
Graumann said the concert will be full of traditional holiday favorites.


Graumann said the Symphony will be welcoming some special guests for the concert's conclusion.



Jeff Perez, R. Gabriel Martinez, Georgia Molina, Tabitha Barbee, George Bancroft, Elesha McMeans, and Debbye Valverde, were guided by attorney Fred Stormer of Amarillo's Underwood Law Firm.

The process was prompted by unusually large shifts in population residency throughout the district. According to information provided by Stormer, between the 2010 and 2020 censuses, the school district's population increased from 23,813 to 25,447; the district's Anglo population decreased from 11,846 to 10,668; and the area's Hispanic population increased from 10,032 to 12,385. Most strikingly, the area's total population deviation between the school district's seven representation districts had climbed to 68.47 percent...the maximum deviation allowed following each Census year is 10 percent.

Stormer said the Underwood Law Firm prepared three new plans, each of which would adjust the district boundaries to shift the BSISD population into an alignment complying with the 10 percent deviation requirement.

Plan A adjusted the deviation to 3.05 percent; Plan B to 3.13 percent; and Plan C to 4.37 percent.

Other factors than deviation alone had the potential to affect the committee's decision about which plan to pick. Stormer provided guidelines to the committee that also asserted that districts should be contiguous and compact, attempt to use easily identifiable geographic features as boundaries, should maintain communities of interest, should contain their currently elected trustees' residences, should take minority voting strength into account and avoid retrogression of racial and/or language minorities, and should not diminish the opportunity of protected minorites to elect representatives of their choice if

they have sufficient numbers to make up

During the meeting, the committee members quickly eliminated Plan C from consideration, as its population deviation was the highest of the three plans presented. Additionally, committee member Jeff Perez pointed out that Plan C would have caused District 2 to divide Districts 4 and Looking over the differences between

Plans A and B, committee member Gabe Martinez noted that Plan B would shift the Limestone Ridge apartment complex from District 7 into District 4. Combined with the lower deviation percentage in Plan A, these factors were enough for the committee to select Plan A as their recommenda-

Committee member Nati Saldivar moved to recommend Plan A. and committee member George Bancroft seconded her motion. The committee unanimously approved the motion.

"I think the process went great. We had a lot of participation from the community members. We had 100 percent participation from the RAC committee," Stormer said. "They all showed up. They brought up some great issues as far as preserving neighborhoods, preserving districts, and they really fulfilled the purpose of why we created the redistricting committee in the first place."

Saldivar said she believes Plan A involves the least amount of disruption to the current voter districts.

"I believe it was less disruptive to what our voters already live in, and it had the smallest deviation," she said. "And the way the lines were cut clearly. I think this is something that the voters will accept."

Stormer said the next step is to present the plans, along with the committee's recommendation, at the first school board meeting of 2022, scheduled Jan. 13.

"The next step is, we will have a public

hearing at the next board meeting and solicit input from any other interested parties," he said. "Following the public hearing, the RAC Committee Chairman will officially present their recommendation to the Board of Trustees, and the board will vote on which plan they would like to approve until we have the 2030 Census." BSISD Superintendent Jay McWilliams

said he felt the process, as led by Stormer, went smoothly.

"I thought it went great," he said. "You put together 14 people from the community, from the school district. All of them, as far as sitting down as a group and talking about three different plans, this was the first time they had ever done it, as a group. We had sent them the information to look at as individuals, but when you come together and bring that many people, I was wondering how many different opinions we were going to have. The best part about it was how serious they took it. They know this is a serious issue.'

McWilliams said all three of the plans as developed by Underwood Law Firm were legal, but the committee was focused on choosing the best plan.

"Give credit to the committee for taking their job seriously and talking it out," he said. "Several of the members pointing out things, and all of the committee members going, 'Oooh, that's a good point.""

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

Kelce's OT touchdown gives Chiefs 34-28 win over Chargers

INGLEWOOD, Calif. — Travis Kelce, Patrick Mahomes and the Kansas City Chiefs have faced their share of challenges this season. The two-time defending AFC champions are peaking at the right time for another playoff push.

