4.5 magnitude quake strikes nearby



Herald Staff Reporter The United States Geological Service has issued information on its website, earthquake. usgs.gov, regarding a 4.5 magnitude earthquake north of Stanton Monday evening.

According to the report, the earthquake struck at about 7:55 p.m. Monday approximately 18 kilometers – about 11.2 miles – north of Stanton. The quake was about 27 km or 17 miles west of Big Spring. The website notes that the earthquake's epicenter was located about 7.8 km (about 4.8 miles) below the surface of the earth.

The website indicates that 245 people have submitted "Felt Reports" indicating that they felt the earthquake, along with data about their experience. Reports originate from as far away as Carlsbad, N.M., east of given on the site, other

West Texas and eastern New Mexico have felt 57 earthquakes. Monday's quake, it reports, is the second strongest in the area in the last 10 years, edging out a 4.4 magnitude earthquake felt Dec. 16 north of Toyah.

Big Spring Mayor Shannon Thomason posted on the Facebook group "Big Spring Rants & Raves" regarding the earthquake:

"DON'T PANIC! We've had an earthquake,' he posted. "No reports of injuries or damage. USGS reporting 4.3 magnitude." The early estimate quoted by the mayor was later upgraded to 4.5 magnitude.

Thomason spoke about the earthquake Tuesday, saying that he certainly felt the quake.

Christmas Day accident leaves one dead near Stanton I-20 accident involving tractor-trailer fatal for Odessa man

The Texas Department of Public Safety reported a fatal accident which occurred Dec. 25 in Martin County.

According to the report, the accident occurred about 1:45 p.m. Saturday about one mile east of Stanton. Preliminary reports indicated that a 2010 Ford F-150 pickup driven by Carlos Fuentes Padilla, 69, of Elmendorf was headed east on the Interstate 20 Service Road. A second vehicle, a 2008 Peterbilt tractor-trailer

driven by Olanrewaju Oyewo, 38, of Odessa, reportedly was exiting Interstate 20 onto the Service



Road at Exit 155 and failed to yield the right of way at a posted intersection, striking Padilla's vehicle.

Padilla was pronounced dead at the scene by Justice of the Peace Nancy Bradshaw. Oyewo was not injured in the accident. Both drivers were reportedly wearing safety belts. Conditions at the time of the wreck were clear and dry, according to the report.

Highway Patrol Trooper Gregory Jordan of Big Spring assisted lead investigator Trooper Amanda Strickland of Midland on the accident investigation, as did Trooper Kaleb Raines of Andrews.

to Facebook and sent out the message 'Don't Panic. 9-1-1 was inundated with calls."

Although many people on social media specu-

lated that the quake was the result of horizontal oil drilling or of "fracking" - a process of injecting high-pressure liquid into wells to force open fissures and extract oil or gas, Thomason said the cause of the quakes is unclear at this point.

"I don't know," he said. "It could be, or then again

it might be something completely different. It could just be a void collapse that's completely unrelated to drilling. I don't have a good answer there, and I don't know that anybody has a good answer. A lot of people are saying,'Oh, yeah, it's all about fracking." Like I said, it's possible, but it's not definitive."

DENVER — After a recent road win by the Dallas Cowboys, receiver Simi Fehoko tweeted, "Just trying to find my seat on the plane and was sacked by Micah. ... Nobody is safe."

Everybody seems to have their head on a swivel for rookie linebacker Micah Parsons.

The do-it-all defender combines a rare versatility — he lines up at linebacker, defensive end and even over center — with a dogged determination as he chases down quarterbacks, ball carriers, rookie records, the playoffs, NFL honors and even history.

Parsons' 13 sacks are $1\frac{1}{2}$ shy of the rookie record set by Jevon Kearse of the Tennessee Titans in 1999. Parsons is already the first rookie in 15 years to get a dozen sacks and three forced fumbles. And with 79 tackles so far, he has an outside chance of getting triple-digit tackles to go with his double-digit sacks.

Better are the odds that he'll become the first player in 40 years to sweep the league's two biggest defensive awards, player and rookie of the year. The previous to do that was Pro Football Hall of Famer Lawrence Taylor in 1981.

"I will say it's hard to have expected what No. 11 is doing in terms of doing all the things that he's asked to do, whether it's make great plays in coverage, whether it's make plays on the quarterback from the blitzing spot, whether it's a natural pass rusher, whether it's just running plays down

sideline to sideline," Cowboys executive vice president of personnel Stephen Jones said on his radio show. "Who could have ever thought that he could digest all of that and be able to line up at all those different positions and get it done?"

Parsons, that's who.

Early glimpses of his ambition came through during HBO's "Hard Knocks" series from training camp. Parsons begged to get back into preseason games, and wasn't happy when he didn't. He told an assistant coach, "The lion is always hungry," and has since trademarked that unexpected catchphrase.

