Mayor Thomason's vaccine mandate ban

At the Nov. 9 Big Spring City Council meeting, Mayor Shannon Thomason issued an executive order banning the city, and other employers in Big Spring, from requiring employees to receive a COVID-19 vaccine.

While the Herald's report on the meeting contained coverage of the order, on Thursday the city sent out a press release containing the entire text of the Mayor's proclamation. The full order is printed below:

Executive Order ST-09

WHEREAS, On March 13, 2020, Texas Governor Gregg Abbott declared a State of Disaster for all Texas counties in response to the COVID-19 pandemic, and;
 WHEREAS, On March 25, 2020, President Donald J. Trump declared that "a major disaster exists in the State of Tex-

as...beginning on January 20, 2020, and continuing", and;

WHEREAS, On March 18, 2020, I, Mayor Shannon D. Thomason, did declare that a state of Public Health Disaster did exist for the City of Big Spring, and;

WHEREAS, All of the previously mentioned Disaster Declarations are currently ongoing and in full force, and;

WHEREAS, Item 12 of the Public Health Disaster declaration effectively suspends any city ordinance or administrative rule to the extent needed to respond to the Disaster, and;

WHEREAS, On October 11, 2021, Governor Greg Abbott did issue "Executive Order GA 40" which ordered that "No entity in Texas can compel receipt of a COVID-19 vaccine by any individual, including an employee or a consumer, who objects to such vaccination for any

reason of personal conscience, based on a religious belief, or for medical reasons, including prior recovery from COVID-19."

WHEREAS, Governor Abbott's Executive Order GA 40 states that "The maximum fine allowed under Section 418.173 of the Texas

Government Code and the State's emergency management plan shall apply to any "failure to comply with" this executive order. Confinement in jail is not an available penalty for violating this executive order."

WHEREAS, Section 418.1015(a) of the Texas Government Code states "The presiding officer of the governing body of an incorporated city or a county or the chief administrative officer of a joint

Crossroads HDC offering Thanksgiving dinners

Thanksgiving is Thursday next week, and Thanksgiving always conjures images of good food.

Big Spring's Crossroads Housing Development Corporation is bringing together resources to help local citizens have a Happy Thanksgiving by providing their holiday meal.

"This weekend, Crossroads is going to hold our second Thanksgiving Meal Kit Giveaway at St. Mary's Episcopal Church at St. Mary's Episcopal Church at 1001 S. Goliad St.," said Crossroads Project Coordinator Anna Scott. "We will begin distribution at 9 a.m. and we will have 125 Thanksgiving meal kits to distribute at that time. We will probably be out of kits by about 10:30.

The meal kits are one per car, and contain everything needed to serve a delicious Thanksgiving dinner for six to eight people, she said.

"It's one kit per car. It doesn't matter if there are two fami-

lies in a car, unfortunately we're only able to give them one kit. The average kit - because some kits may not have everything - but the average kit is going to have canned cranberry sauce, canned green beans, a turkey, brown-and-serve rolls, a pumpkin pie, a bag of potatoes, an aluminum pan to bake the pie in, French's fried onions to make a green-bean casserole, mushroom soup can, marshmallows and sweet potatoes - like canned sweet potatoes - to make a sweet potato casserole. Turkey gravy mix and stuffing," Scott said. "This is all going to be canned goods. The turkey is going to be frozen, at least mostly frozen by the time they get it. We're looking to get about 10-12 pound turkeys, so they're not going to be giant ones. They're not going to break your back. But all of the food is intended to use either this Thanksgiving or this coming Christmas. We went with mostly non-perishables with the goal of feeding families."

board is designated as the emergency management director for the officer's political subdivision."

WHEREAS, Section 418.1015(b) of the Texas Government Code states "An emergency management director serves as the governor's designated agent in the administration and supervision of duties under this chapter. An emergency management director may exercise the powers granted to the governor under this chapter on an appropriate local scale."

