Dade to celebrate 100th

Floyd County Pioneer Woman Myria Dade will celebrate her 100th birthday Sunday, September 17, at the Unity Center, from 2:00 to 4:00 p.m.

The "Celebration of Life" birthday party will be hosted by Ray and Marilyn Holcomb and Jon & Elaine LaBaume. The public is invited to attend.

At the age of 99 1/2 years old because of her physical needs, she moved to the Floydada Rehab and Care Center June 14, 2006. That meant leaving the home that she and her husband, Laure built in 1945.

Laure passed away on February 24, 1983. Myria said, "I really miss him, he was a good man." She has resided in their home alone since that time. She took care of her business and drove until a few months before moving in the Care Center.

After Laure and Myria moved into their home, Myria decided to go to Cosmetology School in Lubbock.

She drove herself over there, stayed for the week and then came home on week-ends. When Myria finished school, she went with a group of girls from the school to Austin to take the State Exam. She passed the hard test with flying colors.

"Laure also went to barber school," said Myria, "but the school told him he could cut hair so well that he didn't need to go to school. They told him to just

Myria then opened "Myria's Beauty Shop" and ran it for four years. She charged \$2.25 for a hair cut and Laure charged \$.50 for a man's hair cut.

She decided to close because people would not pay her. "They would say, 'We'll pay you Saturday," Myria said, "Saturday never came."

Born Myria Douglas September 18, 1906 in San Augustine County, Texas she was the second child of 14 children born to Vead and Anna Douglas.

Myria says life was very hard when she was young. "We lived on a 160 acre farm and I did all the farming. We grew cane, cotton, peanuts, corn, beans, and peas. We also made our own

Myria said when school started the teacher didn't have any place to live, so "my Mamma let the teacher stay in a little house next to us and she cooked for her," said Myria. "Mom would also pack the kid's lunch kit with biscuits soaked in syrup and butter, and country fresh fried meat.

"The school house was 4 miles away and the kids walked there in any kind of weather. I was the second oldest and I didn't go to school except on Friday after-

Myria said none of the other kids would help her, but with those few hours of school she got just enough to teach herself how to read and write. After she and go back home and start cutting Laure married, Myria taught him how to read and write.

Myria says Laure loved to read his bible. Myria also reads her bible and friends say she knows the scripture.

"My oldest brother ran away because he didn't want to work behind a mule," said Myria, "so I stayed home and worked and plowed behind the mules. It was hard work. At the age of 15 I was doing it all in my bare feet. My Daddy didn't do anything except walk around and make sure everybody else was working. I was treated like a slave boy and a slave girl. The only time my Daddy showed up was when the syrup was being made.

"Every morning I milked four cows and fed the mules before they went to work for the day. Then in the evening after I got out of the fields I milked the cows

"I was so glad when my husband came along and asked for me. I was 18 years old and he was 19. Laure was too afraid of my Daddy to ask him for me so he told me he was going to ask my Mamma for me. We got acquainted in church and married in the hallway of the house we lived in after we married. We married on Oct. 8, 1935."

When Myria was asked if things improved after her marriage she said, "My husband was good and sweet to me." Times were hard but he did everything he could for me. He was a good cook and would cook chicken fried, biscuits, and cornbread. He

could do it all."

Laure worked as a farm hand until 1935 earning 50¢ a day. "In 1935 we made \$200 off of a crop and we quit farming," said

Myria, said she worried about what they were going to do if they didn't farm.

"A friend of Laure's said a bunch of them were going to West Texas and 'pull bolls'. He wanted to know if Laure wanted to go and Laure said we would try it for a year. We took a rolled up mattress, a quilt, sheet, one pillow, and a pillow case with our clothes. That was all we had.

"There were 27 of us on a flatbed trailer for two days. We ate bologna and bread we took with us so we would not have to buy any food on the way."

