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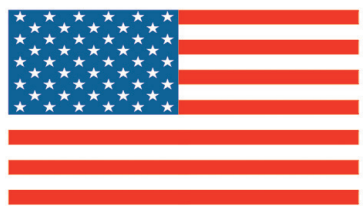

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Coahoma Board of Trustees to discuss routine agenda Tuesday

The Coahoma Board of Trustees will convene for a meeting Tuesday, Sept. 21, in the Elementary Board Room at 6 p.m.

Once the roll call has been taken and a quorum is established, the meeting will be called to order and the opening ceremony will take place.

There will be an opportunity for an open forum before the trustees move to the Consent Agenda. The consent agenda will include minutes of previous meetings, budget amendments and classroom waivers.

Trustees will consider and possibly approve a bid on a passenger school bus.

A nomination for Howard County Appraisal District will be discussed with possible action taken.

Also up for discussion is approval of a resolution to allow Pate Architects to begin preliminary discussion with contractors on adjusted lighting and metal roofing bids.

Once the votes have concluded, the board of trustees will hear the enrollment/ADA/WADA report, financial report and upcoming board meeting dates. Information will also be provided on Senate Bill 15 – local remote learning program.

The Superintendent's Report will include Covid-19 updates, information on the TASA Convention, and EduHero.

The board will retire into executive session to discuss personnel before adjourning for the evening.

A moment in history

The Beginnings of Howard County Junior College

August 15, 1945: WWII is over. The Japanese surrendered, and the Big Spring Bombardier School immediately suspended operations.

No one knew what the future held; however, millions of veterans were about to return to the United States and re-integrate into civilian life. To help this process, Congress passed the G.I. Bill of Rights.

In 1936, Dr. P.W. Malone had presented the idea and concept of higher education in Howard County to the Su-



perintendent of the Big Spring Independent School District, the City Manager, and the Chamber of Commerce. A small committee began investigating the possibilities of a local junior college, but the subject of a local college was tabled for a few years due to the state of the economy and the instability of the nation.

Big Spring was required to have a county-wide tax supported district. State laws required school districts

to maintain an enrollment of 400 high school students and tax valuations over \$12,000,000 to qualify for a junior college. Big Spring met the enrollment criteria but fell short on the tax valuation.

To fulfill the criteria for tax valuations, the group decided to change the proposal to include area communities

Military training jet crashes in Texas, injuring both pilots

LAKE WORTH, Texas (AP) — A military training jet crashed Sunday in a neighborhood near Fort Worth, Texas, injuring the two pilots and damaging three homes but not seriously hurting anyone on the ground, authorities said.

Both pilots managed to eject from the plane before it crashed in Lake Worth, which is just west of Fort Worth, authorities said at a news conference.

"This incident could have been much worse knowing that this plane went down in a residential area," Lake Worth Fire Chief Ryan Arthur said of the crash, which was reported to authorities shortly before 11 a.m.

One of the pilots was electrocuted after being caught in power lines, Lake Worth police said in a statement, adding that "although badly burnt, the pilot was conscious, alert and breathing." Police said the second pilot was found in a wooded area a short distance away. Both were taken to area hospitals.

The chief of naval air training in Corpus Christi said in a Facebook post Sunday evening that the instructor pilot was in stable condition, while the student naval aviator was in serious condition.

Police said that three people in the neighborhood sustained minor injuries, and at least one was taken to the hospital.

The jet was a Navy T-45C Goshawk assigned to Training Air Wing 2 at Naval Air Station Kingsville, about 420 miles (676 kilometers) south of Lake

Worth, the chief of naval air training said in the post. The post says they were conducting a routine training flight that originated from the Corpus Christi International Airport, about 350 miles (563 kilometers) south of Lake Worth along the Gulf Coast.

Three homes were damaged and three residents of those homes were treated at the scene and released, the Fort Worth Fire Department said. The crash cut power to 44 homes in the area, and utility crews were working to restore it.

