Howard College board formally inducts Beck

The Howard County Junior College District Board of Trustees officially welcomed Dr. Marisha Beck as a board member when it met Monday.

As her husband and children looked on in Howard College's Student Union Building Fireplace Room, Dr. Beck took the oath of office, administered by Julie Bailey, assistant to the Howard College president.

"It was a great experience. I was excited that my family could come and be here with me," Dr. Beck said. "Sitting in my first board meeting was really interesting. I'm excited to really dive in and start to learn. Today was just kind of a surface meeting for me because I

Commissioners nominate Emerson for Appraisal board

During a regular meeting Tuesday afternoon, Howard County Commissioners re-appointed Scott Emerson as the county's nominee to serve on the Howard County Appraisal District's board of directors. After approving Emerson as the county's nominee, Commissioner Jimmie Long (Precinct 3) moved to donate the rest of the county's votes to the Forsan ISD to help allow that entity to successfully nominate a representative to the board.

The commissioners unanimously approved both motions. Commissioners also unanimously approved a petition from the Howard County Water District, a group which has been responsible for overseeing purchase of water from Big

Spring by Coahoma, and the pipeline carrying that water.

The group is seeking to disband to save the entities involved money, allowing them to carry out the ongoing transaction themselves rather than employing the Water District as a

middleman. Commissioners also approved the court's meeting dates

and Howard County's holiday schedule for 2021-22. County Treasurer Sharon Adams asked the court whether or not it wanted to extend the current Families First Coronavirus Response Act (FFCRA)/COVID-19 paid leave for county employees who contract the disease. While the leave had first been mandatory, the county had decided to extend the program locally through the end of the fiscal year. Commissioners voted to extend the leave program through Dec. 27.

Sparks listed several events that will be taking place Thursday to commemorate the anniversary.

"As far as the events, we will begin that morning in San Angelo at 10 o'clock with a ribbon cutting to dedicate the new Builders of San Angelo Workshop and honor (retired San Angelo Workforce and Community Development Officer) Jamie Rainey, and honor the memory of (the first Program Director/faculty member for Howard—San Angelo's Construction Trades program, who passed away in January) Nelson Davis. That will be a celebration of the 42 years of our 75 years that we have been working with our San Angelo community. At 1:30, we will be in Lamesa, and we will honor the memory of (longtime Lamesa ISD educator) Dr. Wayne Smith, and that's 49 of our 75 years. SWCD at 3:30, and we'll unveil our new signage with our new name and honor the McGary Regan Foundation for their donations as well as the (former SWCD Dean of Students who passed away in October of 2020) Dom Bonura Memorial Scholarship.

We'll be recognizing SWCD for 40 of our 75 years. Then we'll come to the Big Spring campus and honor the Big Spring Area Community Foundation and celebrate the memory of (former BSACF Director who passed away in July) Greg Henry and the Greg Henry New Horizons Scholarship. Lastly, we'll have a gala for some invited guests. Mainly these are people who have been very big supporters of the college since its inception and through the recent years as well. That will be that evening, and it will be livestreamed so that anyone can watch. The festivities will be at 6:15."

In other business, Dr. Sparks announced officials at the GEO prisons have submitted notice that they will end its memorandum of understanding with Howard College, ending Howard's service at GEO prisons Oct.

"We have been working with our

faculty and working with the FCI relative to some opportunities," Sparks said. "Hopefully we are going to be able to transition some of those individuals to the FCI, and also, as far as on campus as possible. We have several of those individuals who have chosen to retire, so we're working on all of that."

The trustees approved a resolution honoring Dr. Wayne Smith.

The board heard reports on performance measures and outcomes, including Dr. Sparks' announcement that while enrollment for 2021's Fall semester is up about 5 percent, contact hours are down about 3.64 percent overall, indicating that, while more students are enrolling, they are taking fewer classes.

