

Power Plant generators leaving town

The City of Floydada is in the process of selling their surplus electrical power plant equipment. Some of this equipment has been around Floydada since 1916, when the power plant was first built

According to records, it was May, 1916 when Floydada passed an ordinance granting a 50 year franchise to Texas Utilities Company for the right to construct, maintain and operate an electrical system for the City.

Light poles began to be installed in 1920 and G.R. Strickland was appointed the first City Electrical Inspector.

In 1936 the City passed a bond election for \$120,000. The bond money was used to install a municipal light system. In 1939, L.D. Britton was hired as the first lineman and contact person for the City Electrical System.

W.C. Sims was hired as the first Electrical Superintendent in 1940 and he was succeeded in 1950 by J.W. Cannon, who retired 36 years later. Al Fuchs was the original Distribution Superintendent.

Woodie Morris was hired in 1965 to run the Power Plant and he retired in 1992, after serving 27 years. Connie Galloway was hired in 1966 and he became the Electrical Superintendent in 1977. Galloway retired in 2003 after 37 years.

Cannon told the Hesperian-Beacon that three years before he was hired by the City in 1950, he had helped install some of the equipment in the original power plant. "Back then there were only gine down and start it up again. An engine company man was there trying to help us fix the problem and he put in 128 hours that week."

Cannon said in 1974 another engine company man was working on one of the motors and he dropped a six inch metal rod into the big oil holding tank, then he left town. Cannon said, "We had to get that rod out of there. So early the next morning around 6:30 a.m., I stripped down to my shorts and covered my body with olive oil to help keep the lube oil from sticking to me. I got into the warm tank of (lube) oil and felt around for about five minutes until I found the metal rod. I was completely covered with the black oil when I came out of there.'

"Back then there was someone here watching these motors 24 hours a day. During electrical storms, I always came down to help keep them running. We finally got a clock installed in the plant that was run separately by Southwestern Public Service. This was very necessary in order to keep our units in sync with 60 cycles per minute. Otherwise they would not run efficiently," said Cannon.

"When we were digging some of the foundations out back, there was a man who helped haul away the mud and dirt in his 1941 Ford 1/2 ton pickup. He came all the way from Fort Worth each week to help us," Cannon concluded.

Today the City is selling five large electricity producing engines that were installed in the 50s. They run on natural gas and diesel. Four of these monster motors are from 1740 horsepower to 1770 horsepower, all producing up to 1250 kilowatts of electricity, with a 60 cycle generator attached to each one. The fifth super natural gas motor was installed around 1974 and it has 2500 horsepower.

cal Plant employee, Terry Turner, "The oil is being drained from these engines (getting them ready for removal and shipment). 1,550 gallons of thick oil was sucked from these motors just last week (by an outside source) at almost no expense. However, the antifreeze will be next and this will cost us.'

Galloway said, "Whatever it costs to get the antifreeze out of these motors, and get it hauled

off, is worth it, because of the EPA (Environmental Protection Agency) regulations."

The Power Generating Plant was completely shut down in 1977, according to City Manager Gary Brown.


Production of electricity ceased because it became more economical for the City to purchase electricity from an outside source and then deliver it to the public through the City's exist-

"All the City has now are the power distribution lines. We buy our power from West Texas Municipal Power Agency. WTMPA buys from SPS. Because we still own our distribution lines we can then sell the power to our citizens.'

Rain measurements at the West Texas Mesonet, near the Floy dada Municipal Airport, showed no trace of rainfall in January of 2006, .76 inches in February, and 1.35 inches in March. This follows the last two dry months in 2005 which showed November with no rain and December with .09 inches. October 2005 showed 2.10 inches of rain.

In 2005, during the first three months, Floydada had received 4.81 inches. The total accumulation for 2005 was 20.29 inches. The total accumulation for 2004 was 27.07 inches. In 2004 by the month of March, Floydada had already registered 7.03 inches.

In 2003, the Mesonet recorded a total of 14.73 inches.

The County races are winding down to the Run-off election on April 11 and I want to make sure that everyone interested in rununderstands our policy on printing ads.


First of all we check all ads, as well as news stories, and letters to the editor for any libelous or slanderous statements.

This policy can also be found concerning T.V. ads and daily papers.

So for anyone wishing to take out an ad in support of their favorite candidate, the ads during the week of April 6 will have to be very generic--such as, "Please vote for Mr. or Mrs. So-and-So".

In an effort to prevent a significant disruption in cotton shipments, Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. has sent a letter requesting a 45 day extension of USDA's current waiver for temporary outside storage of 2005 crop cotton entered into the Commodity Credit Corporation loan program.

The original waiver (BCD-117), issued on January 18, allowed CCC loan cotton to be stored outside on a temporary basis for a maximum of 90 days from the date the cotton entered storage or April 1 whichever occurs first.

Unfortunately, the extended nature of the 2005 ginning season is keeping new cotton moving into storage and with a slow

Summing up the situation Verett said, "It is our belief that while none of us want cotton stored outside one day longer than is absolutely necessary, we cannot risk the market implications that may arise from any delayed shipment of this crop. However, if warehouses are forced to choose between moving cotton inside to maintain loan eligibility or delaying shipments to accomplish that task, the decision will have to be made to maintain loan eligibility.

In his letter PCG Executive Vice President Steve Verett said the problem facing the industry is two fold: first, adequate inside storage space is not available to move the cotton to, due to facilities still receiving cotton; and second, most warehouses are dedicating the overwhelming majority of their labor and equip- . listed. 