"We are incredibly fortunate that the plane crashed in the backyards of the homes and not the residences themselves," the Fort Worth department said.

Two off-duty Fort Worth firefighters witnessed the crash and were the first on the scene, where they were able to tend to the injured pilots, the department said.

Arthur said the people who live in the damaged homes will be displaced because of the crash.

The neighborhood is near the Naval Air Station Joint Reserve Base. Officials said multiple representatives from the military were at the crash scene. Attempts to reach the naval air station for comment were not immediately successful Sunday.

"Our hearts go out to these military members and their families," Police Chief J.T. Manoushagian said.

"I would imagine that for a pilot, this is the day that you dread, that you hope never comes," he said.

Mary Joyner, whose mother lives near the crash site, told the Fort Worth Star-Telegram that they were sitting at the kitchen table when they heard a "ba-boom" and the power went out. Stepping into the front yard, she saw a plume of black smoke and smelled a metallic aroma

Joyner said she grew up in the house and her family was accustomed to the daily sound of planes flying overhead.

"You live here all your life, you know it can happen, the planes are right here," Joyner said. "You always have the thought."

within Howard County. However, the county-wide student enrollment was still not enough. The state required 7,000 students and the county had a deficit of approximately 1,500 to 2,000 students.

After careful negotiating, the dream of a Junior College became a reality on November 17, 1945. Community members of Big Spring and Howard County cast their votes to create a new junior college. The vote included a \$200,000 bond to purchase buildings and equipment and a source of tax maintenance with a 20 per \$100 valuation cap. The Junior college bond passed by an overwhelming 87 percent majority.

On March 16, 1946, E.C. Dodd was selected by the board to be president of the college. For months, Mr. Dodd was the president of a college without students, faculty, or buildings.

The college spent \$25,000 remodeling the former bombardier school buildings. Each structure was wooden with concrete foundations and wood floors. In addition to the administration building, library, and classrooms, building was used for living space for married students as well as the boys' and girls' dormitories.

County Junior College Classes started at 8:00 a.m. without any formal fanfare. The 170 students met with Mr. Dodd for the first orientation. Tuition and fees were around \$100.00 per year per student.

Small class sizes were a special benefit that these first students enjoyed. Eighteen courses were offered during the first year. Accounting, Algebra, Bookkeeping, Chemistry, English 1 and 2, History 1 and 2, Home Economics, Physical Education, Physics, Psychology, Beginning and advanced shorthand, Spanish, Speech Trigonometry, and Typing.

In April 1947, the college was admitted to full membership in the Association of Texas Colleges, which gave full validity to the transfer of credits to other colleges in the state. The first graduation class was made up of eight students, James Butts, Bill Clanton, Charles Deats, Bobbie Green, Hartman Hooser, Harvey Hooser, John Rudeseal, and Georgia Wise. Mary Watson Jones was named Dean of Women and Harold Davis was named Dean of Men in 1947. Davis also served as Athletic Director. He started the basketball program in the fall of 1947 and the baseball program in the spring of 1948.

January 1949, the Board purchased one hundred acres of land

as a permanent site for the school. New buildings were erected on Birdwell and 11th Place. The new construction consisted of administration/classroom building, science wing, auditorium, and gymnasium at a cost of \$550,000. Classes at the new campus began on September 12, 1951.

Howard County Junior College has had six presidents: Dr. E.C. Dodd, Dr. W.A. Hunt, Dr. Thomas Salter, Dr. Charles Hays, Dr. Bob Riley, and Dr. Cheryl Sparks. Dr. Sparks was named Sixth HCJCD President in August 1992. She has seen many changes throughout her tenure and has been instrumental in establishing programs, plans for expansion and growth and staying on top of legislative changes. Dr. Sparks is a friend and mentor to her staff and each student that walks through the doors of Howard College.

