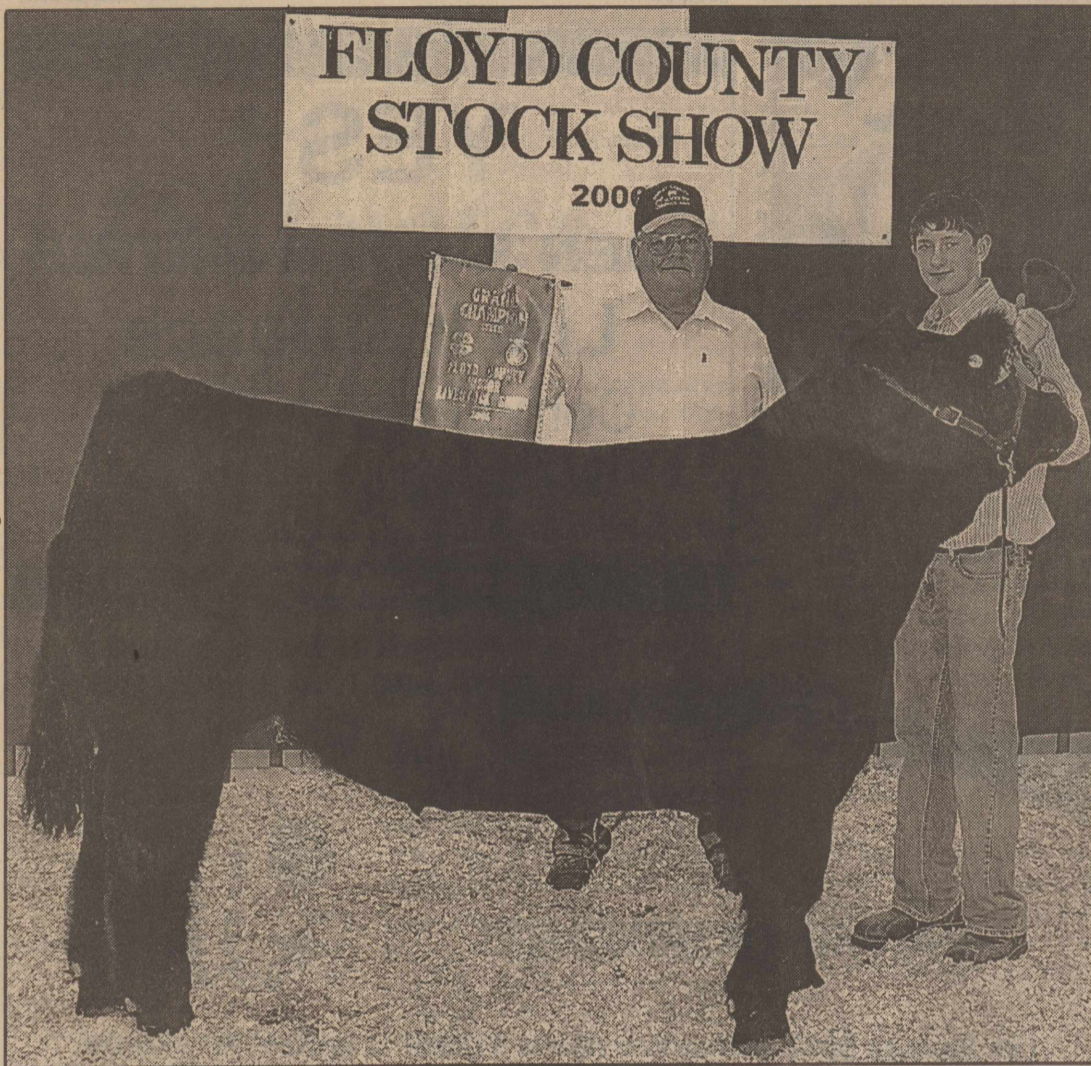

Nine steers were shown on Sunday, January 15th. Mason Lipham earned the Grand Champion honor with his 1,233 lb. Class 2 Cross. The Reserve Champion honor went to Kelsey Nutt's 1,272 lb. Reserve Breed Class 2 Cross.

In the Heifer show, eleven heifers were shown. The Supreme Champion Heifer was shown by Tylee Williams and the Reserve Supreme Champion Heifer was shown by SyAnn Foster.

The Swine Show's Grand Champion Gilt was shown by McCrae McCormick and the Reserve Grand was shown by Laura Cruz.

Goats: Senior Showman Kortney Williams; Junior Showman Kolby Williams.

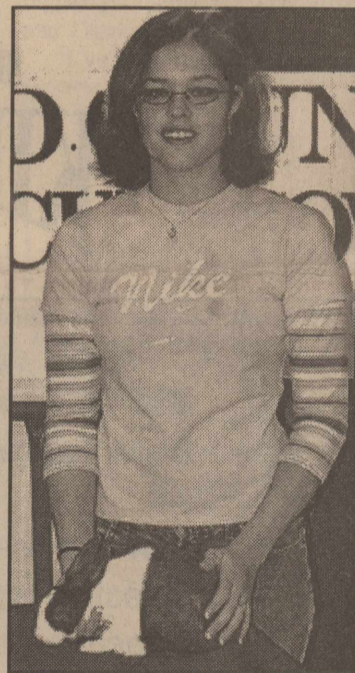

Coach feel about the recognition? "It's good for the kids and the community, but I am the most concerned about how they finish the season. After a team meeting on Monday this is how the team also feels".

