Mayor bans vaccine requirement 2020, and President Donald Trump's statement that "...a ma-

At the end of a three-hour city council meeting Tuesday evening, Big Spring Mayor Shannon Thomason issued an executive order, designated as "Executive Order ST-09," banning COVID-19 vaccination requirements for employment within the city. Citing his authority not only as may-

or, but as Emergency Management Coordinator for the city under state law, Thomason declared that the city will not require the vaccine for its employees, and also "No individual or entity operating within the corporate limits of the City of Big Spring shall compel or require a person to receive the CO-VID-19 vaccination as a condition of employment, or to receive any benefit to which they would otherwise be due."

The order goes on to ban vaccine requirements for employment on Big Spring city property, or by tenants on Big Spring city property.

According to the order, those violating it are subject to fines up to \$500, "...except that convictions for intentional, knowing, or reckless violation of rules and regulations issued pursuant to this chapter...shall be punishable by a fine not to exceed \$2,000.

The order was issued on Thomason's sole authority as mayor and – by state law – as Emergency Management Coordinator, with no input during the meeting given by other members of the city council. It cites Texas Governor Greg Abbott's declaration of disaster for the state in March of jor disaster exists in the State of Texas."

It was unknown at press time which, if any, Big Spring employers will be affected by the mayor's decree.

Following the meeting's invocation and Pledge of Allegiance, local resident Devvy Kidd addressed the council regarding the proliferation of stray dogs in some parts of Big

The resident said the proliferation of dogs was partly responsible for her decision to replace her lawn with artificial turf, because she felt the animals threatened her when she mowed the grass.

Howard County Commissioners will meet to canvas the results from the Nov. 2 election

Howard County Commissioners will meet at 10 a.m. Wednesday to canvass the results of the Nov. 2 general election. The meeting will take place in the second-floor Judge's Conference Room. According to the meeting's brief agenda, citizens may reg-

ister at the start of the meeting to offer public comments to the commissioners. Following any public comments, the commissioners will

canvass the election results, followed by an opportunity for commissioners to mention items to be considered during future meetings.

The sole Howard County item decided in the Nov. 2 election involved the creation of a Howard County Assistance District to allow the county to use tax funds to help fund items of public welfare.

According to unofficial results, the item failed, receiving

about 175 votes for to about 331 against.

Howard County Judge Kathryn Wiseman said the measure would have increased sales tax at businesses in unincorporated areas of Howard County by 2 cents, bringing it into line with sales tax paid inside city limits in the county.

"The whole goal was for us to help defray property tax," Wiseman said. "We were hoping to use those tax dollars to help repair our roads and keep them in better shape. Our roads have just been beaten to pieces. At one time we had something like \$68 million of damage to our roads, mostly from oilfield traffic. This small two-cent increase in tax in the unincorporated areas would have helped us get those roads repaired."

Wiseman said the increase would have also helped fund ambulance service in the county's unincorporated areas.

"We will put it back on the ballot as soon as possible, and try to do a better job of helping people to understand, out in the rural areas, what this sales tax would have meant in the county," she said.









The Forsan Marching Band caps off amazing year with performance at State

Council members approved on final reading an ordinance consolidating rules for Convention and Visitors Bureau board membership into Chapter Two of the Big Spring City Code as part of its ongoing campaign to standardize rules for all boards and committees and to collect them in a single chapter of the code.

The council also unanimously approved amendments to the measure changing requirements for members of the Chamber of Commerce board and the local hotel industry to be included on the CVB board to suggestions; and implementing a formula for event funding by the CVB.

The council tabled approval of vouchers to give Councilman Maury Smith (District 6) more time to

In New Business, the council acknowledged receipt of the CVB Board's Oct. 6 meeting minutes; as well as the Big Spring Economic Development Corporation Board's Sept. 21 minutes.

Big Spring EDC Director Mark Willis presented a proposal that the city participate in a planned Howard County Leadership Summit, in which various governmental and business groups will meet to discuss issues facing the area, and to foster communication and cooperation between local entities. Willis said plans are to include Howard County Commissioners, Big Spring ISD school board, Howard College, the EDC, and other local entities in the discussion, planned for Dec. 6 at Howard College's Dorothy Garrett Coliseum. The council unanimously approved participation in the event.

