Heart disease: the important battle

Being proactive when it comes to your health is one of the best defenses against any disease. Preventative measures can drastically reduce the negative impact on a person's body and long term effects. When it comes to heart disease, the advise is the same, proactive measures and education on the signs, symptoms and treatments can lead to the best outcome.

"Heart Disease can be scary but understanding the disease and treatments can help you get back to life. Midland Memorial Hospital offers many advanced treatment options," Mark Davis, M.D., FACC, FRCPC, said.

Once of the newer procedures being offered - since January – at Midland Memorial Hospital is directed at those dealing with heart valve disease. Dr. Davis is one of the providers who can

perform transcatheter aortic valve replacement.

"This procedure has been being performed worldwide for the past 20 years, but this past year, has become an option for West Texas residents," he said.

According to Dr. Davis, aortic valve stenosis primarily affects the elderly and is significantly underdiagnosed. The signs and symptoms are often written off as "getting old", such as fatigue, shortness of breath or chest pain and pressure. The symptoms can be linked to valvular problems. There are even those who may experience dizziness or fainting episodes with exertion. The average patient is older than 70, but can impact those younger "If one is not proactive it can be too late. When peo-

ple have chest pain from their valve, 50% die within

five years; when they start fainting 50% die within three years, and 50% of those who have significant fatigue and shortness of breath die within two years," Dr. Davis said.

Dr. Davis continued, "When people get older often the aortic valve of the heart calcifies and has difficulty opening. This is called a rtic stenosis. When this valve has difficulty opening, blood backs up into the heart and the lungs and causes people to have chest pain, shortness of breath, dizziness and fatigue. Many years ago, the only

treatment was an aortic valve replacement by open heart surgery. But over the past 10 years we have developed techniques to replace the failing valve with a new valve by inserting a tube into the artery in the groin. Through this tube we stick wires into the heart in order to put a new valve inside the failing valve. By doing so, the patient's symptoms are resolved. Instead of taking weeks to recover, patients are up and moving and leaving the hospital the next day. This proce-

dure is called a TAVR - Transcatheter Aortic Valve Replacement."

According to statistics provided by Midland Memorial Hospital, about 30 patients in Howard County per year have severe symptomatic aortic valve stenosis and are not diagnosed or sent for treatment. If symptoms are left untreated there is a progression of chest pain, fainting, shortness of breath and fatigue that creates limitations on daily living.

The TAVR procedure had been performed for the last couple years in the Permian Basin. In Midland, this is done by Dr. Mark Davis and he is assisted by Cardiovascular Surgeon Dr. Kirit Patel. Dr. Farber performs this procedure in Odessa.

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

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

On October 31st in the year 1517, a young priest by the name Martin Luther published a document that listed 95 grievances outlining abuse and corruption in the church. He nailed a copy to the door of the Castle Church in Wittenberg, Germany, which ignited a movement we now refer to as the Protestant Reformation. Over the years the Church had become de-formed, she did not clearly reflect the image of God's love and grace in the world. Her message and mission had become distorted. An

By 1521, Luther was brought before the Emperor, the Arch Bishop and the Prince. He was asked to recant, to take back all that he had written against the church and the Pope. This wasn't a light thing, to say "no" could cost him his life. He asked for time to think about it before he answered. The next day, he was brought back in and this is what he said: "Unless I am convinced by proofs from Scriptures or by plain and clear reasons and arguments, I can and will not retract, for it is neither safe nor wise to do anything against conscience. Here I stand. I can do no other. God help me.

What Luther captured in this movement was the need for ongoing renewal. In the same way that the image and mission of the church had become marred, our lives can also become deformed. However, as we fully trust our lives to the Potter he can reform and restore what is broken. He can reshape our lives into something new, something useful, something beautiful. May we experience blessing in the brokenness, calm in the chaos, and a masterpiece through the mess as we follow Christ!



We will start with the game that I will be cov-




ering night, and that will be the Forsan Buffaloes taking on the Hawley Bearcats. What game this should be both teams are 9-0, and both teams are ranked

Titans, Rams: top conference teams with different outlooks

They lead their divisions and have been prime contenders for the top spot in their conference — and the only playoff bye.

Yet the outlooks for the Tennessee Titans (6-2) and Los Angeles Rams (7-1) aren't close to the same as they meet Sunday.

Tennessee, which not only owns a three-game lead in the AFC South but has swept the only possible threat there, Indianapolis, placed running back Derrick Henry on injured reserve. The 2020 Offensive Player of the Year, leading rusher in the NFL this season and probably the best player in the division is out with a foot injury.

"If anybody can, I guess come back, it would be Derrick," coach Mike Vrabel said, "but not going to put any expectations on any sort of timeline.

"I know that he'll be around our team as soon as he can. I know that's important to him. I know that'll be important to our team. We will have to move on. We'll have to move on unfortunately without him here in the short term and not look back."