After allowing a franchise-high 29.5 points a game last year, the Cowboys are allowing just 19.5 points per game, and Parsons is the biggest reason for that dramatic drop.

Parsons skipped college football's truncated COVID-19 year in 2020 before getting drafted 12th overall by the Cowboys last April. Dallas moved down two spots in the draft after two cornerbacks the club was targeting at No. 10 were taken. South Carolina's Jaycee Horn went to Carolina at No. 8, and Patrick Surtain II of Alabama was taken ninth by Denver.

Now, Parsons leads a group of rookies who have helped put their teams in the heat of the playoff race. They include New England quarterback Mac Jones, Cincinnati receiver Ja'Marr Chase and San Francisco running back Elijah Mitchell, who hopes to return from a knee injury this week.

Other teams feature rookie duos set-

ting them up for bright futures and perhaps the possibility of sneaking into this year's postseason.

In Denver, it's Surtain and tacklebreaking, bulldozing running back Javonte Williams, although the Broncos' playoff chances are almost nil after their 17-13 stumble at Las Vegas last weekend left them at 7-8 and facing long odds.

In Miami, it's Jaylen Waddle and Jaelen Phillips, whose Dolphins are in the AFC postseason mix after their 20-3 win over New Orleans that made them the first team in NFL history to win seven consecutive games in the same season that they endured a seven-game losing streak.

Surtain has been everything the Broncos' front office and coaching staff envisioned. He's broken up or intercepted a dozen passes, including a pair of fourth-quarter picks of Justin Herbert in Denver's 28-13 win over the Chargers last month.

He picked off Herbert in the end zone early in the fourth quarter and sealed the win by returning his second interception 70 yards for a touchdown.

Surtain reached a top speed of 22.07 mph on his pick-6, according to Next Gen Stats, the fastest by a defensive back with the ball in his hands in the past five years.

That made him the first rookie since Marcus Peters in 2015 for Kansas City to have multiple interceptions, including a pick-6, in the same game.

Broncos coach Vic Fangio suggests Surtain, with his ever-so-rare combination of speed, size and length for a cornerback, ought to win Defensive Rookie of the Year honors for excelling so quickly at what's notoriously a difficult transition from college.

"I do. He's playing a very hard position, and one where it's hard to find quality players," Fangio said. "He's done a great job. He's definitely very deserving of Rookie of the Year, or any honor that could come his way."

In any other year, Surtain might be a lock. But Parsons is having an even better rookie season and while the Broncos are teetering on another losing campaign, the Cowboys have gone from 6-10 last year to 11-4 this season.

The Bengals have turned around from 4-11-1 to 9-6 and sit atop the AFC North after overtaking the sinking Baltimore Ravens last weekend. A key part of Cincinnati's resurgence is the combination of former LSU stars Chase and Joe Burrow, the top pick in 2020 whose rookie season was cut short by a knee injury, leaving the Bengals with a top-5 pick again this year.

With it, they selected Chase, who has 68 catches for 1,173 yards and 10 touchdowns.

Jones hasn't quite made Patriots fans quit longing for Tom Brady, but he's helped turn New England's rebuild into a one-year affair instead of the six-year quagmire the Broncos have endured post-Peyton Manning as they've churned through 10 starting QBs, including five different ones to start each of the past five seasons.

Ties that bind: Some in CFP will face their former schools

MIAMI GARDENS, Fla. — Michigan defensive coordinator Mike Macdonald went to high school in Georgia. He's a University of Georgia graduate. He once worked on the staff at Georgia under Mark Richt as a graduate assistant.

Cincinnati running back Jerome Ford spent two seasons carrying the ball for Alabama, scoring three touchdowns and honing his craft under coach Nick Saban.

And now they get to try to beat their old schools.

There are plenty of ties that bind for all four teams going into the College Football Playoff semifinals Friday, and the ones featuring Macdonald and Ford might be the best of the bunch. Macdonald will look to slow down Georgia — his alma mater — in the Orange Bowl. Ford is Cincinnati's top rusher, set to play against Alabama at the Cotton Bowl. "I'm looking down here at the microphone and it says Orange Bowl," Macdonald said while meeting with reporters virtually on Tuesday morning. "And it's kind of hard to believe that we're here." Oh, in his case, that's true on a lot of levels. Let's start at the beginning: He played high school football in Roswell, Georgia, for a man named Xarvia Smith. The respect was mutual, and when Macdonald was 21 and in the honors program on his way to a business degree from Georgia, Smith got a job at another high school. He offered Macdonald a chance to be defensive coordinator for the freshman team. Six shutouts later by that group, Macdonald was promoted to the varsity coaching staff — juggling that with his senior year of college. "I had some great relationships with some of those players still to this day," Macdonald said. "Obviously, Coach Smith is a mentor of mine. We were just texting actually probably a day or two ago. That was a great memory, man." He's not the only Michigan man with deep Georgia ties. Defensive lineman Chris Hinton is one of seven Wolverines who list Georgia as their home state, and Hinton nearly signed with the Bulldogs. "I grew up with a lot of those guys over there at UGA, just growing up or through the recruiting process or through basketball, so it's going to be fun going against some familiar faces," Hinton said. "They recruited me hard and were honestly my second school. That's really my second school, my second option. It's going to be really fun going against those guys. I'm excited for the game."

