Recognizing 5 Under 55 Nominations due Dec. 22

Big hearts are the foundation of the Big Spring community. As the Big Spring and Howard County communities have endured struggle after struggle this year, with so many unknowns, it has once again proven just how big the hearts that reside in Big Spring, Texas, truly are.

"So many of our local businesses, families and the community as a whole, were impacted in a way none of us expected this past year," Debbye ValVerde, Executive Director of the Big Spring Area Chamber of Commerce, said. "However, despite the hard hit that we were delivered, our community has done what it always does and has joined together to do their best to support a neighbor, lift up a friend, and do what they can to make a positive impact on the community."

The generosity and engagement for the betterment of our community is evident. As a way of recognizing those who give back routinely and strive to make Big Spring and Howard County better for all residents, The Big Spring Area Chamber of Commerce intro-

This week's reviews are fiction titles.

With both her sisters gone and married, Ursula Nordegren is the only one left clinging to their grandma's fears about the outside world in *Her Secret Song* - Brides of Hope Mountain Series Bk# 3 (F CON M) by Mary Connealy. But after a rough winter spent alone, Ursula Nordegren realizes she must overcome her fears of the outside world and begins a trek down Hope Mountain. Along the way she finds a badly wounded stranger and realizes God may have used her decision to leave as a way of saving the man. Wax Mosby was climbing Hope Mountain in part to atone for his terrible

choices. He was hired to drive out the Warden family and now knows he was duped. But when he's wounded during the climb, the last person he expects to rescue him is a beautiful blond woman with the voice of an angel. As both Ursula and Wax weigh the costs of living new lives, the two find an unlikely bond. And they're joined by Ursula's sisters and the Warden family as the final showdown over the family ranch looms with the coming of spring.

When evil in its purest form is unleashed on the world, Grace and others from her religious community are already hidden deep in the hills of Tennessee, abiding by every rule that will keep them safe, pure and alive in *The Girl Behind the Red Rope* (F DEK T) by Ted Dekker. As long as they stay there, behind the red perimeter. Her older brother's questions and the arrival of the first outsiders she's seen in a decade set in motion events that will question everything Grace has built her life on. Enemies rise on all sides but who is the real enemy? And what will it cost her to uncover the truth?

Lucy Clairmont's family treasured the magic of the past, and her childhood fascination with stories of the high seas led her to become a marine archaeologist in *Set the Stars Alight* (F DYK A) by Amanda Dykes. But when tragedy strikes, it is

Dashel, an American forensic astronomer, and his knowledge of the stars that may help her unearth the truth behind the puzzle she's discovered in her family home. Two hundred years earlier, the seeds of love are sown between a boy and a girl who spend their days playing in a secret sea cave, while the privileged young son of the estate looks on, wishing to join. As the children grow and war leads to unthinkable heartbreak, a story of love, betrayal, sacrifice, and redemption unfolds, held secret by the passage of time. As Lucy and Dash journey to a mysterious old estate on the East Sussex coast, their search leads them to a community of souls and a long-hidden tale that may hold the answers and the healing they so desperately seek.

Betty Sweet never expected to be a widow at 40 in *Stories that Bind Us* (F FIN S) by Susie Finkbeiner. With so much life still in front of her, she tries

to figure out what's next. She couldn't have imagined what God had in mind. When her estranged sister is committed to a sanitarium, Betty finds herself taking on the care of a 5-year-old nephew she never knew she had. In 1960s LaFontaine, Michigan, they make an odd pair. Betty with her pink button nose and bouffant hair. Hugo with his light brown skin and large brown eyes. But more powerful than what makes them different is what they share, the heartache of an empty space in their lives. Slowly, they will learn to trust one another as they discover common ground and healing through the magic of storytelling.

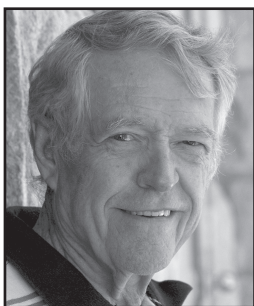

HOWARD PAYNE'S WINNING DEBATERS

Speech and debate are big deals at Howard Payne University in Brownwood. "We're one of the few colleges or universities in Texas or other states that guarantee scholarships for our competitors," says Dr. Julie Welker, who heads up the university's Department of Communication. "Our students must go through an audition process to be on our debate team."

Julie coaches the speech and debate teams and last year was recognized as the Texas Intercollegiate Forensics Association Educator Of The Year. She is a HPU grad and has taught there 22 years. She has been coaching the speech students since 2005. Her teams have been competing all over the nation and yearly in Oxford, England. She recruits just like coaches of athletic teams. As a result, her students have won outstanding awards.

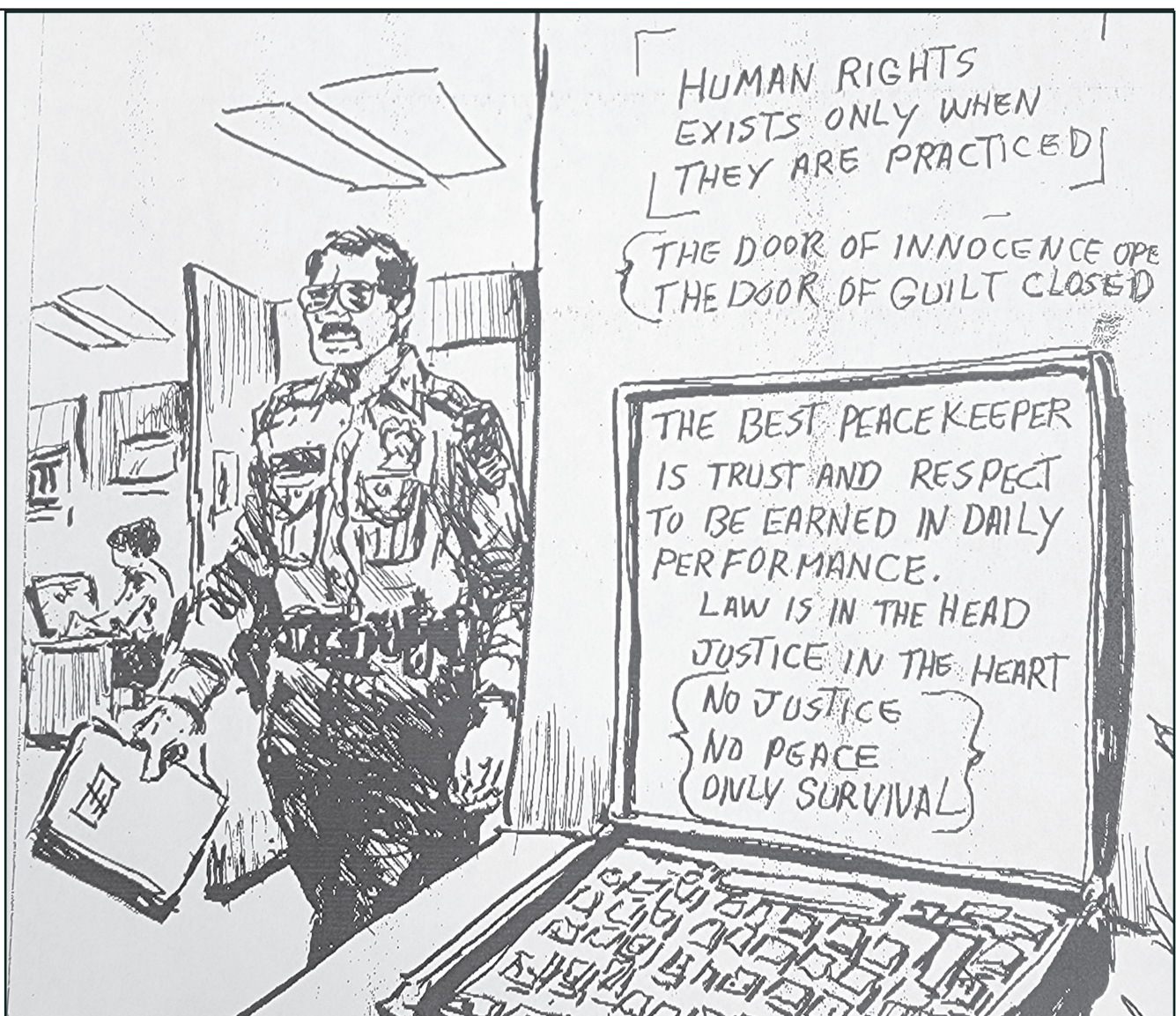

A leader on and off the field

In West Texas, football is king, and for one man, football and sports are his life. Cannon McWilliams is the head football and Athletic Director for Big Spring High School. If you follow Steers football, you know absolutely who Coach McWilliams is. As a sportswriter, I have the extraordinary opportunity to talk to these coaches daily, so I learned more about Cannon, his coaching journey, and his love of sports. He has a compelling story, one of hard work and tenacity. His enthusiasm for sports and coaching stood out to me, and just how much he cares about his athletes and students.