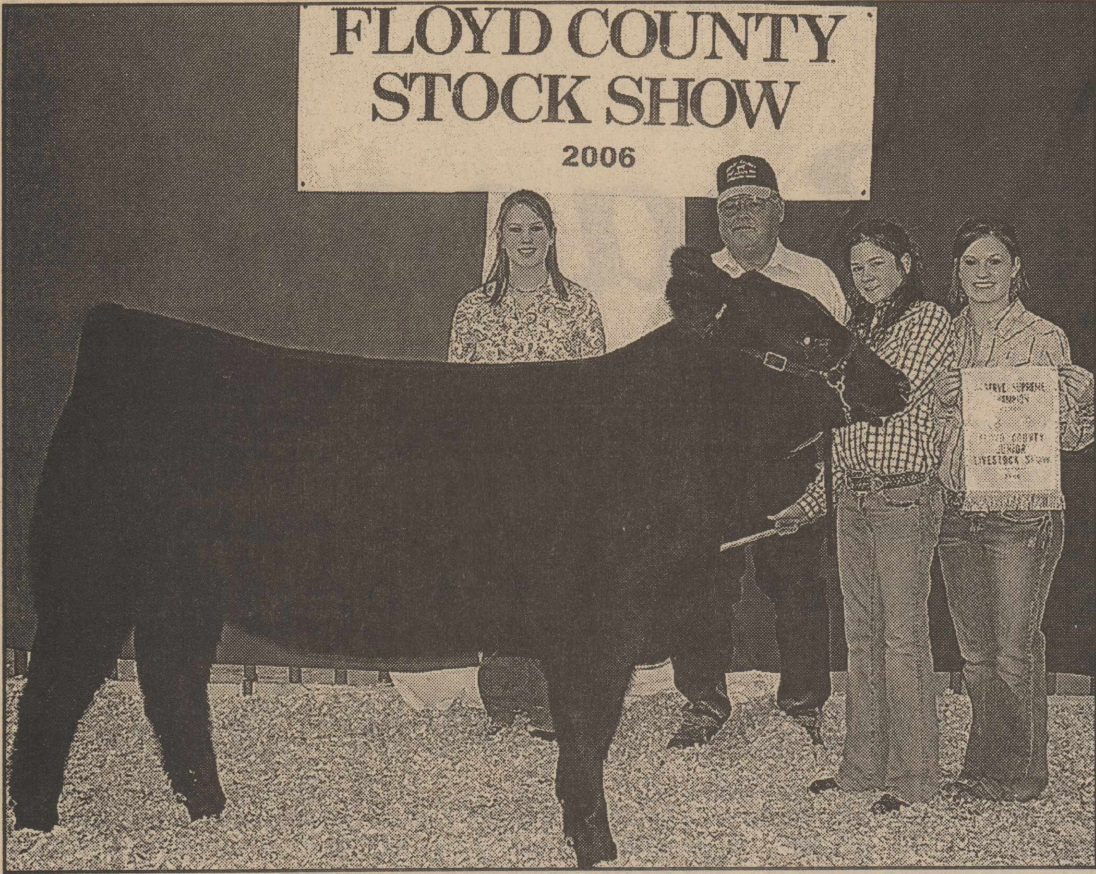
The Whirlwinds started the season at #17 in the pre-season

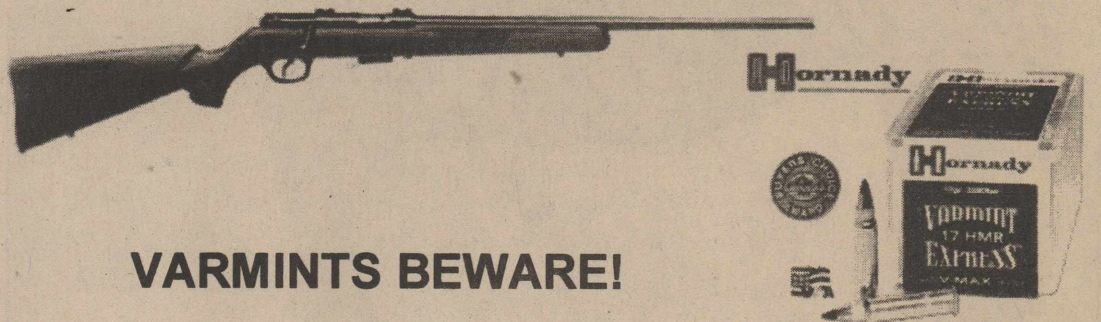

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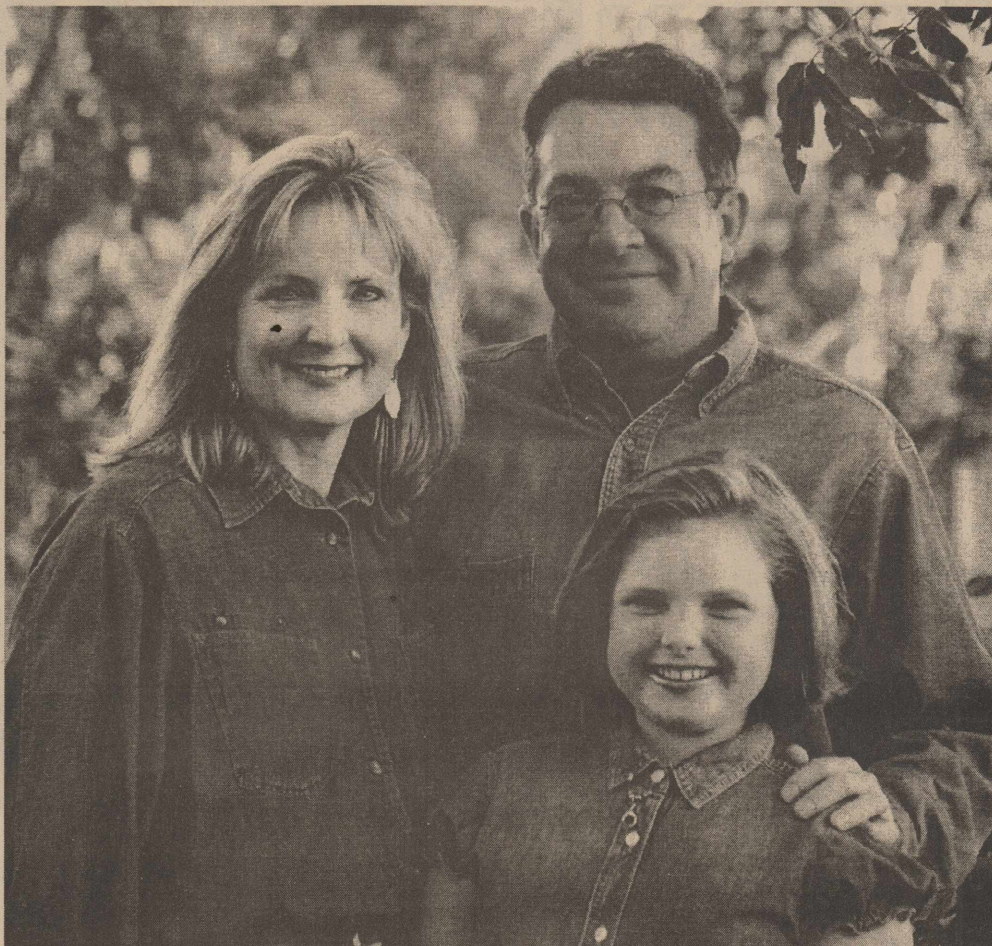

FISD plans public hearing about facilities

The FISD Board met Thursday, January 12, and discussed briefly the school's facilities' needs and the time line for a possible bond election this year.

