200-meter sprints. Retired Army Gen. John W. Vessey





White House: Taliban allowing 'safe passage' Kabul airlift

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Taliban have agreed to allow "safe passage" from Afghanistan for civilians struggling to join a U.S.-directed airlift from the capital, President Joe Biden's national security adviser said Tuesday, although a timetable for completing the evacuation of Americans, Afghan allies and others has yet to be worked out with the country's new rulers.

Jake Sullivan acknowledged reports that some

civilians were encountering resistance — "being turned away or pushed back or even beaten" as they tried to reach the Kabul international airport. But he said "very large numbers" were reaching the airport and the problem of the others was being taken up with the Taliban, whose stunningly swift takeover of the country on Sunday plunged the U.S. evacuation effort into chaos, confusion and violence.

Pentagon officials said that after interruptions on Monday, the airlift was back on track and being accelerated despite weather problems, amid regular communication with Taliban leaders. Additional U.S. troops arrived and more were on the way, with a total of more than 6,000 expected to be involved in securing the airport in coming days.

Pentagon spokesman John Kirby disclosed that U.S. commanders were speaking with Taliban commanders "multiple times a day" about avoiding conflict at the airport.

This suggested that the new rulers of Afghanistan, who swept to power after 20 years of war against the U.S.-supported Kabul government, plan not to disrupt the evacuation. Kirby would not discuss details of the Taliban arrangement, and Sullivan said the question of how much time the Taliban will give the evacuation was still being negotiated.

Biden has said he wants the evacuation completed by Aug. 31. Sullivan declined to say whether that deadline would hold.

Gen. Frank McKenzie, head of U.S. Central Command and overall commander of U.S. troops in Kabul, made an unannounced visit to the Afghan capital on Tuesday. In a written statement, he said he found that military air traffic controllers and ground handlers were "rapidly scaling up" air-

McKenzie on Sunday negotiated the safe passage agreement with Taliban leaders in talks held in Doha, Qatar.

"I cautioned them against interference in our evacuation, and made it clear to them that any attack would be met with overwhelming force in the defense of our forces," McKenzie said. "The protection of U.S. civilians and our partners is my highest priority and we will take all necessary action to ensure a safe and efficient withdrawal."

At the White House, Sullivan said U.S. officials were engaged in an "hour by hour" process of holding the Taliban to their commitment to allow safe passage for civilians wishing to leave the country. Asked whether the Biden administration recognizes the Taliban as the legitimate rulers of Afghanistan, Sullivan said it was too soon to say and that the Taliban's record of adhering to international human rights standards "has not been

Overnight at the airport, nine Air Force C-17 transport planes arrived with equipment and about 1,000 troops, and seven C-17s took off with 700-800 civilian evacuees, including 165 Americans, Army Maj. Gen. William Taylor told a Pentagon news conference. The total included Afghans who have applied for Special Immigrant Visas and third-country nationals, he said.

The goal is to ramp up to one evacuation flight per hour by Wednesday, with potentially a total of 5,000 to 9,000 evacuees leaving per day, Taylor and Kirby said. Taylor said that more than 4,000 U.S. troops are now at the airport.

That number is expected to top 6,000 in coming days, with airport security to be headed by an

Yanks overtake Red Sox for wild card with doubleheader sweep

NEW YORK (AP) — Luis Gil posted his third straight scoreless start to begin his career, Luke Voit and Giancarlo Stanton homered, and the New York Yankees beat Boston 2-0 Tuesday night to sweep a doubleheader and move percentage points ahead of the Red Sox for an AL wild-card spot.

In the opener, Jonathan Loaisiga stranded the bases loaded in Boston's final at-bat for a gutsy twoinning save after New York capitalized on a wild outing by Red Sox relievers for a 5-3 victory. The Yankees have won five straight and 12 of 15

to narrowly overtake Boston for second in the AL East — New York is 68-52 and the Red Sox 69-53, a difference of .001 percentage points. The Yankees were 10 1/2 games behind first-place Boston on July 5 but have gone 26-11 since.