WHEREAS, The United States Centers for Disease Control recently changed their definition of "vaccination" from "the act of introducing a vaccine into the body to produce IMMUNITY to a specific disease" to "the act of introducing a vaccine into the body to produce PROTECTION to a specific disease". This change in definition by the CDC was not based on science, but was a response to political pressure. Protection from COVID-19 can be accomplished by methods other than vaccines, which

include but are not limited to, the wearing of facial covering and other personal protection equipment (PPE), as well as by simply maintaining social distance and minimizing public contact.

WHEREAS, the informed choice of how an individual determines the measures they will take to protect themselves and their family from COVID-19 is best left to the people, and not the government.

NOW THEREFORE, I, Shannon D. Thomason, Mayor of the City of Big Spring and with the authority granted me by Texas Government Code Chapter 418, do order that:

- No current employee of, or applicant for employment with, the City of Big Spring or any of its component units shall be required or compelled to receive a COVID-19 vaccination.
- No individual or entity operating within the corporate limits of the City of Big Spring shall require or compel a person to receive a COVID-19 vaccination as a condition of employment or to receive any benefit that they would otherwise be due.

• No person shall be required or compelled to receive a COVID-19 vaccination as a condition of employment on any property owned by the City of Big Spring.

• No tenant operating on property owned by the City of Big Spring shall require or compel a person to receive a COVID-19 vaccination as a condition of employment.

• Any tenant of the City of Big Spring who has issued any such vaccination requirement is hereby considered to be on notice that they may be in violation of their lease and may be subject to further action in accordance with Section 418 of the Texas Government Code and Big Spring City Code.

• Any person residing in or working in the corporate limits of the City of Big Spring who is being subjected to a vaccination requirement may report violations of Executive Order GA 40 to the City for investigation.

• The City of Big Spring is herein directed to accept and investigate alleged violations of Executive Order GA 40, Chapter 18, Sec. 18-33 of the Big Spring City Code, and this order.

• Big Spring City Code, Chapter 18,

Sec. 18-33 remains in full effect. Violations of this order shall be charged under that section, which provides that "Convictions for violations of the provisions of this chapter shall be punishable by fine not to exceed \$500.00, except that convictions for intentional, knowing, or reckless violations of rules and regulations issued pursuant to this chapter that govern fire safety, public health, or sanitation shall be punishable by fine not to exceed \$2,000.00."

FURTHER, the City of Big Spring encourages all of its citizens to make informed decisions regarding their personal health, and encourages everyone to to be vaccinated for COVID-19, IF THEY SO CHOOSE. However, the City will also continue to stand for and protect the rights of those who choose not to.

There is no charge for a meal kit, and there's no check for proof of residency or proof of financial need required.

"It's going to be a drive-through event, so there's really no checking on IDs, we're not checking to see if you're from Big Spring," Scott said. "Crossroads serves Howard County and the surrounding counties. It just so happens that we're based in Big Spring, so most of our events happen in Big Spring."

In addition to the kits distributed at the drive-through event Saturday, Crossroads will provide some kits to other groups around Big Spring.

"We set aside 80 kits this year that are going toward our nonprofits and churches around town," Scott said. "A few of them that have responded include the Three Angels Food Pantry that just opened, we're distributing some of the kits to the Fire Department this year, as well as the Northside Movement, Howard County Resource Center, and the Big Spring Housing Authority."

All of the food was purchased at retail price by Crossroads. "We actually had to go through five different sources to get all

the food. Last year we did 117 kits, and because there wasn't a crazy supply chain issue, we were fortunate to go exclusively through H-E-B," she said. "But this year we are pulling food from Wal-Mart, H-E-B, Porter's, Ben E. Keith and Costco. So we're bringing food from San Antonio, Fort Worth and Lubbock for this event."

Several local groups are helping Crossroads with the distribution, she added.

"We do have a few helpers and volunteer groups we would like to mention that have already agreed to help," she said. "We are having the Boy Scouts helping us, we are having the Crossroads Young Marines, Friday Greater Big Spring Rotary Club, the Tuesday Big Spring Rotary Club, and Credit World has been storing about 1,000 pounds of canned goods for us and they're helping us get all of the food from the stores and moving it to the location. Johansson's Nursery, they're very sweet and they're loaning us some carts so that we can transport the food without hurting ourselves. And, of course, St. Mary's Episcopal Church is providing the location for the drive-through for us."

