County to consider redistricting Friday by ROGER CLINE

Redistricting is the lone item on the agenda for a special meeting of the Howard County Commissioners, called for 9 a.m. Friday. The meeting will take place in the second-floor Judge's Conference Room of the Howard County Courthouse, 300 S. Main Street.

County Judge Kathryn Wiseman will first open a public hearing on the county's redistricting plan, and members of the public will have the opportunity to express their opinions about the plan to shift the borders of county precincts based on population changes since the precinct borders were last set.

"The thing is, our Precinct 1 (northwest part of the county) was underpopulated by quite a bit. Our Precinct 2 (southeast part of the county) was overpopulated by quite a bit," said Wiseman. "But the problem is, they

Coahoma ISD Classroom Spotlight: Mad Scientist Day





Covid pandemic help from Encompass

The pandemic continues and case counts continue to hold steady keeping area hospitals stretched. In an effort to help hospitals with census numbers and resources, home health visits are being offered by local home health agencies. Since the beginning of the pandemic Encompass has been offering porch visits and adjusting services to continue to meet the need of the Howard County residents.

"During this public health emergency, we are finding ways to best support you and your patients and provide access to care in the safety of their home," Sally Grant, Area Manager to Encompass Health, said.

Whether a patient is dealing with Covid-19, residual effects from having Covid or other illnesses, there are resources and treatment options available within ones own home. Across the nation, those who have contracted Covid have reported dealing with several after effects including viral pneumonia, encephalopathy, cardiomyopathy, lung scarring, critical illness myopathy, mild cognitive impairment, post infection or disuse myopathy, stroke, pulmonary embolism and more.

"We are seeing that many Covid-19 survivors are needing weeks, months possibly years of rehabilitation to get back to where they were before the virus attacked their bodies," Grant said. "The nursing staff at Encompass is equipped to help offer that support, in partnership with medical providers."

While porch visits are being offered there are other mitigation efforts that have been implemented in order to keep

Charter. It wasn't any imposition on the citizens at all. It was just a simple edit. One guy on Facebook said it was violating people's First Amendment rights. That was strictly I think, really a misunderstanding on the voters' part. Like I said, it really didn't change anything.'

Proposition I, which would have removed the city's current disciplinary hearing process for employees, also failed.

"That one has been problematic for the city for a while, because its method of implementation is clunky," Thomason said. "We can live with it, but that whole system is also already handled in our personnel policy."

Thomason said the plan was to replace the disciplinary hearing process with a more modern policy.

"Something better suited to our current state of affairs," he said. "There are things in that that run afoul of state law. Part of the hearing process is finding a retired district judge, which, luckily, we have one semi-available to us now. Like I said, that was more of an update, but that's something we can live with." Proposition J would have removed the requirement for the city's elected officials to be bonded. Thomason said bonding for city elected officials is an outdated concept. "Bonding really hasn't been used for city officials for decades," he said. "It's typically covered by errors and omissions policies. Frankly, that's one we're going to have to look at. If the citizens want us to be bonded, we can get bonds. I can't think of any instance, really, where an elected official would lose their bond, where their bond would be callable. There's nothing in the Charter that states where a person would lose their bond for whatever reason, and nothing I can think of in state law, for that matter, either. So having a bond but not having the bond cover anything in particular is really a redundancy." Proposition S would have allowed a single council member to call a special meeting, rather than requiring a coalition of three council members to

shift things just over enough so that we could get a more equal

call such a meeting.

"That, I would call a substantive change," Thomason said. "It was won that I personally, I went ahead and voted for it, but it's one for the citizens to decide. It just is what it is. Having special meetings, that's something that doesn't need to be thrown around lightly, and it should be for a pretty good reason. I have no issues at all with the way that one went, because quite frankly, it doesn't affect the mayor. The mayor has always been able to call a special meeting.'

Thomason said the city can't put the failed issues back up for election for at least two years.

"We can't do anything for two years," he said. "That's by Texas Constitution. You can only amend a home-rule charter every two years. The minor things we might bring back when the Charter Committee meets again. And that's one of the things that did pass: Now we'll have the Charter Review Committee every four years. So rather than let the Charter go almost 100 years before it is substantively looked at, it will be looked at, basically, on a four-year basis."

Proposition P, which passed, requires the creation of a Charter Review Committee every four years. Thomason said he's also happy about the passage of Proposition T, providing for initiative and referendum for city government. "That puts direct oversight of the Council back in the hands of the citizens," the mayor said. "You don't have to wait to replace Council members. You can use the petition process and put it up for a vote by the citizens. Initiative is the process by which the citizens submit a petition process, whether it be to initiate legislation or to repeal legislation. The referendum, of course, is the vote, and repeal is the extreme form of oversight, which removes council members." Thomason said he's happy that citizens had a chance to vote on updates to the city charter, though he's a bit disappointed in the low turnout, about 8.5 percent of registered voters. Voters living in unincorporated areas of Howard County had the chance to vote on the creation of a County Assistance District, which would use sales tax funds for items of public welfare including construction, road maintenance, law enforcement and detention, libraries, museums and parks, economic development or tourism, firefighting and fire prevention services, etc., and voted it down.