Superintendent Jerry Vaughn told the board, "We have published a Public Notice in the newspaper announcing the public forum for discussion of school facilities. It is set for Thursday, January 26, 7:00 p.m. at the FHS auditorium. The public is invited to attend and offer input and suggestions about our school facilities."

Vince Viaille, of Grimes and

Associates/First Southwest, gave the board a brief report concerning the possible financing of any construction or remodeling needs for the district.

According to Viaille, in a written handout by First Southwest, a \$10,000,000 bond plan for 30 years at 5.70 percent interest, with state EDA funding, would require a maximum required tax rate increase of \$.2429 cents.

The report states, the impact on taxpayers of FISD on Net Taxable Value (NTV) would be \$242.89 per year on \$100,000 NTV property. For example, Net

Taxable Value would be the value of property after exemptions. Such as, a \$50,000 home, less \$15,000 homestead exemption, leaves \$35,000 of NTV. Therefore, the tax rate increase on a \$35,000 home (after exemptions) would be \$85.01 per year.

"The same applies to the ag value, not the market value, of farmland in the county. Most of our irrigated land is tax rated as number 2, our dryland is rated as number 3, while our ranch land is tax rated number 6 or 7," according to Vaughn.

In other matters, the board approved the FISD annual Academic Excellence Indicator System Report for the 2004-2005 school year and the FISD annual performance report.

The report rated FISD as "Academically Acceptable" in their summary of the overall district's attendance and academics.

Vaughn told the board, "We have shown positive growth in the district overall. Academic growth all over the state has dropped some, because the TAKS tests have become harder."

Vaughn pointed out in the written report of performance objectives and goals, "Our teachers are encouraged to attend training sessions paid for by grants, attend conferences and training institutes that will assist them in addressing their skill needs and ACT/SAT skills."

Vaughn added, "We are part of the Safe and Drug Free Schools Program. The report shows that all of our campuses had no violent or criminal incidents. That says a whole lot about our school."

Following an insurance presentation by Kyle Smith of Goen & Goen Insurance, the board voted unanimously to continue their school's insurance coverage with the state's TASB insurance agency. The yearly premium is \$76,597.

Vaughn told the board, "The premiums are about the same, but I recommend TASB because they cover all our 600 laptop computers with a \$250 deductible, while Goen & Goen's policy has \$1000 deductible. We had 18 computer claims last year with 300 laptops at junior high, but this year we have over 600 laptops including high school. If we double the

claims this year, it would cost us \$3,600 just in deductibles with Goen & Goen."

FISD Business Manager Sharon Rainwater presented a Cash Flow Statement and a Tax Statement for December, 2005. The Cash Flow Statement showed a Current Cash Balance of \$6,828,709.13, with a Fund Balance of \$5,384,338.23. The Tax Statement showed Net Collections of \$1,566,495.26, which is 72.01 percent collected.

The board accepted the resignations of Jimmy Crader and Kyle Kuehler, and employed Rebecca Avila, Special Education Aide at R.C. Andrews Elementary, Jennifer Martinez, Special Education Aide at FJHS and Samantha Disney-Harper, Special Education Aide at FJHS and A.B. Duncan Elementary.

Following a closed session, the board took no action concerning hiring a new Athletic Director/Head Football Coach, replacing Coach Lee Hurt, who was reassigned to a teaching position.

Also, following the closed session, the board extended Superintendent Vaughn's contract through June, 2009.

LISD votes in staff pay raise

In a regular meeting, January 12, Lockney ISD Trustees voted to give a raise to all district staff. The raise will cost the district \$76,090 more each year.

There are 109 employees in the district. Twelve positions have been cut in the last 7 years.

According to calculations done by Trustee Lonnie Hooten, the raise would be \$1.00 an hour or \$50.00 per month for each employee.

"I don't want our district to get a reputation for being cheap," said Trustee Robbie Long. "It is too hard to get quality staff when they can go somewhere else and make more money."

"The Service Center recommends we pay the raise in one lump sum," said Superintendent Phil Cotham.

Trustee Boyd Jackson made the motion to approve the revised pay scale for all staff. Three trustees abstained because their wives worked for the district. Abstaining were: Robbie Long, Aaron Wilson, and Lonnie Hooten. Voting for the pay raise were John Quebe, Jessie Garza, Cheryl Edwards, and Boyd Jackson.

The trustees accepted the resignations of Kay Littlefield who left to move close to her husband who works in Midland.

Math teacher Mrs. Kelley also

resigned.

Mike Williams stepped in to take Littlefield's position. Williams will teach economics and geography until the end of the year.

Danny Huggins, of Lockney, was hired to replace Mrs. Kelley. School administrators reported to the Board on enrollment, ethnic breakdowns and school failures.

Elementary Principal Jean Anne Williams reported an enrollment of 282 students. Kindergarten has 39 students and 7 were identified as "At Risk". In the 1st Grade class of 46, four were identified as "At Risk". In 2nd Grade,

nine of the 41 students are "At Risk"; 3rd Grade, five of 50 are "At Risk"; 4th Grade, 4 of 47, and 5th grade, 2 of 42 are "At Risk".

Williams presented the board with a rundown of how each class is helping the "At Risk" children with reading and Earobics programs, dyslexic instructions, tutorials, vocabulary and writing.

Jr. High Principal Todd Hallmark stated there were 134 students enrolled in Jr. High. In the 3rd six weeks, 26% of the total population had one or more failing classes and 74% had passed.