Willis also presented a resolution authorizing submission of a grant application to the U.S. Economic Development Administration for development of land west of the McMahon-Wrinkle Airpark. Willis said the EDC had applied for the \$5 million through the grant program previously, but was turned down. The new application is for \$1.25 million. Willis asked the city to authorize matching funds up to \$500,000. "I don't think it will be that much, but, because

this has been a moving target, I want to have enough cushion to get the maximum amount that we can," Willis said.

The council voted in favor of the measure 5-1, with Mayor Thomason dissenting. However, in order to be approved on an emergency basis, measurers must pass unanimously. The item will need to be brought back for a second reading at the next City Council meeting, scheduled just next week due to the Thanksgiving holiday.

The council unanimously approved casting its 414 votes to name Jordan Partee to the Howard County Appraisal District's board of directors. The council nominated Partee at a previous meeting.

The council unanimously approved funding restroom renovations at the city's Fire Station No. 2, up to \$25,000. Fire Chief Craig Ferguson noted that the city has received one bid of about \$22,000 on the project thus far.

Having approved consolidation of the CVB Board rules into Chapter 2 of the Big Spring City Code during the Old Business portion of the meeting, the council continued the consolidation campaign by unanimously approving rules for the Airpark Development Board and moving them into Chapter 2.

The council approved submission of a letter to Texas Communities Group LLC extending the city's agreement with that company, who provides collections services for the city, for one year.

The council unanimously approved adoption of a corrective warranty deed regarding easements on the property on East 10th and 11th streets.

During the council's canvass of the results of the Nov. 2 Charter Amendment election, council mem-

bers discovered numerous minor discrepancies between the results provided by Howard County Election Administrator Jodi Duck and the pre-printed ordinance provided by city staff. Vote totals on each of the city's 21 propositions which would have removed the requirement that City Council members post a bond upon being elected, was listed

Scoring down, home-field struggles among 1st half NFL trends

Scoring is down, home-field advantage hasn't returned even if the fans have, and the AFC could be in a wild race for playoff spots.

As the NFL gets set to start the second half of its 18-week season, there are a few notable statistical trends to pay attention to, with the two most notable being the reduction of scoring and home-team struggles.

Points per game have dropped by nearly two points per contest per team so far this season as a marked increase in offensive penalties and a small decrease in passing efficiency has taken a toll.

The average team is scoring 1.95 fewer points per game through nine weeks this season than in 2020, the third-biggest one-week drop through nine weeks since the merger. The only bigger ones came in 1991 (2.58 per game) and 1977 (1.97 per game).

One factor could be a big increase in offensive penalties with holding, false starts and delay of games all increasing from last year's pace. That has contributed to to a 35% increase in offensive penalties, while defensive penalties have remained flat.

While some of those pre-snap penalties could be because of the return of fans, the sold-out stadiums have not made life more difficult overall for road teams and reversed the trend from last season when home teams had a losing record (127-128-1) for the first time since the merger. Instead, road teams have gotten even better in 2021, finishing the first

played in London when the designated "home" team won. This trend started in 2019, when home teams posted a .518 winning percentage for the lowest mark in the NFL since 1972.

Here are some others:

JAM-PACKED AFC

The standings are tight at the top of the AFC with nine teams with exactly five wins, including all four in the AFC West.

Tennessee (7-2) and Baltimore (6-2) sit at the top of the conference, but the 11 teams with winning records through nine weeks matches the most in NFL history. The only other time that happened was in 2014.

That season ended with six AFC teams getting double-digit wins and four missing the playoffs despite posting winning records. ROOKIE QBs

With five quarterbacks selected in the first round of the draft in April, rookie quarterbacks figured to be a story line in 2021.

Three of them stepped in as Week 1 starters, with No. 1 pick Trevor Lawrence getting the job in Jacksonville, No. 2 pick Zach Wilson taking over for the Jets and No. 15 pick Mac Jones winning the job in New

No. 11 pick Justin Fields became the starter in Week 3 for Chicago, while No. 3 pick Trey Lance and third-rounder Davis Mills have gotten starts because of injuries to starters in San Francisco and Houston.

