

## Council to consider grants Tuesday

### Meeting to be held early due to Thanksgiving

The Big Spring City Council will hold its second regular meeting of November Tuesday, just a week following its last meeting, due to the Thanksgiving holiday next week.

The council will meet at 5:30 p.m. in the City Council Chambers, 307 W. Fourth St. Members of the public may attend the meeting in person, or watch it via Local Channel 17 through Suddenlink, or on the city website at mybigspring.com/224/Channel-17-Live.

During the meeting, the council will consider three resolutions authorizing grant applications.

First, in Old Business, the council



will consider on final reading a resolution authorizing submission of an application for an Economic Development Administration grant for \$1,250,000 for water and system expansion in the area west of the McMahan-Wrinkle Airpark. The item was on the agenda of the council's Nov. 9 meeting as an emergency item, meaning it could be passed in a single vote if it received unanimous approval, but received one dissenting vote – cast by Mayor Shannon Thomason – and so could not be passed without a vote at a second meeting.

Second, a resolution authorizing application for the Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grant Program, "...to secure funding for department operations/media data management network services..." according to the meeting's agenda. The resolution provided with the agenda indicates that the grant is to purchase two "...Network Attached Storage (NAS) servers that will contain

The newly constructed Howard County Courthouse and jail opened its doors on January 17, 1954. The Architect for the courthouse was Olan Puckett. He proclaimed that the new jail was escape

proof. Puckett said, "If an ambitious prisoner sawed constantly for 28 days and wore out 10,000 hacksaw blades on the job, he would get just 1-16th of an inch into one of the bars in Howard County's new jail." Puckett continued, "There won't be any digging through the jail floor or ceiling either. Embedded in the waterproof concrete floor and roof are thick networks of the same kind of steel the bars are made of."

Mr. Puckett ever heard of the "unsinkable Titanic?" It may have been coincidental that David Leach made the headlines for his capture and arrest in

a total of 35 16 TB SATA hard drives..." increasing the police department's media storage capacity from 11.7 terabytes (TB) to 192 TB,"... thereby ensuring data storage for many years to come..."

The city is seeking \$20,020 through the grant, which is not matched by any funds from the city.

The third grant under consideration requires an emergency reading and would authorize an application to the Body-Worn Camera Grant Program for fiscal year 2022. The agenda item lists the purpose of the grant as "...to secure funding for Police Department digital storage needs and other technology items related to body-worn cameras...". The resolution related to the grant application indicates that "...the grant will be used for a server, software, two

outdoor antenna kits, remote setup, installation, and a hardware printer for body worn camera footage..." and that the total value of the grant will be \$37,697.50. The grant requires that the city match the award with 25 percent, or \$9,424.38.

The meeting will start, as always, with a Call to Order, invocation and Pledge of Allegiance, followed by a time for public comment.

Next, City Manager Todd Darden will offer his report, which will include an update on the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) for the Downtown Revitalization Program; a report on the Big Sandy Landfill Excellence Award; a word about the Thanksgiving Holiday, scheduled Nov. 25 and 26; and a reminder about the local Summit Meeting to be held at 6:30 p.m. Dec. 6 at Howard College's Dorothy Garrett Coliseum.

The council will consider a four-item Consent Agenda, including approval of the Nov. 9 City Council

meeting minutes; final reading of a resolution to cast the city's 414 votes to elect Jordan Partee to the Howard County Joint Tax Appraisal District Board of Directors; final reading of an ordinance amending the city budget to fund bathroom renovations for Fire Station No. 2; and final reading of an ordinance moving rules governing the Airpark Development Board into Chapter 2 of the Big Spring City Code, as part of the city's ongoing campaign to organize all the city's committee and board rules into a single chapter of the code.

After the vote on the Economic Development Administration grant proposal in Old Business, the council will consider vouchers tabled at the previous Council meeting: for Oct. 28 in the amount of \$513,660.62 and for Nov. 4 in the amount of \$1,792,678.14; and new vouchers for Nov. 12 in the amount of \$919,128.46.

In new business the council will acknowledge receipt of the Planning

and Zoning Committee meeting minutes from Sept. 7.

It will discuss authorizing City Manager Darden to negotiate a ground lease near Building 1 at the McMahon-Wrinkle Airpark with Computer North.

Next, the council will consider the other two grant applications mentioned previously.

