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## County approves tax rate and budget into county coffers over the trained in mental health cri-

Howard County's tax rate and budget for 2021-22 will both be higher than in 2020-

Commissioners

officially set the new rate at the "No New Revenue" tax rate of 32.7545 cents per \$100 valuation, a rate which will bring in the same revenue as last year, despite being higher than last year's tax rate of 29.9562 cents per \$100. According to County

Judge Kathryn Wiseman, the commissioners originally planned to set the rate at the "Voter Approval Rate" of 33.9629 cents per \$100, but Commissioner Jimmie Long (Precinct 3) made the motion to instead approve the No New Revenue rate.

At the same time as his motion to approve the 32.7545 cents per \$100 tax rate, Long proposed accepting the county's Annual Budget as presented, totaling \$18,512,000, up slightly from last year's total.

Commissioners approved both the tax rate and budget unanimously.

commissioners whether - considering her upcoming retirement at the end of 2022 - they wanted to appoint someone else to serve on the regional I-27 Advisory Committee. Wiseman currently serves on the committee, whose goal is to extend Interstate 27 which currently runs from Amarillo south to Lubbock – from Lubbock through Big Spring to San Angelo.

Commissioners responded by asking Wiseman to continue to serve on the committee for the time being.

"I say, you need to stay there," said Commissioner John Cline (Precinct 4). Commissioners unanimously approved Wiseman retaining the post. County Treasurer Sharon Adams

presented personnel considerations, her monthly Treasurer's Report for June and July, and the monthly Payroll Report. Adams also presented a policy required by the State of Texas called the Emergency Responder Paid Quarantine Policy, which ensures that emergency personnel afflicted with coronavirus continue to receive pay during their quarantine. Commissioners unanimously passed the measure.

Olson presented an item including two bids on 10-foot chain-link fencing for the new landfill: one for \$343,580 and the other for \$685,420. Commissioner Long moved to table the item, and instead request bids on eight-foot

tall fencing.

"I think at this time, instead of looking at the 10-foot fence, we can save a little money by going with an eightfoot fence," Long said. "Due to our investigation and after some elevation checks, I believe an eight-foot fence will be sufficient and would save us a significant amount of money."

Commissioners unanimously approved following Long's suggestion and the item was tabled pending new

Olson also presented the Monthly Financial Report, as well as invoices, purchase requests, and budget amendments during the meeting. All were unanimously approved, except for a single purchase request for a door at the Justice of the Peace Precinct 1, Place 1, office. The item was tabled for future study.

An item presented by Commissioner Long concerning Four Sevens Operating Company was discussed during a closed executive session prior to the meeting, and no action was taken.

An item was mistakenly placed on the agenda concerning the Texas Commission on Jail standards which had been approved at a previous meeting, so no action was needed.

County Elections Administrator Jody Duck asked commissioners to appoint election judges for the upcoming November election, and to set a special meeting date to canvass the election results. The commissioners set Nov. 15 as the date for the meet-

County Indigent Healthcare Director JoAnn Valle asked permission to go out for bids on pharmaceutical services at the Howard County Detention Center, the Howard County Care/Indigent Welfare, and the Juvenile Probation Program. The commissioners unanimously approved the request.

Valle also asked the commissioners to consider approval of physicians' contracts for the Indigent Healthcare Program for the upcoming fiscal year, which was also approved unanimously.

County Road Commissioner Brian Klinksiek told commissioners that a planned contract negotiation with Delek/Tokai Transportation for a right-of-way through county land had been canceled. Klinksiek also asked the commis-

sioners to consider restoring the speed limit on Centerpoint Road from 50 miles per hour to 65 miles per hour now that construction in the area is complete.

Commissioner Long moved to table

"They're fracking 14 wells," Long said. "I'd like to keep those trucks slowed down, and, more or less, residents out there, so they don't run up on some of those sand trucks out there."

Commissioners unanimously approved tabling the item.

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## Today in History Today is Tuesday, Aug. 24, the

236th day of 2021. There are 129 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History:

On August 24, 1814, during the War of 1812, British forces invaded Washington, D.C., setting fire to the Capitol (which was still under construction) and the White House, as well as other public buildings.

On this date:

In A.D. 79, long-dormant Mount Vesuvius erupted, burying the Roman cities of Pompeii and Herculaneum in volcanic ash; an estimated 20,000 people died.

In 1932, Amelia Earhart embarked on a 19-hour flight from Los Angeles to Newark, New Jersey, making her the first woman to fly solo, nonstop, from coast to coast.

In 1949, the North Atlantic Treaty came into force.

In 1954, President Dwight D. Eisenhower signed the Communist Control Act, outlawing the Communist Party in the United States.

In 1968, France became the world's fifth thermonuclear power as it exploded a hydrogen bomb in the South Pacific.

In 1981, Mark David Chapman was sentenced in New York to 20 years to life in prison for murdering John Lennon. (Chapman remains impris-

In 1989, Baseball Commissioner A. Bartlett Giamatti (juh-MAH'-tee) banned Pete Rose from the game for betting on his own team, the Cincinnati Reds.

In 1992, Hurricane Andrew smashed into Florida, causing \$30 billion in damage; 43 U.S. deaths were blamed on the

In 2001, Tom Green, a Mormon fundamentalist with five wives and 30 children, was sentenced by a court in Provo. Utah, to five years in prison for his conviction on four counts of bigamy and one count of failure to pay child support.