The first stop for the Dades was Roaring Springs at the Alvin Stern farm. "We pulled bolls for one day," said Myria. "My fingers were dripping with blood after the first day and they hurt so bad. I told my husband I can't do this and I quit and started cooking and doing domestic work. My husband also decided he would rather plow than pull

"In Roaring Springs we lived in an old chicken house. We had to clean it up so we could cook on one end and live on the other end. My husband would tell me, 'I hope we can have a house of our own one of these days and we'll get out of this stuff.' And



City keeps same tax rate

The Floydada City Council met in special session Tuesday, September 5, and set the 2006-2007 tax rate at \$.40 cents per \$100 valuation and approved the 2006-2007 operating budget.

The \$.40 cent tax rate is the same as last year's rate, according to City Manager Gary Brown.

The new operating budget for this fiscal year shows the General Fund Revenues and Expenditures at \$1,337,704.00, the Water Fund Revenues and Expenditures at \$636,553.00 and the Electric Fund Revenues and Expenditures at \$2,350,925.00.

Upon the recommendation of Brown, the council unanimously approved the appointment of Terry Turner as the permanent Electrical Superintendent.

"Terry has 14 years of work experience with the City and I have confidence that he can handle the load. He is a team player and I recommend him for the job," said Brown.

The council passed four ordinances concerning City maintenance, debt retirement, applying for a water grant and establishing a set fee for all pole attachments throughout the City.

County's voting precincts are consolidated by Commissioners

The Floyd County Commissioners met in regular session Monday, September 11, and approved a resolution honoring the late County Commissioner Craig Gilly. The court also approved a new early voting location in Lockney and the consolidation of several voting precincts in the

Craig Gilly passed away on August 28th. Gilly had been a county commissioner over six and one-half years. He retired earlier this year to run for the county judge's position. County Judge William D. Hardin is retiring at the end of this year.

Hardin also read a letter of approval by the Justice Department for the consolidating of voting precincts, polling places and the new early election office in Lock-

The permanent consolidation of the precincts are: Voting Precinct #16 and #1 combined; Precinct #20 and Precinct #23 combine: Precinct #7 with Precinct #18; Precinct #5 and Precinct #24; and Precinct #17 with Precinct #9.

The consolidation request is necessary because of declining population and tax base in the county, the increased expenses in order to hold an election and the lack of staff to man the election places in the sparsely populated areas of the county.

The new early voting loca- \$495,755.16. tion in Lockney will be at the Justice of Peace Office located at 119 N. Main (next to the Post Office). It will be open October 22th through November 3rd, from 8:30 a.m. to 5:00 p.m.,

The court approved the District Attorney's forfeiture report showing income of \$3,317.00, with \$2,848.00 expenditures for equipment and expenses.

A renewal contract from 2007 through 2009, was approved by the commissioners with the Health and Human Services Commission and the Texas **Building Procurement Commis**sion for 1,263 square feet of space in the Floyd County Extension Building. This is a reduction of 300 square feet that will now go to the Floydada Chamber of Commerce.

The commissioners transferred \$35,020.54 from the Road & Bridge Fund into the four precincts general fund accounts. Precincts 1, 2, and 4 received \$7,000 each and Precinct 3 received \$14,020.54.

Floyd County Treasurer Elva Martinez gave the court the August Financial Report. It showed a Beginning Balance of \$560,349.82 with Receipts of \$147,325.92. Transfers In and Out were at \$178,740.52, with Disbursed at \$211,920.58, leaving an Ending Balance of are not sure this year."

Floyd County Extension Agents J.D. Ragland and Melissa Long gave reports to the commis-

Long will be assisting in hosting the State Meeting for the Texas Extension Education Association in Lubbock this week and she will present a Disaster Preparedness Training for county employees and a Better Living For Texans program this month.

Long said, "We will have our 4-H Family Auction on October 24th and our annual Punkin Day Pleasers Booth in October."

