# EDC recognizes McDonald with resolution, welcomes Williams

At a special meeting Thursday, the Big Spring Economic Development Corporation board of directors approved a resolution recognizing Bobby McDonald for his service to the board.

The special meeting was called as a make-up session for the meeting originally scheduled Oct. 19, because a quorum was not present for that meeting. "Bobby McDonald and his lovely

wife, Gloria, have served this community...gosh, for decades. For years," said EDC Board President Raul Benavidez. "They've always been involved in some form or another. I know Bobby sat on the City Council for District 4 two separate times. Gloria, also now, two separate times. So, effectively, a

combined 12 years that they have dedicated to the city. Both of them have been members of the Ports to Plains Committee for years, maybe since its inception. So they have played a vital role on the Ports to Plains input, coming through on Highway 87 here. Their involvement in this community is priceless. If you have sat in a meeting with Bobby McDonald, he always gives you history about some street, some house, some neighborhood. They're just really knowledgeable. Those two individuals are just the salt of the earth, as far as I'm concerned."

During the meeting, Benavidez read the resolution regarding Mr. McDonald, noting that McDonald served with distinction on the EDC board from October 2015 to September 2021, and officially recognized, commended, and

The resolution passed unanimously. Following the invocation and pledge at the start of the meeting, the board approved the minutes of the Sept. 21 meet-

ing, and EDC Director Mark Willis pre-

sented his financial report. "Financials are looking good," he said. "Sales tax is up last month 33 percent. Fluctuation over the long term - I always look at the three-month average - we're more along the lines of low 20 percent. Having said that, we still have considerable reserves set back that we need to keep in order to service our debt, in case we're still in iffy times. So

I think keeping the reserve that we've

Willis spoke about potential sale of 40 acres of land in Howard

"The city and the EDC have the right to market that 40 acres at the appraised value which we paid to have done. It's \$13,500 an acre," Willis said. "My thought is, when time comes, we need to buy that 40 acres. We're going to need to invest in having a Stage 1 environmental done. We're going to need to do some clearing out there, make it pretty, make it ready to go. Have the ground tested for how much weight it can handle, how big the slab has to be, etc."

Willis noted that the cost to purchase the land would be about \$500,000, plus approximately \$200,000 to make the land shovelready. He added that having the EDC purchase the land rather than the city would be a good move.

"The city cannot dispose of an asset without putting it out for bids," he said. "Whereas, we could give the land as an incentive for the right prospect, or give it a discounted price. So it needs to be owned by the EDC. My challenge is to make the mayor and everybody understand that we work for the city too. We're just a different arm of the city. Because of the 4-A situation, we have the ability to do things the city can't do on its own. That's why we have these corporations."

During Willis' financial report, Big Spring businessman Cody Williams arrived at the meeting. Williams will be seated on the board at the Nov. 16 meeting.

Benavides welcomed Williams to the meeting, and board member Jeff Ward said he looked forward to working with the new

"Cody, you're a successful business owner in Big Spring on multiple fronts, and we're excited to have you on the board," he said. "I think it's going to be a fantastic perspective that we may not have yet, and having the knowledge of another small business owner that's running their own small economic development is always an asset to us. I'm excited to serve with you." Williams, owner of Big Spring's Skateland and House of Tees,

said he is also excited to serve on the board.

Following the resolution honoring Bobby McDonald, the board approved its annual contract with Leading EDG.

"Because Big Spring is not a member of a group that has small business development centers because we don't have a university here, we contract with Leading EDG to supply that support for new businesses or people thinking about opening a business," Willis said. "They do yeoman's work for us. They help a lot of people get started. More importantly, they've saved some people

In his director's report, Willis spoke about the new addition to the mall. Burke's Outlet.

from starting a business that would've wasted their entire life

savings. I think that's almost as valuable as getting a new busi-

"Grand opening this morning. I went over there with Debbye (ValVerde) and the Chamber, and it was nice,"

he said. "They have a pretty nice selection of products and great prices, they'll do great here." Willis noted that the mall is trying

to shuffle some stores around to make room for larger tenants. "The mall guys are having some is-

sues moving around existing tenants to make bigger footprints for some of the other tenants they're working with," he said. "We're going to try to help them through that. It's a little bit sticky because the existing tenants have long-term contracts. It's likely going to cost the guys who bought the mall a little bit of money to get them to move around. But if Burke's is any indication, they've done a really great job of fixing up the mall."

Willis also suggested formation of a large community meeting between various entities.

"We need to have a Howard County Planning Summit," he said. "Where the city sits down in front of the county, the school district, and everybody, and say, 'This is where we're trying to go.' We need to explain what we see happening out there on the west side of the airport to everybody. The thing about the land ownership. And make it really clear that we need to get everybody together and improve our communication. If you guys are cool with it, I'm going to start working that way. What I'd like to see...every board in the city would be invited to this."