Looking ahead — and far down the road to where they could be in February, hosting the Super Bowl — the Rams added what could be a key piece to their already formidable defense.

Von Miller was acquired from Denver, and while the linebacker no longer is an elite player, there could be enough left to make that Aaron Donald-led unit even more stingy.

"I feel like it frees us all up," Miller said. "They'll try to figure out creative ways to triple-team and double-team, but it can't possibly be that effective. We've got great coaches. We've got great guys playing on this team, and we'll be able to figure it out.

"You hear stories of the Fearsome Foursome, you hear stories of this legendary defense, and we want to recreate that. They've been playing great defense all year. I just want to add some of the things that I do best."

The action began Thursday night, as the Indianapolis Colts rushed for the highest single-game total in the NFL this season in a 45-30 win over the New York Jets. Carson Wentz threw three touchdown passes and Jonathan Taylor rushed for 172 yards and two scores as Indy (4-5) finished with 260 yards rushing. New York starting quarterback Mike White injured his right forearm in the first quarter as the Jets (2-6) lost their seven straight night game.

Off this week are Washington (2-6), Seattle (3-5), Detroit (0-8) and Tampa Bay (6-2).

Green Bay (7-1) at Kansas City (4-4) Other than Cheeseheads, the folks most disappointed (and annoyed) about Aaron Rodgers being sidelined while in the COVID-19 protocol must be at Fox, the network televising what could have been a terrific quarterbacks confrontation with Patrick Mahomes.

"You just watched this last weekend," Chiefs coach Andy Reid says. "Two quarterbacks (the Jets' Mike White and Saints' Trevor Siemian) came in that hadn't had an opportunity to play much, if at all, and won games. So, our guys are aware of that. You get yourself ready to play. In this league, there are small margins. It's a true team sport. You get yourself ready to go."

1. One heart. It would clearly be wrong to open one diamond simply because it is the stronger suit. Since the majority of hands end up in a suit contract, every effort should be made to represent suit length correctly so that the partnership will wind up in the suit in which it holds

the most cards. The most efficient way of attaining this goal when holding two fivecard suits is to bid the higher-ranking suit first — regardless of strength — with the intention of subsequently bidding the lower-ranking suit twice. This will give partner a choice of suits at the same level. If you were to bid dia-

monds first, followed by hearts, the same would not be true. **2.** One notrump. It is far better to open with one notrump than one diamond. The notrump bid has the huge advantage of immediately describing a balanced hand with 15 to 17 points and stoppers in at least three suits, not to mention the incidental advantage of making it more difficult for the opposition to enter the bidding.

A diamond opening is likely to create later bidding problems. For example, if partner responded with one heart or one spade, you'd be faced with a problem that has no satisfactory solution.

3. One heart. This hand represents an exception to the rule laid out in the first problem. Since it barely qualifies as an opening bid, an effort should be made to keep the bidding as low as possible. This can best be accomplished by starting with one heart. Then, if partner makes the expected response of one spade or one notrump, you can comfortably bid two diamonds, permitting the contract to be played at that level in either red suit.

Observe that if you start with one diamond and get a one-spade or one-notrump response, your hand is not nearly good enough to "reverse" into two hearts, which would show at least 17 points.

4. One club. This looks very much like a one-notrump bid, but you

can't make that bid with 18 points. It may seem harmless to exceed the normal limit by only a point, but one mustn't forget that partner's responses are geared to a 15to 17-point spread. A game or slam could easily be missed if the pointcount range became elastic at the whim of the opener. The extra values above an opening one-notrump bid can be shown by jumping to two notrump at your next turn.

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





Today's Highlight in History:

On Nov. 5, 2017, a gunman armed with an assault rifle opened fire in a small South Texas church, killing more than two dozen people; the shooter, Devin Patrick Kelley, was later found dead in a vehicle after he was shot and chased by two men who heard the gunfire. (An autopsy revealed that he died from a self-inflicted gunshot wound.)

On this date:

In 1605, the "Gunpowder Plot" failed as Guy Fawkes was seized before he could blow up the English Parliament.

In 1872, suffragist Susan B. Anthony defied the law by attempting to cast a vote for President Ulysses S. Grant. (Anthony was convicted by a

never paid the penalty.)

In 1912, Democrat Woodrow Wilson was elected president, defeating Progressive Party candidate Theodore Roosevelt, incumbent Republican William Howard Taft and Socialist Eugene V. Debs.

In 1935, Parker Brothers began marketing the board game "Monopoly."

In 1968, Republican Richard M. Nixon won the presidency, defeating Democratic Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey and American Independent candidate George C. Wallace.

In 1989, death claimed pianist Vladimir Horowitz in New York at age 86 and singer-songwriter Barry Sadler in Murfreesboro, Tennessee, at age 49.