As many of you may realize, Coach McWilliams was born with sports in his blood. His dad is Jay McWilliams, a renowned coach in his own right. His grandparents were associated with either sports or education, so the young man had a genuine love for sports. Growing up, Cannon played whatever sport was in season; if it was fall, he had a football in his hands; if it was winter, it was basketball season, and if it was spring, it was baseball. So there is where his appreciation of sports started developing. With his dad as a head coach, Cannon was constantly around the field house or the fields and regularly around the individuals playing sports. That kind of lit the fire of craving to be a coach. Cannon can recall watching the satisfaction and delight his dad got out of coaching and knew that this was what he craved to do. Because his dad, Jay McWilliams, was such a valuable coach, Cannon moved around as a kid. He spent some time in Granberry, Harper, Coahoma, and then McCamey, completing his sports career. One tremendous benefit of going to these smaller schools is that he was an outstanding athlete. He got to play all the various sports that the schools offered, and he did well at them. However, as he performed successfully in all the sports, Cannon recognized that his playing days were over. He figured out he wanted to be a coach and not a player anymore. His love of coaching was just too much. He just had it in his blood. So he made a tough choice and determined that he would hang up the cleats and pursue his coaching dreams. He realized how much being a coach could impact a player's life, and he just felt that this was the ideal route for himself.

So opens the coaching journey. Coach McWilliams started at Midland College and ultimately finished school at UTPB in 2010. After graduating from UTPB, Cannon found getting hired was a little more problematic than he first thought. Back then, more prominent schools had various coaching requirements than they presently have. Finally, in about mid-July 2010, he got the call he had been waiting for.

He had his first coaching opportunity at Mertzon. For those of you who don't realize, Mertzon is a tiny town, but none, less Coach, was just thrilled to have a foot in the door. He says he picked up a lot from those years at Mertzon because of how small the school was, and he was working with the junior

high team at the time; he had to learn how to coach every position on the field. Being able to coach junior high, he studied the ins and outs of football. He knew how to coach and how to compromise with the kids. He recounts his first year as a roller coaster but wouldn't alter it for the world. The insight he gained from that first year of coaching is valuable.

After his two years in Mertzon, he had a buddy named Kurt Bird, who coached him in his senior year at McCamey, was the defensive coordinator at Muleshoe. Bird informed him about a job opportunity at Muleshoe. McWilliams was ready to move up to a little bigger school, so he put in his resume and was lucky enough to get the job. Cannon could coach under another legendary coach, David Wood, who hired him into the squad. Coach Wood is so prominent that Muleshoe eventually named the stadium with his play in after him. He was like a sponge with his time under coach Wood. In his offensive attack, some basics come from his time at Muleshoe. He has likewise taken away some things he picked up about practice. So his time at Muleshoe shaped his coaching system. Muleshoe was in the middle of nowhere, and Cannon had accomplished a lot under his one year under coach Wood but was ready for a bigger school.

An old roommate from college was a coach at Bellville, called him up, and let him know they had a position available as the swingman. A swingman coaches all the wide receivers. So he applied and was able to obtain a job in Bellville. So there he was, the WR coach, but he coached sixth-grade world geography and eighth-grade technology classes. At Bellville, he learned from another great coach in Grady Roe. Cannon stayed there for a year and, like all of his stops, gained so much more about the game of football and how to handle the children.

After his year in Bellville, Cannon received a call from one of his companions that coached in Andrews. They notified him they were going to have a secondary position open. So Cannon found his path to coaching at Andrews. He had family in Andrews and just wanted to be closer to his family, and he knew this would be the right step in his coaching career. Cannon's career was going just like he wanted; he could work with good people, all the while learning precisely what he liked and disliked about the places he had been. He was learning the way he wanted to coach. After a year of learning in Andrews, McWilliams moved on.

During this stage, he also carried out a complete lifestyle transformation. He recognized he was overweight and wasn't living a perfectly healthy life, so looking for a complete change in his life, Cannon did exactly that he started getting into the gym and just cut out all the nasty stuff from his life. This important life change brought him to his next job in Sonora. He followed one of his friends and someone he regards as a mentor in Jeff Cordel. Cordel was the Defensive Coordinator, and Cannon would be the defensive backs coach, head basketball coach, and help with the track team. Once again, as he could expand his coaching and coach different sports and football, it would simply help

set Cannon up for the future. It was his time at Sonora when his life change took full effect. Now occupying a new life, he felt this could make him a better coach and mentor. So with a new coaching job and a whole new rejuvenated outlook on life, McWilliams made maybe one of the most unforgettable encounters of his life while in Sonora. Cannon meets his future wife there. He credits his two years in Sonora to effectively transforming his viewpoint on life and his coaching philosophy.

After his two seasons in Sonora, he wanted to go back to a bigger school. He saw Big Spring was hiring for an offensive coaching position. Even though he had taught mainly defense to this point, he interviewed for the job; during his interview, he discussed both offense and defense. He was told that there might be a defensive coordinator job open; sure enough, the AD from Big Spring offered him the defensive coordinator job a few weeks afterward. So now that he had a new job in a little bigger town, he asked his then-girlfriend to move with him, which she did. Cannon was now set in what would ultimately become his destiny. His first couple of years here in Big Spring were challenging, learning a new system and conforming to new coaching styles, and the plan started taking shape. He grasped that the young kids in this town could gain so much from him and that he could be the mentor and coach he had always wanted to be. After two years of coaching the defense, the head coach moved on to a new opportunity. Mike Ritchy would be appointed the new head Athletic Director, and he named Cannon the head football coach. Cannon had ultimately accomplished it. McWilliams had his first head coaching job. He recognized it would be a demand but did not know how tough it would be. He took all of his coaching philosophy and all he had picked up from the coaches he had worked with to establish his coaching style. This is his third year of being the head football coach; they grew leaps and bounds last season as they concluded with a winning record and won a playoff game. It was around that time that Mike Ritchy wanted to step down as the athletic director, and Cannon accepted the role. This was just another hat he put on; he now had head AD duties on top of all of his football obligations as the head coach. He adapted swiftly to his new role and did an outstanding job like he has his entire life. Now heading into his third season as the head coach, all of his arduous work is paying off as the team has had those three years to learn his coaching style and offense. This should be an exceptional season for the Steers.

Cannon's coaching journey is something we can all learn from. His never-quit attitude has gotten him to the place he is now. All of his stops and everything he has learned is eventide in how he coaches the player on the sidelines. But, what is more, remarkable is that he wants to be a leader and a mentor for these kids, and that is absolutely what he is undertaking. The outlook is bright for all the Steers athletics with Coach McWilliams at the helm.

Michigan's Jim Harbaugh is AP coach of the year, Fickell 2nd

Michigan's Jim Harbaugh is The Associated Press college football coach of the year after leading the Wolverines to their first Big Ten title in 17 years and a berth in the College Football Playoff.

Harbaugh is the first Michigan coach to win the AP Coach of the Year Award presented by Regions Bank, and the first from the Big Ten since Penn State's Joe Paterno in 2005.

"It's a tremendous reflection on the entire staff, players," Harbaugh told the AP. "Everybody shares in it. A rising tide lifts all ships."

He received 22 of 53 first-place votes and 103 points from a panel of AP Top 25 voters to finish ahead of Cincinnati's Luke Fickell, who had 16 first-place votes and 88 points.

Baylor's Dave Aranda was third and Michigan State's Mel Tucker was fourth. Kirby Smart was fifth with a first-place vote and Utah State's Blake Anderson was sixth, receiving three first-place votes.

