# Voters approve School Bond

Floydada ISD taxpayers rea school bond issue and approved a \$5.50 million dollar school bond in Saturday's election. FISD voters also chose Marty Lucke as the new School Board year.

In 2004 FISD voters rejected a much larger 30 year school bond of \$14.5 million. Voting was higher in the 2004 election with 1,075 ballots cast--or

The 2004 bond issue called for renovation and new construction of FISD campuses--including reducing 4 campuses down to 2. The old proposal included new construction at Duncan and the High School and the demoli-

The new bond called for the district to build an addition to A.B. Duncan to house students from R.C. Andrews. R.C. Andrews will be closed. Reno-

vations will also be made at existing campuses.

The Floyd County Commissioners met Monday, May 15, and heard a request by producer Don Marble of South Plains asking for "the lifting of the county's burn ban."

Marble said, "The only thing left to burn now is CRP grass. I have a lot of tree limbs and trash to burn and the high winds in the Panhandle was the reason for their fires (months' ago)."

It was with sadness that I read of the selling and/or closing of Kirk & Sons. When we lived in the area, it was a stop for trading nearly every time we were in town. I barely remember J.T. Kirk, but knew Omar Kirk and David Kirk very well.

There are a couple of stories that I remember well from the history of the business. The first was told to me by David Kirk. It concerned a customer who was shopping for a sofa when Omar Kirk and W.S. (Stan) Goen were partners. Omar Kirk was mostly in charge of the hardware section of the business and Stan Goen was in charge of the furniture section. Stan had a very colorful variety of language and was not shy in using it. The customer walked all around the sofa, stopped and gently kicked one leg as a prospective buyer of an automobile would kick a tire. "Is this for sale?" he asked Mr. Goen, who immediately replied, "I didn't buy the SOB just to look

The second rememberence I have is a personal one. About 1959 or 60, my wife Wanda and I were looking to buy an inexpensive piano. W.T. and Katie Conner had just bought a "better one" for the girls to take lessons on. I traded W.T. a small dehumidafier for their old piano which was stored in a box car at their house. I went over one Saturday morning, backed my pickup up to the box car. The tailgate on the pickup was the same level as the box car and I was able to move the piano into the pickup. I drove very slowly out of the drive way, made a slow left turn, went one mile, made another slow left turn. I proceeded about three miles and made a slow right turn. Not slow enough. I had not tied the piano to anything and watched in my rear view mirror as it went over the side. It looked like someone had set off a stick of dynamite in it. The only thing left in one piece was the sound board. I sat down on the side of the pickup and think I would have cried, except Bill Duboise drove up. He helped me load the pieces into my truck and I took them to the Floydada dump ground. I then went to Kirk & Sons. The very last thing we needed was to spend money on a new piano, but I really didn't think I could go home empty handed and face Wanda. Mr. Omar Kirk and I negotiated the price of a spinnet piano he had there and I pleaded for it to be

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
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

# City of Lockney adopts City water and drought contingency plan

The Lockney City Council unanimously passed a City Ordinance adopting a City Water and Drought Contingency Plan on a motion by Junior Brotherton and second by Ham Gammage, during their Thursday May 11, 2006 meeting. T.E.C.Q. requires cities to have a plan on file.

cil unanimously passed a resolution ordering Atmos Energy to show reasonableness of existing natural gas distribution rates on a motion by Ham Gammage and second by Tina Graves.

On a motion by Tina Graves and second by Michael DeLeon, the Council unanimously passed a resolution authorizing execution of the Atmos Gas Standing Steering Committee participation agreement.

The Council unanimously approved Jimmy Kemp to set on the Mackenzie Municipal Water Authority Board for a two year term on a motion by Michael DeLeon and second by Ham Gammage. No one from the L.E.D.C. was

present to give their quarterly report to the Council, so this agenda item was rescheduled.

No action was taken on the agenda item to consider rate increase from Southwestern Public Service Company. It was rescheduled for next month.

No action was taken on the agenda item to consider the Grant Works Contract on Planning Capacity Study at this time. It was rescheduled.

City Administrator Ron Hall mentioned he needed letters of support from the downtown businesses as well as citizens for repairing/replacing the downtown sidewalks to be written and mailed to the City of Lockney, P.O. Box 387, Lockney, Texas 79241. "Sending these letters of support with our application will greatly improve the chances of getting this Grant," said Hall. "At least 70% participation by our businesses is required. I have contacted them and it would be great if they could write a letter detailing the specific problems they have seen (people falling,

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





# The hype about hypertension

More than half of Americans over age 60 have high blood pressure; but, that does not mean it is part of normal aging.

High blood pressure, or hypertension, is sometimes called the "silent killer" because you cannot necessarily see or feel any of its symptoms. You can have hypertension and still feel just fine. However, hypertension is a major health problem. If not treated, it can lead to stroke, heart disease, eye problems or kidney failure, among other things. The good news is that there are ways you can prevent and/or control high blood pressure.

