The Lockney community was shocked to learn, Sunday morning, April 30th, that all the military flags at the Veteran's Memorial Park had been stolen during the night. Veterans, contributors, and volunteer workers on the project were hit especially hard.

Clues were recovered at the scene and police are conducting a criminal investigation.

Veteran Park builder and organizer Ed Marks was especially saddened and angry over the incident.

"The veterans around here feel like this was sacred ground and it has been desecrated," said Marks.

## County combines polling places

Commissioners voted April they would do everything they in Floyd County and to also make Early Voting available in Lock-

County Clerk Marilyn Holcomb had recently asked the Commissioners Court to consolidate voting boxes.

Holcomb told the Commissioners it was becoming difficult to find qualified people who are willing to work elections. Polling places are also now required to have a trained bilingual person working, which is making it even more difficult for counties to comply with the voting rules.

Carolyn Marble, Peggy Roberts and Ann Hartman, election judges from the South Plains location were present at the meet-

Elmer Dean and Martha Williams, from the Harmony box, also spoke to the Commission-

The group from South Plains asked the Commissioners to keep the box open in South Plains. Marble told the Commissioners they felt they had enough workers to work the polling place. She also said there was a bilingual Hispanic woman is the South Plains Community that was willing to work the election.

The ladies assured the court

30th to combine voting precincts could to have qualified and trained people to work the election if the Commissioners would keep the box open.

The Williams told the Court it was difficult to find people to work the elections in the Harmony community. The Williams said in the last 2 elections only 14 people voted.

The photos will be printed in the paper each week, but we do not promise to print every picture we get. We're hoping we receive photos from all over Floyd County and the world.


The Lamesa Press-Reporter recently celebrated




Family and Protective Services or to a law enforcement agency. How to report: If you feel a situation is life-threatening, call 911. The Texas Abuse Hotline is 1-800-252-5400 and is answered 24 hours a day, seven days a week. You may also file a report using a secure web site: (https:// www.txabusehotline.org).

Reporters are not expected to prove the abuse or neglect they report. When you make a report, be specific. Tell exactly what happened and when. Be sure to report all injuries or incidents you have observed, including dates and time of day. Reports should be made as soon as possible. A delay in making a report may result in serious harm to a child. It is also important for the investigators to be able to see the physical signs of abuse, such as bruises, before they fade.

Reports of child abuse or neglect made in "good faith" and even unfounded suspicions, as long as your report is made in good faith.





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

### Lighthouse Electric holds annual meeting

For the first time in the history of Lighthouse Electric Cooperative, two candidates for a director position, James Hinton and Kreis McIntosh, were deadlocked in a tie vote. According to the co-op's bylaws, in such a case the winner is determined by the flip of a coin. Kreis McIntosh was the winner and will assume the three-year term for the district 2 position formerly held by retiring director Louis Lloyd.

Incumbent Lighthouse directors Tom Johnson and Tom Cope were re-elected to represent their respective districts 5 and 8.

Lighthouse General Manager Bill Harbin paid tribute to retiring director Louis Lloyd, calling him his friend and mentor. "We have been so wonderfully blessed by his leadership," Harbin said. "We will miss him so much, and we wish him happiness in his retirement and hope that he will continue to come by and offer his counsel."

Lloyd reflected upon his 30 years of service, and told of the changes and growth of the co-op during his tenure, the last 20 years of which he served as board president. After his address, Lloyd received a standing ovation from the members and

Harbin also paid special tribute to his coworkers, the employees of Lighthouse Electric Co-op. "You may not know all of these fine people personally," he told the membership. "But you enjoy the fruits of their labor almost constantly." He also pointed out that a group of employees traveled to the Gulf Coast and East Texas to help restore power after hurricanes Katrina and Rita, and that these employees received "high praise" for their professionalism from the co-ops they helped out. 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two states, Louisiana and Texas,"

Members heard from Bob Bryant, president/general manager of Golden Spread Electric Lighthouse Cooperative, Electric's wholesale power supplier. Bryant reported that electric rates have mirrored the rising cost of generation fuels.

"There is a lot of upward pressure on electric rates," Bryant said. "Rates will continue to be sensitive to natural gas supplies. If more hurricanes come along and limit natural gas supplies such as hurricanes Rita and Katrina did, if we have cold weather, or if there is a supply disruption of any sort, we are going to see a lot of volatility in the gas market."

Bryant said that electric loads continue to steadily grow. "There are increased requirements for serving electric facilities. There isn't much capacity that is being built, in this area [the Southwest Power Pool] or in the ERCOT area [Electric Reliability Council of Texas]," he said, "and we've seen that supplies are beginning to tighten very dramatically in this area," he said. "Transmission availability is also limited. There are limited connections from this area to the outside world. As loads grow, it's going to be impossible to add additional reliance on those transmission lines until new ones can

"We're told that new transmission facilities will not be available until about 2010, so we're going to go through a time frame here that could be very tight," Bryant told Lighthouse members. "That's not unique to this area; ERCOT has seen something very similar. ERCOT is going to continue to rely on natural gas to meet its increased load requirements and it's very clear that

ERCOT's resources are very strained."