Of the 88 student Hispanic population 35% failed, 5% of the

42 Caucasians failed, and 75% of the 4 enrolled African American population has failing grades.

In High School, Principal Dean Thompson stated there were 195 students enrolled. 110 were Hispanic, 79 were Caucasian, and 6 were African American.

Of these students, 65 were failing one or more classes. Of the 65, 53 were Hispanic, 8 were Caucasian and 4 were African American.

Thompson said the biggest failures were in English and Math.

All principals were questioned about what they believed were the causes of failures and all agreed that lack of support from home was the major contributing factor.

Hallmark and Thompson stated there were also problems with students "not caring". "Poor attendance and attitude, are our biggest problems," said Hallmark and Thompson.

"I've been told that it doesn't

matter if I fail," said Thompson, "because I'm going to drop out of school when I'm 17 anyway."

Coach Joe Robertson reported on upcoming athletic activities stating that powerlifting was starting Saturday, January 14, and realignment announcements would be February 2.

"We don't know yet whether we will be classified as 1A or 2A. I've been making schedules for both. However, the Floydada Athletic Director told me that he had been instructed not to schedule Lockney if we go to 1A. Floydada will not play us in a non-district game if we go 1A. "There won't be a County Championship Game."

Trustee John Quebe responded, "That is too bad. This is the longest rivalry there is. I think it is sad that Floydada and Lockney kids would be denied the opportunity to be part of that tradition."

1931 in Crosbyton to Harrison and Lillie Ausmus Edwards. He attended schools in Crosbyton.

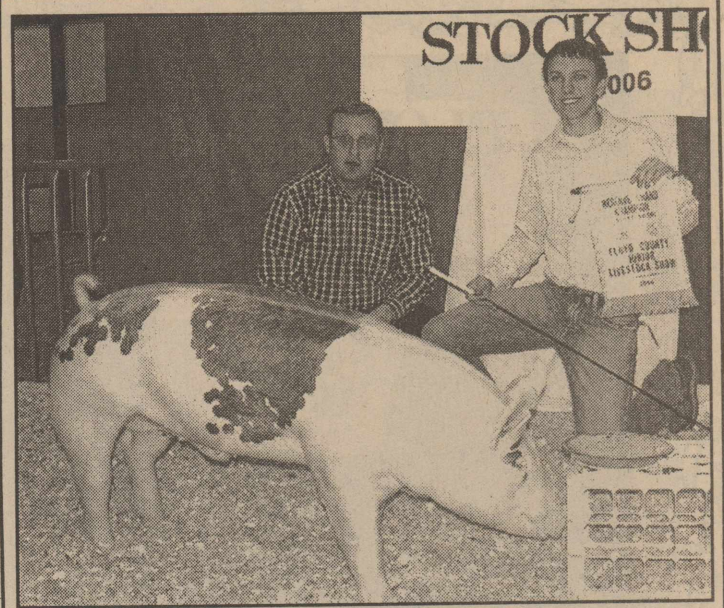

They are the parents of three children, sons Darrell and Rodney, both of Lockney, and daughter Kristi, of Abernathy. They have six grandchildren and 5 greats.

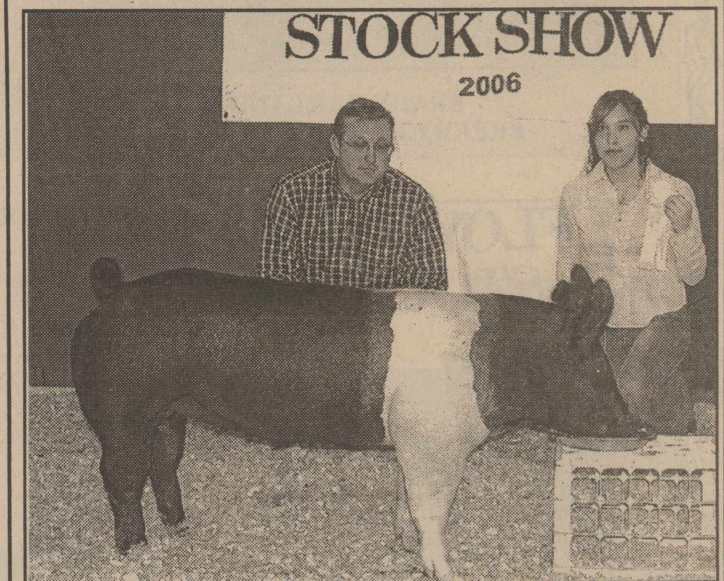

Continued From Page 1 reported on the Site-Based Committee meeting. Cotham stated that Pat O'Connell expressed an interest for Cargill to be involved with the math programs at the Jr. High and High School. "They want to contribute money as well as volunteer time. The math teachers will decide how to coordinate this effort."

"Jim Doucette described a mentoring program he had envisioned for high school students where students would go to school for 6 or 7 periods and then work with local businesses for 1 or 2 periods. Teachers would identify candidates for this program based on schedules and completion of required credits."

Cotham presented the financial report which showed 74.91% of taxes collected, or \$960,298.29. "We are ahead of last year," said Cotham.

The January bank statements showed \$505,173.28 in bank, and \$3,529,260.13 invested, for a total balance of \$4,034,433.41.