Founded in 1999, Crossroads Housing Development Corporation is a 501-C3 nonprofit provider of affordable housing in Texas. The corporation offers programs designed to help homeowners in Howard County.

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Pope: Don't judge the poor, often victims of injustice

VATICAN CITY — Pope Francis decried societies which rush indifferently past the poor, often judging them instead of helping them, as he celebrated Sunday Mass in St. Peter's Basilica attended by 2,000 indigent people.

During his homily, Francis also made an appeal against what he called "growing indifference" to the poor, who, he said, are often forced into poverty by injustice.

Francis has used his papacy since 2013 to draw attention to those living on society's margins. The Catholic Church dedicated the day to the world's poor.

"We are part of a history marked by tribulation, violence, suffering and injustice, ever awaiting a liberation that never seems to arrive," Francis said. "Those who are most wounded, oppressed and even crushed, are the poor, the weakest links in the chain."

He said by focusing on the poor the Church "asks us not to turn aside, not to be afraid to take a close look at the suffering of those most vulnerable."

The pontiff lamented the "poverty into which they are often forced, victims of injustice and the inequality of a throwaway society that hurries past without seeing them and without scruple abandons them to their fate."

The pontiff didn't specifically cite the impact of climate change on the poor, who could be forced to flee their homes due to droughts and floods.

But Francis added that "unless our hope translates into decisions and concrete gestures of concern, justice, solidarity and care for our common home, the sufferings of the poor will not be relieved, the economy of waste that forces them to live on the margins will not be converted, their expectations will not blossom anew."

He encouraged people to improve the world by "breaking bread with the hungry, working for justice, lifting up the poor and restoring their dignity."

Charity workers were among those invited to the Mass, along with those they assist.

Francis issued a plea to bring hope to the world through "tenderness to the poor, without judging them."

The trees have turned. Many have dropped their leaves. Winter is at the door, and Covid has loosened its grip. Football is in the air, stadiums are packed, and the Cowboys are finally winning again. Thoughts turn a shared table overflowing with turkey, dressing, giblet gravy, pecan pie and "home." This year is especially meaningful after last year's isolation and zoom. Many are making plans to travel. I like Thanksgiving and the American traditions that go along with it.

Thanksgiving is special to the American experience. George Washington signed the first Thanksgiving proclamation in 1789. But the official annual holiday began in 1863 when Abraham Lincoln set aside the fourth Thursday of November as a day for giving thanks. When he issued his proclamation, our nation was embroiled in Civil War. Young men by the thousands lay dead

on the battlefields. Families were gripped with grief. But a wounded nation found solace for its soul by seeking a grateful heart.

In times of prosperity and want, in times of war and peace, throughout the Great Depression, the Great Recession and last year's pandemic we have paused as a nation on this final Thursday of November to remember and to be thankful. For this one day, at least, we make sure that the homeless and the hungry are fed. On this day, we lay down our tools and gather around tables with those whom we love the most. We are not burdened with the buying and giving of gifts. We simply pause to enjoy one another and the goodness with which God has blessed us.

Nothing is more important than cultivating a grateful and thankful heart. We all experience blessing and loss. God sends his rain on the just and the unjust. The faithful and the unfaithful must weather the same storms. We all experience life and love and loss that we do not deserve. We often cannot choose our circumstances but we can

choose our response; bitterness and resentment, thankfulness and gratitude. The former leads to death. The latter leads to life.