A resolution authorizing selection of a Professional Service Provider for the Coronavirus Local Fiscal Recovery Fund (CLFRF) programs through the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 is the next item of up for consideration, followed by consideration of another resolution to amend the city budget to fund replacement of the boiler in the Municipal Auditorium.

At the end of New Business, each council member present will have the opportunity to provide input on miscellaneous matters before the meeting is adjourned.

Colorado City on the same day that the new Courthouse was featured in the Big Spring Herald and being touted as an escape proof facility or perhaps it was a challenge for Leach. A chance to snub his nose at the law officials he couldn't seem to escape from otherwise.

On Tuesday, March 16, 1954, just two short months after Puckett made that statement, five prisoners broke out of the "Tool Proof/Escape Proof" jail.

The prisoners escaped by ripping out a section of

bars in Cell Block No. 1 and then chiseling through masonry under the north window on the fourth floor of the courthouse. The only "tools" they used were a piece of metal that had been found and a 4x4 block of wood. Once they broke through, the prisoners swung to the ground on a rope device made from mattress covers. The old sandstone courthouse had not been torn down and helped block the view as the prisoner's made their escape down from the fourth floor. There were other inmates being held at the jail on misdemeanor charges. They wisely chose not to run with the escapees. Leach was the ringleader in the escape plan. He had previously managed to escape the Colorado City and

Stanton jails. He mastered being an escape artist however, his escape plan never worked accordingly, and he always got caught.

Two of the five escaped prisoners were caught almost immediately after the jail break. The other two were caught the following day. Leach remained on the loose for two more days before he was apprehended on the banks of the Colorado River where he was camping in a tent.

Inmates, Thompson, Springer, Hendrix and Leach were sentenced to prison and transferred to Huntsville. The fifth escapee, Thomas Taylor, was not subject for indictment as he had never been convicted of a felony in Texas.

### Prescott, Cowboys back on track with 43-3 rout of Falcons

ARLINGTON, Texas — Dak Prescott and the Dallas Cowboys had already answered their worst showing of the season when the star quarterback took off on a fourth-down scramble near the goal line.

The powerful punctuating touchdown finished a blowout of Atlanta on Sunday.

Prescott also threw for two TDs, Ezekiel Elliott scored twice and Nahshon Wright recovered a blocked punt in the end zone a week after touching one kept Dallas from getting the ball as the Cowboys rolled to a 43-3 win.

"Last week just wasn't us," said Prescott, who ran through linebacker Mykal Walker at the goal line on his 4-yard TD even though he already had the first down. "Everybody in our locker room knows that. It left a bad taste in our mouth. I think it's a taste we needed in a sense to understand how tough this game is."

Plenty of things that went wrong for the Cowboys in last week's blowout loss to Denver that ended a six-game winning streak went right to help the NFC East leaders get back on track.

Offensive execution was among them, starting when coach Mike McCarthy tried to send a message by taking the ball to start the game instead of deferring after Dallas won the coin toss.

The Cowboys (7-2) looked much more like the NFL's No. 1 offense with Prescott throwing the first of two TD passes to CeeDee Lamb on the opening drive and Elliott finishing two others kept alive by fourth-down conversions, all before halftime.

"We had to go out there and set the tone," said Elliott, who was otherwise quiet with 41 yards on 14 carries. "You know we wanted the ball, we wanted to hit them in the mouth first, we wanted to go score first, and that's what we did."

The first half ended with a sequence that led to the highest-scoring quarter in franchise history (29 points in the second) and Dallas' biggest half-time lead (36-3) since 1971.

Dorance Armstrong's one-armed block of

Dustin Colquitt's punt was recovered by Wright in the end zone with 37 seconds remaining in the first half. A week earlier again Denver, Wright touched a blocked punt past the line of scrimmage without securing the loose ball, and the Broncos recovered to retain possession.

Atlanta (4-5) had 12 men on the field for the extra point, so the Cowboys went for the 2-point conversion from the 1. Elliott added another plunge across the goal line.

Matt Ryan led the Falcons to the Dallas 20 in just four plays on their first possession before settling for a field goal. Ryan didn't get that deep into Cowboys territory again, threw two interceptions — including Trevon Diggs' NFL-leading eighth — and was pulled before the end of the third quarter with Atlanta down 43-3.

