years as the head of the Big Spring Herald's Editorial Department, Duforat has taken a job teaching journalism in Forsan rather than working directly in the trade, although she will still be contributing to the paper's front page upon occsion. Pope has been leading the Herald's

sports offerings since February of this year, and will continue to do so in his new role as Managing Editor. "Amanda was probably the best boss

that I've worked under," Pope said. "The way that she took me in, basically off of the streets, and taught me the right way to write, taught me how to lay out articles, taught me how to do the job correctly...I'll never be able to repay her for that. After we found out she was leaving, the knowledge that she's given me...and she still helps me out. It's amazing. I'll never be able to thank her enough. She's done great, and she'll be deeply missed here. I won't be able to fill her shoes." Pope was born in Odessa, and grew up

in Crane. "Lived in Crane my whole life," he said.

"After I left school, I was in the military for almost 15 years. I've been all over the place. I was in the Navy. After that, I moved back home, back to the Crane/ Odessa area. I kind of moved back and forth." Prior to coming to the Herald, he had oil-

field jobs, and also worked in a different branch of journalism. "As far as writing goes, it was all for dai-

ly fantasy sports," he said. "Maybe some betting articles from time to time.' Pope - who wrote articles for fantasy

sports websites Draft Kings and FanDuel – explained that fantasy sports is a pastime enjoyed by many, who use sports statistics to group players into imaginary teams, and then score points based on those players' performances each week.

"Basically what you do there is you build a fantasy lineup each and every week. Every player has a salary according to how good they are, and you have a \$50,000 salary cap that you have to stay under. You can't just pick all the good players. You get points for their production on the field," he said. "So what we would do is, we'd try to go and predict what they were going to do for that week, and give you the best salary advice, give you the best value advice. If we thought that maybe a \$4,000 guy was going to get a touchdown...had been getting more playing time under the radar. All that came from just watching game film. This was a few years ago, back before all the websites had all the stats. Back then it was just grinding it out, watching game film all day long."

Pope said he's enjoyed his time at the Herald so far, and looks forward to delving into the editor's job.

"It's been a learning experience. I love covering sports. I love getting to know the players and the coaches from the area. That's one thing that will never change, is the love for sports," he said. "Other than my family, that's what I love the

most. It's fun. It's a good way to get to know people. A lot of people care about sports, so it opens up a lot of conversations. A lot of people want to know how a certain team's doing, or what I think about that week.' As Pope gets his feet wet in the

new position, he said he plans to stay the course laid out by Dufo-"Basically we're going to keep

the ball rolling. I believe in 'Don't fix what's not broken." he said. "Obviously with new people in charge, there's going to be maybe some slight changes, but Amanda's already set a good path. We're



Imagine after several busy days you stumble across the news feed on your phone. You suddenly realize that you have not been keeping up with what's going on in the world. Immediately, you begin skimming through the headlines, looking for articles that catch your interest, moving from one article to the next trying to cram as much information as you can in a few minutes until the light turns green again. Get off your phone!

The truth is that many of us are so busy we attempt to grasp as much information as we can in fleeting free moments during our day. That is what we call informational reading. Reading simply to cram as much information between our ears as possible. Some of us got really good at cramming before a test in school, only to immediately forget that information when it was no longer needed for

Now imagine that you are holding a hand written letter from a close friend or family member who lives far away. Someone you haven't heard from in a long time. Someone you deeply love. What would you be anticipating when you get to this letter? How would you read it differently than the news article? You might want to find an unhurried time that you could sit down with limited distractions to soak in these words. Reading this letter might cause you to slow down, savor the words and phrases written specifically to you – this is what I call relational reading. You feel connected to the one who wrote the letter. Information may still be communicated, but it is personal and relational in nature.

Spiritual reading is relational and personal. There may be new information, but the purpose is not gathering information. The purpose of the Word is formation and transformation. We're not concerned with speed or volume, but with depth and receptivity. D. L. Moody said, "The Bible was not given to increase our knowledge; it was given to change our lives." If the purpose of our reading is to be addressed by God Himself, then we need to be listening for what God is saying to us with a heart willing to respond.