In 1992, Malice Green, a Black motorist, died after he was struck in the head 14 times with

a flashlight by a Detroit police officer, Larry Nevers, outside a suspected crack house (Nevers and his partner, Walter Budzyn, were found guilty of second-degree murder, but the convictions were overturned; they were later convicted of involuntary manslaughter.)

In 1994, former President Ronald Reagan disclosed he had Alzheimer's disease.

In 2003, President George W. Bush signed a bill outlawing the procedure known by its critics as "partial-birth abortion"; less than an hour later, a federal judge in Nebraska issued a temporary restraining order against the ban. (In 2007, the .S. Supreme Court upheld the Partial Birth Abortion Ban Act.)

In 2006, Saddam Hussein was convicted and sentenced by the Iraqi High Tribunal to hang for crimes against humanity.

In 2007, Hollywood writers began a three-month strike. forcing late-night talk shows to immediately start airing reruns

In 2009, a shooting rampage at the Fort Hood Army post in Texas left 13 people dead; Maj. Nidal Hasan, an Army psychiatrist, was later convicted of murder and sentenced to death. (No execution date has been set.)

Ten years ago: Former Penn State defensive coordinator Jerry Sandusky, accused of molesting eight boys, was arrested and released on \$100,000 bail after being arraigned on 40 criminal counts. (Sandusky was later convicted and sentenced to 30 to 60 years in prison for the sexual abuse of 10 boys over a 15-year period.)

Five years ago: Republican Donald Trump vowed to press into Democratic strongholds over the campaign's final days as Hillary Clinton looked to an army of A-list celebrities and politicos to defend her narrowing path to the presidency. Arrogate overhauled pacesetter California Chrome in the final 100 yards in an upset half-

length victory in the \$6 million Breeders' Cup Classic.


One year ago: With Democrat Joe Biden inching closer to victory, President Donald Trump lashed out in a statement from the White House briefing room, insisting that Democrats were trying to "steal the election" with "illegal votes"; there had in fact been no evidence that votes cast illegally were being counted, and no evidence of widespread fraud. ABC, CBS and NBC all cut away from Trump's remarks, with network anchors saying they needed to correct falsehoods being disseminated by the president. Biden appealed for calm as the vote count continued, telling reporters, "The process is working." Facebook banned a large group called "Stop the Steal" that supporters of Trump were using to organize protests against the presidential vote count; some members had called for violence.



A nasty public eight-month feud reached its conclusion on Thursday when the Sabres traded Eichel to Vegas, ending a stalemate over how to treat his neck injury. The dispute revolved around the NHL's collective bargaining agreement giving teams the final say over the treatment of injuries. The Sabres balked at Eichel having

artificial disk replacement surgery because it had never been performed on an NHL player, and they instead recommended fusion surgery.

The Golden Knights have no such

Vegas general manager Kelly Mc-Crimmon said Eichel has the goahead to have the procedure, which is expected to sideline him for four more months.

TORONTO (AP) — The executive board of the NHL Players' Association has voted to approve an independent investigation into the union's handling of sexual assault allegations by Kyle Beach in 2010.

Executive director Don Fehr rec-

ommended on a call earlier this week bringing in outside counsel to review what happened more than a decade ago when the PA learned of Beach's allegations. The NHLPA announced Thursday that board members voted in favor of that.

Players in recent days expressed concern over the NHLPA's handling of Beach's allegations, even though he wasn't technically a member because he never played in an NHL game. An investigation commissioned by the Chicago Blackhawks found that a confidant of Beach's reached out to the NHLPA, with nothing coming of it.

Attorneys Brian Fahling and Eric Kniffen's letter to athletic director Pat Chun lays out their appeal of Rolovich's firing for just cause.

The letter says Chun overturned a decision by the university's Human Resource Services to grant Rolovich a religious exemption to the vaccination mandate. Rolovich has said he is Catholic. The Catholic Church has not prohibited vaccinations against

The most intriguing storyline here could be Patriots rookie quarterback Mac Jones against cornerback Stephon Gilmore, the 2019 Defensive Player of the Year who couldn't get a new contract out of New England and was dealt to Carolina. Gilmore had an interception in his first game with the Panthers last week while playing 17 snaps.

For New England, which is 3-0 on the road, has seen Jones lead all rookies in completions (192), completion rate (68.1), passing yards (1,997), TD passes (nine) and rating (90.1). He's trying to become the first rookie QB since Dak Prescott in 2016 to win his first four road starts.

Denver (4-4) at Dallas (6-1)

Given their current forms, it might be impossible to believe that the Broncos have won six consecutive games in the series. The previous victory for Dallas was in 1995, also the most recent time the Cowbovs reached the Super Bowl, or even the NFC championship game.