Alabama's Nick Saban and Wake Forest's Dave Clawson also received first-place votes.

Harbaugh came into his seventh season as coach of his alma mater on a hot seat after going 2-4 in the Big Ten's abbreviated schedule in 2020. After his first losing season with Michigan, Harbaugh took a pay cut and had his buyout reduced, putting the school in better position to make a coaching change if this season didn't go well.

Harbaugh also made staff changes on the defensive side of the ball in the offseason.

Everything came together for the Wolverines this season. They beat Ohio State to snap an eight-game losing streak in the rivalry and reached the Big Ten title game for the first time, where they routed Iowa.

No. 2 Michigan (12-1) faces No. 3 Georgia (12-1) in its first College Football Playoff appearance on Dec. 31 at the Orange Bowl.

"I love this team. I love this '21 team," Harbaugh said. "They've got a bounce in their step every day. They've got a smile on their face. They've worked incredibly hard."

Cowboys' easy ride in NFC East not so easy any longer

When November began, the NFC East was all about the runaway Cowboys.

Now in December, it could become about surging Washington (6-6) if it can beat Dallas (8-4) on Sunday.

A division that was won by Washington in 2020 with a 7-9 record will be up for grabs — with even Philadelphia in the mix — should Dallas falter in this rivalry game.

"It's definitely a critical game," says Cowboys running back Ezekiel Elliott, who is battling a right knee injury that has limited his production. "They're playing very good football, I think, what like four wins in a row?"

Correct, Zeke.

"And they're a little banged up but seems like they haven't really missed much of a beat and they've been having good game plans."

Washington also isn't feeding on the dregs of the league, with wins over Tampa Bay and Las Vegas during its recent streak. That string has occurred even though 2020 Defensive Rookie of the Year Chase Young has been sidelined.

Quarterback Taylor Heinicke looks as if he's earning a future contract in the nation's capital. Proven coach Ron Rivera seems to have his team peaking as it heads to five consecutive division contests to finish the schedule, an NFL first.

"I have a blind faith, I guess," Rivera says, looking back at a 2-6 mark. "I got a lot of confidence in our guys. I got a lot of confidence in our coaches and I just think that it's unfortunate, but we were most certainly better than what our record said. I know you are what your record said, but I didn't believe that."

"I do think that when guys believe in something and they really feel they have a chance, all they need is that opportunity. And that's what we are hoping to create. To get to where we are right now, with the opportunity with the door wide open, now we just got to step through it."

The action began with Minnesota surviving 36-28 against Pittsburgh on Thursday night.

Off this week in the final set of byes are Indianapolis (7-6), Miami (6-7), New England (9-4) and Philadelphia (6-7).

Los Angeles Rams (8-4) at Arizona (10-2), Monday night

A win gives the Cardinals their first postseason berth since 2015. They snapped a seven-game losing streak against the Rams earlier this season, part of going 4-0 in the division.

But Rams coach Sean McVay is 8-1 against the Cardinals, and LA has the playmakers on both sides of the ball to make things difficult for Arizona. Cooper Kupp leads the NFL with 1,366 yards receiving and 11 touchdown catches.

The Cardinals will look to establish running back James Conner, who has scored at least one touchdown in six straight games.

Buffalo (7-5) at Tampa Bay (9-3)

Following an awful performance on the field and the sideline for Buffalo in the wind and cold on Monday night, it's fair to question whether the Bills will even make the postseason. A loss here could be very damaging.

"It's never easy," tackle Dion Dawkins says. "We've had a lot of lessons. We've had a lot of tough tough days. In this league, nothing is every promised, and it shows."

Tampa Bay has won three in a row and no quarterback enjoys playing Buffalo more than Tom Brady. He is 32-3 against them and has thrown for 70 TDs and run for two more versus Buffalo.

Brady needs 18 completions to move ahead of Drew Brees (7,142) for the most in league history. He's two TD passes shy of becoming the first player with 700 TDs passing, including playoffs. And the Bucs could secure a playoff spot with a victory and losses by the Saints and Panthers.

San Francisco (6-6) at Cincinnati (7-5)

Two contenders for wild-card play-off slots who come off losses.

San Francisco forced four fumbles at Seattle, yet fell. The Niners lead the NFL with 18 forced fumbles. Two keys to stopping them: The 49ers rank second in the NFL in gaining 6.31 yards per play on first down and have converted a league-best 77.4% of red-zone drives into touchdowns.

Bengals quarterback Joe Burrow is nursing a damaged finger, but will play. The Cincinnati offense is third in red-zone TD rate (69.7 percent).

Tee Higgins has emerged as another playmaker for Burrow. He had nine catches for 138 yards and a touchdown last week against the Chargers, and six receptions for 114 yards and a touchdown the previous week vs. the Steelers.

Baltimore (8-4) at Cleveland (6-6)

Hey, didn't these guys just duke it out two weeks ago?,"

Yep. Indeed, this is the first time Cleveland, coming off a bye, has faced the same opponent in consecutive games in the regular season since 1957, when the Browns split a pair with the Eagles.

Ravens coach John Harbaugh is 23-4 against Cleveland, including 11-2 at FirstEnergy Stadium. Since 1950, only Hall of Fame coach Chuck Noll (25-21) has more victories against the Browns. And Baltimore has won four straight and 11 of 14 against the Browns since 2014. Plus, the Ravens' 14-3 record in December since 2018 is the NFL's best for the month.

Both offenses are struggling. The Browns haven't scored more than 17 points in six of the past seven games. Baltimore has been held under 20 points in five of its past six games, going 3-3 in that span after a 5-1 start.

Chicago (4-8) at Green Bay (9-3)

Another chance for Aaron Rodgers to show the Bears "I still own you," as he yelled after he beat them in Chicago in October. The Packers have gone 22-5 against the Bears in games Rodgers has started. In one of the five losses, Rodgers left with an injury after the Packers' opening series.

"I feel good about being able to leave this at some point with us ahead, which you never know, it's been an ebb and flow in this rivalry, and it's been fun to get back ahead in the all-time series," says Rodgers, referring to Green Bay's 102-95-6 mark in the league's oldest rivalry.

The Bears, who have dropped six of seven, should have rookie quarterback Justin Fields back from broken ribs.

Las Vegas (6-6) at Kansas City (8-4)

The Chiefs go for a sixth straight victory, and taking on a sieve of a sec-

ondary like the Raiders have could provide a boost to a somewhat sputtering attack. Patrick Mahomes had another difficult game against Denver, throwing for 184 yards with an interception and no TD passes. The Las Vegas pass defense is allowing just over 230 yards per game. Mahomes threw for 406 yards with five touchdowns and no picks in a 41-14 win for Kansas City earlier this season.

The Chiefs have won seven of the past eight in the series. Las Vegas, losers of four of the past five outings, is 6-0 when Derek Carr throws for at least 300 yards and 0-6 when he doesn't.

Jacksonville (2-10) at Tennessee (8-4)

Can't be a much better way to come off a bye than facing the lowly Jaguars. Tennessee hopes to be healthier, too, but the Titans have 18 players on injured reserve, and standout safety Kevin Byard on the COVID-19 list. They have used an NFL-high 86 players.

The Titans have won four straight and eight of the past nine against the Jaguars. They also have won seven straight in Nashville.

Only four players on Jacksonville's roster even have wins at Nissan Stadium, and none of them came with the Jaguars. Receiver Tavon Austin, defensive tackle Malcom Brown, running back Carlos Hyde and defensive end Jihad Ward are the lone Jaguars with wins in Nashville.

New York Giants (4-8) at Los Angeles Chargers (7-5)

Both sides have concerns about who won't be available. Chargers receivers Keenan Allen and Mike Williams and cornerback Chris Harris Jr. are in COVID-19 protocol. All three could test out before Sunday and play.

Giants QB Mike Glennon (concussion protocol) is expected to start as long as he is cleared. If Glennon can't play, Jake Fromm would likely see his first regular-season reps. Starter Daniel Jones remains sidelined because of a neck injury, and several other key offensive players are questionable.

The Chargers have won four straight against the Giants, who have lost their past four games this season on the road. They will be guaranteed a fifth consecutive losing record with a defeat.