Reflections: Power of Encouragement

Believe It or Not

"Believe" is an interesting word. Sometimes we use it to indicate doubt. If we are not entirely certain of something, we will say, "I believe so." For instance, if someone asks, "Are your friends joining us for dinner?" We will say, "I believe so." Meaning, I think they are, but I am not quite sure.

Sometimes we use "believe" to indicate our agreement. If you point to an airplane and ask, "Do you believe this is an airplane?" I might say, "Yes, I believe that is an airplane."

At other times we use the word "believe" to indicate our confidence in someone. We could also use this term with respect to the pilot of the airplane. We could believe in him, meaning we have confidence he can fly the airplane.

The word translated "believe" in the Bible actually means "faith." We don't have a verb form of "faith" in our language. We cannot say, "I faith you." We are left with our word "believe." In this case, if we believe in the airplane and the pilot, we must climb aboard the airplane, follow instructions, and actually fly in it. We trust both the airplane and the pilot to take us aloft thousands of feet in the air.

The "faith" meaning of the word changes how we understand key passages in the Bible. For instance, when Jesus says, "I am the resurrection and the life. He who believes in me shall never die," he is actually saying, "I am the resurrection and the life. He who puts his trust and absolute faith in me shall never die."

There are many who "believe" in Christ and "believe" they are Christians. They use the term like the first example. They are not quite sure, but they think it might be true, or hope it is. Then there are others who "believe" according to the second definition. They

give mental assent believing that Jesus is the Son of God, but it doesn't make much difference in their lives.

Still others fall into the third category. They believe in Jesus in the sense that they have confidence in who he claims to be. They think he is a good person, that he spoke the truth, that he would get their vote among the other religious leaders in history.

But moving into a faith relationship with Jesus Christ requires the New Testament kind of "believing." We must trust Him with our lives. In this case we don't have to understand or know everything, just like we don't have to understand or know everything about flight and airplanes to fly. When the Bible says, "Believe on the Lord Jesus Christ and you shall be saved," it means more than wishful thinking, mental assent or even having confidence in Christ. It means we must place our complete faith and trust in Jesus Christ. Like flying, we must follow His instructions and trust Him. If we do this, He will save us.

We demonstrate this "faith" kind of believing by doing what He says. (Matthew 7:24-27; John 14:15). We live according to His Kingdom that is ruled by kindness, gentleness, thoughtfulness, humility, hope and love. (Colossians

After a couple of plays there, Steers got called for a big face mask on a third-down that gave Riv-

erside a first down and, more importantly, 15 yards and some room. The Rangers didn't waste the opportunity as they drove the ball right down the field and eventually scored from eight yards out for the game's first points. With:45 seconds left in the first quarter Riverside had a 7-0 lead. This is where things went from bad to worse for the Steers. After a lousy kickoff return, the Steers started their third drive on their 15-yard line. Two plays later, the Riverside defense made a huge play as they got another interception on a tipped ball and ran it in for a touchdown making this a 14-0 lead. In a matter of 20 seconds, the whole dynamic of this game had changed. After that crazy few seconds, the score was now 14-0 at the end of the first quarter.

As the second quarter began, the Steers now knew they needed to score and do so quickly to stay in this game. Baeza and this offense got right back to work as they moved the ball down the fie field, and it seemed as though they might have found their rhythm. After an excellent play from Baez to Cobos moved the ball down to the 12-yard line. Padron tried his best to get this Steers offense in a grove, but Big Spring had to punt again. The Steers defense held Riverside again as they continued to look pretty good against an excellent team. The Steers finally broke through and scored a touchdown on a nice Cobos run to make this a 14-7 game with 2:58 left in the first half. El Paso would tack on three more points right at the end of the second quarter to make this a 17-7 lead at halftime.







1. Two notrump. Partner's onenotrump rebid over one spade is ambiguous. It might range from a poor six-point hand without spade or club support to a moderate hand with as many as 10 points. By raising to two notrump, you indicate a relatively balanced hand containing about 16 to 18 high-card points, and thus invite partner to carry on to three notrump.

Two clubs over one notrump would fail to identify your 17-high card points, while a jump to three clubs would show your point count, but would misrepresent the length and strength of your club suit.

2. Three spades. With 17 high-card points and two strong fivecard suits, you should express your game prospects vociferously. The jump-rebid describes your high-card strength and distribution at the same time.