Whether going in for a checkup or major surgery, having your blood pressure checked is a standard procedure for health providers. But, what exactly do those numbers mean and why are there two of them? The first, or top, number is your systolic pressure. This tells you how much your blood pushes against the blood vessel walls as your heart beats. The second, or bottom, number measures the pressure while the heart relaxes between beats. This is the diastolic pressure. If your blood pressure is normal, according to current recommendations, your systolic pressure is less than 120 and your diastolic pressure

is less than 80. For older people, the first number (systolic) often is high (greater than 140), but the sec-

ond number (diastolic) is normal (less than 80). This problem is called isolated systolic hypertension. Isolated systolic hypertension is the most common form of high blood pressure in older people. Isolated systolic hypertension can lead to serious health problems. If you are diagnosed with hypertension, your health care provider will probably want you to make changes in your daily habits to try and lower those

He or she may also ask you to check your blood pressure at home at different times of the day. If the numbers are still high after several checks, your health provider will probably suggest medication, changes in your diet and exercise

Try these healthy habits recommended by the National Heart, Lung and Blood Institute to help you control or prevent high blood

• Keep a healthy weight. Being overweight adds to your risk of high blood pressure. Ask your health provider if you need to lose

• Exercise every day. Moderate exercise may lower your risk of hypertension and heart disease. Try to exercise at least 30 minutes a day, 5 days a week or more. Check with your health provider before starting a new exercise program.

• Eat more fruits, vegetables, whole grains and low-fat dairy foods. Also, make sure you are getting enough potassium. Fresh fruits and vegetables are high in potassium. If using packaged

foods, read the nutrition labels to choose those that have more potassium.

· Cut down on salt and sodium. Most Americans eat more salt and sodium than they need. A low-salt diet might help lower your blood pressure. Talk with your health provider about your salt intake.

• Drink less alcohol. Drinking alcohol can affect your blood pressure as it decreases the amount of water in your body. As a general rule, men shouldn't have more than two drinks a day; women not more than one drink

If lifestyle changes alone do not control your high blood pressure, your health provider may tell you to take blood pressure pills. You may need to take medicine for the rest of your life. It is important to note any significant changes in your health or level of functioning once you start taking blood pressure medication. The dose may need to be adjusted to suit your needs and this may take several attempts.

If you have high blood pressure, remember that:

 High blood pressure may not make you feel sick, but it is

 You can lower your blood pressure by changing your daily habits and, if needed, by taking medicine. If you need to take high blood pressure medicine, lifestyle changes may help lower the dose you need and reduce side effects.



Cotton

Recent rains have improved soil moisture conditions in many parts of the High Plains region and have allowed growers to sustain a brisk pace as they work to get their 2006 crop established.

Most areas would be rated in fair condition although some dryland acres are still considered marginal. It goes without saying though that the entire High Plains region will benefit from additional rainfall and warm tempera-

Apart from moisture, the only area of concern for many would be the impact of recent cool spells on seedling emergence. Daytime temperatures the past couple of weeks have fluctuated between the upper 60s to over 90 degrees.

Nighttime temperatures have been correspondingly unstable and the net result in some cases could be a slight delay in emergence. A return to seasonable temperatures would quickly address the situation.

The High Plains region is expected to plant approximately 3.75 million acres of cotton in 2006. A dry winter and marginal subsoil moisture going into planting make it critical that the area receiving timely in-season rainfall. Near perfect conditions would have to prevail for the area to have a reasonable chance to approach the record-setting production levels of the past two growing seasons.

In the USDA National Agricultural Statistics Service's May 12 Crop Production report, final district level production figures for the High Plains region indicate the area produced 5.7 million bales of Upland cotton in 2005. Statewide production figures show that Texas contributed 8.44 million bales to the total 2005 U.S. Upland production figure of 23.25 million bales.

#### Ag Committee impressed by unified message

A diverse group of Texas farmers and livestock producers left a solid impression on a dozen members of the House Agriculture Committee during the one and only full Committee hearing on the 2007 Farm Bill to be held in Texas.

Plains Cotton Growers Board members Rickey Bearden, of Plains, and Al Spinks, of Mid-

land, were asked to provide testimony during the hearing. Bearden is a past president of the organization and is the current Chairman of the PCG Board of Directors. Spinks is a member of the PCG Executive Committee.

The hearing, conducted on the campus of Angelo State University May 9, provided eleven witnesses the chance to share their thoughts about the 2007 Farm bill with members of the House Agriculture Committee in atten-

Rep. Mike Conaway, whose district hosted the hearing, and Rep. Randy Neugebauer are current members of the House Agriculture Committee and participated in the hearing.

Bearden and Spinks were asked to be part of the panel representing agriculture interests across Texas. PCG President Mike Hughes and PCG Vice President Barry Evans submitted written testimony to be included in the official record of the hearing. Spinks, who drew the opening witness slot, set the tone for the rest of the day expressing strong support for further consideration of a permanent disaster provision and development of innovative new crop insurance products that can work in tandem with farm program provisions to provide effective risk management protection for producers who encounter production re- measy as sending an email. Like many of the witnesses that would follow, Spinks noted the importance of the marketing loan as the basis for the farm program safety net and the value of the Direct and Counter-cyclical payment program.

Speaking third, Bearden echoed the sentiments expresses by Spinks and speakers that would follow. Using cotton as an example he also took the opportunity to talk specifically about the current program, its ability to function as an effective safety net for producers and its focus as a commodity support program.