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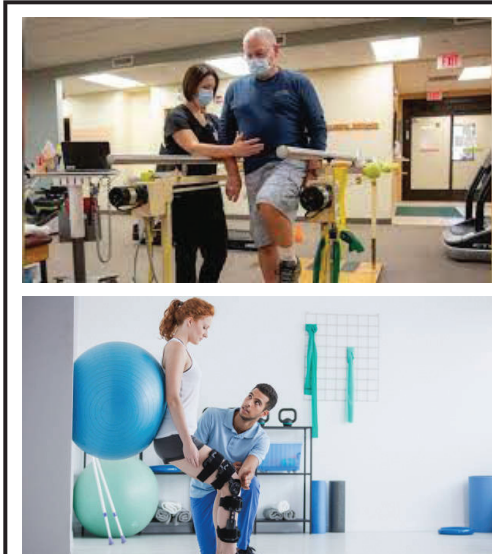
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The Coahoma Bulldogs wait out the storms and take care of business

COAHOMA - It took all of five hours to get it done, but where it was all over, the Coahoma Bulldogs had a happy homecoming and the Colorado City Wolves were still searching for that ever elusive win.

Both teams had to endure a three hour lightning delay and Coahoma turned back an upset minded Colorado City team to come away with a 26-12 win, evening its record to 2-2 for the season while Colorado City falls to 0-4. The Wolves are mired in a 25-game losing streak dating back to Nov. 9, 2018 when they defeated Stanton 48-7.

The game was just two minutes old when the lightning came. Coahoma was moving down the field with a first and 10 from the Colorado City 38-yard line. Three hours later the game resumed at 10:34 p.m.

Coahoma coach Chris Joslin was relieved to get to play. "It was good to get the game in tonight," Joslin said. "Both sides agreed on it and I'm just thankful Colorado City and it gave Coahoma all it wanted. In fact the Wolves did something they hadn't done all season, score two touchdowns in a game. Those scores came in a matter of about three minutes.

Chris Ortiz climaxed a 45-yard C-City scoring drive with a seven-yard run. On Coahoma's next possession Jordan Garza picked off Bailey's pass and the Wolves were in business again. It took the

Wolves five plays to go 38 yards. Aedan Briseno scored from four yards out and all of a sudden, Colorado City led a stunned Bulldogs team 12-7 early in the second period.

Into his Coahoma team. He promptly took the ensuing kickoff back 75 yards for a score. Once he made it to the sideline, he made one cut and raced



untouched to the end zone. Coahoma went into halftime leading 13-12.

Emerson wasn't through with his heroics however. He helped ice the game late in the fourth period by catching a 28-yard scoring pass from Bailey. In between those plays, Coahoma got a 51-yard scoring run by Isaiah Eleda.

"We were ready to go at the start of the game. We had our best pre-game warmup this year," Joslin said. "But then what can you say about a three

hour delay.? We corrected some things at halftime and came back in the second half and played a lot better. My hat goes off to the kids."

Coahoma will be on the road Friday when they travel to Merkel to play the Badgers at 7 p.m.

Zuerlein makes 56-yarder on last play, Cowboys beat Chargers

INGLEWOOD, Calif. — Through his rehab from a broken ankle last season, Dak Prescott thought about what it would feel like to be on the field again and lead the Dallas Cowboys on a game-winning drive.

Prescott directed the Cowboys on an 11-play, 49-yard march against the Los Angeles Chargers, culminating in Greg Zuerlein's 56-yard field goal as time expired for a 20-17 victory on Sunday.

"You see, that's what you do it for, for the ball in your hands for a chance to go win," said Prescott, who completed 23 of 27 passes for 237 yards and an interception. "I was talking to the offense in the huddle that now we've got the game in a position that we wanted. We were able to capitalize, get into field goal range and let special teams go out there and do their job."

Dallas (1-1) overcame the loss of five players who started its opener and ruined the Chargers' first game in front of home fans at SoFi Stadium.

"You see the best of Dak Prescott in those situations, and he knows those situations, puts a lot of time into it. I just really love his demeanor, his poise in two-minute drills, so it's good to get these ones on Sunday," Dallas coach Mike McCarthy said.

