 Pediatric care: No more than 2 designated visitors per hospital stay.

• End-of-life: No more than 1 visitor at a time, limited to immediate family only. Family visitors must remain outside the facility until rotated in. Other excircumstances, tenuating such as hospice and end-oflife care, will be considered based on the best interest and needs of the individual patient. All exceptions must be approved by the care team.

• Maternity and Labor and Delivery Units: No more than 2 designated visitors including labor partner per hospital stay.

The Permian Basin Regional Planning Commission and Texas A&M AgriLife Extension's Texas Master Gardener program will hold a class at Howard College in the fine art of composting.

The class will answer such questions as: What is composting? Why compost? What goes into a compost pile? How is compost used? Are there different types of composting? and Does composting affect the environment?

basic, advanced or expert questions about the subject.

Lila Estes

Lila was probably one of the first trailblazers of the women's lib movement. Women-owned busi-



nesses were mostly unheard of in small town Texas in 1970, but Lila did not let that slow her down. She opened her "own' business, Reeder Realtors, in a small room in the same building with Bill's insurance agency, Reeder Insurance. Her real estate business was a resounding success because Lila enjoyed the work and truly cared for her clients. She was always excited

to close a deal even if it meant working late nights and weekends. She also was a pioneer in moving the real estate industry to the computer world by partnering with ERA Real Estate franchise. She became one of the first offices to offer her clients the ability to see new homes on the computer screen as well as the ability to fax home photos to clients. Debney joined Lila in the real estate business and during those years, the office and Lila won many national ERA awards and travel incentives.

In 2000, after 40 years in Big Spring, Lila and Bill decided to leave the work world and moved to Mesquite to be closer to all their children and grandchildren. Bill and Lila became very active members of the First United Methodist Church of Mesquite where they were welcomed with open arms. They both loved taking their grandkids to City Lake Park to feed the ducks (and fight off the geese) and to play at the "Wooden Park" at Kid Scape Park. With the move, Lila developed her love for Panera Bread (where everyone knew her name), good Braum's hamburgers, and sizzling Martinez Brothers fajitas.

Lila loved attending all of the baseball, basketball, soccer, volleyball and football games that her kids, grandkids and great-grandkids played, even following them to Florida and then to California to watch their college baseball games. She rarely missed a game and was usually the most vocal fan, making sure the refs and umpires knew whenever they would make an unfair call involving one of her "kids". Lila equally loved attending their many

musicals, plays and band performances.

Lila is remembered for her fantastic style and amazing taste. She was always the most beautiful and well-dressed woman in the room. She popped her collar up to frame her face long before anyone was doing that on TV. She loved beautiful and expensive things and somehow always persuaded Bill to buy something that caught her eye. When Lila and Bill were all but broke and expecting their first child. Lila fell in love with the latest style in baby beds, a beautiful but expensive crib built by a fledgling company named Stork. Heard of that company? It took the American market by storm. It cost almost more than a new car! After many conversations, Lila won and all three of the busterettes, each as they born, used that same expensive crib! Lila was an "influencer" long before social media starting using that word. Her hair was never gray and was styled perfectly in the most popular style of the time. When she "went blonde", everyone in town went blonde as well. Her lipstick, the perfect shade of deep coral, was always flawless. Lila loved new clothes and loved to shop - a trait she has definitely passed down to her daughters and grandchildren.

Lila could sew beautifully - just like her mother, who used to take Lila with her when she went to buy large sacks of flour so that Lila could choose the fabric pattern of the flour bag. Then, her mom would make Lila a new dress with the flour cloth fabric. Lila made baby clothes, doll clothes and pageant gowns covered with sequins and beads. She even became a quasi-barber and cut Bill's hair on a regular basis. She also beautifully cut Dawn's "Farrah Fawcett hair do" throughout Dawn's high school, pageant and modelling years.

Lila was usually the smartest person in the room, too, although she knew how to hide that by asking the right questions to lead them to the right conclusion. Lila's mere presence filled any room she entered and she was able to make those she spoke with feel like they were the only person in the world that she wanted to talk to.

