Have a safe Thanksgiving holiday

With Thanksgiving on Thursday, many people will be cooking up sumptuous turkey feasts, while others will be hitting the road to visit far-off family. These fun activities can be dangerous without the proper planning and care.

Big Spring Fire Chief Craig Ferguson recently provided tips on remaining safe this Turkey Day.

"The best thing I can tell people to do, especially when they're using turkey fryers and even their ovens is, read the instructions and follow the manufacturers' guidelines to that equipment." Ferguson said. "That's one of the most important things they can do to stay safe while they're using that stuff."

Outdoor cooking for Thanksgiving is a trend that can produce some delicious results, but also require some special care in their use, added the chief.

"If you are going to use a turkey fryer or a grill or a smoker to prepare your turkey, do it away from the house. Don't set that stuff up underneath your porch or patio," he said. "Stay at least 20 feet



away from any structure or flammable materials. Have a fire extinguisher or water hose or bucket of water on hand just to prevent any kind of fire, or fire spread. Those are some of the biggest things I can tell people to do."

Fire departments across the nation and even in Big Spring - often see an upswing in fires and other accidents during the holiday season.

"During the holidays, we see an increase in house fires and injuries due to cooking, and house fires because people at Christmastime and during the holidays, they're decorating their homes and so they're using more electricity,' Ferguson said. "They'll put extension cords underneath rugs and whatnot. They're not using the manufacturers guidelines for the proper use of those appliances. That's why we'll see an uptick. Here in Big Spring and Howard County we'll have on average a couple of fires during the holidays due to these kind of things. One or two. Most of the time. thankfully, it's minor and the damage is contained to a small area most of the time."

The chief advised local residents to make sure their safety devices are in working order.

"With the holidays, we have a lot of people that are home and are visiting family: Make sure your smoke detectors and stuff have batteries and are working properly, so that in an emergency you can be alerted early on," he said.

Of course, holiday travel is a big cause of accidents.

"Lots of traffic on the road when we're going to travel to see our families," said Chief Ferguson. "Check your car out, make sure it's mechanically sound, that your tires have air pressure, that you have enough gasoline to get to where

Local government, businesses closing for holiday


Turkey Day is Thursday this week, and most of the town's public offices, schools, financial institutions and grocery stores will either close or change their hours for the holiday.

City of Big Spring offices will be closed Thursday and Friday in observance of the Thanksgiving holiday. There will be no sanitation pickup Thursday; Thursday's normal sanitation routes will be picked up Wednesday. There will be no change to Friday's sanitation schedule.

The city's landfill will be open Saturday from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. All other city offices will reopen Monday.

Emergency city services - Police, Fire and Emergency Medical Services – will continue normal operations during the holiday. The Emergency Utilities Department will be available and can be reached at 432-264-2392.

Howard County will also close all offices Thursday and Friday. County offices will reopen for business on Monday. While the Sheriff's administrative offices will be closed, law enforcement services will operate as normal.



Brighter medical outlook awaits Cowboys, but after Raiders

The NFC East race is tightening up on Dak Prescott and the Dallas Cowboys, who could be without the quarterback's top two receivers in another game with the best pair of defensive ends sidelined on Thanksgiving.

A brighter medical outlook awaits in December if nobody else gets hurt, but the Las Vegas Raiders come first Thursday after Dallas (7-3) couldn't overcome injuries while failing to validate its status as a Super Bowl contender against twotime defending AFC champion Kansas City.

"We went through everything that we went through last year for moments like this, to be able to move forward and for other guys to step in and take advantage of their opportunity," said Prescott, who watched most of a 6-10 season in 2020 with a broken ankle. "That's where playmakers and guys get better. We're going to have to continue to do that with guys being out."

At receiver, that list is topped by Michael Gallup, Cedrick Wilson and Noah Brown for now with Amari Cooper out for sure and CeeDee Lamb possibly joining him on the sideline.

Cooper won't play against his former team because of a positive COVID-19 test last week and the accompanying rules for unvaccinated players. The Cowboys gave the Raiders a firstround pick in a 2018 trade for Cooper. Assistant strength and conditioning coach Cedric Smith was added to COVID-19 protocols Monday.

Lamb sustained a concussion in the 19-9 loss to the Chiefs, but did participate in meetings Monday.

Star defensive end DeMarcus Lawrence is close to returning after being out since the opener with a broken foot, but the target date is more likely Dec. 2 at New Orleans. That's also the first week Randy Gregory (calf strain) is eligible to return from injured reserve.

It's also worth noting that running back Ezekiel Elliott is dealing with a knee injury that got a little worse with another awkward twist on a tackle Sunday, when division rivals Philadelphia and Washington each won a second consecutive game.

"We all understand the challenges that frankly we have to pick up as we move forward," coach Mike McCarthy said. "We have a quick turnaround. We will take that experience and grow from it."

WHAT'S WORKING

Rookie LB Micah Parsons hasn't had much trouble getting pressure on quarterbacks when lining up at defensive end, a necessity with Lawrence and Gregory out. He had two more sacks against Patrick Mahomes, including a forced fumble Dallas recovered. With seven games remaining, Parsons has already tied DeMarcus Ware's rookie club record of eight sacks from 2005.

