## Council OKs \$1.25-million economic development grant

Meeting for just 45 minutes Tuesday evening, the Big Spring City Council approved on second reading a resolution authorizing a \$1.25 million grant application, and committing \$500,000 in matching funds for the project.

The grant application, passed by the Big Spring Economic Development Corporation's board of directors earlier in the day, will request funds from the U.S. Economic Development Administration to develop land west of the McMahon-Wrinkle Airpark, including near the intersection of the Reliever Route and Interstate 20.

At the council's previous meeting, the item was up for emergency approval -

requiring only one vote to pass instead of the usual two - in a bid to get the grant application in sooner. The item passed 5-1 with Mayor Shannon Thomason dissenting and Councilman Cody Hughes (District 3) absent, but the vote needed to pass unanimously to achieve emergency approval. Tuesday's vote on the item was the second reading of the resolution, which passed 6-1, with Thomason continuing to oppose the measure.

Following the call to order, invocation and Pledge of Allegiance at the start of the meeting, Mayor Thomason called for public comment, but no one chose to address the council.

City Manager Todd Darden offered his report, praising city staff for assisting with preparation of a Community Devel-

"They helped us put together a grant application for downtown revitalization," Darden said. "The project consists of sidewalks, street reconstruction, waterlines and ADA (Americans with Disabilities Act) compliance. The grant total is roughly \$350,000, \$300,000 coming from the state and \$46,000 coming from the city."

Darden reported on a recent American Council of Engineering Companies award garnered by Big Spring's new Big Sandy Landfill.

"Our landfill, Big Sandy, received a 2022 ACEC Texas Engineering Excellence Award, the Gold Award. This



Darden also reminded the council about the city's Thanksgiving Holiday, scheduled Nov. 25 and 26; and about the Howard County Summit meeting scheduled Dec. 6 at Howard College.

The council unanimously passed the meeting's consent agenda without comment. Items on the Consent Agenda included approval of the Nov. 9 City Council meeting minutes; final reading of a resolution casting the city's 414 votes for Jordan Partee in the Howard County Appraisal District board of directors election; final reading of an ordinance amending the city's budget to fund restroom renovations at Fire Station No. 2; and final reading of an ordinance moving rules governing the Airpark Development Board membership to Chapter 2 of City Code, continuing the city's ongoing campaign to move rules for all city committees and boards into a single chapter of the Code.

Following the city's vote on the Big Spring EDC

grant proposal mentioned previously, the council approved vouchers tabled at the previous meeting in the amount of \$513,660.62 for Oct. 28 and \$1,792,678.14 for Nov. 4. The council also approved vouchers for \$919,128.46 for Nov. 12.

In New Business, the council acknowledged receipt of the Planning and Zoning Committee minutes from their Sept. 7 meeting.

The council also unanimously approved authorizing City Manager Darden to negotiate and execute a ground lease with Compute North near Building 1, and an office lease in Building 1, at the McMahon-Wrinkle Airpark.

Fire Chief Chad Williams requested that the city leaders approve an application to the Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grant Program for department operations/media data management network servers. Williams reported that he modified request to include 35 terabytes of memory instead of 24 terabytees, at a very slight increase "This resolution y'all passed back in March," he

said. "We went to purchase this equipment and we found out we could purchase more of 16-terabyte hard drives for basically the same amount of money," he said. "Basically it's just changing 24 to 35, and then the amount is \$45 more. This is a zeromatch grant, so there's no cost to the city." Williams also presented a grant application

through the Body-Worn Camera Grant Program for fiscal year 2022, for \$37,697.50. The grant requires approved this grant unanimously.

The council unanimously approved a resolution authorizing selection of a professional service provider for Coronavirus Local Fiscal Recovery Fund (CLFRF) programs through the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021.

The council also unanimously approved a budget amendment in the amount of \$155,000 for replacement of a steam-powered boiler at the Municipal Auditorium. Councilman Cody Hughes (District 3) questioned whether a better alternative to a boiler system was available.

"We'd have to re-do the entire system," said Community Services Director Hayley Herrera. "It would be cheaper to replace the boiler than to re-do the entire building." During the council members' individual state-

ments at the end of the meeting, Councilman Hughes reported that Crossroads Housing Development Corporation will be giving away Thanksgiving meals Saturday at 9 a.m., while supplies last The giveaway will be held at St. Mary's Episcopal Church, 1001 S. Goliad St.

Councilman Nick Ornelas (District 1) reported that a ribbon-cutting for the new "P.J. The D.J." Pavilion in ABC Park honoring the late P.J. governmental entities, businesses, and other groups. In addition, the board directed EDC staff to prepare an agenda for the

EDC Director Mark Willis delivered his report, announcing that unemployment is down from 10.2 percent this time in 2020 to 6.2 percent now, but warned that the closing of GEO prisons locally would likely affect that statistic in the near future. Willis also reported that a recent job fair held at Howard College went

"We're fixing to see a spike on that in December with all three of the GEO facilities closing up," he said. "We're losing roughly 600 jobs. The job fair went really well. It was fairly well attended, but we're going to need to do another one."