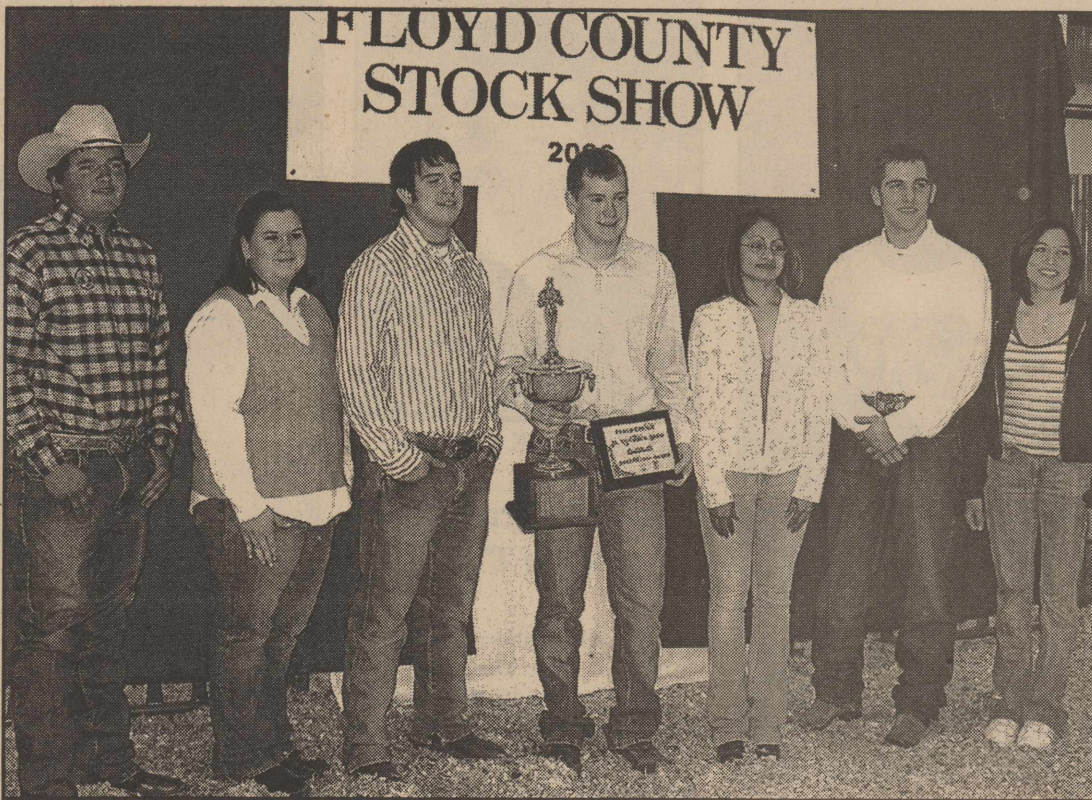

Lockney City council presents awards to Hall and Johnson

Mayor Rodger Stapp, on behalf of the Lockney City Council, presented Bobby Hall and Brenda Johnson, former president and treasurer, respectively, of the Lockney Economic Development Corporation with awards of appreciation at the Wednesday, January 11 meeting. "Bobby and Brenda have volunteered a lot of time and work to see the LEDC formed," said Mayor Stapp. "They have worked hard on behalf of Lockney and we want to show them our appreciation."

The Leadership Lockney class, created under the auspices of the LEDC was present to observe the City Council Meeting in session.

Kim Schnaubert, of SPAG, was present to address the Council concerning a grant with Texas Yes! that SPAG will administer. The resolution to apply for the grant with Texas Yes! Texas Department of Agriculture, Beautification Program for \$5,000, a 50/50 match grant for \$10,000, was passed unanimously on a motion by Tina Graves and second by Michael DeLeon. The Downtown Lockney Beautification Group will also be involved in this effort.

Concerning the \$50,000, 50/50 match grant for ball park improvements, Schnaubert advised the Council it would not be necessary to submit another application, but to rewrite the current one and resubmit it. "In order for this application to be accepted, you (the city of Lockney) must

show you will include other improvements to the whole ball park area from the swimming pool to the Lockney Youth Center, such as a walking/running path, picnic tables and BBQ pits, T-boxes for disk golf, tether ball set-up, volley ball net, swimming pool improvements, etc. You must get the citizens involved in this process," said Schnaubert. "One very good way is to have Lockney citizens write a letter of support."

Ron Hall suggested a general outline for letters of support (see his letter to the Editor).

In other business, the council passed unanimously a variance for Lindan Morris to build a metal fence on his business property. The motion was made by Junior Brotherton and seconded by J.D. Copeland.

The amendment to the City Investment Policy was tabled on advise of City Attorney Lanny Voss, who suggested waiting to develop a plan that could incorporate the new changes now pending in the State Legislature. "You could then resubmit it as a future agenda item," Voss stated.

The Council unanimously approved the text of a Lease of City property submitted by Caprock Telephone Cooperative, Inc. The motion was made by Junior and seconded by Ham Gammage.

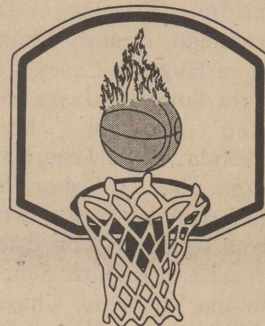
A resolution on seal-coating between Oiler Engineering and City of Lockney, was passed unanimously on a motion by Ham Gammage and second by Tina Graves.

Robin Kirk Sanders graduated from TTU on December 17, 2005. She graduated Summa Cum Laude and received a Bachelors of Science in Early Childhood.

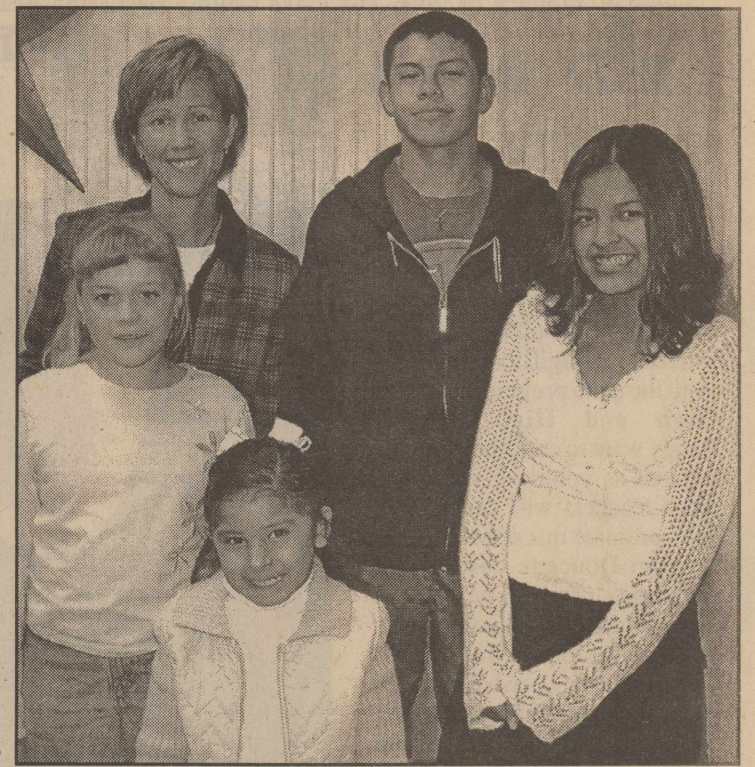
Robin was one of only 17 graduates who were recognized as outstanding students for maintaining a perfect 4.0 in her 3 1/2 years at TTU.