WHAT NEEDS HELP

The Cowboys could use LT Tyron Smith, who has missed three consecutive games with an ankle injury. Dallas didn't protect Prescott very well (season-high five sacks) and didn't create much room in the running game. LG Connor McGovern replaced the benched Connor Williams, but the key to making the line better could mean getting Terence Steele in the backup tackle spot, rather than a starting role, because experience is still an issue for the undrafted second-year player. The pressure on Prescott helped contribute to his lost fumble and two interceptions. It was the 2016 NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year's fifth career game with at least three giveaways. STOCK UP The defense deserves credit for keeping the Cowboys in the game when it looked like Mahomes and company might blow them out. Kansas City had to settle for a field goal after Prescott's fumble at the Dallas 22-yard line, and the Chiefs scored just three points in the final 44 minutes. The Cowboys give up a lot of big plays but still find ways to get stops.

INJURIES

The Cowboys were optimistic about Smith returning against the Chiefs, which could mean the short week doesn't matter in trying to get the perennial Pro Bowler back in the lineup.

"If he is ready, he is ready. If he is not, he is not. Hopefully he will be ready to go on Thursday," McCarthy said.

Elliott continues to downplay his knee injury, even though he keeps limping through portions of games. "It's feeling better, but I rolled up on it, and kind of hurt it. Overall, it's definitely getting better," Elliott said.

McCarthy said S Donovan Wilson won't play against the Raiders after injuring a shoulder against the Chiefs.

KEY NUMBER

Sub-300 — The Cowboys were held to less than 300 yards (276) for the second time in three games. That hasn't happened to a Prescott-led offense since late 2018.

NEXT STEPS

The next two games are the last in a seven-game stretch outside the NFC East, which also means division opponents are bunched up at the end. If the Cowboys can make their three-game lead in the loss column bigger, their focus can be more on the race for seeding in the NFC.

East's only real chance, therefore, would be to shift his attack to spades at trick two in the hope of establishing three tricks in the suit. In the actual case, declarer would be unable to prevail against this defense, and sooner or later he would go down one.

Today's Highlight in History:

On Nov. 24, 1963, Jack Ruby shot and mortally wounded Lee Harvey Oswald, the accused assassin of President John F. Kennedy, in a scene captured on live television.

On this date:

In 1859, British naturalist Charles Darwin published "On the Origin of Species," which explained his theory of evolution by means of natural selection.

In 1941, the U.S. Supreme Court, in Edwards v. California, unanimously struck down a California law prohibiting people from bringing impoverished nonresidents into the state.

In 1947, a group of writ-ers, producers and directors that became known as the "Hollywood Ten" was cited for contempt of Congress for refusing to answer questions about alleged Communist influence in the movie indus-try. John Steinbeck's novel "The Pearl" was first published.

In 1950, the musical "Guys and Dolls," based on the writings of Damon Runyon and featuring songs by Frank Loesser (LEH'-suhr), opened on Broadway.

In 1971, a hijacker calling himself "Dan Cooper" (but who became popularly known as "D.B. Cooper") parachuted from a Northwest Orient Airlines 727 over the Pacific Northwest after receiving \$200,000 in ransom; his fate remains unknown.

In 1974, the bone fragments AGNES

ot a 3.2 million-year-old hominid were discovered by scientists in Ethiopia; the skeletal remains were nicknamed "Lucy.

In 1987, the United States and the Soviet Union agreed on terms to scrap shorterand medium-range missiles. (The Intermediate-Range Nuclear Forces Treaty was signed by President Ronald Reagan and Soviet leader Mikhail S. Gorbachev the following month.)

In 1991, rock singer Freddie Mercury died in London at age 45 of AIDS-related pneumoniā.

In 2000, the U.S. Supreme Court stepped into the bitter, overtime struggle for the White House, agreeing to consider George W. Bush's appeal against the hand recounting of ballots in Florida.

In 2012, fire raced through a garment factory in Bangladesh that supplied

major retailers in the West, killing 112 people; an official said many of the victims were trapped because the eight-story building lacked emergency exits.

In 2014, it was announced that a grand jury in St. Louis County, Missouri, had decided against indicting Ferguson police officer Darren Wilson in the death of Michael Brown; the decision enraged protesters who set fire to buildings and cars and looted businesses in the area where Brown had been fatally shot.

In 2017, militants attacked a crowded mosque in Egypt with gunfire and rocket-propelled grenades, killing more than 300 people in the deadliest-ever attack by Islamic extremists in the country.

Ten years ago: In the first NFL game featuring brothers as opposing head coaches, the Baltimore Ravens, led by John Harbaugh, beat the San Francisco 49ers, 16-6, under rookie coach Jim Harbaugh.

Five years ago: A car bomb tore through a gas station south of Baghdad, killing at least 92 people in an attack claimed by the Islamic State group. Florence Henderson, who went from Broadway star to one of America's most beloved television moms in "The Brady Bunch," died in

Los Angeles at age 82. One year ago: Pennsylvania officials certified Joe Biden as the winner of the presidential vote in the state; the Trump campaign had gone to court trying to prevent the certifica-tion. The Nevada Supreme Court made Biden's win in the state official. County election workers across Georgia began an official machine recount of the roughly 5 million votes cast in the presidential race in the state; certified results had shown Biden winning in Georgia by 12,670 votes. Purdue Pharma pleaded guilty to three criminal charges, formally taking responsibility for its part in the opioid epidemic. The Dow

closed above 30,000 for the first time amid progress in the development of coronavirus vaccines. Beyoncé led the way with nine Grammy nominations, including bids for song and record of the year with "Black Parade."