Ford carried the ball 31 times in two seasons for Saban and the Crimson Tide. But he's grown fatigued of being labeled "the Alabama transfer."

"I'm thankful for everything Coach Saban did for me and the opportunity to play at Alabama," said Ford, who has rushed for 1,242 yards and 19 touchdowns this season. "But I'm a Bearcat, and I would kind of appreciate it if people stopped calling me 'the Alabama transfer.' I am a Cincinnati Bearcat. But like I said, I'm thankful for everything Coach Saban did for me and the opportunity to play at Alabama around all the great coaches and other great players."

Facing his former team might be an interesting plot twist, but Ford has a chance to help Cincinnati get to the national title game. That's all the motivation he says he needs.

And Hinton gives Macdonald plenty of credit for getting Michigan to this moment.

"I think he does a great job of putting people in great positions to make plays, and he does a great job just relating to his players," Hinton said. "We understand what he's thinking, he understands what we're thinking, and we're able to bounce off of that, bounce ideas off of that, and I think that's paid dividends to our success this year. I mean, we love Coach Mac."

Ford helped carry Cincinnati to this stage, becoming one of the nation's breakout stars in 2021 and - as luck would have it - getting the chance to face a program he knows plenty about in the semifinals.

"I'm real motivated to play," Ford said. "There's nobody or nothing the team that we are playing could do to possibly add any motivation. I feel like I'm very intrinsically motivated, and everything I have comes from inside."

Fair enough.

As is the case with Ford, there's no question about where Macdonald's loyalty lies this week.

After his stint at Cedar Shoals, Macdonald became a grad assistant at Georgia. This was before iPads and tablets; playbooks were actually still books back then, and Macdonald was part of the group assembling them.

"I remember just having a really rough relationship with the printer," he said.


Office machinery issues notwithstanding, Macdonald became further convinced that coaching was his calling. Richt moved him up to defensive quality control coach for three years, before Macdonald decided in 2013 that it was time to put his business degree to use. He accepted an offer to work at KPMG, along the same time that John Harbaugh — the brother of Michigan coach Jim Harbaugh was looking for interns with the Baltimore Ravens.

The KPMG move never happened. Macdonald spent seven years with the Ravens, got hired at Michigan this past January and the rest is history.

"Just extremely fortunate," Macdonald said. "Talk about just luck of the draw. Man, am I blessed that that happened, so otherwise we wouldn't be sitting here."

The proposed facilities include a new, single-circuit, double bundled 345-kV approximately 13.7- mile transmission line linking a proposed new WETT Bernoulli 345kV Switching Station (which is located approximately 5 miles south of Garden City, near the intersection of Farm to Market Road 33 and County Road 140) to a new Edmondson Ranch Collector Station (located approximately 14 miles southeast of Garden City and approximately 6 miles east-northeast of the intersection of County Road 11 and County Road 280). The Bernoulli Switching Station will tap and loop in WETT's existing Bearkat to Sand Bluff 345-kV transmission line with doublecircuit-capable tap facilities utilizing four new self-supporting lattice towers. The length of the new transmission line is approximately 13.7 miles and the estimated total cost of this project, including the new WETT switching station and tap facilities, is \$51,660,287.


The proposed facilities will link the proposed new WETT Bernoulli 345-kV Switching Station (which is located approximately 5 miles south of Garden City, near the intersection of Farm to Market Road 33 and County Road 140) to a new Edmondson Ranch Collector Station (located approximately 14 miles southeast of Garden City and approximately 6 miles east-northeast of the intersection of County Road 11 and County Road 280) using self-supporting singlecircuit tubular steel structures. The Bernoulli Switching Station will tap and loop in WETT's existing Bearkat to Sand Bluff 345-kV transmission line with double-circuit-capable tap facilities utilizing four new self-supporting lattice towers. The route runs in a generally southeastern direction from the proposed Bernoulli Switching Station for approximately 13.7 miles to the proposed Edmondson Ranch Collector Station: the route exits the southern side of the Bernoulli Switching Station and runs south for approximately 0.2 mile in length; the route then turns east for approximately 1.8 miles before turning south for approximately one mile; the route then turns east again and runs relatively straight for approximately 2.1 miles. 