Kelce had a career-high 191 receiving yards and scored on a 34-yard pass from Mahomes in overtime as the Chiefs rallied for a 34-28 victory over the Los Angeles Chargers on Thursday night.

Kelce caught a tying 7-yard touchdown pass with 1:16 left in the fourth quarter, then ended the game with his catch-and-run in overtime. On first-and-10, Kelce pulled in Mahomes' pass at the 30 and eluded two tackles en route to the end zone, where he was swarmed by teammates.

"I don't think I've ever been part of a walk-off touchdown or anything like that, so to be in that moment, find him underneath and him making such a dynamic play where, I mean, he cut back, ran by people," said Mahomes, who completed 31 of 47 for a season-high 410 yards with three touchdowns and an interception. "You think he's old. He can't run by people. But he's still running by people. And he got in the

The Chiefs were 3-4 at the end of October but have won seven straight to improve to 10-4 and go up by two games in the AFC West.

Kelce had been held to six total receptions the past two games, but he broke out in a big way. He had five of his 10 catches for 142 yards in the fourth quarter and overtime. He also had a 69-yard reception that led to Tyreek Hill's 1-yard touchdown and a 2-point conversion that tied it at 21.

"Everybody is talking about him losing a step, he looked fast to me," Chiefs coach Andy Reid said after the 32-year-old Kelce had his sixth career game with at least 10 catches. "His endurance down the stretch for an elder statesman — he's not over the hill — his acceleration is

Mahomes bounced back after a costly fourth-quarter interception led to Austin Ekeler's touchdown and gave the Chargers a 21-13 advantage. He was 10 of 16 for 197 yards and three TDs after the turnover.

"Obviously it (stinks) in the moment. I mean, I promise you I felt as bad as anyone about that throw and that situation, and knew how bad it looked. But you will get another chance and you better be ready for that moment," Mahomes said.

Justin Herbert gave the Chargers a 28-21 lead with 2:19 remaining on a 8-yard TD pass to Keenan Allen, but couldn't make it hold up. It is the second straight season the Chiefs have come to the Chargers' Hollywood Park home and won in overtime.

"The goal is always to score. We needed to put up points, and we got in the end zone, and that was our mission," Herbert said. "We would have loved to have been able to run the clock down and not have any time, but this is the NFL, and you have to get in the end zone."

Los Angeles' defeat came after a terrifying injury to tight end Donald Parham. The 24-year-old appeared to lose consciousness after slamming his head on the turf in the first quarter. He was helped off on a

stretcher and taken to a hospital, where the team said he is in stable condition.

Herbert threw two touchdowns and ran for another score, but the Chargers (8-6) came up empty on three red-zone drives. Herbert completed 22 of 38 passes for 236 yards and an interception. "I really liked the way we managed the entire game tonight. It didn't

go down for us today, but we gave ourselves an opportunity. We just didn't finish the game off defensively," Chargers coach Brandon Staley said. The Chargers fell behind 10-0 early in the second quarter before

scoring on two straight drives to take a 14-10 lead at halftime. Herbert scored on a 1-yard keeper off left end and then connected with Jalen Guyton for a 4-yard TD on the next drive. The Chiefs benefited off Chargers' mistakes for their first 10 points.

After Los Angeles turned it over on downs, Kansas City went 95 yards in 11 plays, culminating in Michael Burton's 7-yard run up the middle. The Chiefs then turned Anthony Hitchens' interception of Herbert

into points on Harrison Butker's 30-yard field goal.

BIG NIGHT FOR HILL

Hill had 12 receptions for 148 yards and a TD. It is his fourth game this season with at least 11 catches.

SIX STRAIGHT FOR EKELER

Ekeler scored a touchdown for the sixth straight game with a 2-yard run off left end to extend the lead to 21-13 early in the fourth quarter. The TD came after Uchenna Nwosu tipped Mahomes' screen pass intended for Clyde Edwards-Helaire at the KC 4 and returned it 2 yards.