"In the meantime," Bryant said, "we are looking for additional coal-fired power supplies, but even those won't be available until around 2010. If we can change a good part of our load from natural gas to coal, we can stabilize the rates and see a lot less volatility. It's a very significant issue for all electric customers in this area.

"I can assure you that we at Lighthouse and Golden Spread electric cooperatives are doing all we can to keep rates down and assure you of an adequate supply of electricity in the future," he reported.

Bryant also paid tribute to retiring director Louis Lloyd, who served on the Golden Spread board for the past 20 years. "He's been a faithful and loyal servant, and he's been very instrumental in the development of this organization from almost nothing to a very significant power supplier today," Bryant said. "Your members should be very proud of you, Louis, and the service you've given to this organization."

Lighthouse employee Todd Williams was recognized with a service award for reaching his 25th year of service to the co-op.

An arcing demonstration was presented by employees Danny Nixon, Billy Hunter, and Billy Joe Villarreal. Members and their guests were treated to a catered dinner and took part in a health fair prior to the meeting.

More than 50 door prizes were awarded throughout the meeting. Lucky member Grant Cage won the \$500 grand prize.

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The Texas House of Representatives wrapped up a busy week voting to approve House Bill 5, the last piece of a fivepart tax reform plan designed to provide property tax relief and replace the State's current franchise tax system with a broader based business activity tax.

A Texas Supreme Court ruling that declared the current school finance system unconstitutional and taxpayers calling for property tax relief are the catalysts for change and prompted the Legislature's third called Special Session to try and deal with the situation.

Altogether the House voted this week to approve five separate bills (HB1, HB2, HB3, HB4, and HB5) designed to allow Texas school districts to cut property tax rates by a third over the next few years. The bills also establish a structure to replace the lost funding with additional revenues generated through a broadened franchise (business activity) tax, increases in cigarette taxes and changes in motor vehicle sales tax provisions.

All funds generated by these changes would be deposited in a dedicated fund, separate from the State's general operating fund that will be used solely for the purpose of funding the State's public schools.

The following are brief descriptions of the changes made by the House passed legislation:

House Bill 1: Uses \$2.1 billion in state surplus funds to buy down property taxes \$0.17 in the first year.

House Bill 2: Dedicates all the revenue raised in the bills to school district property tax relief and creates a Property Tax Relief Fund outside of the general revenue fund. Revenues generated by changes in franchise, cigarette and sales taxes on used motor vehicles must go into the Property Tax Relief Fund, which can only be appropriated to cut school property tax rates.

House Bill 3: Revises the franchise tax provisions in Texas to ensure that each business pays

its fair share of education costs. This bill will be the primary source of funds used to buy down property tax rates. The primary franchise tax will be lowered from 4.5 percent to 1 percent and an additional \$3.4 billion will be generated annually from businesses, including those that currently avoid paying the franchise tax through loopholes. Retail and wholesale firms will pay a 0.5 percent rate.

House Bill 4: Tightens the language and the requirements for the sale of used motor vehicles to replace documents previously dubbed as the "liar's affidavit" requiring sellers to reveal and pay tax on the true sale amount or a minimum of 80 percent of the standard presumptive value of the vehicle.

House Bill 5: Increases the tax on the sale of tobacco products to raise an estimated \$678 million in revenue for property tax relief.

All five pieces of the House passed plan have been sent to the Texas Senate for further consid-

Lt. Governor David Dewhurst has noted that the Senate still has questions about the House plan's ability to reduce property taxes as much as promised. Dewhurst has noted that the remaining challenge for the Legislature is how


to utilize the remainder of the current budget surplus and how to adjust revenue rates in the tax plan to provide adequate revenues.

He pointed out that the tax changes approved by the House only pay for 33-35 cents of the promised property tax relief and that he is concerned about relying too heavily on budget surplus funds to pay for the remainder of property tax cuts.

The Senate will work through the weekend to review the house legislation and to consider other ways to fund public education and cut property tax rates the week of May 1.

In a statement about the Senate's plan of action Dewhurst said if the Legislature can pass a bill that reduces property taxes while improving schools, that the state will make a "giant step" forward in the quality of its educa-

He added, "If we can pass out these bills, making the corrections in some cases that are necessary . . . and put a bill onto House Bill 1 that pays our teachers more, provides incentives, increases performance and dramatically increases academic and financial accountability, that's a real win-win for the people of Texas and for the children of Texas.