Lila was a skeptic, but she was also a dreamer who always looked to the future and loved making plans. Lila lived in the world of "what if?", and she was brave enough to see it through. She was upbeat and always moved forward in life. She loved

working in the dirt, planting flowers, including geraniums every spring. Lila loved a good list - she often joked that she had lists of her lists. She loved to travel (with Bill, of course) - to Europe, Mexico, California, New York, New England and anywhere with a beach. She loved walking on beaches, looking at the seagulls and gathering shells with Bill. The Del Coronado in San Diego was one of her very special places, and Jonathan Livingston Seagull was one of her favorite books.

Lila loved chocolate. A lot! Her favorite was 5th Avenue bars which almost always made everything better. She would pull into a 7-11 store, and Deb and Denise would jump out and buy her 3 or 4 5th Avenue bars to keep Lila going. Snickers bars were a distant second. Lila loved peanut butter straight from the jar and Eagle Brand sweetened condensed milk straight from the can. Lila is fondly remembered for inventing "unbirthday presents", creating the "marshmallow drawer" that always had presents for the grandkids, and singing her post-bath song "wrap-her-up-before-she-freezes" during grandkids' overnights.

Not to be forgotten, she regularly sent food back in restaurants (which mortified her children), hid money in clothes (just in case), even froze milk during the Three Mile Island nuclear incident (for safety) and ducked down in the car when she was delivering her grandson in the carpool lane since she was wearing her robe. And she did love her legendary shopping trips to Northpark Mall and had a passionate love for all cats and dogs.

We all loved and looked forward to Lila's fantastic holiday cranberry pecan salad, her labor-intensive dateloaf that always left Bill's arm hurting from the hand-mixing and her amazing broccoli cheese casserole. She and Bill really enjoyed a good bridge party with friends. They were actually brilliant competitive bridge players and even were statelevel winners many times. Lila was great at playing Little People, racing Hot Wheels and serving a tea party with the grandkids. She looked forward to her weekly coffee at McDonalds with her girlfriends from their church. She just had a generous heart and would welcome people who would otherwise be alone during Christmas season to join her family's holiday dinners and parties.



Something to think about...

"For Christ's love compels us, because we are convinced that one died for all..." ~ 2 Corinthians 5:14a

As I thought about what it means for us to partici-



pate in God's mission, I was reminded of a short story Ernest Hemingway wrote. In it, he told of a Spanish father and his teenage son who had a strained relationship. The son was named Paco, and at one point he seriously wrongs his father. In his guilt and shame, Paco runs away from home and finds himself wandering the streets of Madrid.

The father desperately searched SCHNEGERGER all over the city for his son. He was afraid he may never see his boy

again. In a last ditch, desperate attempt, the father took out an ad in the local newspaper El Liberal. The ad simply read: "Paco, meet me at the Hotel Montana at noon on Tuesday. All is forgiven! Love, Papa."

The father in Hemingway's story prayed that his son would somehow see the ad; and then maybe, just maybe, he would come to the Hotel Montana. On Tuesday, just before noon, the father arrived at the hotel.

When he did, he could not believe his eyes. There were over 800 young men that showed up hoping to be reunited to their father. It turned out that each of them was named Paco, and each of them had come to meet his own father. They all longed to find forgiveness and reconciliation in front of the Hotel Montana.

All they needed was an invitation. How many "Paco's" do we cross paths with every day?

"All this is from God, who reconciled us to himself through Christ and gave us the ministry of reconciliation: that God was reconciling the world to himself in Christ, not counting people's sins against them. And he has committed to us the message of reconciliation. We are therefore Christ's ambassadors, as though God were making his appeal through us. We implore you on Christ's behalf: Be reconciled to God." \sim 2 Corinthians 5:18-20

Jesus told a similar story about a lost son revealing our Heavenly Father's heart for his lost chil dren.

Home can sometimes feel a million miles away. Many are not sure if they are welcome any more. We get to be the ad, the sign, the message from God for the lost and broken in our world that says: "Whatever you have done, all is forgiven! Please come home! Love, Papa."

How can we become a clear message from the Father for the "Paco's" of this world? May we help others find their way home this week!

Faith in a violent world

The rapid collapse of the Afghanistan government and its fall to Taliban control has sent chills throughout the world. We are haunted by the desperation written on thousands of Afghan faces huddled at the Kabul airport seeking escape. Our hearts and our prayers go out to them.

Why is the world so broken? Why does violence stalk every generation? Why does this continue?

My grandfather fought in France during the First World War. But twenty years later the world was engulfed in another global conflict and the "War to End All Wars" was largely forgotten. Since WWII America has been at war in Korea, Vietnam, the Gulf War, Bosnia, Iraq, Afghanistan and several other lesser known places.