Howard College's Director of Information and Marketing Cindy Smith reported on the college's Quality Enhancement Plan, announcing that

Prescott, Cowboys beat Eagles in 1st home game since injury

ARLINGTON, Texas (AP) — Dak Prescott ran toward the tunnel, raising his arms to the fans and tossing them souvenirs after the Dallas Cowboys manhandled the Philadelphia Eagles in prime time.

The scene was a stark contrast to almost a year earlier, when the star quarterback was in tears as he rode on a cart through the same spot after the gruesome ankle injury that ended his season.

Prescott threw for three touchdowns in his first home game since the injury, Trevon Diggs returned an interception 59 yards for a score and the Cowboys beat the Eagles 41-21 on Monday night.

"Just thankful for everything that I've been through, all of the hard work that made me account for just to be back out here doing what I love," Prescott said. "It's the greatest place to play football."

Ezekiel Elliott ran for a season-high 95 yards and two touchdowns, and tight end Dalton Schultz had the first two-TD game of his career.

Except for a fumble in the end zone that gave the Eagles (1-2) their first touchdown, Prescott was efficient, going 21 of 26 for 238 yards without an interception in the first NFC East game for both teams.

Prescott's first game at AT&T Stadium since the season-ending compound fracture and dislocation of his right ankle in Week 5 last year against the New York Giants was also the return to full capacity after the pandemic-imposed limits last season. There were 93,267 fans inside with the retractable roof open at the \$1.2 billion facility.

"A guy like Dak, he's going to be psyched regardless," Elliott said. "There's not any extra he can get besides just the competitor he is, the player he is." The Cowboys (2-1) had a 19-1 edge in first downs late in the first half, but the Eagles were down just 20-7 at the break. After Javon Hargrave forced Prescott's fumble and caught the ball for the score, the Eagles stuffed the QB on a fourth-down sneak at the other end.

Diggs stepped in front of a pass from Hurts to the sideline on the third play of the second half and ran untouched for his first career TD while becoming the first Dallas player with a pick in each of the first three games since Everson Walls in 1985.

Diggs and Cincinnati's Logan Wilson share the NFL lead with three interceptions.

Hurts had completions of 41 yards to Quez Watkins, 38 yards to tight end Dallas Goedert and 27 yards to tight end Zach Ertz while finishing 25 of 39 for 326 yards with two TDs and two interceptions. Plenty of the Texas native's passing yards, and the second TD, came with the game out of reach.

"I didn't do a good enough job of leading," Hurts said. "I didn't do a good enough of running our offense, doing the things I need to do. This one's on me."

Prescott's 19-yard touchdown pass to Schultz put the Cowboys ahead for good at 14-7 late in the first quarter, and a 2-yarder to Cedrick Wilson on fourth down essentially put the game away at 34-14 early in the fourth.

Any doubt was erased when rookies Micah Parsons and Osa Odighizuwa shared a sack of Hurts on a desperation try on fourth-and-9 midway through the fourth quarter. Odighizuwa had his first career sack in the first half, dropping Hurts for an 11-yard loss.

Schultz, who led Dallas with 80 yards receiving, scored again on a 22-yarder in the fourth quarter.

Tony Pollard added 60 yards rushing on 11 car-

ries as the Cowboys finished with 160 yards on the ground against the NFL's No. 2 run defense.

"They had a good game plan to run the ball, we were second and 4, second and 3," Eagles defensive tackle Fletcher Cox said. "One thing we're known for is stopping the run. We couldn't get off the field."

HALL OF FAME RINGS

Jimmy Johnson, who coached the Cowboys to a pair of Super Bowl titles in the 1990s, made a rare appearance on their home field when he was presented his Pro Football Hall of Fame ring at half-time along with safety Cliff Harris and receiver Drew Pearson. All three were inducted this summer.

Johnson started his speech by thanking owner Jerry Jones and ended it with the famous line he first shouted after an NFC championship game win over San Francisco during the 1992 season: "How 'bout them Cowboys!" Johnson and Jones split acrimoniously after another Super Bowl title to finish the 1993 season. The two hugged before Jones put the ring on Johnson.