Prescott got Dallas into Chargers

territory with a 12-yard completion to Amari Cooper to the LA 45 with 36 seconds remaining. Three plays later, Zuerlein booted it through for his 11th game-winning kick and third with the Cowboys.

Zuerlein made all three of his attempts Sunday after missing two fields and an extra point last week.

"You see why we have confidence in him. This guy, he kicks field goals that put teams in the Super Bowl-caliber champion-type kicker," McCarthy said. "He had two big ones today, and he hit the money one right at the end."

The Cowboys had a little more balance offensively after dropping back to pass 59 times in 77 plays last week. Tony Pollard had 109 yards on 13 carries for the third 100-yard game of his career and Ezekiel Elliott had 16 carries for 73 yards.

The Chargers (1-1) got their 10th 300-yard game from Justin Herbert, but turnovers and penalties ended up looming large. Los Angeles was flagged 12 times for 99 yards and had a pair of touchdowns taken away.

"There were 20 (total) penalties in the game. It felt like a preseason game, to be quite honest with you. That was just the way the game was being officiated today, and we've got to play within the parameters of how the game is being called," Chargers first-year coach Brandon Staley said

after the team fell to 8-17 in one-score games since the start of the 2019 season. "I felt like last week we won the game as a team, and today I thought we lost the game as a team."

Herbert's 37-yard TD pass to a wide-open Donald Parham was nullified when Jared Cook was called for holding. Three plays later, Herbert was intercepted in the end zone by Damarious Kazee on third-and-6 from the Dallas 9 after Keenan Allen appeared to slip on his route.

In the fourth quarter, a motion penalty took away a 2-yard score for Cook. The Chargers had to settle for Vizcaino's third field goal to even it at 17.

"Fundamentally we just had some calls and some penalties that got brought back, and some turnovers, and I can't turn the ball over in the red zone like that and expect to win," said Herbert, who was 31 of 41 for 338 yards with a touchdown and two interceptions. "That's a pretty good offense we're going up against, so we've got to put up more points."

Dallas jumped out to a 14-3 lead early in the second quarter on touchdowns by Pollard and Elliott.

The Chargers closed to within a field goal on Mike Williams' 12-yard TD on a wide receiver screen after he had a 27-yard reception to get them into the red zone. Los Angeles then made the 2-point conversion on Austin Ekeler's run up the middle.

Vizcaino tied it at 14 with a 32-yard field goal midway through the third quarter.

A HALFTIME FIRST
It took just over 100 seasons, but this marked the first 14-11 halftime score in NFL history.

CBS posted a graphic about the oddity before the end of the first half. It was confirmed by Sportradar.

Vizcaino had a chance to tie it late in the first half, but his 44-yard attempt hit the left upright with 3 seconds remaining. Dallas got the ball at its 49-yard line, and Prescott hit CeeDee Lamb, who found an opening and went up the right sideline. He lateraled at the 17 to Elliott, who was forced out of bounds by Derwin James at the 3.

Late turnovers send Chiefs to 1st September loss in 5 years

BALTIMORE — Patrick Mahomes' flawless September run is over.

The Kansas City quarterback was intercepted late in the third quarter, one of two turnovers by the Chiefs that led to a 36-35 loss to Baltimore on Sunday night. It was Kansas City's first September defeat since Sept. 18, 2016. The Chiefs had won 15 in a row in the month since then.

"Turnovers will kill you in this league, and we had two of them down the stretch, crucial time," coach Andy Reid said. "So we've got to do better."

Mahomes was 11-0 as a starter in September with 35 touchdown passes and no interceptions. He threw for three more TDs on Sunday, and Kansas City seemed to be rolling along after Tyrann Mathieu picked off Lamar Jackson twice in the first quarter and left

the Ravens playing catch-up.

The Chiefs eventually returned the favor with those two giveaways of their own.