In all, the rookies have made 34 starts for the second-most ever through nine weeks of a non-strike season, compared to the 41 in 2012 in a class headlined by Andrew Luck, Russell Wilson and Robert Griffin III.

While that trio made the playoffs as rookie starters, only Jones has his team in position for a playoff spot at the midpoint this season.

The rookies have combined for a 10-27 record as starters, with Jones earning half the wins. Lawrence, Wilson, Fields and Mills have four of the worst six passer ratings among 33 qualified QBs.

ALL OR NOTHING

The increase in fourth-down tries to a record pace so far this season have made both comebacks more prevalent and blowouts more com-

There have been a record-tying 41 games won by teams that trailed in the fourth quarter so far this season, matching the most through Week θ , previously done in both 1989 and 2012.

There have been a record 35 games with the winning score coming in the final two minutes of regulation or overtime, and 13 that have gone to an extra period, tied for the fourth most.

The willingness of coaches to go for it on fourth down has helped lead to many of those thrilling finishes, but when that strategy doesn't work, it can lead to more lopsided results. That has contributed to the 24 games decided by more than 21 points, the second-most through nine weeks in the past 40 years, after 26 in 2009.

TURNROUND TEAMS

Six teams have already matched or exceeded their 2020 win total, led by Dallas, which has gone from 6-10 a year ago to 6-2 this season.

The Bengals (5-4) have already won one more game than last season and are in the playoff hunt in the AFC, and Atlanta (4-4) is currently in seventh position in the NFC after a 4-12 mark in 2020.

The other one of those teams in contention is the Broncos, who at 5-4 have matched last season's win total.

Accused of assaulting ex, Vikes' Cook says she assaulted him

MINNEAPOLIS — Minnesota Vikings star Dalvin Cook is facing a lawsuit from a former girlfriend for alleged assault, battery and false imprisonment for a year-ago altercation at his home, the Star Tribune reported Tuesday, and the fifth-year running back is accusing the woman of assaulting and extorting

Cook's attorney, David Valentini, said the woman, a U.S. Army sergeant, unlawfully entered Cook's home, assaulted him and has been trying to settle her claim for "millions of dollars."

According to details from the lawsuit that were reported by the Star Tribune, the woman traveled to Cook's home near Vikings headquarters to end their relationship on Nov. 19, 2020. She said Cook was angered by her request that he help her gather her belongings. She said Cook then "grabbed her arm, and slung her whole body over the couch, slamming her face into the coffee table and causing her lower forehead and the bridge of her nose to bust open."

The Star Tribune also reported the lawsuit, which was filed in Dakota County District Court, includes as evidence messages sent from Cook to the woman after the fight apologizing for his actions. She said she suffered a concussion, deep cuts to her face and other bruising.

In a statement sent to The Associated Press and other media outlets, Valentini said Cook had the legal right to defend himself per Minnesota's castle doctrine. He said the woman entered Cook's home with a stolen garage door opener, punched him and sprayed mace in his face without provocation. The

woman also sprayed mace on two guests of Cook's, Valentini said, and forced the three of them at gunpoint to remain in his home for "several hours."





In 1775, the U.S. Marines were organized under authority of the Continental Congress

In 1871, journalist-explorer Henry M. Stanley found Scottish missionary David Livingstone, who had not been heard from for years, near Lake Tanganyika in central Africa.

In 1919, the American Legion opened its first national convention in Minneapolis

In 1928, Hirohito (hee-rohhee-toh) was enthroned as Emperor of Japan.

In 1944, during World War II, the ammunition ship USS Mount Hood (AE-11) exploded while moored at the Manus Naval Base in the Admiralty Islands in the South Pacific, leaving 45 confirmed dead and 327 missing and presumed dead.

In 1969, the children's educational program "Sesame Street" made its debut on National Educational Television (later

In 1975, the U.N. General Assembly approved a resolution equating Zionism with racism (the world body repealed the resolution in Dec. 1991).

In 2009, John Allen Muhammad, mastermind of the 2002 sniper attacks that killed 10 in the Washington, D.C. region, was executed. President Barack Obama visited Fort Hood, Texas, where he somberly saluted the 13 Americans killed in a shooting rampage, and pledged that the killer would be "met with justice — in this world, and the next."