The next EDC board meeting is scheduled for Nov. 16.

pulses they seem unable to control. They find themselves on a collision course with destruction. Our world needs the deliverance from evil.

Jesus once met a man filled with destructive demons. He lived among the tombs of the dead, often cutting himself with sharp stones. Local citizens tried to control him by putting him in chains, but he broke the chains and escaped back to his home among the graves. When Jesus ordered the demons that were destroying the man to leave him the demons entered a nearby herd of swine that immediately rushed into the sea and were drowned. The man was healed. When his neighbors found him, he was in his right mind, sitting with Jesus, no longer a threat to himself or to them. But it scared them. They asked Jesus to leave their country and not to come back. (Mark 5:1-20). Forces that we cannot understand or control always scare us.

This Halloween we can celebrate an occasion to enjoy our children and their imagination. We can celebrate the turning leaves, dry corn, pumpkins and harvest. And we can be reminded that in our struggles with the unseen forces of good and evil, both in our hearts and in the world, we have a Deliverer.

Again, the odds are in our favor because this God came looking for us.

The problem is that we look for God in all the wrong places and things like religions, temples, rituals, diets, laws, standards, convictions, and selfhelp programs. Sometimes, we even ask the wrong questions because we are looking too hard. If we think that we must forsake all of our sin that we might "find" God, we are looking too hard. If we are living by the Law of Moses, we are looking too hard. If we believe that baptism will make finding God easier, we are looking too hard.

But why?

Because that's not how it works. We don't look for God, He looks for us. Romans 10:20 says:

"But Esaias is very bold, and saith, I was found of them that sought me not; I was made manifest unto them that asked not after me". God is found of those who don't look for Him, nor does He manifest Himself to those

who ask for Him. For this reason, we say that finding God has nothing to do with forsaking sin, being religious, going to church, getting baptized, or any other ritual, diet, law, standard, conviction or self-help program.

Finding God is Him finding us. We know that we have found God (or rather that He has found us) when we come to that place of rest; no religion, no temples, rituals, laws or labour, just rest in Jesus. But how can we be certain that God has found us? When we hear Jesus say...

# Week nine high school football breakdow

It is that time; football fans, it's Friday Night. This week, like last week, we should have some good games ahead of us. All three of our local teams will be in some crucial games. First, Big Spring will play their most important game of the year. They will take on the Fort Stockton Panthers in a game that potentially decided the district title. Next, the Forsan Buffaloes will look to stay perfect as they hit the road to take on the Stamford Bulldogs. Finally, Coahoma will have a challenging task on their hands as they will be on the road taking on a top ten team in the state as they take on Lubbock Roosevelt. This week will say a lot about how the playoffs will play out for these teams.

Let us start with the Big Spring Steers. Last week was the district opener for the Steers as they trav-



eled Andrews to take on the Mustangs. The Mustangs and the Steers have long, storied valry, this game

meant a lot. It was a close-fought first half of backand-forth football. Both teams wanted to win this game, and the scoreboard showed that after the first half of play, the Steers trailed in this game from 19 to 14. However, the second half was a different story for your Steers. They made the adjustments and came out on fire. They dominated the Mustangs in the second half, never allowing them to find any rhythm on offense. Once the Steers finally found their momentum, they rolled, and once they got started, there was no way that Andrews could stop them. Big Spring put up 34 unanswered points to blow out their rival 48-19. It was a dominant victory from the Steers against a rival; not only that, but it was a huge district win. Gabriel Baeza once again had a great game as he passed for 404 yards on 35 for 49 attempts. He also chipped in with 87 yards rushing on 21 carries. Eli Cobos was the player of the game this past Friday, as he was on fire. Cobos was unstoppable. He had eight receptions for 110 yards and three touchdowns on the night. He also handled all the kicking duties and made six extra points in the game. Kaegen Mitchell was his dominant self as the receiver had 12 catches for 132 yards and two touchdowns. Mitchell also shinned on the defensive side of the ball as he was a shutdown cornerback. He had two key interceptions that helped this defense dominate this game. It was a great game by a team that has been playing good football all season long.

This week is another arduous task for the Steers, as they will take on the Fort Stockton Panthers. The Panthers have also had a great season as they come into this game sporting a 7-1 record on the season. They like the Steers are also 1-0 in district play. The Panthers squeaked out an overtime victory last week against San Angelo Lakeview 35-32. In their previous three games, Fort Stockton is 3-0 with victories over the Crane Golden Cranes 44-8. Not only are they more than likely battling for a district title, but it will also be "Pink Out" night. Let us all come out and pack these stands and cheer this team on to what could be a monumental victory. The game will be this Friday night, Oct 29, and will be at Memorial Stadium; they have set kickoff for 7 p.m.