It is the third time since 1994 a Chargers player has reached the end zone in at least six consecutive games. LaDainian Tomlinson had a seven-game streak in 2004 and Natrone Means had a six-game run in

RED ZONE WOES

The Chargers could have had at least a 20-10 lead at halftime had Staley opted for a field goal instead of going for it on fourth down. Andre Roberts took the opening kickoff 75 yards and Los Angeles drove to the 5 before turning it over on downs on four straight incompletions by Herbert.

The Chargers could have kicked a field goal on the last play of the first half, but Herbert couldn't connect with Allen on fourth-and-goal from the 1.

Early in the fourth quarter, Los Angeles had second-and-goal, but Ben Niemann recovered Joshua Kelley's fumble at the 2.

The Chiefs also were not immune to red-zone failures. They were down 14-13 and had fourth-and-goal at the 2 when Mahomes' pass to Mecole Hardman was incomplete.

2. Four spades. True, you have only 10 high-card points, but game is nevertheless probable after partner rebids spades, showing extra length in the suit. Your singleton heart has enormous value. It would be overly cautious to bid only three spades, as partner is unlikely to lose four tricks.

3. Five clubs. To bid only four clubs would not come anywhere close to doing your hand justice, since you could make the same bid with four or five small clubs and a worthless hand. The jump to five clubs represents your values fairly accurately. If partner passes, you'll probably make just five; if he raises to six clubs, you'll probably make

that also. **4. Three spades.** You could take a stab at three notrump, but, considering your 6-3-3-1 distribution, the hand will almost surely play better in spades. The three-spade bid (forcing) asks partner to choose between spades and notrump, depending on his hand. Since you are in no position to judge what is best, you should let partner make the final decision. If he has something like: ♠ Q8532 ♥ AQ5 ♦ KJ4 ♣ Q6, three notrump is by far the best contract.





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Cowboys rookie Parsons focuses on next steps as praise grows

FRISCO, Texas — After a sixth consecutive game with a sack, Dallas Cowboys rookie linebacker Micah Parsons started the next day with a text to one of his coaches.

"What do we got this week?" Parsons asked defensive coordinator Dan Quinn.

The question fits with the philosophy of the former Penn State player who skipped college football's shortened COVID-19 year before getting drafted 12th overall. Parsons is always thinking about what's next, not what's done.

"That drive I have inside of me, wanting to be great, wanting to do more, wanting more on my plate just comes with wanting to do this," Parsons said. "I don't think nobody can become something by sitting back and watch and waiting for something to happen. I am trying to initiate it to happen."

So what's next? How about the first player in 40 years to sweep the NFL's two biggest defensive awards, player and rookie of the year?

The last to do that was Pro Football Hall of Famer Lawrence Taylor in 1981. The Cowboys (9-4) are playing Taylor's team, the New York Giants (4-9), on Sunday.

Yes, people are already dropping that name while watching Parsons get within range of two rookie sacks records and calling him the best player on the Dallas roster — offense or defense.

"It's really too early," Parsons said. "I could see the similarities. But LT was completely different. It's an honor that people are doing that. But to be compared to a Hall of Famer so early on, I mean it's not ready to be in the conversation yet. I still have a long way to go."

Parsons had already started the LT talk before last week's 27-20 victory over Washington, when his strip sack on Taylor Heinicke led to Dallas' second consecutive game with a defensive touchdown, on Dorance Armstrong's 37-yard fumble return.

That was one of two sacks for Parsons, the third time he has done that during a six-game run with at least one sack. That streak is two games shy of Jevon Kearse's rookie record with Tennessee in 1999.

After the game, fellow rookie Simi Fehoko, a receiver, tweeted, "Just trying to find my seat on the plane and was sacked by Micah. ... Nobody is safe."

Then came Parsons' text to Quinn.

"So that tells me that he's down for a challenge and what we got to get done," Quinn said. "I said, 'Hey man, I'm still grading this game, so I'll get back to

you. Give me a minute.' It's 9:30 in the morning."