One year ago: Democrat Cal Cunningham conceded defeat

to Republican Thom Tillis in their North Carolina Senate race; Democrats would now have to win both runoff races in Georgia in January in order to seize Senate control. (The Democrats would win both.) The U.S. hit a record number of coronavirus hospitalizations and surpassed 1 million new confirmed cases in just the first 10 days of November amid a nationwide surge of infections. A Vatican investigation found that bishops, cardinals and popes downplayed or dismissed reports of sexual misconduct by former Cardinal Theodore McCarrick; much of the blame went to Pope John Paul II, who appointed McCarrick archbishop of Washington, D.C. in 2000 despite an investigation that confirmed he had slept with seminarians. 

Roadrunners bask in dream season after taking a few chances

SAN ANTONIO — No. 15 UTSA is enjoying a dream season after trusting in what could be when few others were as hopeful. Basking in a 9-0 start and the first national ranking in the program's 10-year

history, the Roadrunners are rolling ahead of Saturday's home game against Southern Mississippi. "I'd be lying if I didn't say this is almost surreal, a dream," coach Jeff Tray-

lor said. "Enjoy these moments. These are special moments. We'll look back in time one day and go, 'Wow, that was an incredible ride.' I hope we've got many, many more of those in front of us."

How the Roadrunners are accomplishing this dream is a tale of taking some chances.

UTSA hired Lisa Campos, whose career began in student affairs, as the program's fifth athletic director in 2018. Campos is one of only two Latinas among the nation's 130 FBS schools running a Division I athletics department.

"Being in San Antonio, this is about being a role model to the youth here and across the nation that we have a responsibility to," Campos said.

Her first major move was trusting her instincts and hiring Traylor, a relatively unknown commodity, as the team's third head coach.

Traylor had coached in five state championships at Gilmer (Texas) High School, winning three state titles and 12 district titles and going 175-26 in 15 years. He then had a successful career as an assistant coach at Texas, SMU and Arkansas before joining UTSA in December 2019.

His previous success was not enough for some of the university's existing fan base and casual observers, who wanted a known commodity like former Miami coach Larry Coker, the Roadrunners first head coach.

"I wish I would have saved some of the messages and some of the social media from two years ago when I made that hire," Campos said, chuckling. "There were definitely some folks who didn't see what I saw, who didn't know Jeff. They hadn't connected with him."

The biggest risk was taken by a growing list of local football standouts who decided to remain in San Antonio rather than join more established programs. Junior linebacker Rashad Wisdom of nearby Converse said he kept a low profile as a freshman athlete while working toward his major in cybersecu-

"I'm new, so I'm not really saying anything," Wisdom recalled. "People were in there (a class he was attending), 'Are you going to the football game?' I remember like it was yesterday, one girl was like, 'Ah, no. Our football team sucks.' I was like, 'Man!'"

Wisdom can laugh after facing some initial criticism for choosing the school with nearly 35,000 students in Texas' largest city.

"Now, everybody loves talking about UTSA football and say they love going to UTSA," Wisdom said.

In the past three months, UTSA has opened a \$40.4 million athletic training facility, upset Illinois for its first victory against a Big Ten school, has the

best start in school history, is bowl eligible for the second straight season, received its first national ranking and announced last month that it will soon join the American Athletic Conference.

players and staff was Campos' announcement that Traylor had signed a 10-

year extension worth \$28 million amid rumors that he might leave for a more established program.

"Jeff is a builder," Campos said. "He's a builder of culture. He's a builder of aspirations and belief. That team is totally behind him, believing in what they can do."

To hear Traylor tell it, he simply stumbled into something.

"I'm so thrilled for my kids, my players," Traylor said. "It just makes me feel so good for them. They are the ones that deserve all this. I'm just so happy for them."

Truth is, the 53-yearold Traylor has elevated the program at a faster pace than its mascot. UTSA has consecutive winning seasons under Traylor after being above .500 only once in the six seasons prior to his arrival.

Traylor has implemented the "Triangle of sists of offense, defense and special teams but also represents a culture of toughness and commitment that UTSA's other athletic programs are adopting.