James explained violence this way: "What is the source of quarrels and conflicts among you? Is not the source your pleasures that wage war in your members? You lust and do not Bill have; so you commit murder. You are envious and cannot obtain; so you fight and quarrel." (James 4:1-2). TINSLEY

Jesus was under no illusion regarding our circumstances. He said, "You will be hearing of wars and rumors of wars. See

that you are not frightened, for those things must take place, but that is not yet the end. For nation will rise against nation, and kingdom against kingdom, and in various places there will be famines and earthquakes.

(Matthew 24:6-7). "In this world you will have tribulation, but be of good cour-age, I have overcome the world." (John 16:33).

It is difficult to imagine the violence and cruelty of the first century. Crucifixion was common under Roman rule. More than 2,000 Jews were crucified and displayed on Galilean roads about the time Jesus was born following a revolt led by Judas ben Hezekiah. As far as we know every one of the Apostles, except John, was martyred. In spite of this, they lived their lives with hope, joy and peace.

Often persecuted and suffering for his faith in Christ, the Apostle Paul gave us this instruction: "We urge you, brethren, admonish the unruly, encourage the fainthearted, help the weak, be patient with everyone. See that no one repays another with evil for evil, but always seek after that which is good for one another and for all people," (1 Thessalonians 5:14-15).)

It is easy to give in to the relentless stream of negative news: wars, violence, abuse and natural disasters. Many see dark clouds gathered on the horizon with little hope for the future. But faith can withstand the most dismal circumstances

For every act of violence, we can find a thousand acts of kindness. Every overwhelming flood unleashes a greater flood of human kindness, courage and sacrifice. The same can be said for every terrorist attack and every war. God is present. Goodness will triumph. He will not leave us nor abandon us. The righteous will not be forsaken. Nothing can destroy the life of the spirit in Christ Jesus.

"For he hath made him to be sin for us, who knew no sin; that we might be made the righteousness of God in him." 2 Corinthians

5:21



This is probably one of the most amazing verses in all of the Bible because it tells us so many things about salvation. It tells us that God made Jesus to be sin for us. This means that on the cross, Jesus literally became our sin. Jesus did no sin (He was perfect and sinless), however,

He became the embodiment of every single sin which has ever been committed by human beings – past, present and future. If this were not written and recorded in Scripture, it would be a blasphemous statement. The radicality of what this verse says is in fact the hope of the gospel. Jesus didn't die for sinners with small, token sins, He died for real, hardboiled sinners with exceedingly sinful sin. And because of this fact, all of our sins have been forgiven.

Sin For Us Let me tell you what this means. It means that our sin no longer matters. Yes, sin is sinful, and sin is bad, but it is no longer a determining factor in whether or not God loves, justifies, sanctifies, accepts or blesses us. I recommend that you stop sinning, but don't stress over your sin, don't let it keep you up at night, because in God's eyes, your sin isn't even an issue. But why did God make Jesus to be sin for

> us? So that we could focus on something other than our sin, and thus, be made free. In Christ, we no longer live by religious rules and regulations because God made Him to be sin for us. And now, being made free from the Law, our focus is our fellowship with God. We don't worry about being too sinful, because now, our main concern is - are we trusting His grace enough? We don't work to sin less; we strive to trust Jesus more and to take His easy yoke and light burden. We don't think about how bad our sin is, but rather, we meditate on the greatness and goodness of God's grace. We are not sin-focused, we are grace-focused because God made Jesus to be sin for us.


So really, I guess my struggle comes down to ... do I have the faith to trust Him, and will I be bold enough to be obediant.

NFL's vaccine rate at 93%, mandatory shots were discussed

The NFL says 93% of players are vaccinated for COVID-19 and the league wanted mandatory vaccination but the NFLPA wouldn't agreed to it.

The league also has asked the players' union to adjust protocols so vaccinated players would be tested weekly instead of every 14 days. Unvaccinated players are tested daily.

NFLPA president JC Tretter, a center for the Cleveland Browns, said earlier this week the decision not to make vaccination mandatory was done by the league. But league officials disputed that assertion.