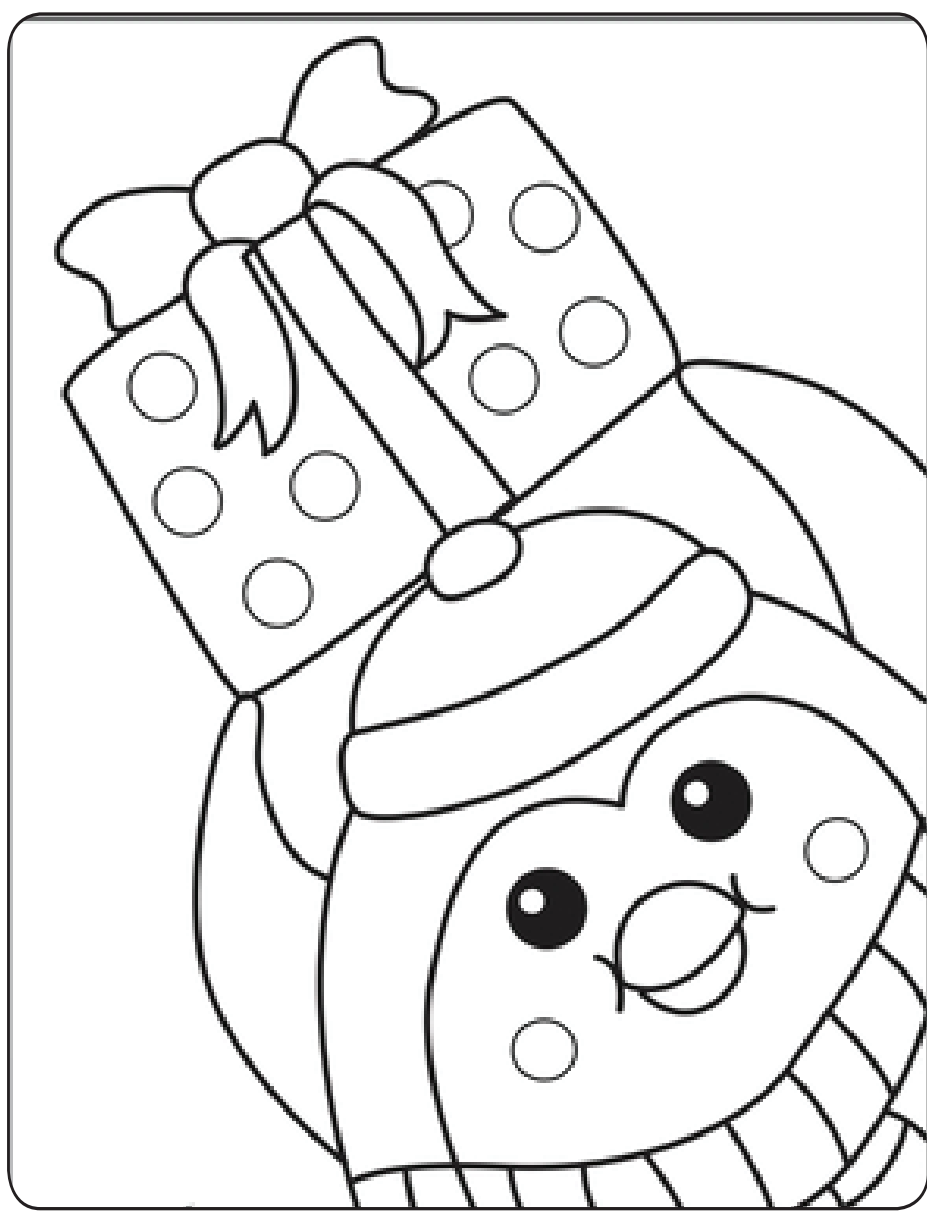

Court won't stop Texas abortion ban, but lets clinics sue

WASHINGTON — The Supreme Court on Friday left in place Texas' ban on most abortions, offering only a glimmer of daylight for clinics in the state to challenge the nation's most restrictive abortion law.

The decision, little more than a week after the court signaled it would roll back abortion rights and possibly overturn its landmark Roe v. Wade decision, was greeted with dismay by abortion rights supporters but praise by opponents.

Five conservative justices, including three appointed by former President Donald Trump, formed a majority to limit who can be sued by the clinics, a result that both sides said probably will prevent federal courts from effectively blocking the law.

Texas licensing officials may be sued, but not state court judges, court clerks or state Attorney General Ken Paxton, the court ruled. That seems to leave people free, under the unusual structure of the Texas law, to sue abortion clinics and anyone else who "aids or abets" an abortion performed after cardiac activity is detected in an embryo, around six weeks and before some women know they're pregnant.

"The Supreme Court has essentially greenlit Texas's cynical scheme and prevented federal courts from blocking an unconstitutional law," the Center for Reproductive Rights, which represents the Texas clinics, said on Twitter.

The court acted more than a month after hearing arguments over the law, which makes no exceptions for rape or incest.

The law has been in place for about three months, since Sept. 1. The Supreme Court's Roe v. Wade ruling that legalized abortion nationwide has stood since 1973.

Justice Neil Gorsuch, who has consistently voted against abortion rights, did not mention Roe in his main opinion for the court Friday. Gorsuch is one of the Trump appointees, along with Justices Brett Kavanaugh and Amy Coney Barrett.

Abortion providers will now attempt to run the same legal gantlet that has previously frustrated them. The federal judge who already has once blocked the law, known as S.B. 8, almost certainly will be asked to do so again. Then his decision would be reviewed by the 5th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals, which has twice voted to allow enforcement of the abortion ban.

In any case, it all could return to the justices, and so far there have not been five votes on the nine-member court to put the law on hold while the legal fight plays out.

"The Court should have put an end to this madness months ago, before S. B. 8 first went into effect. It failed to do so then, and it fails again today," Justice Sonia Sotomayor wrote in a separate opinion Friday.

The court's conservative majority also seems likely to roll back abortion rights in a Mississippi case that was argued last week, although that decision is not expected until spring.

If Roe is overruled, the fight over the Texas law would be largely beside the point because Texas is one of 12 states with a trigger law that would ban abortion in a post-Roe world.

Friday's high court ruling came a day after a state court judge in Texas ruled that the law's enforcement, which rewards lawsuits against violators by awarding judgments of \$10,000, is unconstitutional yet left the law in place.

The legal fight over the Texas law is focused on its unusual structure and whether it improperly limits how the law can be challenged in court. Texas lawmakers handed responsibility for enforcing the law to private citizens, rather than state officials.

The law authorizes lawsuits against clinics, doctors and others who perform or facilitate a banned abortion. The case raised a complex set of issues about who, if anyone, can sue over the law in federal court, the typical route for challenges to abortion restrictions. Indeed, federal courts routinely put a hold on similar laws, which rely on traditional enforcement by state and local authorities.

The Supreme Court voted Friday 8 to 1 in favor of allowing the clinics' lawsuit against the ban to proceed, with only Justice Clarence Thomas voting the other way. But the court was sharply divided, 5-4, on the knotty issue of whom to target with a court order that ostensibly tries to block the law. The justices ruled that Texas licensing officials may be sued, but dismissed claims against state court judges,

court clerks and the state attorney general.

Gorsuch wrote that abortion providers have to follow the same rules that apply to people asserting other constitutional rights. "The Court has consistently applied these requirements whether the challenged law in question is said to chill the free exercise of religion, the freedom of speech, the right to bear arms or any other right. The petitioners are not entitled to a special exemption," Gorsuch wrote.

GREEN EGGS VS. EGGNOG

I find it interesting how people associate items or phrases with different memories or seasons. I recently got some “homegrown” eggs from my friend Stephanie Piercefield’s hatchery. Of course, I was not surprised to find the traditional white and brown eggs but also had the treat of some green eggs. I immediately thought of my Dr. Seuss days of Sam wanting his friend to try green eggs and ham. I snapped a picture of my green eggs and ham (not green) and sent it to my teacher friends for a laugh. It dawned on me that like most city children, I never thought of the fact that eggs come in different shell colors.