The Bible is clear about the importance of thanksgiving. The Psalms are filled with thanksgiving and praise. Jeremiah envisioned desolate Jerusalem restored with gratitude saying: "the voice of joy and the voice of gladness, the voice of the bridegroom and the voice of the bride, the voice of those who say, 'Give thanks to the Lord of hosts, for the Lord is good, for His lovingkindness is everlasting.'" (Jer. 33:11). 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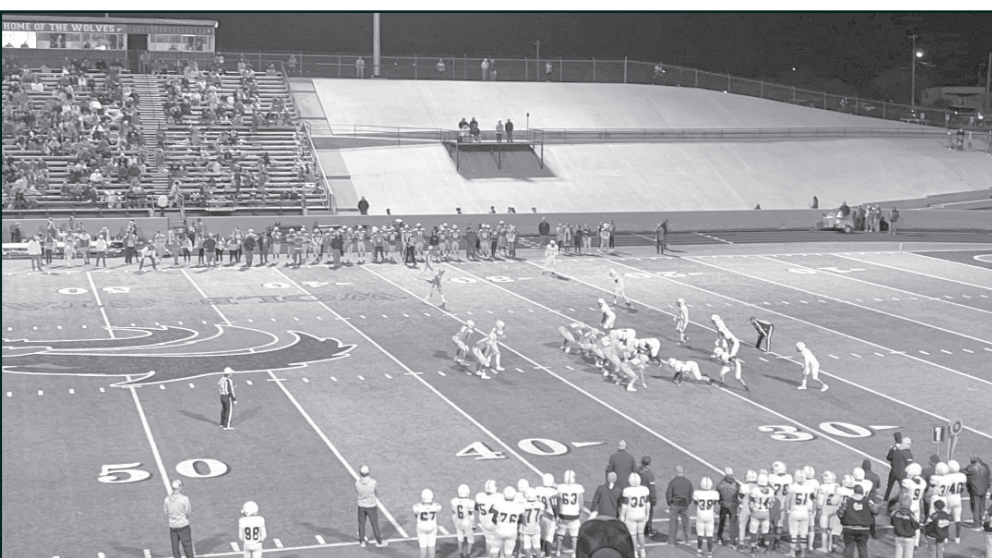

Forsan Buffaloes fall to New Deal in playoffs

The Forsan buffaloes lost in the second round of the playoffs this Thursday night, Nov 18, to the #5 ranked New Deal Lions by a final score of 28-24. The loss brings an end to a great season of football by the Forsan Buffaloes.

On a cold November night in Colorado City, Texas, the 10-1 Forsan Buffaloes faced off against the 10-1 New Deal Lions. This was a remarkably tough second-round matchup for both teams as Forsan was the #12 ranked team in 2A, and the Lions were #5. But, boy would this game live up to the hype; it was a back and forth affair with both teams leaving it all out on the field. Unfortunately for the Buffaloes, they came up just a little short as they lost a nail-bitter 28-24.

This was a prime-time matchup for two outstanding football teams. You don't get to a 10-12 record by accident, and both of these teams showed why they were not only in the playoffs but why they were both considered two of the top teams in the State. The Forsan Buffaloes received the opening kickoff but could not get anything going on their first drive. The New Deal defense stepped up and forced a very quick three and out. Once the New Deal offense got their chance on the field, they did exactly what they have done all season long, running the ball effectively. The Lions have one of the best running backs iv seen in person all year long. Lerici Eaton proved why he has a lot of hype behind him as he and this New Deal offense drove right down the field and scored their first touchdown of the game. With 5:51 left in the first quarter, the New Deal Lions had an early 7-0 lead over Forsan. The Buffs now had their second drive of the game, and much like the first, had trouble finding any rhythm against this strong Lion defense going three and out once more. On the Lion's second drive of the game, they kept this dynamic run game going as they once again moved the ball down the field. With:14 seconds left in the first quarter, they scored the second touchdown of the night to take a 14-0 lead.

After one-quarter of play, the Buffs were two touchdowns down to an excellent football team. Knowing they had to make something happen on the offensive side of the game, the Buffs' offense woke up. Forsan started to find its mojo and started to move the ball on the ground with their running game. As they moved into Lion's territory for the first time for the night, the Buffs finally had some momentum on their side. Unfortunately, that momentum quickly went away as the buff had a devastating fumble on the New Deal 37 yard line, halting the drive and giving this Lions offense the ball back already up 14-0. After the mistake by the Forsan offense, it was time for this Buff defense to make a play, and that is precisely what they did. The Buffaloes caused a fumble of their own to get the

ball back at their 44-yard line. The Buffs just got the break they needed. On the first play after the turnover, the buff Chris Mendez broke free from 56 yards out to make this a 7-14 game with 9:40 left in the first half of play. After the score, the Forsan Buffaloes had all the momentum going in their direction. After the Buff touchdown, both defenses somewhat settled into this game as the buffaloes defense started to do a better job at containing the New Deal RB. Forsan did go on to put up three more points on a Nolan Park field goal. The field goal made this a 10-14 game at halftime.