"We've been discussing mandatory vaccination from the start," NFL deputy general counsel Larry Ferazani said Thursday. "In fact, we took the lead and required staff and coaches to be vaccinated in order to have access to a player. Beginning at that point, we began banging the drum for what (the NFLPA's) experts also concede is the single greatest way that we can protect the players and the staff, which is to get to a 100 percent vaccination level. That was our request from that, and we would still love to see that mandate go into effect tomorrow."

NFL officials also do not have a vaccine mandate.

The league reported 68 positives cases out of 7,190 tested individuals between Aug. 1-21. The 0.95% incidence rate is lower than in most communities.

In 2005, coastal residents jammed freeways and gas stations as they rushed to get out of the way of Hurricane Katrina, which was headed toward New Orleans.

In 2006, a Comair CRJ-100 crashed after trying to take off from the wrong runway

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in Lexington, Ky., killing 49 people and leaving the co-pilot the sole survivor.

In 2008, Barack Obama was nominated for president by the Democratic National Convention in Denver.

In 2009, mourners filed past the closed casket of the late Sen. Edward Kennedy at the John F. Kennedy Presidential Library and Museum in Boston. Jaycee Lee Dugard, kidnapped when she was 11, was reunited with her mother 18 years after her abduction in South Lake Tahoe, California.

Ten years ago: Hurricane Irene, after striking Puerto Rico and the Bahamas, pushed up the U.S east coast, prompting evacuations in New York City and leaving major flood damage in Vermont.

Five years ago: Republican Donald Trump warned of a 'war on the American farmer," telling a crowd in Iowa that

rival Hillary Clinton wanted "to shut down family farms' and implement anti-agriculture policies; Trump's speech at the annual "Roast and Ride" fundraiser for GOP Sen. Joni Ernst came hours after Clinton received her first national security briefing as the Democratic presidential nominee.

One year ago: Speaking on the White House South Lawn, President Donald Trump accepted his party's renomination, blasting Joe Biden as a hapless career politician who would endanger Americans' safety and painting a grim portrait of violence in American cities run by Democrats; Trump spoke for more than a hour to a tightly-packed and largely maskless crowd. Hurricane Laura roared ashore as a Category 4 storm near Cameron, Louisiana, bringing 150 mile-an-hour winds, torrential rains and a storm surge as high as 15 feet; the storm, one of the strongest ever to strike the U.S., would leave

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How Do I Negotiate a Raise?

Dear Annie: My

wife has been on pain medication for almost a decade, and it has turned into a serious addiction. I have to monitor her pills weekly -- though, recently, it's been daily. She hasn't worked at all the last decade, ever since she started getting prescribed the painkillers. She lays in bed all day long, sleeping or watching TV. I've bought several safes to lock away her pills in so that I can only administer to her what she needs. She's broken into all of them. I keep the pills with me at all times so that I can make sure she doesn't take too much. She's constantly deriding me, blaming me for her not having enough pills. She always pleads,

"Just give me tomorrow's pills tonight." She has now brought our adult children into this mess by trying to make them pick sides in this ongoing fight, but the kids know she has a problem! I have brought up rehab several times, but she dismisses the idea and claims she doesn't need it. This past year, I got her an appointment with a therapist. It was just online, through videoconference, and my wife completely blew it off, barely paying attention to the therapist. After 25 years of marriage, I'm about ready to file for divorce. Help! --Tired of Mother's Little Helper

Dear Tired: Of

course you're exhausted. You're living in the tides of addiction, but you don't have to be

subject to the constant push and pull. To find some grounding, I strongly encourage you to check out Nar-Anon (https://www.nar-anon. org) or SMART Recovery Family and Friends (https://www.smartrecovery.org/family). You cannot neglect your own mental health.

As for your wife, she clearly has a severe opioid addiction and needs professional help. You and your adult children may choose to do an intervention in order to make the strongest possible case to get her into an in-patient treatment facility. She will need the supervision of medical professionals if she's going to detox. Call the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration at 800662-4357 for guidance and to be referred to resources in your area.

Dear Annie: I have been working at the same company for 12 years, and I haven't gotten a raise in five years. I never got in the habit of asking for them, because they used to give me a small salary bump every other year. But that petered out when a new CEO took over.