By rebidding your spades, you indicate five cards in that suit. Part-

3. Three hearts. You should press hard for game despite your three-card trump support (partner will know you have only three hearts, since you would have raised immediately with four-card support). A two-heart bid would be proper if you had a king less; as it is, though, you can show your actual values with the three-heart bid. Partner can then carry on to game in hearts if he has five of them, or retreat to three notrump if he has only a

4. Two diamonds. Your diamonds are certainly not hefty, but the situation calls for identification of your distribution. Partner should now read you for 4-0-4-5 distribution and should be able to make the appropriate decision as to the best

You don't jump-rebid here because, after partner's one-heart response, there is a distinct possibility that no satisfactory trump fit exists, in which case there might be no game. At the same time, though, the fact that you elected to bid all three suits implies a good hand and urges partner to continue bidding.





316th day of 2021. There are 49 days left in the year. Today's Highlight in History:

On Nov. 12, 1942, the World War II naval Battle of Guadalcanal began. (The Allies ended up winning a major victory over Japanese forces.)

On this date:

In 1920, baseball got its first "czar" as Judge Kenesaw Mountain Landis was elected commissioner of the American and National Leagues.

In 1927, Josef Stalin became the undisputed ruler of the Soviet Union as Leon Trotsky was expelled from the Communist Party.

In 1936, the San Francisco-Oakland Bay Bridge opened as President Franklin D. Roosevelt pressed a telegraph key in Washington, D.C., giving

In 1948, former Japanese pre-mier Hideki Tojo and several other World War II Japanese leaders were sentenced to death by a war crimes tribunal.

In 1969, news of the My Lai (mee ly) Massacre carried out by U.S. forces in South Vietnam in March 1968 was broken by investigative reporter Seymour Hersh

In 1975, Supreme Court Justice William O. Douglas retired because of failing health, ending a record 36-year

In 1982, Yuri V. Andropov (ahn-DROH'-pawf) was elected to succeed the late Leonid I. Brezhnev as general secretary of the Soviet Communist Party's Central Committee.

In 1987, the American Medical Association issued a policy statement saying it was to treat someone solely because that person had AIDS or was HIV-positive.

In 1996, a Saudi Boeing 747 jetliner collided shortly after takeoff from New Delhi, India, with a Kazak Ilyushin (il-YOO'shin)-76 cargo plane, killing 349 people.

In 2001, American Airlines Flight 587, an Airbus A300 headed to the Dominican Republic, crashed after take off from New York's John F. Kennedy International Airport, killing all 260 people on board and five people on the ground.

In 2009, Army psychia-trist Maj. Nidal Malik Hasan (nih-DAHL' mah-LEEK' hah-SAHN') was charged with 13 counts of premeditated murder in the Fort Hood, Texas, shooting rampage. (Hasan was later convicted and sentenced to death; no execution date has

In 2019, Venice saw its worst flooding in more than 50 years

with the water reaching 6.14 feet above average sea level; damage was estimated in the hundreds of millions of dollars.

Ten years ago: President Barack Obama met separately with the leaders of Russia and China on the sidelines of a Pacific Rim economic summit in his native Hawaii. Italian Premier Silvio Berlusconi resigned, ending a political era and setting in motion a transition aimed at bringing the country back from the brink of economic crisis. In a surprisingly sharp move, the Arab League voted to suspend Syria over the country's bloody crackdown on protesters and stepped up calls on the army to stop killing civilians.

Five years ago: Tens of thousands of people marched in streets across the United States, staging the fourth day of protests against Donald Trump's surprise victory as president. Hundreds of thousands of people flooded the streets of Seoul (sohl), South Korea, demanding the resigna

tion of President Park Geunhye (goon-hay) amid an explosive political scandal.

One year ago: The Cybersecurity and Infrastructure Security Agency, a broad coalition of top government and industry officials, rejected President Donald Trump's claims of election fraud, saying that the elec-tion was "the most secure in American history" and that there was "no evidence that any voting system deleted or lost votes, changed votes or was in any way compromised." Federal health officials reached an agreement with pharmacies across the U.S. to distribute free coronavirus vaccines once the vaccines were approved and available. Atlanta Braves first baseman Freddie Freeman easily won the National League MVP award, while Chicago White Sox slugger José Abreu was chosen as the AL MVP.