Now it's time for those Forsan Buffaloes. The Buffs are a perfect 8-0 on the season. They have been playing outstanding football all season long. Last week the mighty Buffs took on the Haskell Indians in a district matchup. The #10 team in the state made light work of the Indians, winning easily 28-0. Haskell had no chance against this potent run game Forsan featured. Forsan, as a team, rushed for 216 yards total and three touchdowns on the night. Nate Hernandez led Forsan in rushing yards as he carried the ball 14 times for 122 yards. Major Stockton also chipped in 55 yards on ten carries and one touchdown. Stockton also passed for 37 yards on three of seven passing. Sawyer Stallings is looking healthier as he played at the quarterback position as well. 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

After the opening lead was made and dummy appeared, declarer could see that his partner had greatly overbid his values. Declarer looked at the dummy, then looked at his partner and said: "That dummy is an insult to Poland!"

If you were West on the following layout, you might have similar feelings if you reached Six Spades due to partner's overoptimism after you opened two notrump. However, they don't allow you to back up and change the contract, so the question is how would you proceed after North leads the ten of clubs? (Assume the missing trumps are

ivided 3-1 or 2-2).

slam is to find South with the doubleton K-Q of clubs, as well as the king of diamonds. Accordingly, you play a low club from the dummy, and South, luckily for you, produces the queen.


You next cash three rounds of

trump (South turns up with three of them) and continue with the A-K and another heart, ruffing in dummy. Now you play the club five, taken by South with the king. You hope South will return a diamond away from the king, which would hand you the slam, but he smartly exits with a heart instead.

After discarding a diamond from your hand and ruffing the heart with dummy's last trump, you return the queen of diamonds, covered by the king and ace. Miraculously, you are now on the verge of making the contract if North holds the jack of diamonds. You hope he started with a hand such as:

If that's what he was dealt, he will be a dead duck when you next play the queen of spades in this posi-



Today's Highlight in History:

On Oct. 29, 2018, a new-generation Boeing jet operated by the Indonesian budget airline Lion Air crashed in the Java Sea minutes after takeoff from Jakarta, killing all 189 people on board; it was the first of two deadly crashes involving the 737 Max, causing the plane to be grounded around the world for nearly two years as Boeing worked on software changes to a flight-control system.

In 1957, former MGM studio boss Louis B. Mayer died in Los Angeles at age 75.

In 1960, a chartered plane carrying the California Polytechnic State University football team crashed on takeoff from Toledo Ohio, killing 22 of the 48 people on board.

In 1987, following the confirmation defeat of Robert H. Bork to serve on the U.S. Supreme Court, President Ronald Reagan announced his choice of Douglas H. Ginsburg, a nomination that fell apart over revelations of Ginsburg's previous marijuana use. Jazz

great Woody Herman died in Los Angeles at age 74.

In 1994, gunman Francisco Martin Duran fired more than two dozen shots from a semiautomatic rifle at the White House. (Duran was later convicted of trying to assassinate President Bill Clinton and was sentenced to 40 years in prison.)

In 1998, Sen. John Glenn, at age 77, roared back into space aboard the shuttle Discovery, retracing the trail he'd blazed for America's astronauts 36 years earlier.

In 2004, four days before Election Day in the U.S., Osama bin Laden, in a videotaped statement, directly admitted for the first time that he'd ordered the September 11 attacks and told Americans "the best way to avoid another Manhattan" was to stop threatening Muslims'

In 2012, Superstorm Sandy slammed ashore in New Jersey and slowly marched inland,

devastating coastal communities and causing widespread power outages; the storm and its aftermath were blamed for at least 182 deaths in the U.S.

In 2015, Paul Ryan was elected the 54th speaker of the U.S. House of Representatives.

In 2017, all but 10 members of the Houston Texans took a knee during the national anthem, reacting to a remark from team owner Bob McNair to other NFL owners that "we can't have the inmates running the prison.'

Ten years ago: A Taliban sui-cide bomber rammed a vehicle loaded with explosives into an armored NATO bus on a busy thoroughfare in Kabul, killing 17 people, including 12 Americans. A "white Halloween" storm with record-setting snowfalls brought down trees across the northeastern U.S., knocking out power to millions; 39 deaths were blamed on the weather. Joe Paterno broke Eddie Robinson's record for victories by a Division I coach with No.

409 in Penn State's sloppy 10-7 win over Illinois.

Five years ago: Hillary Clinton lashed out at the FBI's handling of a new email review, leading a chorus of Democratic leaders who declared the bureau's actions just days before the election were "unprecedented" and "deeply troubling.