INJURIES

Eagles: LG Isaac Seumalo was taken off on a cart after injuring his right foot in the fourth quarter. The Eagles were already without LT Jordan Mailata (knee) and RG Brandon Brooks (chest strain). S K'Von Wallace injured his left shoulder in the first quarter trying to tackle Elliott and didn't return.

At NBA media days, COVID and vaccines remain dominant topics

Utah center Rudy Gobert revealed that after much deliberation, he decided to become vaccinated. San Antonio coach Gregg Popovich has gotten his booster shot already. Boston coach Ime Udoka had his shots and tested positive for COVID-19 anyway.

And Brooklyn guard Kyrie Irving is

And Brooklyn guard Kyrie Irving is keeping everyone guessing.

The NBA season arrived Monday with media days in advance of training camp, with the ongoing pandemic as much if not even more of a topic than basketball. This will be the third season affected at least in part by the pandemic, almost certainly not the last, and some teams revealed that their rosters are 100% vaccinated entering the season.

"When I felt like it was the right time, I did it," said Gobert — the first NBA player who was known to test positive for COVID-19, back on March 11, 2020.

Same goes for Giannis Antetokounmpo of the NBA champion Milwaukee Bucks, who still isn't totally sure if the vaccine will present issues down the road.

But much like sentiments expressed by Portland's Damian Lillard and Memphis' Ja Morant, Antetokounmpo — a father of two — said his family played a major role in his decision to get vaccinated.

"I did what was best for me and my family's safety. ... You do whatever it takes for you and your family to be OK," Antetokounmpo said. The Spurs have a fully vaccinated

roster, Popovich said. The New York Knicks and Los Angeles Lakers said last week that they would have the same, and some other clubs — including Utah, Portland, Houston and Charlotte — said they were at the 100% mark.

Other teams are close to being fully vaccinated.

Miami will be by the start of the season, a person with knowledge of the situation told The Associated Press, speaking on condition of anonymity Monday because the Heat vaccine rate has not publicly revealed by the team.

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Toronto general manager Bobby Webster said the Raptors are "one dose" away from being there, as did Atlanta GM Travis Schlenk.

Leaguewide, the rate is believed to be around 90% and climbing.

"There is still a lot of stuff going on out there," Popovich said. "You see all the bumps in cases here and there. You see all the areas where people are not vaccinated. It's a double-edged sword. I think we are in good shape right now. We're trying to do everything we can to make sure we can be safe, which means we've got to be disciplined day to day to day to day."

Players who are vaccinated will not be tested often; unvaccinated players will be tested on all practice days and travel days, and at least once on game days.

The list of unvaccinated players includes Washington's Bradley Beal — who missed out on the chance to play for an Olympic gold medal with USA Basketball this summer after testing positive.

Beal said he remains unvaccinated for "personal reasons," and has questions about why someone can still contract the virus even after being vaccinated.

"Would I love to sit here and tell you that we're 100% vaccinated? I'd be thrilled about that," Denver coach Michael Malone said. "The fact is that we're not, and that's all I'll say on that matter regarding who is and who's not. It's a delicate balance. It is not my place to tell somebody that they have to be vaccinated."

Irving is among the individuals at the center of that debate in the NBA right now.

By local rule in New York, to play for the Nets at home this season Irving would have to be vaccinated or receive an exemption — something that Golden State's Andrew Wiggins sought from the NBA unsuccessfully last week because San Francisco has similar rules.

"I'm just going to keep fighting for what I believe," Wiggins said Monday. Irving wasn't at media day in Brook-

lyn on Monday, instead appearing remotely and refusing to say if he plans

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to play in home games.

"Please respect my privacy," Irving said.

Added Nets forward Kevin Durant, at media day: "That's on Kyrie. That's his personal decision."

Irving is keeping his status and reasoning private. Orlando's Jonathan Isaac is not.