A few months ago, I was at lunch with two co-workers when the subject of salaries came up. I asked them if they'd received any pay bumps in the past few years, and they both said that they had. This gave me the guts I needed to ask my supervisor to meet with me. I presented a list of my accomplishments

over the past four years and said that I believed I had earned a raise. He said that pretty much no one was getting raises anymore, at which point I tentatively mentioned (without naming names) that I'd heard some other employees had received raises. He got visibly angry and told me that I should never discuss my salary with another employee at the company and asked me to leave his office immediately. After that, I dropped the issue. But now I'm wishing I'd pushed back and am considering asking him for another meeting. Am I crazy? -- Taken for Granted

Dear Taken: It's a violation of the National Labor Relations Act for employers to forbid employees from dis-

cussing their wages. Contact the National Labor Relations Board at 1-844-762-6572 for guidance on what recourse you may have. Whatever comes of that, it might be time to dust off that resume. Because, beyond being illegal, your boss's behavior is just plain old disrespectful. You'd be better off working for a company that recognizes your worth.

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
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
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

1. Win the heart lead with the king, draw all the missing trumps and cash the A-K of spades, hoping to catch the singleton or doubleton queen. If the queen does not fall, lead the ten of diamonds to the ace and return the queen from dummy, planning to discard a spade if South follows low. The overall chance of success with this method of play is about 60%.

If you were to stake the outcome strictly on either a finesse in spades or in diamonds, you would have little more than a 50% chance for the grand slam.

Note that it is far better to play South for the king of diamonds than North. This is because you can trap South's hypothetical king regardless of how many diamonds he was dealt, while if you finessed successfully against North by overtaking the ten of diamonds with the jack, you could not catch his king (by cashing the ace and ruffing a diamond) if he started with more than three diamonds. With eight diamonds in the opposing hands, the chance of felling the king in this way is significantly against the odds.

2. The only concern is the possibility of losing two club tricks. This can't happen if the adverse clubs are divided 3-2, so all your thoughts should be concentrated on dealing with a 4-1 or 5-0 club division.

To assure the contract, cash the A-K of hearts and lead a low club to dummy's jack. If South wins with the king, he must return a club or yield a ruff-and-discard. Either way, you're sure to score the rest of the tricks.

If dummy's jack wins the first club trick, you should next return a low club from dummy toward your remaining Q-9-3! If South shows out on the trick, you can play any club from your hand to assure the contract. North wins but is endplayed. If South follows suit on the second club lead, you are equally sure of losing no more than one club trick.

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

Sale and Dalbec lead Red Sox to 12-2 rout of Twins

BOSTON- Red Sox ace Chris Sale joined Hall of Famer Sandy Koufax as the only pitchers on record with three immaculate innings, Bobby Dalbec homered twice and Boston beat the Minnesota Twins 12-2 on Thursday night.

Dalbec drove in seven runs and Rafael Devers hit his 30th homer, a two-run shot during a five-run sixth that helped the Red Sox put away the Twins and seal Sale's third victory in as many starts since his return from Tommy John surgery.

"Today was probably the best my mechanics have been start-to-finish. I really felt like I was staying on top of the baseball. I really kind of found it out in the bullpen before the game," Sale said.

Sale (3-0) pitched 5 1-3 innings, striking out eight and allowing two runs on two hits. Willians Astudillo's two-run homer in the fifth accounted for the only runs the Twins managed off Sale.

Astudillo ended up pitching, too, moving over from third base to start the bottom of the eighth and giving the Twins' actual relievers a breather on a hot night with a flight home still to go.

Dalbec's three-run homer in the second off of John Gant (4-8) gave Sale some early cushion and started an offensive outburst for the struggling Red Sox, who outhit the Twins 9-3 and drew eight walks.

In Sale's three starts, Boston has outscored its opponents 34-4.

"The biggest thing I've got going for me right now is offense," Sale said. "That gives myself and the pitching staff a little bit more breathing room to be aggressive. I'm definitely appreciative of that."

The Red Sox hit multiple homers for the fourth straight game, but the highlight of the night was Sale's ninepitch third inning. Sale, whose first immaculate inning came against Baltimore on May 8, 2019. He did it again the following month against Kansas City, then joined Koufax in the third inning Thursday when he struck out Nick Gordon, Andrelton Simmons and Rob Refsnyder on three pitches each. Refsnyder was fooled badly by a slider in the dirt on the final pitch of the inning.

"It was a tough night all the way around. It really was. We faced a guy just coming off an injury and a rehab, but still one of the better pitchers in baseball that you're going to see," Twins manager Rocco Baldelli said.