Ahead 35-24 but facing third-and-long near midfield, Mahomes tried to throw a pass while being pulled down. It was picked off by Tavon Young, and the Ravens drove 56 yards for a touchdown to make it 35-30.

After a Kansas City punt, Baltimore scored again to take the lead — but the Chiefs were still in good shape when they drove into field goal range as the clock wound down. On second-and-3 from the Baltimore 32, Clyde Edwards-Helaire fumbled the ball away. Kansas City never got it back.

Odafe Oweh, the rookie who forced and recovered the fumble, was drafted by the Ravens in the first round — with a pick they acquired when they traded offensive lineman Orlando Brown to the Chiefs.

This deal occurred more than 70 years ago at a New York tournament. The form of scoring was total points, in which the primary goal is to make or defeat the contract, just as in rubber bridge.

West led the heart king against three notrump, and East, Morrie Elis, was immediately faced with a crucial decision. South's two-notrump bid promised a heart stopper, which could only be Q-10-x, so West's king

had to be a singleton. Since Elis had only one side entry, there would be no way to establish and then run the heart suit.

So Elis decided to look elsewhere for a way to defeat the contract, and concluded that the best chance was to play West for the K-10 and length in diamonds. He therefore overtook the king of hearts with the ace, even though this established a second heart trick for the declarer, and shifted to the three of diamonds.

South put up the queen, and when West produced the king, it was allowed to hold the trick. West then continued with the diamond ten to dummy's ace, on which Elis carefully unblocked the jack.

After this stellar defense, declarer was helpless. He had only eight tricks — five clubs, a diamond and two hearts with the aid of a finesse. If he tried to establish a ninth trick in spades, the defense would grab the ace and run the diamonds for down three. So he did the best he could by cashing his winners to finish down one.

Elis' apparent generosity at trick one was well-judged. He placed his partner with a holding that would allow defeat of the contract and proceeded accordingly. The outcome was well worth the extra heart trick he gave away in the process.

In 1881, Chester A. Arthur was sworn in as the 21st president of the United States, succeeding the assassinated James A. Garfield.

In 1946, the first Cannes Film Festival, lasting 16 days, opened in France.

In 1962, James Meredith, a Black student, was blocked from enrolling at the University of Mississippi by Democratic Gov. Ross R. Barnett. (Meredith was later admitted.)

In 1967, the Cunard liner RMS Queen Elizabeth 2 was christened by Britain's Queen Elizabeth II in Clydebank, Scotland.

In 1973, in their so-called "battle of the sexes," tennis star Billie Jean King defeated Bobby Riggs in straight sets, 6-4, 6-3, 6-3, at the Houston Astrodome.

In 1976, Playboy magazine released an interview in which Democratic presidential nominee Jimmy Carter admitted he'd "looked on a lot of women with lust."

In 1984, a suicide car bomber attacked the U.S. Embassy annex in north Beirut, killing at least 14 people, including two Americans and 12 Lebanese. The family sitcoms "The Cosby Show" and "Who's the Boss?" premiered on NBC and ABC, respectively.

In 1995, in a move that stunned Wall Street, AT&T Corporation announced it was splitting into three companies.

In 2000, Independent Counsel Robert Ray announced the end of the Whitewater investigation, saying there was insufficient evidence to warrant charges against President and Mrs. Clinton.

In 2004, CBS News apologized for a "mistake in judgment" in its story questioning President George W. Bush's National Guard service, saying it could not vouch for the authenticity of documents featured in the report.

In 2017, Hurricane Maria, the strongest hurricane to hit Puerto Rico in more than 80 years,

struck the island, wiping out as much as 75 percent of the power distribution lines and causing an island-wide blackout.

Ten years ago: Repeal of the U.S. military's 18-year-old "don't ask, don't tell" compromise took effect, allowing gay and lesbian service members to serve openly. A suicide bomber posing as a Taliban peace envoy assassinated former Afghan President Burhanuddin Rabbani (boor-HAHN'-uh-deen ruh-BAH'-nee).