The Cowboys hope to get back Dak Prescott, though backup quarterback Cooper Rush performed admirably in last week's victory at Minnesota. Cornerback Trevon Diggs has a league-leading seven interceptions after going without one in a game for the first time this season against the Vikings.

It's Denver's first game without the traded linebacker Von Miller. GM George Paton gave coach Vic Fangio and offensive coordinator Pat Shurmur votes of confidence this week but was highly critical of Denver's offensive showings.

Buffalo (5-2) at Jacksonville (1-6)

A rugged matchup for the Jags — as if pretty much all their opponents don't have an edge on them. Finding a way to move the ball will be a huge challenge for Trevor Lawrence. Consider that Buffalo's safety tandem of Jordan Poyer and Micah Hyde own three interceptions each as part of a defense tied for the NFL lead with 11 picks. Buffalo's stout run defense, which has only allowed Henry a 100-yard game, might not be facing Jacksonville starter James Robinson (bruised heel).

Bills QB Josh Allen has at least two TD passes and a passer rating over 100 in five consecutive games, the longest active streak in the NFL.

Arizona (7-1) at San Francisco (3-4)

The Cardinals have had recent success in this series at the Niners, winning five of the past six. They are 4-0 on the road in 2021, and though they come off their first loss, the Cardinals have been perfect on fourth downs, 7 for 7.

James Conner has eight rushing touchdowns, all in the past six games. He is second in the NFL in that category behind Henry, who has 10 but now is

The 49ers snapped a four-game losing streak last

week, but are 1-7 at Levi's Stadium the past two sea-

Minnesota (3-4) at Baltimore (5-2)

Unlike Arizona prospering in the Bay Area, the Vikings have all of one win in Baltimore. That goes back to when the Colts made it their home. They beat the Ravens in 1998 when they went 15-1. The Vikings were 0-8 on the road against the Colts and 1-3 vs. the Ravens.

Also working in Baltimore's favor: The Ravens have the NFL's longest active winning streak against the NFC with 11, and are an NFL-best 17-8 in games immediately following a bye week. Coach John Harbaugh is 10-3 in those games.

The Vikings lead the NFL in sacks per game and with 24 in seven games have already surpassed their 2020 season total (23).

Atlanta (3-4) at New Orleans (5-2)

With Jameis Winston gone for the season (left knee), veteran Siemian or do-everything Taysom Hill, back from injured reserve, will start at quarterback for the hosts. The Saints are 21-9 against the Falcons since Sean Payton became head coach in 2006 and have won three straight and six of the past seven meetings.

Atlanta's Matt Ryan has passed for at least two TDs in each of his past five road games. Tight end Kyle Pitts ranks second among rookies in yards receiving (484) and is tied for fourth in receptions (33). He's become the top target for Ryan with wide receiver Calvin Ridley out for personal reasons.

Las Vegas (5-2) at New York Giants (2-6)

Rich Bisaccia can become the first interim head coach to win his initial three games since Gary Moeller took over in midseason and led the Lions to three straight wins in 2000.

only Raiders coaches to start 3-0 were John Madden (1969) and Bill Callahan (2002). Coincidentally, Callahan replaced Jon Gruden, who was traded to Tampa Bay. Bisaccia, the special teams coordinator, took over when Gruden resigned in October.

Las Vegas has an NFLworst 3-15 mark coming off the bye over the past 18 seasons and has been outscored by 20.5 points per game in losing the past four.

The sloppy Giants had 10 penalties in last Monday's loss at Kansas City. But the Giants have won three of the past four against the Raiders.

LA's defense is last in the NFL against the run and the Eagles are coming off their best rushing game in several years, totaling 236 yards from Boston Scott and Jordan Howard.

The Chargers have a dynamic running back in Austin Ekeler, tied for second in the NFL among RBs with eight scrimmage touchdowns.

Philly is 0-3 at home.

Chicago (3-5) at Pittsburgh (4-3), Monday night

Monday night is no time to be in the Steel City for visiting NFL teams. The Steelers are 27-5 in Pittsburgh since "Monday Night Football" began in 1970, including 19 straight wins. The previous Monday night home loss was in 1991 against the Giants. Pittsburgh's .662 winning percentage (49-25) on Monday night is the highest in the NFL.

But the Bears have won their past three against Pittsburgh.

Mike Tomlin is tied with Hall of Famer Bill Cowher for second on the Steelers' coaching victories list. Cowher went 149-90-1 from 1992-2006. Tomlin is 149-81-1 since replacing Cowher in 2007.

Houston (1-7) at Miami (1-7)

What could have been an intriguing matchup if a Deshaun Watson trade had gone through now is, well, the worst on the schedule — perhaps for the entire season and not just in Week 9. It's second NFL game involving two teams with 1-7 records: the other was Carolina against San Francisco in



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