Backyard chicken flocks for meat or egg production are a growing trend among rural and suburban Texans. However, there are several considerations for the backyard poultry beginners investing in what is an upfront and ongoing expense. It is important for backyard flocks to include birds from reputable sources so look for National Poultry Improvement Plan (NPPI) certified hatcheries. Backyard growers need to provide good shelter, fresh water, and nutritious feed for their flocks. A chicken coop should be well ventilated and protect its occupants from extreme weather (rain, cold, heat) as well as protect the flock from predators (raccoons, coyotes, dogs, snakes, etc.).

There are literally hundreds of breeds or varieties to choose from when selecting chickens. Just like some cattle are bred for meat (Angus) and others dairy (Jersey), chickens are bred with characteristics that make them better for egg or meat production. The best egg layers are white or brown Leghorn strains. All eggshells start white inside the hen because shells are primarily calcium. White egg layers are Ancona, Blue Andalusian, Campine and White Leghorn. Different shades of brown are from the breeds Barnevelder, Australorp, Plymouth Barred Rock, Marans Rhode Island Red, along with several others. If you are looking for blue eggs then Ameraucana, Araucana and Cream Legbar are your breeds. Of course, if you want green eggs with your ham then the Olive Egger and Easter Egger are your birds. Chickens can live for many years, but their egg production will reduce with age. Owners need to take this along with local government regulations, medical care, disease control (salmonella), dead bird disposal and manure management/disposal into consideration if they are deciding to become backyard poultry owners.

Like many agricultural businesses, poultry production can be a rewarding venture. On behalf of the egg consumer, I say thank you for all those great scrambled eggs and baked goods (cakes, cookies, etc.) I have eaten during my life. However, one thing made with eggs I never bought into was eggnog. The Christmas season has always been my favorite time of the year with the decorations and glad tidings, but eggnog never made it onto my yearly list. A traditional holiday drink dating back hundreds of years, eggnog is made with eggs (hence the name), milk, cream, spices like nutmeg and vanilla, and for adults it is fortified with rum, whisky, and/or brandy. I have been told that I need to taste the homemade eggnog and not to judge the drink by the store-bought containers. The eggnog base starts by beating egg yolks with sugar until light and fluffy. Then you slowly whisk in hot milk that's been infused with cloves and cinnamon, which tempers the eggs, so they don't curdle. Finally, you warm the eggnog on the stovetop until it thickens. It's essentially a custard. (see attached recipe found online) In doing my research I found the Puerto Rican answer to eggnog called coquito (pronounced koh-KEE-toh). Literally translated to “little coconut”, there is debate as to whether or not traditional Coquito should contain eggs. NRCS Soil Conservationist Jose Nunez whom I work with in our Big Spring office is from Puerto Rico and he votes no eggs. Jose says, “The difference between traditional eggnog and Coquito is that there are no eggs in Puerto Rico’s traditional holiday drink. It is very delicious and popular.”

Whether you are a lover of eggnog or a more eggs for breakfast type of person, poultry production is one more agricultural industry that the people of this world rely on for continued life. So, I say: “I

will eat them here and there. And I will eat them anywhere. I do so like green eggs and ham!” (but not eggnog)

Traditional Eggnog Recipe (www.tastesbetter-fromscratch.com)

Ingredients

- 6 large egg yolks
- 1/2 cup granulated sugar
- 1 cup heavy whipping cream
- 2 cups milk
- 1/2 teaspoon ground nutmeg
- pinch of salt
- 1/4 teaspoon vanilla extract
- ground cinnamon, for topping

Instructions

1. Whisk the egg yolks and sugar together in a medium bowl until light and creamy.

ADVERTISEMENT

1. In a saucepan over medium-high heat, combine the cream, milk, nutmeg, and salt. Stir often until mixture reaches a bare simmer.

2. Add a big spoonful of the hot milk to the egg mixture, whisking vigorously. Repeat, adding a big spoonful at a time, to temper the eggs.

3. Once most of the hot milk has been added to the eggs, pour the mixture back into the saucepan on the stove.

4. Whisk constantly for just a few minutes, until the mixture is just slightly thickened (or until it reaches about 160 degrees F on a thermometer). It will thicken more as it cools.

5. Remove from heat and stir in the vanilla.

6. Pour the eggnog into a pitcher or other container and cover with plastic wrap.

7. Refrigerate until chilled. It will thicken as it cools. If you want a thinner, completely smooth consistency, you can add the entire mixture to a blender with 1 or 2 tablespoons of milk and blend until smooth.

8. Serve with a sprinkle of cinnamon, and fresh whipped cream, if desired.

9. Store homemade eggnog in the fridge for up to one week.

Ingredients

- 7 oz canned coconut milk
- 6 oz white rum
- 6 oz evaporated milk
- 2.5 oz sweetened condensed milk,

1/4 cup soft goat cheese (2 ounces)

1/4 cup cream cheese (2 ounces)

3 tablespoons milk

2 teaspoons fresh thyme leaves finely chopped, or 3/4 teaspoon dried thyme

Preheat oven to 425 F. Place four layers of paper towels on a microwave-safe plate.

Top with bacon slices. Cover with two or more layers of paper towels. Microwave on high 1



to 2 minutes to render fat from bacon but not crisp.

While bacon cools, slice each fig twice, starting at stem end, and cutting three-quarters of the way to bottom.

Stuff each fig with a pecan piece. Wrap a half strip of bacon around each fig and secure with a toothpick.

Place on a foil-lined baking sheet. Bake 10 minutes. Turn. Return to the oven for 5 minutes or until the bacon is sizzling and begins to crisp.

In a small bowl, combine syrup and cayenne pepper. Brush mixture over appetizers.

For dip: Combine all dip ingredients in a small bowl. Cover and chill until serving time. Makes about 1/2 cup. Serve appetizers warm with dip.



Tips to keep your tree fresh this holiday season

Christmas trees are often the pièce de résistance of holiday decor. Few things draw the attention of holiday guests quite like an

awe-inspiring Christmas tree, especially when that tree maintains its fresh, healthy sheen throughout December.

Many families purchase fresh trees over Thanksgiving weekend or during the first weekend of December. Though the weeks between Thanksgiving and Christmas Day may seem like a long time to keep a tree looking great, there are a handful of ways for holiday celebrants to help their trees maintain that undeniable appeal for the long haul.

• Pick the right tree. Choosing the right tree is one of the simplest ways to keep a tree looking good throughout the holiday season. A freshly cut tree that buyers choose and cut down themselves or have cut down can reassure them that the tree is likely to stay strong throughout December. Trees purchased from a tree lot may have been cut down long before they made it to the lot, which can make it harder to keep them looking good until Christmas Day.

• Cut an inch off the base of any tree that is not freshly cut. MSU Extension at Michigan State University notes that all Christmas trees are conifers, which means they have resin canals in their trunks. Once a tree is cut, the resin can block the pores and make it harder for the tree to take in water. Cutting an inch off the base of a tree that was not freshly cut just before putting

it in the stand can help ensure it gets the water it needs to stay healthy and firm. MSU Extension notes that this approach should be taken with any tree that was not cut within six to eight hours of being put in a stand.

• Replenish the water supply every day. Fresh tree veterans recognize that Christmas trees can be very thirsty, especially within the first week or so of being cut and brought home. Fill the stand with water each morning and, if necessary, refill it each night before going to bed. The more water a tree gets and drinks, the more likely it is that the tree will look healthy all the way to Christmas Day. MSU Extension notes that many decorative or antique tree stands do not hold much water, so anyone with such a stand may need to replenish the water supply more than once or twice per day.

• Keep the tree away from a heat source. For safety's sake, trees should be kept away from heating vents, fireplaces and space heaters. But keeping trees away from such heat sources, and ensuring they are not spending the daytime in direct sunlight, also decreases the chances they will dry out before Christmas Day.

A handful of simple strategies can help holiday celebrants keep their Christmas trees looking good throughout the month of December.

The problem of which long suit to establish in notrump play, when there is a genuine choice, does not always lend itself to hard and fast rules. While general bidding principles can be memorized to help one arrive at the proper contract, there are relatively few corresponding principles to direct declarer to the best line of play.

Take this case where South is in three notrump and starts with seven sure tricks. The two more he

needs must come from either spades or clubs. In selecting which suit to attack, South should not be influenced by generalities such as always attacking the longest and/or strongest suit. Instead, the decision should be based on plain common sense—that is, which suit is more likely to produce the desired result.