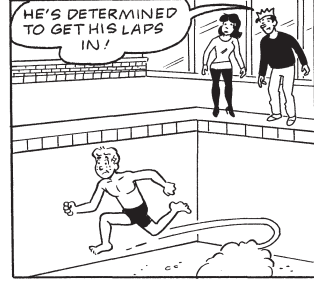
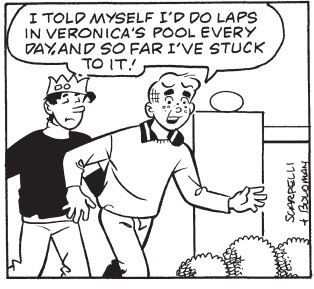
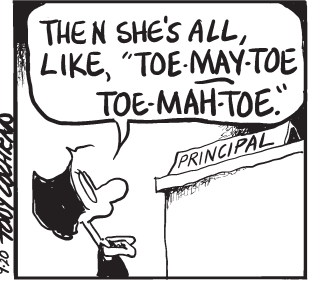
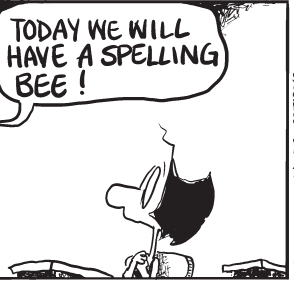
Five years ago: In their final speeches at the annual gathering of world leaders, U.N. Secretary-General Ban Ki-moon railed against leaders who kept "feeding the war machine" in Syria, while U.S. President Barack Obama said there was no military solution to the five-year conflict. A Black police officer fatally shot Keith Lamont Scott, a Black man, at a Charlotte, North Carolina, apartment complex, prompting days of civil unrest. (Charlotte-Mecklenburg police later said that the shooting was justified.)

One year ago: Democratic presidential candidate Joe Biden said the Republican effort to approve a replacement for the late Justice Ruth Bader Ginsburg before the November election was an "abuse of power"; he said voters should pick the president who would pick the justice. (Amy Coney Barrett would be confirmed days before the election.) "Schitt's Creek," a Canadian show about a fish-out-of-water family, made history at the Emmy Awards by sweeping the comedy categories; the virtual awards ceremony included remote links to 100-plus nominees. Byron DeChambeau closed with a 3-under-par 67 for a six-shot victory over Matthew Wolff in the U.S. Open at Winged Foot in Mamaroneck, New York, on a course so tough that no one else broke par. Tour de France rookie Tadej Pogacar won cycling's showpiece race on the eve of his 22nd birthday.

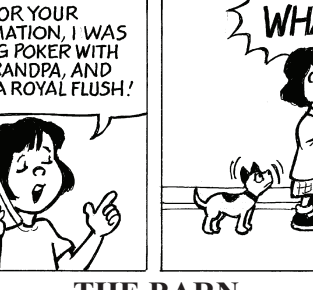
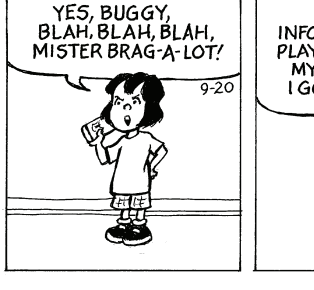
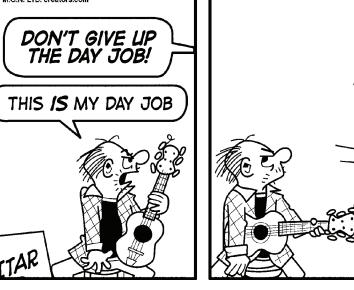
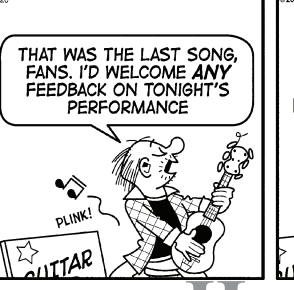