So from being down 14-0 after the first quarter

to 14 lead in the third.

As the fourth quarter started, the Buffs had a three-point lead and momentum. This New Deal Lion offense would not go away quietly as they showed why they were the #5 ranked team in the State. Behind their all-star RB, the Lions moved right down the field and, from two yards out, punched the ball into the end zone taking back the lead 21 to 17. This was turning into a shootout. After a good kickoff return, Forsan had excellent field position as they started from their 42-yard line. Major Stockton found Cayden Morgan one more time. This one was good for a beautiful 58 yard TD pass giving the lead to Forsan 24-21. From what I could gather, the stadium clock was still not working, but there were about six minutes left in the game. Now with the lead back, the Forsan defense needed to make a stop. Unfortunately, this New Deal running game was just too strong, and after a few big running plays, they scored again, taking the lead back 28-24 in what was just a crazy fourth quarter of play. Forsan was down once again with what I was told was about four minutes left in the game. Forsan started this drive at their 33-yard line needing a touchdown to take the leads. After a few bad plays and a penalty that backed them up, Forsan faced a third and twenty to keep this game going. With Stallings now in a QB, he dropped back and delivered a strike converting the first down and giving the Buffaloes life. Forsan continued to use a mix of the pass and rush on this drive as they moved the ball down the field, inching closer and closer to the end zone. One of these teams was set to make a big, game-changing play to ensure their team the win. The Buffs now had the ball at the New Deal eleven-yard line, and they could smell the end zone. As the Buffs dropped back to pass, the New Deal defense made the play of the game as they intercepted the Stallings pass to stop the drive and ensure the victory. Opening lead — eight of spades.
Most deals require no more than simple, orderly thinking for declarer to achieve the best result possible. A tendency to focus on how to play a specific suit rather than on how to play the hand as a whole is a fairly common failing that causes many contracts to be lost.
Take this case where many declarers would go wrong. West leads a spade, and South wins East's nine with the queen. How should declarer play the hand? He is gazing at six

ready-made tricks — two spades, two hearts and two clubs — and needs three more for the contract.
Declarer can lead a diamond to the queen and lose to the ace — which East, on the bidding, is likely to have — but this will give South only two additional tricks and leave him one trick shy of his goal. Or declarer can play the A-K and another club, hoping the opposing clubs are divided 3-2, but this will also bring him to only eight tricks.
Since both methods of play lead to a dead end, South should start looking elsewhere for a way to develop his three additional tricks. And if he studies the situation carefully enough, he should spot an approach that will give him an excellent shot at the contract.
At trick two, he leads a club to the king and returns a low diamond from dummy. East can't afford to rise with the ace, which would hand declarer three immediate diamond tricks, so let's say East ducks and allows South to win with the king.
Having "stolen" this trick, declarer now abandons diamonds and plays the ace and another club. When the suit breaks normally, he has nine solid tricks.
A little in-depth analysis at the start pays off in the end.

Today is Friday, Nov. 19, the 323rd day of 2021. There are 42 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History:

On Nov. 19, 1969, Apollo 12 astronauts Charles Conrad and Alan Bean made the second manned landing on the moon.

On this date:

In 1794, the United States and Britain signed Jay's Treaty, which resolved some issues left over from the Revolutionary War.

In 1863, President Abraham Lincoln dedicated a national cemetery at the site of the Civil War battlefield of Gettysburg in Pennsylvania.

In 1919, the Senate rejected the Treaty of Versailles (veh-RSY) by a vote of 55 in favor, 39 against, short of the two-thirds majority needed for ratification.

In 1942, during World War II, Russian forces launched their winter offensive against the Germans along the Don front.

In 1959, Ford Motor Co. announced it was halting production of the unpopular Edsel.

In 1977, Egyptian President Anwar Sadat became the first Arab leader to visit Israel.

In 1985, President Ronald Reagan and Soviet leader Mikhail S. Gorbachev met for the first time as they began their summit in Geneva.