Isaac, whose mother works in health

care, has had COVID-19 already. He is not vaccinated, but insisted he is not anti-vaccine, anti-medicine, or anti-science, either.

"I thank God, I'm grateful, that I live in a society where vaccines are nos-

in a society where vaccines are possible and we can protect ourselves and have the means to protect ourselves in the first place," Isaac said. "That being said, it is my belief that the vaccine status of every person should be their own choice. ... I'm not ashamed to say that I'm uncomfortable with taking the vaccine at this time."

Media day tends to have some loose

Media day tends to have some loose moments, and Durant was at the forefront of one of those when he was asked why people call him "KD." The reporter — "Dave from Basketball Digest" — was none other than David Letterman, who got laughs from media that were present even though Durant didn't outwardly show any happiness with the line of questioning.

Popovich joined San Antonio reporters to ask the hard-hitting ques-

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tion of why shooting matters in basketball, and in Miami, Jimmy Butler crashed Kyle Lowry's first Heat availability in an effort to get him to endorse his coffee brand.

"He's going to pay me very handsomely," Lowry said.

There were also reminders that the pandemic isn't over.

Udoka, entering his first season as Celtics' coach, is wrapping up a 10-day quarantine after testing positive and plans to be at the team's first practice Tuesday. Phoenix's Devin Booker wasn't at Suns media day, already in the league's health and safety protocols — indicating some sort of testing or contact tracing issue.

testing or contact-tracing issue.

But camps are opening. A regular 82-game season is planned. Fans will be back in buildings. Popovich, the NBA's longest-tenured current coach who said he qualified for his booster shot already because he's in his 90s—he's really only 72—may have summed up the order of things in the NBA now perfectly with this assessment: "Normalcy, with a good dose of

caution."

"I think getting vaccinated is your choice," Indiana guard Malcolm Brogdon said. "I think it's absolutely your choice. But at the same time, we're trying to protect the entire NBA. Not just our team, but the entire NBA.

Neal, Anae out for Dallas against Eagles because of COVID-19

ARLINGTON, Texas (AP) — The Dallas Cowboys are missing players because of COVID-19 protocols for the third consecutive game to start the season, with linebacker Keanu Neal and defensive end Bradlee Anae sidelined for the home opener against Philadelphia on Monday night.

Neal and Anae aren't among the inactive players for the Cowboys because they're on the COVID-19 reserve list. Defensive tackle Justin Hamilton and tight end Jeremy Sprinkle were brought up from the practice squad as COVID-19 replacements.

Dallas was without four-time All-Pro right guard Zack Martin for the 31-29 loss to Tampa Bay in the opener. Defensive end Randy Gregory sat last week's 20-17 victory over the Los Angeles Chargers. Martin debuted against L.A., and Gregory is back this week.





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

The failure to utilize the allimportant number 13 during the play of a hand is often responsible for the failure to make contracts that should be made.

Consider this deal where South reaches four hearts on the bidding shown and West leads a diamond. East cashes three diamond tricks, West discarding a spade, and then

shifts to a trump. At this point, declarer's only problem is to avoid losing a trick to the against either opponent, South should focus all his attention on determining which opponent is more likely to hold that card.

After taking East's trump return, declarer draws three more rounds of trump, learning in the process that East began with four trumps and West with one. At this stage, South might decide to finesse against East for the club queen on the basis that East opened the bidding. As can be seen, this would bring the play to an unhappy conclusion — at least from South's viewpoint.

However, he should recognize that there is a chance to learn more about the unseen hands before the club suit is broached. Since East is already known to have started with five diamonds and four hearts, declarer's next step should be to learn how many spades East was dealt.

Accordingly, he cashes the A-K of spades and ruffs a spade with his last trump at trick 10. In the process, South discovers that East started with at least three spades, leaving him room for no more than one club.

The rest is easy. Declarer cashes the club king to guard against East's holding the singleton queen, then leads a club to the jack. All guesswork is eliminated simply by count-