Koufax completed his immaculate innings for the Los Angeles Dodgers between 1962-64. Sale was the first Red Sox pitcher to do it at Fenway Park since Pedro Martinez on May 18, 2002 against Seattle.

BOBBY D!

Dalbec's first homer reached the second row of seats atop the Green Monster in left field and put Boston up 3-0. His second came on a line drive in the seventh that just cleared the yellow line on top of the 37-foot wall and pushed the lead to 12-2.

Fans chanted "Bobby!" after he rounded the bases and continued the chant until Dalbec climbed back out of the dugout to answer the curtain call.

ALL-PURPOSE

Sale didn't allow a hit until Ryan Jeffers' one-out single in the fifth, which Astudillo followed quickly with his seventh homer of the season. Astudillo belted an 0-1 slider with a drive that bounced off the very top of a billboard standing above the Green Monster.

Astudillo wasn't done for the night, although that was his only hit. Down 12-2 midway through the eighth and with nothing to gain, manager Rocco Baldelli called upon his third baseman to take over on the mound. It took him 20 pitches, most of which floated in around half the speed Sale and Gant were throwing a few hours earlier, but Astudillo finished without allowing a hit or run.

"We didn't get a ton going today offensively. We struggled throw strikes and that's a tough combination," Baldelli said. "If we're going to give free passes to good teams, we're going to end up with a result like we got today. There's not a ton to really say about it."

Twins: IF Jorge Polanco was out of the lineup with soreness in his back. Manager Rocco Baldelli said the Twins planned to give Polanco, who homered for the second straight game Wednesday, a day off this week and Thursday seemed best. "He probably wants to be in the lineup, too, but we were going to pick a day and today's the day," Baldelli said

Red Sox: Placed OF Hunter Renfroe on the bereavement/family medical emergency list Thursday, causing a shuffle in the lineup. Boston recalled Jarren Duran from Triple-A Worcester and started him in center field. Kyle Schwarber, who was supposed to make his first start playing first base since joining the Red Sox last month in a trade with Washington, stayed at DH and J.D. Martinez played left field. Xander Bogaerts, who snapped an 0-for-13 slump with a ninth-inning single Wednesday night, was out of the lineup and replaced by Kiké Hernández.

Standing pat: Pac-12 decides it will not explore expansion

By RALPH D. RUSSO AP College Football Writer The Pac-12 said Thursday it will stand pat with its membership and not look to expand the 12-team conference, making it highly unlikely that the Big 12 schools being left behind by Texas and Oklahoma will find new Power Five homes.

The announcement came two days after the Pac-12, Atlantic Coast Conference and Big Ten pledged to work together on governance issues and scheduling agreements in football and basketball.

The formation of a three-conference alliance came a little less than a month after the Southeastern Conference invited Texas and Oklahoma to join the league in 2025. The move would coincide with the end of the Big 12's current television contract.

With Pac-12 expansion off the board, and both the ACC and Big Ten stating publicly that they are content with their current membership, the eight remaining Big 12 schools appear to have limited options beyond sticking together.

"The decision by Texas and Oklahoma led to significant instability in college athletics and I don't think instability is good for college athletics, particularly given all the other issues that are facing us right now," Pac-12 Commissioner George Kliavkoff told The Associated Press. "I think you heard my colleagues in the ACC and Big Ten agree with that position that we need to bring a stability back

to college athletics."

The past few months have brought a wave of significant events in college sports, from a stinging Supreme Court ruling in an antitrust case to the advent of college athletes as paid sponsors.

Meanwhile, the NCAA is in the process of sweeping reform as it tries to redefine its mission and there is a proposal in the pipeline to expand the College Football Playoff from four to 12 teams.

The SEC's move to add OU and Texas led to widespread speculation that it could trigger a wave of conference realignment across the rest of the Power Five.

Just days after the planned move of Texas and Oklahoma became official, Kliavkoff and Big 12 Commissioner Bob Bowlsby met and discussed whether the the Pac-12 and Big 12 could possibly work together to benefit each conference. Nothing ever came of that, and the Big 12 was left out of the alliance

Between the alliance and the Pac-12's standing pat, the threat of widespread school poaching seems to have subsided — at least until the Big 12decides its next move.

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Texas Tech athletic director Kirby Hocutt, part of a four-person Big 12 expansion subcommittee, said Thursday night that the conference would be diligent in making the right strategic decisions to

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