"The whole goal was for us to help defray property tax," Judge Wiseman said regarding the measure. "This was only offered to those who lived outside of any incorporated city, in the county. I don't think we did a very good job of helping people in the rural area of the county to understand that this is only bringing the sales tax up to what it would be in the city.'

Wiseman said county roads are routinely damaged by heavy oilfield traffic.

"The people who are paying that tax are probably the same people who are destroying our county roads," she said.

"We were hoping to use those tax dollars to help repair our roads and keep them in better shape. Our roads have just been beaten to pieces. At one time we had something like \$68 million of dam-

age to our roads, mostly from oilfield traffic. This small 2-cent increase in tax in the unincorporated areas would have helped us get those roads repaired."

The funds would have also been used to offset the cost of ambulance service in the county's unincorporated areas.

"We pay about \$37,000 a month in ambulance service out in the county, so it would also help defray that cost also, so it is very unfortunate that that was not passed," she said. "We will put it back on the ballot as soon as possible, and try to do a better job of helping people to understand, out in the rural areas, what this sales tax would have meant to the county."

Added precautions include screening of patients and household members daily, limit visits to those necessary and utilizing tele-health when appropriate, education of proper hand hygiene and disinfection of high-use areas in the home, utilization of proper PPE for staff making home visits, and the encouragement of flu vaccines and other preventive measures.

"Our staff is committed to keeping highrisk patients safe at home by providing the care they need to mitigate hospitalizations and emergent care visits," she said. "Our goal during the Covid-19 pandemic is to continue providing superior care to our patients in the safety of their own home, where they are less susceptible to the spread of the virus."







Some contracts stand or fall essentially on the opening lead. Consider this deal where South got to six hearts on the bidding shown. South made the slam after West chose a spade as his opening lead. West reasoned that — given the bidding — his opponents were prepared to cope with a diamond lead, the suit East had bid, so he decided to surprise them by leading a spade. This highly speculative lead did not work out well when declarer proceeded to make the most of his chances. After discarding a diamond and a club on the A-K of spades and ruffing a spade, South cashed the K-A of clubs and ruffed a club. He was hoping the clubs would be divided 3-3, in which case he would have had smooth sailing the rest of the way.

But East showed out on the third club, discarding a diamond, and South was left with only one more hope — that East had started with the singleton ace of trump. South's prayers were quickly answered.

When he next led a trump, poor East was forced to win with the ace and had to return a diamond, allowing South to score the queen. As a result, South lost only one trump trick and so made the slam. Had West led a diamond initially, there would have been no way for South to make the contract. In general, it is much safer to lead partner's suit than to make a blind lead in another suit, unless the circumstances strongly indicate otherwise. West had no good reason in this case to vary from the general rule, and in the actual deal, it cost him a slam.

Coahoma Bulldogs fall to top ranked team

ACUFF - Methodical. That describes the Lubbock Roosevelt Eagles 52-19 win over the Coahoma Bulldogs here Friday night at Eagle Stadium. In doing so the No. 7 ranked Eagles, 9-0, for the season and 4-0 in District 3-4A moved closer to a district title. Meanwhile the Bulldogs, 3-6, 1-4, saw their playoff hopes fading.

Roosevelt clinched at least a tie for the district crown with one game remaining against highly regarded Idalou. Coahoma must beat Abernathy Friday and still need some help to have at least a chance to make the playoffs.

If one likes old school smash mouth football, Roosevelt played it to the T. Their Flexbone option offense simply overwhelmed the Bulldogs, who had no answer to stop the run. Roosevelt didn't even attempt a pass in the game as it grinded out 457 yards on the ground. It scored on four of five possessions in the first half. The other possession Coahoma linebacker Jaidyn Vineyard made Roosevelt quarterback Alex Trevino cough up the ball and defensive back Ky Kemper recovered.

Coahoma trailed 32-12 at the half but the game could have been closer if Coahoma had pulled off the close plays. On four different occasions

in the second quarter, th Bulldogs let the game slip away. They kicked an onsides kick which it appeared Coahoma had recovered. Roosevelt ended up with the ball however. Another time Coahoma had a drive deep in Roosevelt territory which Coahoma converted a fourth down pass play. The play was nullified because of an illegal lineman downfield. Coahoma squelched another scoring opportunity when the quarterback missed a wide open receiver on fourth down. Perhaps the most disheartening play came when Coahoma punter Austin Perkins took a bad snap and turned into an 11 yard gain for an apparent first down. But a very unfavorable spot by the officials left Coahoma inches short.

On the other hand, there was the Roosevelt offense that ran like a well oiled machine. Nate Gensler led that machine by running for 183 yards. He

Quarterback Kemper, filling in for injured starter Billy Bailey, scooted 62 yards on a keeper. It was followed by a 24-yard scoring run by Vineyard, cutting the lead to 24-12 with 10:04 left in the first half.

Coahoma's other two scores came on big plays also came on big plays. Kemper teamed up with Perkins for a 74-yard catch and run scoring pass .