In 2003, the Justice Department reported the U.S. crime rate in 2002 was the lowest since studies began in 1973.

In 2008, on the final day of the Beijing Games, Kobe Bryant hit two 3-pointers in a big fourth quarter to help the United States defeat Spain 118-107 and win the men's basketball gold medal for the first time since 2000.

In 2019, police in Aurora, Colorado, responding to a report of a suspicious person,

used a chokehold to subdue Elijah McClain, a 23-year-old Black man; he suffered cardiac arrest on the way to the hospital and was later declared brain dead and taken off life support. (Three officers were placed on leave but returned to the force after prosecutors found insufficient evidence to support charging them.)

Ten years ago: A defiant Moammar Gadhafi vowed from hiding to fight on "until victory or martyrdom" and called on residents of the Libyan capital and loyal tribesmen across his North African nation to free Tripoli from the "devils and traitors" who had overrun it. Steve Jobs resigned as CEO of Apple Inc.; he was succeeded by Tim Cook.

Five years ago: A 6.2 magnitude earthquake reduced three central Italian towns to rubble and killed nearly 300 people. Astronaut Jeffrey Williams, commander of the International Space Station, marked a U.S.

record-breaking 521st day in orbit, a number accumulated over four flights. (Upon his return to earth 13 days later, Williams had logged a grand total of 534 days in space).

One year ago: Republicans formally nominated President Donald Trump for a second term on the opening day of a scaled-down convention; during a visit to the convention city of Charlotte, North Carolina, Trump told delegates that "the only way they can take this election away from us is if this is a rigged election." Anger over the shooting of a Black man, Jacob Blake, by police spilled into the streets of Kenosha, Wisconsin for a second night. Authorities in Portland, Oregon, said protesters repeatedly set fire to a police union headquarters building and were repelled by officers spraying tear gas. The World Health Organization said using plasma from the recovered to treat COVID-19 was still considered an "experi-mental" therapy; the statement

came a day after President Donald Trump announced an emergency authorization of the treatment. University of Hong Kong scientists claimed to have the first evidence of someone being reinfected with the virus that causes COVID-19. Citing "significant errors" in jury selection, California's Supreme Court overturned the death sen tence for Scott Peterson but let his murder conviction stand in the killing of his pregnant wife.

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

You don't have to see all 52 cards to play a hand to best advantage. There are times when the correct method of play can be determined as

the table.

Consider this deal where West leads a club against three notrump. Declarer starts with six tricks and is a decided favorite to score three more by establishing dummy's diamonds.

He wins the club with the queen

if the opposing cards were face up on

queen, dummy the king and East, very alertly, the deuce. If East plays the ace instead of the deuce, South has an easy time of it. Whatever East returns, South can cash the J-10 of diamonds and concede a diamond to the nine to acquire his ninth trick.

But if East ducks the king of diamonds and sold also the inels. South case

monds, and also the jack, South goes down one. It is not difficult to find this defense, because East knows West's queen is a singleton, and that by ducking twice he can limit dummy to two diamond tricks.

However, just as East can read the queen as a singleton, so can South, and if he pays close attention to his knitting, he can make the contract anyway. He simply allows West's queen to hold the first diamond trick!

This play makes mincemeat of the defense, as South is now sure to score three diamond tricks no matter how East defends.

It's not easy for declarer to think of ducking the queen of diamonds when West plays it. One would tend to cover the queen with the king instinctively without giving the matter much thought. The moral is simply that you should look before you lean.

#### The Problem Is You

Dear Annie: My husband and I are trying to figure out how to emotionally support our adult daughter, who is 40 years old. She is going through a very emotional period in her life.

She has been married for about a year, has "major issues" with her spouse and is not certain she can "stay in the relationship." But from our conversations with her and what we've observed, the issues she describes seem to be all "her." For example, she expects her spouse to give his undivided attention to her all day on his day off from work. She is not even willing to allow chores such as mowing the lawn or doing the laundry to interfere. She doesn't want him to be reading. talking on the phone or checking emails -- just paying full attention to her. Her sister is extremely concerned about her as well.

with her spouse. We are all concerned about mental health issues but are at a loss.

We've encouraged her to seek therapy, which she has started, but she is already looking for a different therapist. Her sister is going to ask her own therapist for advice on how to be more supportive. We'll do the same.

But we can't bring ourselves to agree with her that the spousal behaviors are abusive. because they simply are not. This opinion is based on what we've observed firsthand; not by what she says about what happens. We can say, "we are so sorry you are unhappy," but this is not the affirmation she is seeking from us. This family dynamic is new to us and is stressing us all out. Any advice? -- Stressed Out Family

Dear Stressed Out Family: It does sound like your daughter could be suffering from a mental illness, or maybe just extreme insecurity or narcissism. Regardless of the diagnosis, which hopefully her new therapist will be able to make, you are also suffering. The best thing to do is to consult a professional yourself about how best to support your daughter during this difficult time of her life -- and yours.

They are not forgotten in my house. For the last 30 years, my life and home have been filled with joy, laughter and happiness. My advice to that grandmother is to write those so-called daughters-in-law off and surround herself with others that will love her and want to spend holidays with a woman who loves and wants to host them. She won't regret it. -- Grandfather