If spades are attacked, he should ask himself: Will nine tricks surely materialize? The answer is probably, but not certainly. Thus, in the actual deal, if South wins the heart lead and finesses the jack of spades, he will go down after East wins with the queen and returns the ten of spades. Dummy's strong spades eventually prove to be declarer's weakness.

But if South takes the time to ask himself whether he should attack clubs instead, he finds that making 10 tricks is an absolute certainty. Regardless of how the East-West cards are divided, declarer cannot be stopped from scoring three clubs, three hearts, two diamonds and two spades after forcing out the ace and queen of clubs.

In this case, simple logic leads South to conclude that the clubs are a safer bet than the spades. This time, the seemingly weaker suit gets the nod.

A Man's Loss Touches Readers

Dear Annie: I am asking you to reprint your column with the letter from "Neil," who lost his wife to cancer and was having a difficult time coping with his grief. I am giving my copy to my brother-in-law, as he lost his wife, my sister, to glioblastoma, a type of brain cancer, Nov. 1. Now I would like to have another copy. -- Kansas Karol

Dear Kansas Karol: I'm so sorry for your loss. Many were touched by Neil's letter. Here it is.

Dear Annie: I am a 69-year-old man who, until now, only read your column periodically. Each time I read your advice to someone, I would say to myself, "Hmm, that's really good advice." I never ever thought that I would need to write to you. Well, now I am eating those words. In late August, I lost the most important person in my life to inoperable pancreatic cancer. My wife was diagnosed in June 2014, and despite the fact that the cancer spread to three additional organs, she fought back. This amazing woman refused to let the cancer win. She went on

with her life, and even though she received chemo and radiation therapy on a regular basis, as well as numerous medications, she refused to give in.

I drove her to every doctor's appointment and every radiation and chemotherapy appointment, as well as all over the country as we searched for clinical trials. However, after two-plus years, her fragile body could fight no longer, and she died in my arms.

The reason I am writing to you is that I am a total mess. Friends and family are calling me to come to dinner. I don't want to be around people as I grieve; I prefer to be alone all of the time. Our house is just as it was on the day she died because I simply can't part with her things at this time. Yet seeing these things sends me into pain and sobbing sessions that may last for hours. I have completely lost faith in everything, and I don't trust professionals. I have joined several grief support groups, but I do not find solace in them yet.

My wife and I spent 50 years of our lives together. She was my best friend, my soul mate and my only love. Without her, I feel empty and incomplete. Although people keep telling me that things eventually will get better, I have my doubts. I am trying to take care of myself and to do the things I believe she would want me to do if she were still alive. The only thing I really have difficulty doing is sleeping. I would appreciate any advice you can

offer. -- Neil

Dear Neil: I know that nothing I say can reduce the enormity of your loss -- that my response may come across as cliched or maybe even a little hollow -- because in the face of such grief, words look ridiculous and small. Still, I must say, with all of my heart, that I am so sorry for your loss.

In these times of deep grief, turn to the memories you and your wife shared. Let them warm you through the night like a blanket. They are eternal. No one can ever take those away from you. Your wife lives on in your heart. Let her strength help you through this.

Be patient with yourself and permit yourself to grieve as long and as deeply as you need. But it sounds as if your wife was an amazing fighter, and she would want you to fight -- to be strong, to wring as much joy and happiness out of life as you possibly can, every single glorious day on this earth.

You are blessed to have friends and family who want to lift you up. When you are ready, you will let them. One day, someone close to you will find himself in this same unfathomable situation, and your friendship will be his saving grace. Think how proud your wife would be to see you spread that love.

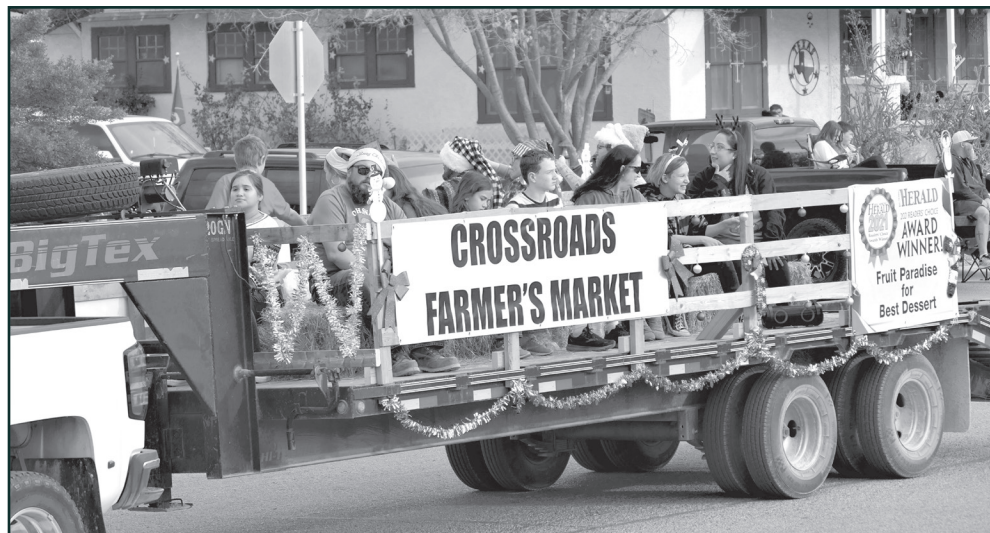

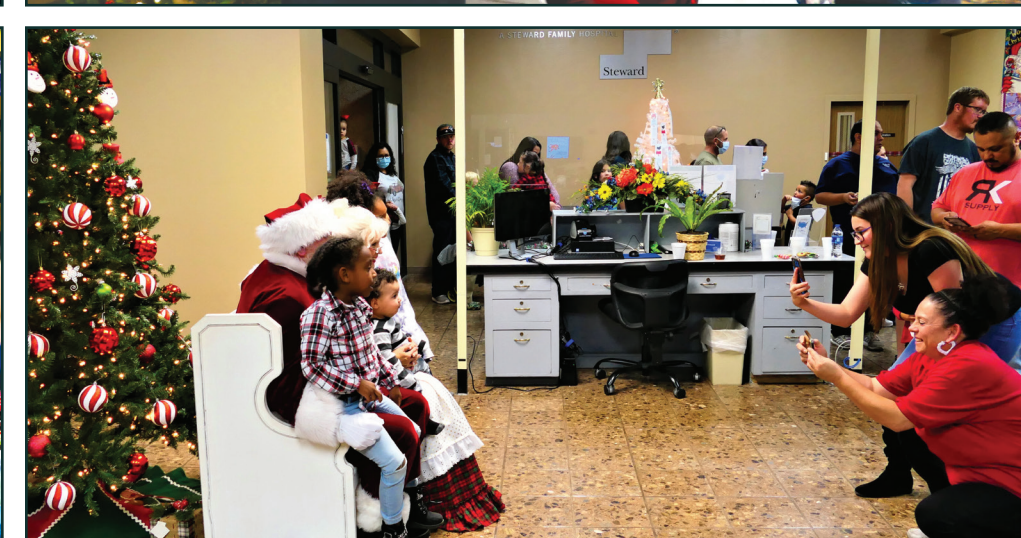

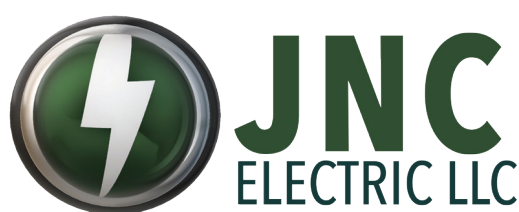

Melissa Joan Hart offers 'Mistletoe in Montana'

Melissa Joan Hart knows what it's like to direct other actors, so she doesn't mind being directed by one ... especially if the person is a close friend.

Television's former "Sabrina, the Teenage Witch" is guided by "Life Goes On" and "ER" alum Kellie Martin in "Mistletoe in Montana," a Lifetime movie that debuts Friday, Dec. 17. Also an executive producer of the film along with her mother Paula, Hart plays the operator of a ranch resort that a single father (Duane Henry, "NCIS") visits with his children at holiday time, possibly resulting in romance. Jamey Sheridan ("Law & Order: Criminal Intent") also stars as the Hart character's father.