The Cowboys were without both their starting defensive ends, DeMarcus Lawrence and Randy Gregory, for Parsons' second game as a pro. News of their absences came during the week, which meant the Cowboys had to toss Parsons into the pass rushing group. Almost every snap he played in a win at the Los Angeles Chargers was at defensive and

With Lawrence, Gregory and other previously missing pieces all back, Parsons can play anywhere. And he does. Sometimes, it's as a linebacker. Sometimes, it's at end. Sometimes, it's over the center.

This was all part of the vision Quinn had when coming to Dallas after getting fired midseason as coach in Atlanta last year. But Quinn, and the rest of the coaches and personnel people, can't say they thought he'd be the first rookie in 15 years with 12 sacks and three forced fumbles — with four games

remainin

Parsons needs three sacks to beat Kearse's rookie record of 14½. He has a chance for the rare combination of double-digit sacks and triple-digit tackles.

"I will say it's hard to have expected what No. 11 is doing in terms of doing all the things that he's asked to do, whether it's make great plays in coverage, whether it's make plays on the quarterback from the blitzing spot, whether it's a natural pass rusher, whether it's just running plays down sideline to sideline," executive vice president of personnel Stephen Jones said on his radio show. "Who could have ever thought that he could digest all of that and be able to line up at all those different positions and get it done?"

Parsons would have said he could, even all the way back when the Cowboys moved down two spots in the draft and still got him after the cornerbacks they targeted were gone.

There were some early glimpses of his eagerness during HBO's "Hard Knocks" series from training camp.

Parsons begged to get back into preseason games, and wasn't happy when he didn't. He told an assistant coach, "The lion is always hungry," and has since trademarked that unexpected catchphrase. It helps that Penn State is his alma mater, and don't think his former coach, James Franklin, and others haven't noticed what Parsons is doing.

"Coach Franklin preached it a lot: the great ones always figure it out," Parsons said. "Whether it's just small details in your routine that you may have to change, or you've got to add things to your game that you've got to get comfortable with. And if you figure it out, it's always going to be a lot of success for yourself. Hopefully, I'm figuring it out and I just keep adding on to it."

MSU RB Walker, Pitt QB Pickett skipping Peach Bowl

PITTSBURGH — The Peach Bowl will go on without Kenneth Walker and Kenny Pickett.

Walker, an All-America running back at Michigan State, and Pickett, a record-setting quarterback for Pittsburgh, both announced Thursday they are skipping the bowl game to focus on the NFL draft.

Walker and Pickett both revealed their respective decisions in social media posts on Thursday, leaving the 11th-ranked Spartans (10-2) and 13th-ranked Panthers (11-2) without their biggest stars for the Dec. 30 game in Atlanta.

Pickett, the ACC Player of the Year and third-place finisher in the Heisman Trophy voting, thanked the university, head coach Pat Narduzzi, offensive coordinator Mark Whipple, his teammates and the fans in a lengthy Twitter post. Pickett called the celebration after the Panthers won their first ACC title with a win over Wake Forest earlier this month "one of the best moments of my career."

It's a moment few saw coming entering the fall before Pickett started re-writ-

ing the Pitt record book. He set new school marks for touchdown passes in a season (42) and yards passing in a season (4,319) while guiding the Panthers to 11 wins for the first time since 1981. He captured the Johnny Unitas Award last week and was named a second-team All-American by The Associated Press.

"From the time you arrived as a freshman five years ago, right up until the

"From the time you arrived as a freshman five years ago, right up until the moment you walked off the field in Charlotte as ACC Champion, you gave the University of Pittsburgh absolutely everything you had," Narduzzi wrote to Pickett in a Twitter post.

Pickett's breakout season has rocketed him up NFL draft boards. He is expected to be among the first quarterbacks selected in April.

His decision means the Panthers will be without their starting quarterback



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a decision Michigan State coach Mel Tucker supported.

"I want to congratulate Ken for all his success and thank him for taking a chance on us," Tucker posted.

Walker, a Tennessee native, transferred from Wake Forest after his sophomore season and helped Tucker's turnaround. The Spartans won two games in Tucker's debut season last year that was shortened by the pandemic.