Prescott was 24 of 31 for 296 yards before sitting in the fourth quarter, while Ryan finished with a 21.4 rating. He was 9 of 21 for 117 yards with the Falcons coming off a 27-25 win over New Orleans that was their first victory in four games.

"I think you understand it just counts once," Ryan said. "As ugly as it is, we get 17 of these opportunities. I think we're better than we played today. We just need to play up to the standard that we're capable of doing."

Elliott's first touchdown was a 1-yarder five plays after Prescott's 21-yard pass to Lamb on fourth-and-5. The two-time rushing champ's 2-yard score came the play after Prescott scrambled on fourth-and-3 and found Michael Gallup along the sideline for 23 yards in the first game for Gallup (calf strain) since the opener.

The Falcons were moving again the second time they had the ball before facing a fourth-and-7. Atlanta passed on a 50-yard field goal try, and Dallas cornerback Jourdan Lewis had the second of consecutive pass breakups.

A little more than a quarter later, the Falcons were down 28-3.

"We wanted to be aggressive coming in here," coach Arthur Smith said. "I know it was fourth-and-7, but looking at it at that point of the game, we knew what kind of offense we were playing on

the other side, so I made a decision to be aggressive. Obviously, hindsight's 20-20."

QUINN'S REUNION

Dallas defensive coordinator Dan Quinn was on the same field with the Falcons for the first time since they fired him as coach after an 0-5 start last season. He took breaks from his pregame workout routine in the stadium to greet members of the Atlanta staff while also greeting Ryan and owner Arthur Blank.

The Cowboys held the Falcons to season worsts in first downs (11) and third-down conversions (1 of 11). With 214 yards, Atlanta had just 1 more than its season low.

"Credit to him and credit to their defense," said Ryan, who was sacked twice. "I thought he did a great job of putting those guys in position to be successful and their guys made plays."

NFL DEBUT AT 31

Cowboys kicker Lirim Hajrullahu made his NFL debut at age 31 with Greg Zuerlein on the COVID-19 list.

McCarthy was worried about the former CFL kicker keeping the ball away from dangerous return man Cordarrelle Patterson lurking. But Hajrullahu got touchbacks on all six of his kickoffs and made all five PATs.

Opening lead — king of clubs.  
Italy won its first world open team title since 1975 by defeating Brazil in the final of the 1988 Rosenblum Teams.

The Italians had an easy time of it in the 96-deal final, downing the Brazilians by 79 International Match Points.

Today's deal, just the fourth of the match, helped the Italians race to a 36-IMP lead from which the Brazilians never recovered. The auction shown took place at the table where Gabriel Chagas and Marcelo Branco were North-South for Brazil against Andrea Buratti and Massimo Lanzarotti.

After Branco opened two diamonds (weak) and Buratti over-called with two hearts, Chagas decided to put maximum pressure on the opponents by leaping to five diamonds. There were three ways (albeit all unlikely) he could win with this action: his side might make five diamonds; East-West might be able to make five clubs; or East-West might be stampeded into taking a losing action, such as bidding five hearts.

As it was, Buratti doubled five diamonds and led the king of clubs. Upon seeing the singleton club in dummy, he switched to a trump. Branco won in his hand and led a heart, but Buratti put up the king and returned another trump. This left declarer with four losers — a heart, a spade and two clubs — and he finished down two for -500.

At the other table, the bidding went:

South	West	North	East
Pass	1♥	Pass	Pass
2♦	Dble	3♦	3♠

Two marginal misjudgments by the Brazilian East-West pair landed them in a six-card spade fit instead of their nine-card club fit. Three spades went down three for a loss of 300 points. Combined with the 500-point loss at the other table, this gave the Italians a gain of 800 points, or 13 IMPs.

## Petty Uncle Won't Return Our Belongings

Dear Annie: My uncle has a reputation for being extremely cheap, but he did something recently that has left me fuming.

He called my husband and asked to borrow a pair of acetylene tanks, which are used for welding projects, after he found out we had them in our garage. These tanks belong to my dad, but they have been stored at our house while not in use for a few years. The tanks include a torch, gauges, hoses and other accessories.

After some back and forth texting, my uncle said that he needed to exchange the tanks before filling them, which also cost him more money.