One year ago: The Commerce

Department estimated that the U.S. economy grew at a sizzling 33.1% annual rate in the July-September quarter — by far the largest quarterly gain on record rebounding from an epic plunge in the spring, when the coronavirus closed businesses and threw tens of millions out of work. Six people were dead and millions were without power after Hurricane Zeta tore across the South, leaving shat-tered buildings and thousands of downed trees as it weakened to a tropical storm. An attacker identified as an Islamic extremist who had recently arrived from Tunisia stabbed three people to death at a church in the French city of Nice before

being seriously wounded by police. The Vatican ended Pope Francis' general audiences with the public amid a surge in coronavirus cases in Italy and a confirmed infection at the previous week's encounter.

# A World Series short on drama so far shifts scene to Atlanta

ATLANTA — His day on the diamond almost done, Jose Altuve walked over to a clutch of Astros fans clustered behind the netting down the right field line at Minute Maid Park.

For five minutes, he autographed World Series programs, No. 27 jerseys and other items, many of them for kids. A young girl got a ball with Altuve's signature and joyfully turned to her mother.

"I'm about to cry," the mom said Wednesday night. Altuve's team liked the signs they saw from him earlier in the evening, too.

In a Fall Classic devoid of drama so far, the bigswinging leadoff man is among the few stars to deliver any huge hits.

Bouncing back from the first three-strikeout game of his postseason career, plus a prolonged slump in the AL Championship Series, Altuve homered and doubled as Houston beat the Atlanta Braves 7-2, tying the matchup at 1-all.

But teammates Carlos Correa, Alex Bregman and AL Championship Series MVP Yordan Alvarez have been mostly silent. Freddie Freeman, Austin Riley and NLCS MVP Eddie Rosario haven't done much damage for the Braves, either.

"You can be 0 for 20, but what about if you get the big hit? So that's what playoffs is about," said. "I don't care if I went 0 for 5 last night."

As Astros manager Dusty Baker said: "My dad used to tell me it's OK to get down, just don't stay down. So he didn't stay down."

After a rainy day off, they'll play Game 3 Friday night at Truist Park, provided the weather is OK. Luis Garcia is set to pitch for the Astros against Ian Anderson. Both of them threw well in the games their teams won to clinch these spots.

It will be the first World Series pairing of rookie starters since the 2006 opener. That night, Anthony Reves led St. Louis over De-

troit and its newcomer, Justin Verlander. This sea-

son, Verlander was on Houston's injured list while recovering from Tommy John surgery.

Astros reserve Marwin Gonzalez is the only play-

er who has batted against the other team's starter.

"Hank Aaron used to say, if you've never faced a pitcher, you initiate him right away and then kind of kill his spirits," Baker said. "So hopefully, we can

At 23, Anderson is already an October veteran. He's made seven postseason starts in two years, going 3-0 with a 1.47 ERA.

"He's been through a lot in a short major league career, a lot of big experiences, pitched a lot of big games here," Braves manager Brian Snitker said

Garcia, meanwhile, will be forced to bat with no designated hitter in the National League park.

"I like to hit," said Garcia, who's hitless in six ca-

The Braves are 5-0 at home this year in the playoffs and are expecting a loud crowd.

"The atmosphere is awesome. Like I say, Braves country is real. It's real," Snitker said.

The Astros haven't visited Truist Park since 2017, the year it opened, meaning many of their players will be seeing it for the first time. The Astros hoped to work out at the stadium Thursday to get familiar with the "dimensions and the caroms and the corners," Baker said, but rain limited their activity.

The tarp covered the field all day and a few Asros tossed the ball in the outfield before the drizzle turned to showers. The temperatures were in the 50s — a far cry from Houston — and the same kind of weather was in the forecast for Game 3.

Altuve helped the Astros earn their split at home. A postseason perennial, the All-Star second baseman pushed aside a 3-for-24 skid in the ALCS and a hitless opener against the Braves.

Altuve tied former Yankees star Bernie Williams for second on the career postseason home run list

with 22, trailing only the 29 by Manny Ramirez.

To Baker, there was nothing surprising about Altuve's performance. And he figures the other Astros infielders -- Correa, Bregman and Yuli Gurriel -- also will play key roles.

"They expect good things to happen and they expect to play well. They expect to do good. I found that out last year," he said.

"We had some guys struggling and they said, well, wait till the playoffs, and we barely squeaked in," he said. "They said, hey, man, we're going to turn it on in the playoffs. I haven't seen many people in this game who can kind of turn it on when they want to."


Altuve has shown that. In 11 seasons, he's averaged a home run every 35 at-bats in the regular


season; in 75 postseason games, he's homered once every 14 at-bats.

Baker recalled a slugger he managed in San Francisco, and a speedster who played across the Bay.

"Come to mind like Barry Bonds. He's like, I'm going to take over this game today, and he takes it over. Rickey Henderson says, hey, man, I'm going to steal three or four bases, and I'm going to take this game over by myself," Baker said.

"Like I said, you don't find many players like that, where they have the ability or the mindset or the mind control to do it," he said.





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
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