Willis reported that the EDC was turned down for a requested \$5 million grant from the Economic Development Administra-

"We immediately reached out to the head of the EDA for this area in Austin, and found out that, yes, ours was considered a really great project, but they decided to go to their maximum was now between \$1.25 million and \$1.5 million. Instead of 'firstcome, first-served' - we were the second in our whole region because we heard it was first-come, first-served – but they changed that. Now, every month until they run out of money, the ninth of the month, they will take applications."

Willis said pending approval of \$500,000 in matching funds from the Big Spring City Council, he will re-apply for the grant, within the lower maximum restrictions, by the Dec. 9.

Funds from the grant, if received, will be used to develop land west of the McMahon-Wrinkle Airpark.





# Surprising teams on wrong side of Week 10 blowouts

It was another blowout-filled weekend in the NFL, only this time several of teams on the losing end came from teams near the top of the standings.

For the second time in four weeks, six games were decided by at least 21 points, the first time that has happened twice in a season since 2009 and just the fifth time ever.

Five of the six teams on the wrong side of those lopsided games were teams that entered the weekend with a .500 or better record with Atlanta losing 43-3 to Dallas, Las Vegas falling 41-14 to Kansas City, the Rams losing 31-10 to San Francisco, Arizona getting beat 34-10 by Carolina and Cleveland getting knocked off 45-7 by New England.

The other blowout was far more predictable with the struggling New York Jets getting beat 45-17 by Buffalo.

This marked just the second time in NFL history that five teams that came into the week without a losing record got beat by at least 21 points, according to Sportradar. The other came in Week 17 of the 2009 season when many of those teams were resting key players for the playoffs.

Blowouts have been extremely common so far this season with the 24 games decided by at least 24 points tied for the second most through 10 weeks since the merger, trailing only the 29 in 1975.

nerger, training on RARE ROOKIES

The Patriots got impressive production from a pair of rookies in their win over the Browns with Mac Jones completing 19 of 23 passes for 198 yards and three TDs and Rhamondre Stevenson rushed for 100 yards and two TDs.

New England became the fifth team since the merger to have one rookie throw at least two TD passes and another run for two TDs in a game. The others were the Browns in 2018 (Baker Mayfield and Nick Chubb), Cowboys in 2016 (Dak Prescott and Ezekiel Elliott), Washington in 2012 (Kirk Cousins and Alfred Morris;

Robert Griffin III and Morris), and Denver in 2006 (Jay Cutler and Mike Bell).

Mike Bell). Jones' 142.1 rating in the game was the fifthhighest singlegame passer rating by a rookie quarterback in the Super Bowl era with at least attempts, only trailing two games from Mayfield, one

from Prescott and one from Geno Smith in 2013.

rom Prescott al PAT'S BACK

Chiefs quarterback Patrick Mahomes shook off a shaky stretch to get back into his old form, throwing for 406 yards with five TDs and no interceptions in a 41-14 win over the Raiders.

It was the third time Mahomes threw for at least 400 yards and five TDs in a game, also doing it against the Jets last season and the Rams in 2018, tying Hall of Famers Peyton Manning, Dan Marino and Joe Montana for the most in NFL history.

Mahomes is the only one of those players to do it more than once without an interception, also doing that against the Jets.

LONG DROUGHT

The Lions came close to winning at Pittsburgh for the first time since the Ford family bought the team in 1961. Detroit had nine losses and one tie on the road

against the Steelers since their last win in 1955 at Forbes Field before settling for another tie on Sunday.

The bidding: North East South West Pass Pass Pass Pass

Opening lead — queen of hearts.

Sometimes a defender must make a play that appears to be suicidal. Yet when the special circumstances of that deal are analyzed, it can be seen that the play is absolutely nec-

Take this case where South is in four spades and West leads the queen of hearts. East takes the ace and has to decide what to do next. He should conclude that his only chance to defeat the contract is to

return the four of clubs! Before examining the reasons for this play, let's first observe its effect.

West puts up the queen of clubs, taken by dummy's king. Sooner or later, declarer concedes a trick to the ace of diamonds. When he does, West returns a club through dummy's J-9, and East's A-10 of clubs set the contract.

Now let's examine the reasoning that points the way to this defense. The first step is for East to dismiss any lie of the cards that would render the contract impregnable. East must therefore assume that West has the ace of diamonds, since if South has that card, the contract can't be beaten.

Having done this, East can now count three defensive tricks in the form of three aces. The remaining question is where the fourth trick might come from. Given South's spade bids and dummy's spade holding, there is no hope of getting a trump trick, so only the possibility remaining is to score two club tricks. This can't be done if South has the club queen, so West must be credited with that card.

However, the two club tricks can be taken only if the defense is in the position to collect them when West's presumed ace of diamonds is driven out. And the only way this can be achieved is with a low club return by East at trick two.

As it happens, West has both of the cards East needs to defeat the contract, and the virtue of his logic reaps a just reward.




