Let's talk cotton - 2021 Crop **Tour and Cotton Boll Scramble**

Howard County has a big history with cotton. The "king" crop has long been one of the region's economic pillars, and understanding the cotton plant and the way it grows has a huge impact on farmers' bottom lines.

Sept. 30, the Texas A&M AgriLife Extension is offering local farmers a chance to participate in the collection of data it uses to help agricultural science understand factors related to how cotton grows...and then play a little golf.

The event is the Crop Tour and Cotton Boll Golf Scramble, and it kicks off at 7:30 a.m. Sept. 30 with registration at the G.C. Broughton Jr. Ag Complex, 2411 Echols Dr. in Big Spring.

"Two of the stops on that tour are

going to be variety trials," said Ag Extension Agent Tommy Yeater. "We're looking at 12 or 13 different varieties of cotton. It's different companies. Some of them may be a little earlier maturing than other varieties, some of them may grade a little better but yield drops off. So with my work with them, we, number one, see how they grow, see how they perform, then I work and harvest them. I take a sample and I take it to Lubbock in December. I take it to an independent lab and they crunch the numbers. So it's not just a seed company telling you how good their seed is. We have compared all these different companies' seed, and at the end of the day, what's it going to do?"

The variety trials usually test the newer varieties each year, Yeater said.

will also include a seeding rate trial.

"That is planting different amounts of seed to the acre," he said. "That doesn't sound like much, but when a bag of seed costs \$500 and that's good for three acres versus five acres, and you're planting 4,000 acres, it can have a really important impact. What we're doing is looking at the benefit of seeding rates in accordance to managing your cotton. When it's a wet year going into it and you know you're going to have a lot of plants germinate, maybe you need to back off. Instead of putting a plant every six inches, just put them every 10 inches. Because we're pretty confident they're going to come up and be effective."

Yeater said the study will look at the effectiveness of planting cotton plants

6, 8, 10 and 12 inches apart, given this year's conditions.

"This year is going to be a really good test because this has been a really good year," he said. "It's been really good rains, and we could use another one right now. Actually, 10 days ago. But regardless, it's going to be good."

Yeater said this season, it looks like a 10-inch planting scheme looks like the best bet.

"We're showing that 10 inches is what we want," he said. "It just depends on the year and the conditions."

Yeater said program also includes studies of harvest aids, herbicides used to protect yield by controlling weeds that interfere with harvest operations and by diverting water and nutrients intended for the cotton plants.

"Any farmer out there...any cotton farmer...would benefit by coming to this educational program and listening to these demonstrations," Yeater said. "Especially the seeding rate and the harvest aid."

Farms assisting with the Crop Tour studies locally include Blagraves Farms, Moates Farms, and Iden Farms, all located in the north part of Howard County.

Following the tour, which will start with registration at 7:30 a.m. and run through noon, participants will be treated to a hamburger lunch at Big Spring Gin, followed by the Cotton Boll Golf Scramble at Comanche Trail Golf Course, sponsored by Expedition Royalty Company.

No charge for the lectures.

Sánchez homers, Yanks beat Rangers 4-3 to gain in wild card

NEW YORK — Maligned for poor defense and a bat that failed to fulfill promise for long stretches, Gary Sánchez impresses the Yankees with resilience.

With New York reeling after consecutive blowouts, Sánchez sparked a revival with an early go-ahead home run. Chad Green and Aroldis Chapman headlined four relievers who combined for 4 2/3 scoreless innings in a 4-3 victory over the Texas Rangers on Monday night that boosted the Yankees within a half-game of Toronto for the second AL wild card.

job of blocking things out and moving on even when he does make a mistake."

With a harvest moon rising above Yankee Stadium, New York built a 4-0 lead before the Rangers closed in a three-run fifth against Nestor Cortes.

Green (8-7) retired five straight batters and Chapman three in a row for his 28th save in 32 chances — both pitching on four days' rest. Between them, Clay Holmes and Joely Rodríguez combined for the seventh and eighth.