She was also honored by the College of Human Sciences by being designated as the Banner Bearer representing her college during the graduation exercises.

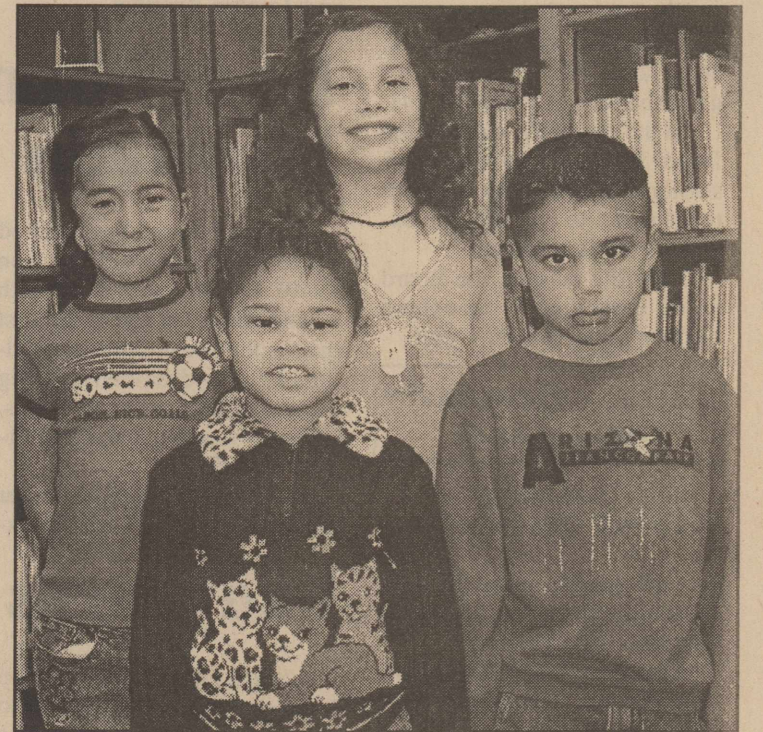

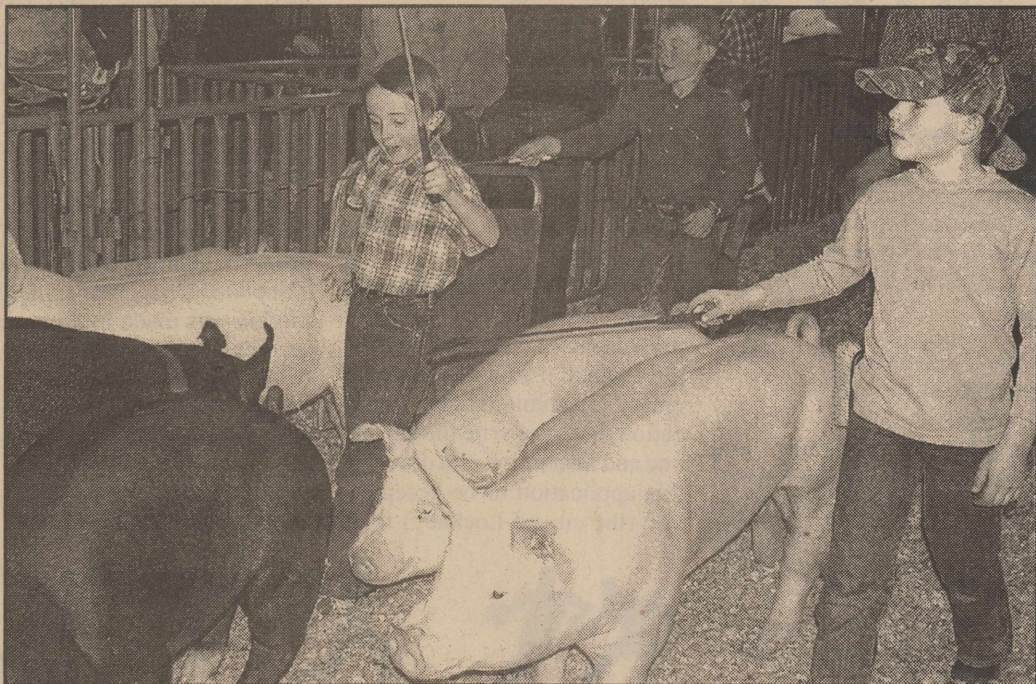

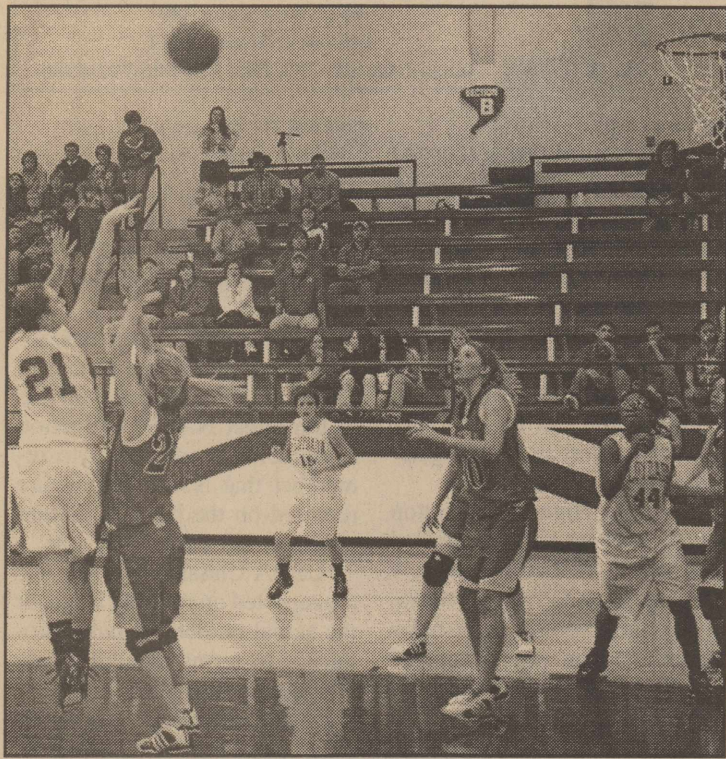

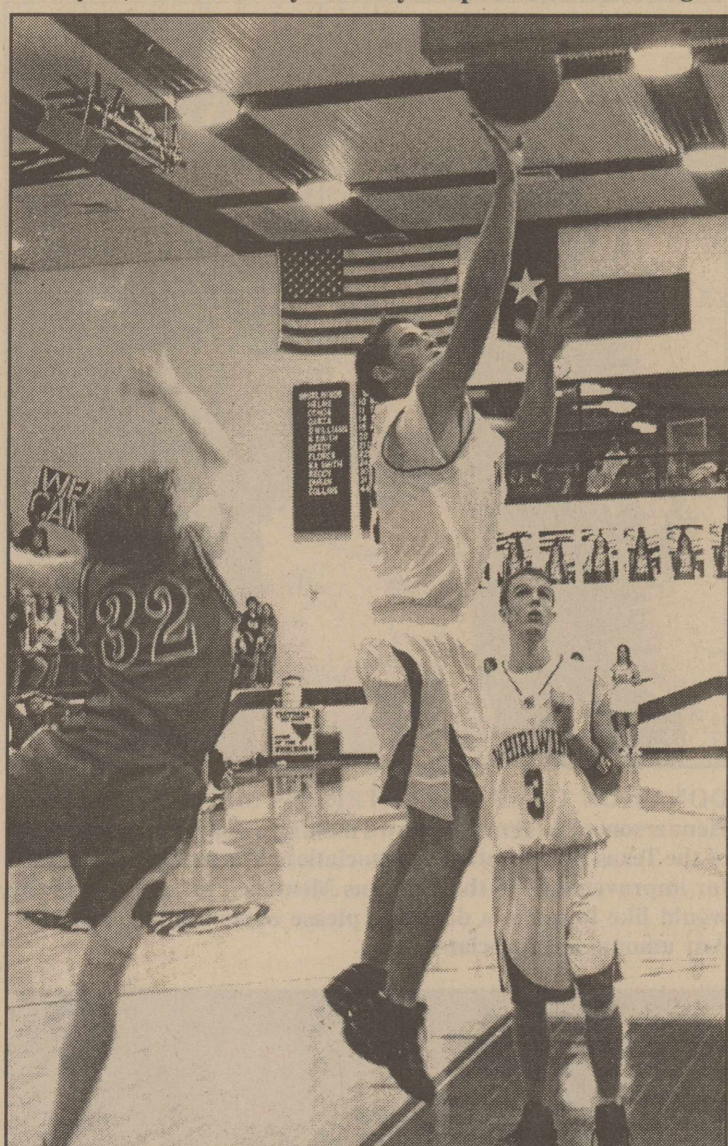

The whole team played tough defense and made it hard for Friona to run their offense. Leading all scorers in this one was

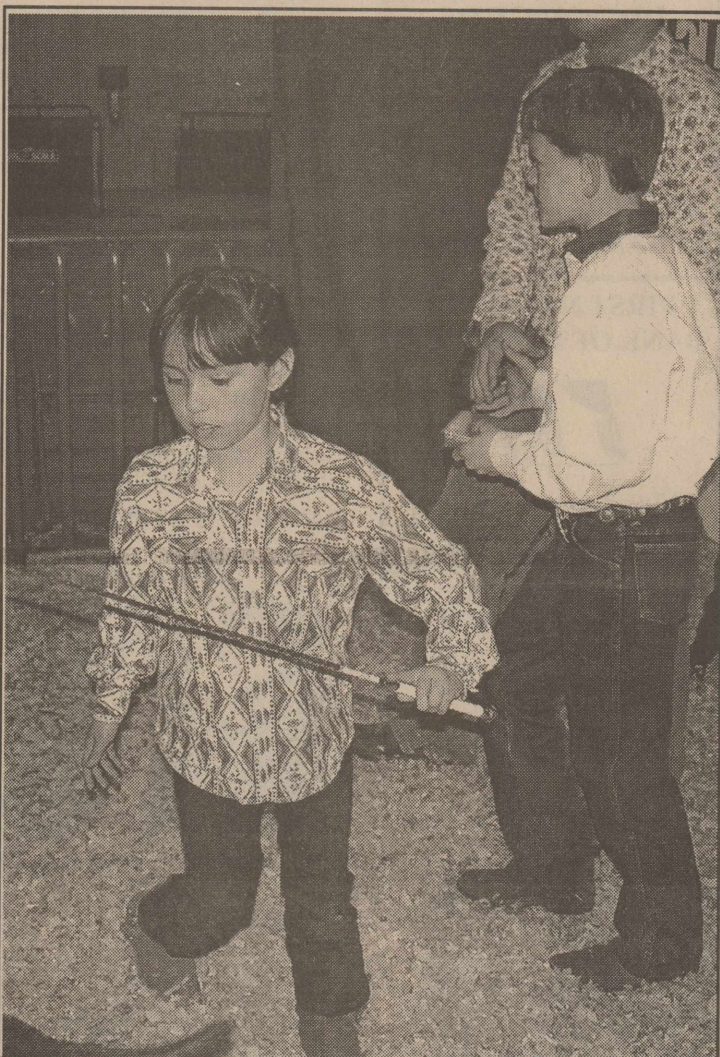

Heavy fund buying boosted cotton futures on the New York Board of Trade higher Monday, touching highs not seen since the end of October. However, the rest of the week was characterized by dull trading, and futures prices ended mixed in light volume on Thursday.

USDA's monthly supply demand report, released Thursday morning, was virtually unchanged from the December report. In world numbers, the department lowered world carryover 150,000 bales to 50.77 million. World consumption increased 390,000 bales to 115.25 million while production jumped 70,000 bales to 112.36 million.