My husband made it clear that we had no intention of reimbursing him for the gas he refilled; he can return them empty to us. My husband also told him that he did not have our permission to exchange

our tanks anyway. Then, my husband asked when he can expect to have the tanks returned, and my uncle said it could take up to a year for him to use up the gas.

My husband reminded him that we let him borrow the tanks for a short-term project he needed. "I'm not going to wait a year to get my belongings back, and I'm also not going to pay you to get them back."

My uncle hasn't told us when he plans on returning them, and we now need them.

This uncle is the pettiest person we've ever met, and we don't care about maintaining any relationship with him. He is a careless, selfish human being. We just want our tanks back! Please suggest how to go about this. -- Dealing with a Petty Uncle

Dear Dealing: You could take him to small claims court, and you'd have a good chance of

winning. I would consider that option seriously. At the same time, don't let his pettiness and cruelty drag you down.

Without question, you are right, and he is wrong. You should not have to drive to get them back and pay him money, but if you really want the tanks back, that might be the fastest way to retrieve them. He sounds like a very unhappy person, and when dealing with that type of person, the best way forward is to have compassion for them and focus on your own happiness. But never lend him anything again. Period.

## Today in History

Today is Monday, Nov. 15, the 319th day of 2021. There are 46 days left in the year.

**Today's Highlight in History:**

On Nov. 15, 1942, the naval Battle of Guadalcanal ended during World War II with a decisive U.S. victory over Japanese forces.

On this date:

In 1777, the Second Continental Congress approved the Articles of Confederation.

In 1806, explorer Zebulon Pike sighted the mountaintop now known as Pikes Peak in present-day Colorado.

In 1864, during the Civil War, Union forces led by Maj. Gen. William Tecumseh (teh-KUM'-seh) Sherman began their "March to the

Sea" from Atlanta; the campaign ended with the capture of Savannah on Dec. 21.

In 1889, Brazil was proclaimed a republic as its emperor, Dom Pedro II, was overthrown.

In 1937, at the U.S. Capitol, members of the House and Senate met in air-conditioned chambers for the first time.

In 1939, President Franklin D. Roosevelt laid the cornerstone of the Jefferson Memorial in Washington, D.C.

In 1959, four members of the Clutter family of Holcomb, Kansas, were found murdered in their home. (Ex-convicts Richard Hickock and Perry Smith were later convicted of the killings and hanged in a case made famous by the Truman Capote book "In

Cold Blood.")

In 1966, the flight of Gemini 12, the final mission of the Gemini program, ended successfully as astronauts James A. Lovell and Edwin "Buzz" Aldrin Jr. splashed down safely in the Atlantic after spending four days in orbit.

In 1969, a quarter of a million protesters staged a peaceful demonstration in Washington against the Vietnam War.

In 1989, Time Warner launched The Comedy Channel, which later merged with Viacom's HA! network to form Comedy Central.

In 2003, two Black Hawk helicopters collided and crashed in Iraq; 17 U.S. troops were killed.

In 2019, Roger Stone, a longtime friend and ally of President Donald Trump, was convicted of all seven counts in a federal indict-

ment accusing him of lying to Congress, tampering with a witness and obstructing the House investigation of whether Trump coordinated with Russia during the 2016 campaign. (As Stone was about to begin serving a 40-month prison sentence, Trump commuted the sentence.)

Ten years ago: Hundreds of police officers in riot gear raided the Occupy Wall Street encampment in New York City in the pre-dawn darkness, evicting hundreds of protesters and then demolishing the tent city. Justin Verlander of the Detroit Tigers breezed to the AL Cy Young Award in a unanimous vote.







Five years ago: President Barack Obama, opening his final overseas trip while in office, acknowledged in Athens, Greece, that he was surprised by Donald Trump's victory, and said it stemmed from deep-seated anxieties among working-

class Americans that the government needed to do better to address. Speaker Paul Ryan unanimously won his GOP colleagues' votes for another term at the helm of the House.

One year ago: President Donald Trump's campaign withdrew a central part of its lawsuit seeking to stop the certification of election results in Pennsylvania, won by Joe Biden; Trump's campaign dropped the allegation that hundreds of thousands of mail-in and absentee ballots were illegally processed without its representatives watching. Dustin Johnson overcame a jittery start in the final round to win the Masters by five shots, finishing with a record-low score of 268, 20 under par.