In 1995, Polish President Lech Walesa (vah-WEN'-sah) was defeated in his bid for re-election.

In 1997, Iowa seamstress Bobbi McCaughey (mih-KOY) gave birth to the world's first set of surviving septuplets, four boys and three girls.

In 2004, in one of the worst brawls in U.S. sports history, Ron Artest and Stephen Jackson of the Indiana Pacers charged into the stands and fought with Detroit Pistons fans, forcing officials to end the Pacers' 97-82 win with 45.9 seconds left.

In 2010, President Barack Obama, attending a NATO summit in Lisbon, Portugal, won an agreement to build a missile shield over Europe, a victory that risked further aggravating Russia.

In 2017, Charles Manson, the hippie cult leader behind the gruesome murders of actor Sharon Tate and six others in Los Angeles in 1969, died in a California hospital at the age of 83 after nearly a half-century in prison.

Ten years ago: Moammar Gadhafi's son and former heir apparent Seif al-Islam was captured by revolutionary fighters in the southern desert just over a month after Gadhafi was killed, setting off joyous celebrations across Libya. (He was released from detention in 2017.)

Five years ago: President-elect Donald Trump met with 2012 Republican nominee Mitt Romney in Bedminster, New Jersey; both were positive about their sit-down, a marked shift in tone after a year in which Romney attacked Trump as a "con man" and Trump labeled Romney a "loser."

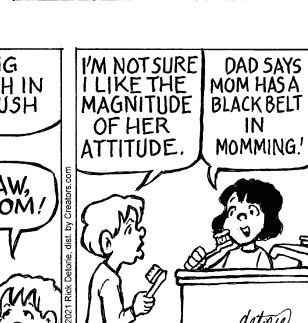
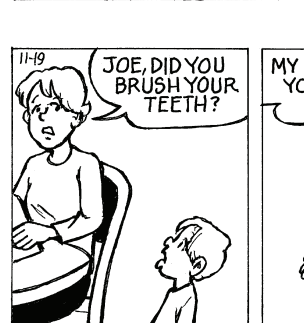
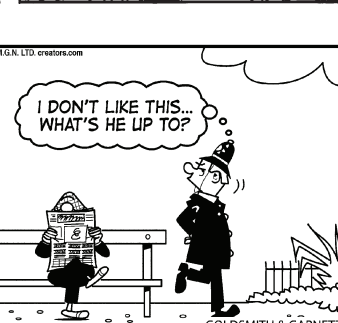
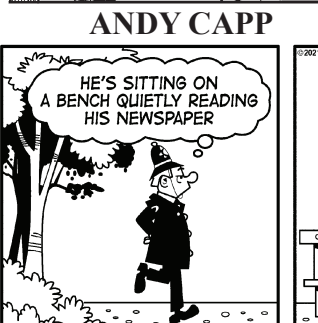
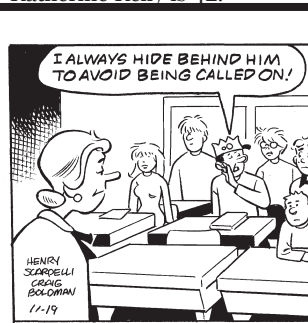
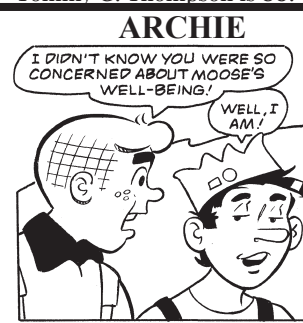
The International Space Station gained three new residents, including NASA astronaut Peggy Whitson, who at 56 was the oldest and most experienced woman to orbit the world.

One year ago: Georgia's top elections official released results of a hand tally of ballots that affirmed Democrat Joe Biden's narrow lead over President Donald Trump in the state. The Wisconsin Elections Commission issued an order to recount more than 800,000 ballots cast in two heavily liberal counties; the order was required by law after Trump paid \$3 million for the recount. (The recount added slightly to Biden's 20,600-vote margin in Wisconsin.)

California imposed a nighttime curfew as its coronavirus figures soared; sheriffs in some counties said they wouldn't enforce it.