"This movie is actually inspired by my cousin's true-life experience going to a dude ranch," Hart explains. "She met a wrangler and fell in love, so this is the flip-flop of that. We were at her wedding in Wyoming last year, and my mother and I were on horseback ... and I said, 'This would make a great movie.' And she said, 'Well, do you want to be the wrangler or the guest?' And I was like, 'I wanna be the wrangler, 'cause I wanna really learn how to be a cowgirl.'"

Hart drew upon a summer of childhood horse-riding lessons, but she says that while making the movie on location, "I rode as many horses as I could for as long as I could, and learned about different rein techniques and different ways to respond to a horse and how horses respond to you. There were some lessons I went away for and told my husband, 'I'll see you in three hours, if you're lucky. I might not make it back.'"

Though director Martin starred in 2019's "Christmas in Montana," that actually was filmed in Canada, but she's familiar with Montana as her husband's home state. After directing a couple of her "Mystery Woman" capers, she notes her latest turn in that seat was "super-challenging. There's not a lot of film crew based in Montana, and this particular summer because of the pandemic, a lot of people were like, 'I want to get away where there are no people. Let's go to Montana!' It was surprisingly difficult to shoot there this summer.

"That being said," adds Martin, "I know Montana so well that I do feel I brought some knowledge about what it is about. I added shots of snowy owls and elk and all the things that make Montana Montana. It was nice to be able to shoot there, even though we had to acknowledge in the script that it was unseasonably warm. Which, by the way, does happen. Often, they don't get snow there until after Christmas."

December is Safe Toys & Gifts Month

When it comes to toys and gifts, it is critical to remember to consider the safety and age range of the toys.

Prevent Blindness America has declared December as Safe Toys and Gifts Awareness Month. The group encourages everyone to consider if the toys they wish to give suits the age and individual skills and abilities of the individual child who will receive it, especially for infants and children under age three.

This holiday season (and beyond), please consider the following guidelines for choosing safe toys for all ages:

- Inspect all toys before purchasing. Avoid those that shoot or include parts that fly off. The toy should have no sharp edges or points and should be sturdy enough to withstand impact without breaking, being crushed, or being pulled apart easily.
- When purchasing toys for children with special needs try to: Choose toys that may appeal to different senses such as sound, movement, and texture; consider interactive toys to allow the child to play with others; and think about the size of the toy and the position a child would need to be in to play with it.
- Do NOT give toys with small parts (including magnets and "button" batteries which can cause serious injury or death if ingested) to young children as they tend to put things in their mouths, increasing the risk of choking. If the piece can fit inside a toilet paper roll, it is not appropriate for kids under age three.
- Do NOT give toys with ropes and cords or heating elements.
- Do NOT give crayons and markers unless they are labeled "nontoxic".

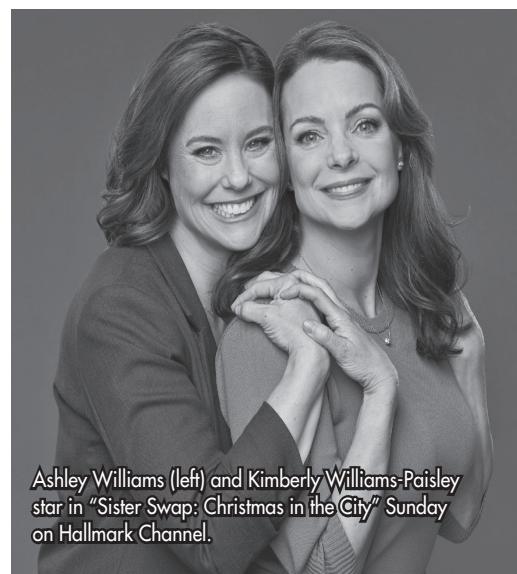
Ashley Williams and Kimberly Williams-Paisley stage a 'Sister Swap'

When it comes to literal sister acts, Ashley Williams and Kimberly Williams-Paisley are in the midst of performing one.

But they also recognized the fact that now it's just a beautiful space that people are going to feel welcome (in). And I think that was always top of mind for them – bringing people in to feel comfortable there so they can come and look at pets and adopt an animal."

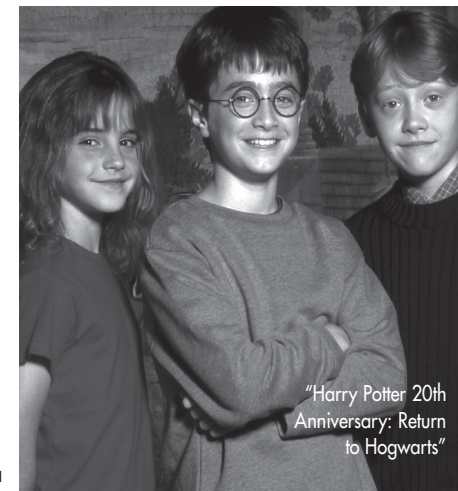

Michael Symon up for a 'Throwdown' in Food Network competition series

Michael Symon loves to teach, compete and of course, cook and he displays all three in a competition series upcoming on Food Network.

In "Throwdown With Michael Symon," a four-episode series premiering with a double episode on Tuesday, Dec. 14, the chef, restaurateur and cookbook author ventures onto the home turf of top New York chefs and challenges them to a – well, see the title – in which he takes on that chef's signature dish and creates his own interpretation of it.

The twist here is that the chef in question doesn't know this is a competition, only that they'll be filming a Food Network special. Then Symon makes his way through the crowd and throws down his figurative gauntlet. A pair of special guest judges blindly evaluates the final product and declares a winner.

So while the chef has the home crowd and the signature dish to their advantage, Symon has the element of surprise on his side.

"It's my kind of favorite show," explains Symon, who just released his new cookbook "Fix It With Food: Every Meal Easy," "where for me I get to be a chef, which I love; there's a lot of just like natural teaching

moments in the show, which I love; we get to feature basically two great chefs/restaurateurs per episode, so maybe people get to discover some new places.

"And then it ends in competition, which everybody else loves," he adds with a laugh. "So I think it's one of those few shows that hits on all those elements."

Tuesday's opener takes Symon first to Brooklyn's Pig Beach to throwdown against chef Matt Abdo and his signature burger. Then in the second, he shows up at the downtown Manhattan Eastern European eatery Tzarevna to challenge owners Ricky and Mariia Dolinsky in making their khachapuri, a cheesy stuffed bread from the nation of Georgia.

For Symon, the decadent dish required a substantial learning curve.

"That was a fun one for me," he says, "because it's something that I've never made, khachapuri. So you kind of go to a restaurant and learn the history of the dish and the different varieties of it and what someone who specializes in Georgia cuisine, what they think makes it special and unique. It was a great history lesson and learning experience for me and to taste all the different varieties was pretty awesome."

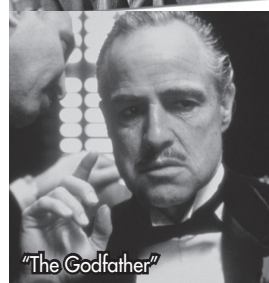

'Love Actually' actually remains a holiday favorite

Many holiday-movie classics date back a lot of years, but "Love Actually" is one of relatively recent vintage. Writer-director Richard Curtis' many-charactered, multi-plotted, enormously entertaining 2003 comedy-drama – which Freeform shows Tuesday, Dec. 14, and Saturday, Dec. 18 – has Christmas baked right into its plot, opening several weeks before the yuletide in England. Its major figures connect in a "Six Degrees" sort of way, though in certain cases, it takes getting through the whole movie to know just how.

Among them: the newly elected prime minister (Hugh Grant), who does all he can to resist his foul-mouthed but engaging personal aide (Martine McCutcheon); his sister (Emma Thompson), who counsels a new-widower friend (Liam Neeson) while having doubts about her husband's (Alan Rickman) fidelity; and one of the husband's employees (Laura Linney), who has a crush on a co-worker (Rodrigo Santoro) that's obvious to everyone else at the office.