The Red Sox had seemingly snapped out of a 3-11

The Red Sox had seemingly snapped out of a 3-11 slump when they swept last-place Baltimore for three games over the weekend. Now, Boston is suddenly out of postseason position after leading the division for much of the season.

Gil (2-0) allowed three hits and four walks and struck out four over 4 2/3 innings. He has yet to allow a run in 15 2/3 big league innings, the longest stretch to start a career by a Yankees pitcher since at least 1961, according to Elias. The previous best was Joba Chamberlain at 15 1/3 innings in 2007.

Gil is the only major league pitcher since at least 1901 with no runs allowed and 15 or more strikeouts through his first three games, according to YES Network.

The 23-year-old Gil — pronounced like "heel" — cruised into the fifth before allowing two singles and a walk. Left-hander Wandy Peralta relieved and retired lefty-hitting Rafael Devers on an inning-ending fielder's choice, preserving the 2-0

lead.

Boston had runners at first and third in the sixth with two outs when pinch-hitter Bobby Dalbec ripped a comebacker that appeared to hit Peralta in the shoulder. Peralta scrambled for the ball near the third-base line and fired to first just in time to retire Dalbec.

Chad Green closed out the ninth for his fifth save and second in two days.

Voit poked a 98 mph fastball from Nathan Eovaldi (10-8) over the wall in right for a solo homer in the second. It was Voit's sixth homer of the season and second in three days.

The 2020 big league home run leader seemingly lost his job at first base when the Yankees acquired Anthony Rizzo from the Cubs on July 29, but he's taken advantage of steady playing time with Rizzo on the COVID-19 injured list. Rizzo is expected back in the next couple of days.

Stanton led off the fourth with his 19th home run.

Eovaldi worked five innings and was charged with two runs, seven hits and a walk with six strikeouts.

FOR STARTERS

Loaisiga pitched a perfect sixth in the first game before Boston loaded the bases with no outs in the seventh on three singles — two of them soft, well-placed grounders. Pinch-hitter Travis Shaw lined out to left in his first at-bat since being claimed off waivers Sunday, but the ball wasn't deep enough for a sacrifice fly.

The 26-year-old Loaisiga then struck out Kiké Hernandez and Hunter Renfroe — the latter on a caught foul tip — and let out a vicious yell following his fifth save.

"He didn't flinch," Yankees manager Aaron Boone said. "You could just see his confidence out there, like, 'I got this.' He was able to execute and wiggle out of it."

The Yankees have played a majors-most 68 games decided by two runs or fewer. Their .661 winning percentage (45-23) in those games is best in the big leagues.

leagues. Red Sox relievers Garrett Whitlock (4-2) and Josh Taylor combined to walk the bases loaded with one out in the fifth inning before Voit floated a two-run

single to shallow center for a 4-3 lead.

Boston issued six walks over the final two innings.

Albert Abreu (2-0) got the final out of the fifth and the win.

Big 12 teams face forfeits if virus keeps them from playing

IRVING, Texas (AP) — Big 12 teams unable to play a game this fall because of COVID-19, or any other reasons, will have to forfeit and be given a loss in the conference standings.

The Big 12 released its game threshold policy Tuesday. A no contest would be declared only if both teams are unable to compete, and there are no plans to make up any games not played as scheduled.

Roster thresholds that were in effect for the Big 12 last season are no longer in play. Teams without at least 53 available players, and a minimum number at certain positions, could get a no contest declared last year if unable to play and unable to reschedule the game.

The Big 12 said a forfeit can happen at any point before a completed contest, and when possible would occur prior to the visiting team traveled to the game site.

Both teams would be deemed to have played the game for the purposes of conference standings only, with the team not forfeiting being credited with a win.

Pac-12 officials said last week that its teams that cannot play because of COVID-19 issues will likely be forced to forfeit games, with the conference reinstituting its forfeiture policy after it modified its rules last season because of the pandemic. SEC Commissioner Greg Sankey has been clear that forfeits — not postponements, like last year — were on the table in his league.

The Big 12 last season got 43 of its 45 scheduled conference games played.