"The supply/demand data was viewed as very neutral, although the bull might have had a case for bullishness due to the 250,000-bale increase in Indian consumption," one analyst said. "If this increase is later determined to be the result of increased domestic demand in India, then it will represent a per capita increase in Indian consumption," he explained.

There were no changes in the U.S. supply demand situation apart from raising the U.S. crop just 17,000 bales, bringing the nation's total estimated production to 23.72 million bales. The department's estimate for U.S. exports was left unchanged at 16.4 million bales, and domestic use stayed at 6.0 million bales. The crop in Texas was raised 100,000 bales, bringing the state's estimated total production to 8.2 million. Principal adjustments included increases of 80,000 bales each in the High and

Rolling Plains, pegging production at 5.63 and 1.02 million bales, respectively. Production in the Rio Grande Valley, Coastal Bend and Upper Coastal Bend regions was lowered by a cumulative 60,000 bales, and modest changes were made to other districts.

Meanwhile, USDA's weekly U.S. cotton export sales report came in slightly lower than analysts' expectations. Net export sales of U.S. cotton totaled 140,800 bales in the week ended Jan. 5, a 16 percent decrease from the previous week and 58 percent less than the four-week average. China was by far the major buyer with purchases totaling 60,600 bales. Turkey and Indonesia rounded out the list of top three buyers for the week.

Export shipments of 200,000 bales were three percent more than the prior week but 13 percent less than the four-week average. Primary destinations included China, Turkey, and Mexico.

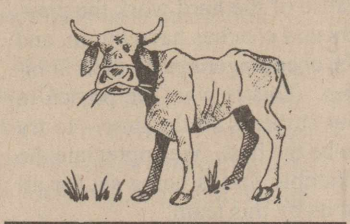
"The export sales figures were weak, but those sales were made in a holiday week when China was on holiday as well as the U.S., so that weakness is understandable," explained a market observer.

On the spot cotton scene, online trading by producers in Texas, Oklahoma and Kansas in the week ended Jan. 12 totaled 121,220 bales compared to the previous week when 100,881 bales were traded. Average prices received by producers in the most recent week ranged from 47.80 to 48.75 cents per pound compared to 46.87 to 48.05 cents per pound the previous week.

The old saying "big crops keep getting bigger" seems to be holding true as, the 2005 High Plains cotton crop received yet another boost to its production estimate in the January 12 USDA Crop Production Report.

Based on the National Agricultural Statistics Service (NASS) report, the High Plains region will produce a record breaking 5.63 million bales from the 2005 crop, eclipsing last year's 4.9 million bale record by more than 700,000 bales.

The January NASS estimate is 80,000 bales higher than the agency's December forecast of 5.55 million bales for the region. An adjustment in the expected yield per acre for Texas Agricultural Statistics Service Districts 1-N and 1-S precipitated the increase.

Breaking down (the numbers indicate) USDA believes production from the Northern High Plains (1-N) will reach 1.45 million bales, up 30,000 bales from December, and that the Southern High Plains (1-S) district will produce 4.1 million bales, up 50,000 bales.

Statewide the 2005 Upland Cotton crop is forecast at 8.2 million bales. USDA production estimates are reported in 480-pound bales.

The report estimated that yields in District 1-N should average 899 pounds per harvested acre, up 18 pounds per acre from December, and that yields in District 1-S are projected at 746 pounds per harvested acre, 9 pounds higher than the previous estimate.

While the 2005 production forecast continues to climb on the High Plains, the area wasn't the only part of the state to see significant increases in the January estimate. Both the Northern (2-N) and Southern (2-S) Rolling Plains TASS districts recorded 40,000 bales increases in the January 12 report as well.

In addition to being a High Plains record-setter from a production standpoint, the 2005 crop also continues to exhibit outstanding fiber quality measure-

ments as well. Season to date averages on the 4.15 million running bales classed by the Lubbock and Lamesa USDA Cotton Classing offices show that the dry weather pattern that has prevailed during the harvest season has helped gins run at near peak capacity throughout the season and caused no degradation in fiber quality between harvest and ginning operations.

Since the High Plains cotton harvest was essentially finished by January 1, all that remains now is for area gins to finish processing the last 1.5 million or so bales that remain. Ginning is expected to continue for another 6-8 weeks in some areas.

Staple length is one of the most important of the physical characteristics of the cotton fiber. Staple length readings reported by the Lubbock USDA Cotton Classing office, which processed approximately 3.187 million individual bale samples through January 12, is averaging a respectable 34.9.

The Lamesa Classing office, which has processed just over 955,000 bale samples, is averaging a Staple length of 35.1. Staple length is measured in 32nds of an inch. A Staple reading of 35 is equivalent to a fiber length of 1-3/32 inches.

Micronaire readings at the Lubbock and Lamesa offices are both averaging 3.7. Strength measurements at the two offices average right at the 29 grams per tex level- Uniformity readings at the two offices are stable at 80

percent for the season. Color grades from the two offices are averaging Strict Middling 21 or better for the season. An average Leaf grade of 3 has also been reported by both offices.

When comparing the bale totals from the Lubbock and Lamesa Cotton Classing offices to the latest NASS production estimate, it is important to remember that NASS figures are reported on the basis of a standardized 480-pound bale size.

USDA Classing office totals are reported on running bales, or the actual number of bales produced. In terms of actual bale weights running bales tend to average approximately 500 pounds or 3-4 percent more than a statistical 480-pound bale equivalent.

When converting from running bales to statistical bales the total number of bales produced will increase by 3-4 percent due to the conversion. To illustrate this difference the 4.15 million running bales classed so far at Lubbock and Lamesa would equate to approximately 4.32 million 480-pound statistical bales.

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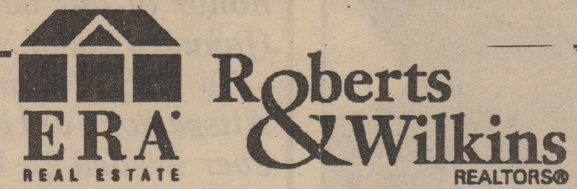