But wait! There's more! To wit: the widower's young stepson (Thomas Sangster), who's nursing his own crush on a classmate (Olivia Olson ... and wait until you hear her cut loose on "All I Want for Christmas Is You" in a school talent show); a writer (Colin Firth) who becomes attracted to his housekeeper (Lucia Moniz) while isolating for work; two actors in a porn movie (Martin Freeman, Joanna Page); a groom's (Chiwetel Ejiofor) best friend (Andrew Lincoln), who secretly pines for the bride (Keira Knightley); and mildly self-delusional Colin (Kris Marshall), who leaves the U.K. for America, intending to captivate its female population.

And there's still one more, quite hilariously, in the form of Billy Mack (a great Bill Nighy) – a washed-up rock star who finds himself back at the top of the charts with a Christmas-slanted take on the Troggs' pop standard "Love Is All Around" that Billy himself can't stand.

That's clearly a lot of territory for one film to cover, and it's pretty remarkable how smoothly and seamlessly "Love Actually" achieves it. Curtis also provides room for some memorable turns by actors who don't have front-

one stories, an obvious one being Rowan Atkinson as a store worker who wraps a holiday gift like he's conducting a symphony (while all that Rickman wants to do is grab the present and run).

Those who love "Love Actually" love it with a passion, and it's easy to see why. Its characters are hugely relatable, whether it's a matter of watching Grant dance around 10 Downing Street to Pointer Sisters music (when he thinks no one's watching ... oops) or seeing Lincoln have an emotional unraveling when his ardor is discovered by the object of his affection.

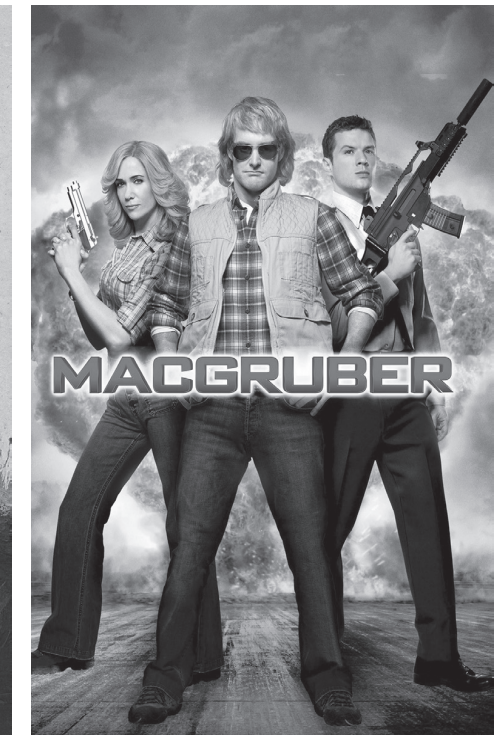

Brian Stokes Mitchell was born on Oct. 31, 1957, in Seattle. The youngest of four siblings, he spent much of his early life overseas because of his father's job as a U.S. Navy civilian engineer. He eventually was raised in San Diego, Calif., where he appeared in school musicals – and though he didn't go to college, he had private teachers who trained him in performing.

After doing parts on "Frasier," "Ugly Betty" and "Glee," Mitchell has been a guest in recent years on such series as "Mr. Robot," "The Blacklist," "Billions," "The Good Fight" and "Prodigal Son." He also was a co-star of the short-lived sitcom "Fam." His latest Broadway credit is "Shuffle Along, or, the Making of the Musical Sensation of 1921 and All That Followed."

This year, Mitchell is the guest performer on an annual holiday special that takes a slightly different form as "20 Years of Christmas With the Tabernacle Choir" airs Monday, Dec. 13, on PBS (check local listings) and Thursday, Dec. 16, on BYUtv. Along with the latest concert, the program features highlights from previous years' shows with such guests as Angela Lansbury, Hugh Bonneville, Kristin Chenoweth and Richard Thomas.

Mitchell is married to actress Allyson Tucker; they have a son named Ellington. After recovering from COVID-19 last year, Mitchell sang every night from his Manhattan apartment to thank medical personnel and first responders.

The 89th Hollywood Christmas Parade is ready to march again

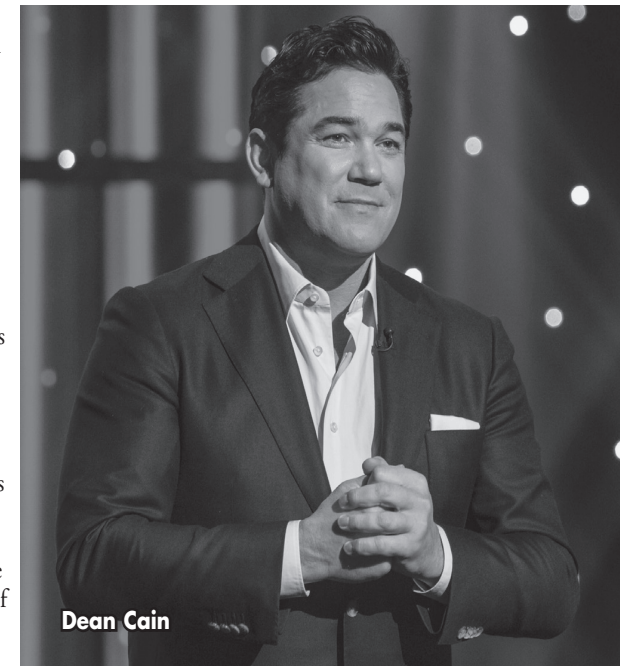

Kupp having a season for the ages for playoff-minded Rams



To say Cooper Kupp is having a monster season would be gross understatement. It's positively historic.

Indeed, the Los Angeles Rams' fifth-year wide receiver has rolled up numbers through his first 10 games that place his 2021 campaign among the NFL's all-time greats.

Through mid-November, the 6-foot-2-inch third round pick out of Eastern Washington was leading the league in the three major receiving categories – receptions with 85, yards with 1,141 and receiving touchdowns with 10. He was also about to eclipse his own personal full-season marks of 94, 1,161 and 10.

Were he to maintain this pace, he'd join only Hall of Famers Lance Alworth (1966) and Jerry Rice (1990) as well as Sterling Sharpe (1992) and Steve Smith (2005) as wideouts to pull off the receiving hat trick. And if he were to up his average of 114.1 yards per game over the remaining seven regular season games, he'd threaten the all-time single season mark of 1,964 yards set in 2012 by Calvin Johnson, also a Hall of Famer.

Of course, records are always nice but there is immediate,

bigger business at hand. The Rams are fighting with the Arizona Cardinals for first place in the NFC West and a possible first round bye in the playoffs. W's are increasingly important this time of year and Kupp and the Rams need to keep their eyes on the team prize if they want a shot at a Super Bowl run.

Kupp and the Rams can be seen in action Monday, Dec. 13, when they have a showdown on enemy turf with the Cardinals in a game airing on ESPN and ABC.

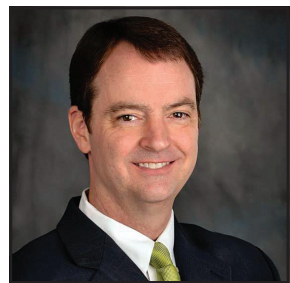

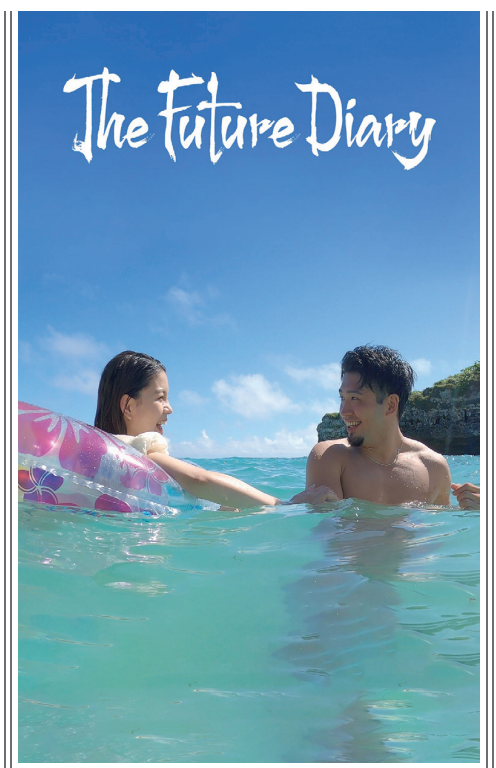