After losing two of three to Cleveland (73-76), the Yankees (84-67) gained on Toronto and wild-card leader Boston (86-65) with 11 games left.

Sánchez put the Yankees ahead in the second against rookie A.J. Alexy (2-1) with his 22nd home run, and run-scoring singles by Aaron Judge and Gleyber Torres around Giancarlo Stanton's sacrifice fly built a 4-0 lead in the third.

Sloppy play behind the plate by Sánchez contributed to three defeats during New York's fall from a playoff position: He failed to tag a runner against the Mets despite catching the throw in plenty of time, allowed a pair of ninth-inning wild pitches at Baltimore and missed a foul popup in a seven-run inning by Cleveland.

"The first thing you learn," Sánchez said through translator Marlon Abreu, "nobody is going to be perfect playing this game. Even if you look at Gold Glovers, they're going to make some mistakes throughout the year. It's a tough sport, a long year. ... The main focus is the next pitch. The next pitch is the most important one. You have to have that mindset."

Sánchez had 20 homers and 42 RBIs as a rookie in 2016, hit 33 homers with 90 RBIs the following year but has endured long slumps. He is hitting .211 with 52 RBIs this season, displaced by Kyle Higashioka as the catcher for ace Gerrit Cole.

"A guy that I feel has gotten beaten down and kind of abused over the years. It doesn't matter what it is," Judge said. "You see a lot of guys around the league and a lot of guys around the game that kind of get stuck in their ways and it's my way or the highway or this is just how I do it. But Gary is a guy that's always willing to listen, always willing to learn and continue to improve on his craft."

Yankees manager Aaron Boone expressed support for Sánchez before the game.

"Sometimes because Gary is the lightning rod that he seems to be sometimes, a play or two really torpedoes some of that or changes that narrative, and that's not necessarily fair," Boone said.

"I've just gained a lot of respect for the man," Boone added after the final out. "Even though he's had a tough week leading up to this, he does a good "If we play well, the results will take care of themselves," Boone said.

Charlie Culberson led off the fifth with a home run for Texas. Leody Taveras and Isiah Kiner-Falefa hit consecutive doubles, Green threw a wild pitch that Sánchez hardly moved for, and rookie standout Adolis García hit a sacrifice fly.

Cortes escaped second-and-third, no-outs trouble in the first with three straight strikeouts and allowed three runs and five hits in 4 1/3 innings with seven strikeouts.

Texas dropped to 55-95, on track for its first 100-loss season since 1973. Taveras airmailed a throw home from center field in the third, advancing the runners and leading to a run.

"Those are little things that we shot ourself in the foot," manager Chris Woodward said. "We should have won that game. I hope everybody in that clubhouse realizes that."

Alexy, making his third big league start, allowed four runs, four hits and six walks in 3 1/3 innings. He's walked 15 in 18 innings.

"You can't stay in this league if you're going to walk guys like that," Woodward said.

king, cashes the ace and continues with the jack at trick three.

The bidding and East's first three plays combine to make it a virtual certainty that West is out of hearts at this point, and the question is whether or not to ruff with the ten. To defuse the immediate threat, South could trump with the king, but the trouble with this is that it might promote the missing jack into a trick.

In the actual deal, if declarer trumps with either the ten or king, he will go down one. Both plays establish a trump winner for West, and when South later tries a club finesse, East's queen scores the setting trick. If ruffing high or low were declarer's only options, he could not succeed as the cards lie. But there is a third option that makes declarer a very strong favorite to finish with ten tricks. His best play is to discard a club at trick three instead of attempting to win the trick. By doing so, declarer telescopes both of his potential losers into one trick, leaving him in the driver's seat. Regardless of what East plays next, declarer is home free. Another heart lead by East can be overruffed by dummy if West ruffs, after which South has the rest of the tricks.