Ragland told the commissioners, "The rain is good. We are up to 12.71 inches for the year, as compared to 15.77 inches this time last year. We now need good weather. The quicker we can get the cotton into modules, the better it will be.'

'The rain has been excellent for the wheat. We will probably have a lot of wheat this year with some being harvested even for grain. We average around 170,000 to 190,000 acres of wheat in Floyd County yearly."

According to Ragland, the grain sorgum yields will probably be down this year due to the lack of moisture early in the season. Concerning pumpkins, Ragland said, "We usually average 20,000 to 24,000 pounds per acre, but after the rains, we just

Dear Sir,

Since your Rank, M.O.S., Unit you are serving in and place you are stationed was not included in your Letter to the Editor, out of respect to you I will refer to you as Abraham Rosales, Jr.

It was a curious thing to me why one family was singled out to be ostracized over receiving a flag. It finally dawned on me that you have been badly misinformed. As president of Lockney Veterans Association, I take full responsibility for this situation,

We formed about a year ago to build and maintain a Veterans Memorial in Lockney. In that short time, we have turned a weedy vacant lot into one of the most beautiful memorial parks, I dare say, in the state of Texas. After our flags were stolen by two thieves that we know who chose to disrespect us and our community, we replaced them after several fund-raisers. We had decided that when we would retire the flags instead of destroying them, we would give them to Veterans whom we wanted to

We gave away three flags. A POW/MIA flag went to H.G. Graham for his tireless work on this project. The American flag went to Wesley Hunter because he was wounded in combat. Which brings us to the Graves family. First of all we did not give the Graves 'family' a flag. The Texas flag went to Ryan Graves who is deployed to Iraq. Since he could not be there to accept it, his wife stood in for him. I personally asked his parents to stand in with her. On that same day we honored two WWII Veterans, two Korean War Veterans, and one Vietnam Veteran.

Now how did we come up with these names? As a group, we came up with names and voted. It was a group decision. Not all WWII Vets were recognized, not all Korean War Vets were recognized, not all Vietnam Vets were recognized and not all present day Vets were recognized.

This is where you come in Mister Abraham Rosales, Jr. On November 11 as Veterans we will give flags away again and honor more Vets. What we need is for someone to get us a duty roster of all the young men and women from Lockney who have served for the last 30 years. This would be a great way for you to be a part of the vision that we have, instead of finding fault with what we are doing.

Now you mentioned you felt you had been disrespected. I don't think you really understand what disrespect means. When I came home from Vietnam in 1969, I was spit on, called a murderer, and a traitor to my country. We were told not to wear our uniforms in public and to never put prior military experience on a job application. It was extremely hard to get through an

we did." Laure was a good carpenter, so he could build the

"In 1939 we moved to Dougherty and farmed for Mr. W.C. Hudson until 1942. Then we went to work for W.S. Poole for \$50 a month. I got \$25 for cooking and Laure got \$25 for plowing.

After 18 months the Dades moved to Lockney and Laure went to work for Alfalfa Mills. Myria continued to do domestic work. After moving to Floydada, Myria's good cooking was in big demand. She often cooked for parties for some of the "very elite" women in the community.

"That was a good job and things got better," said Myria. "After the Alfalfa Mill closed

Laure worked in the cotton yard. He retired after that and kept busy with wood working--including starting their home in Floydada.

Much of Myria's life can be seen in her many photographs. "People tell me I have a lot of history in my pictures," said

Myria is quick to point out the pictures of her Godchildren. "I had three miscarriages," said

Myria. "We never had our own children but we were godparents to Clarence, Lawrence, and Martha Teague of Lubbock, and Robert, Isiah, Curly J., Edward, and Pat Shelby.'

She was also the "other grandmother" to the children and grand children of Ray and Marilyn Holcomb of Floydada.

"She has been a part of our family for over 40 years," said Marilyn. "She has always gone to our family reunions.'

According to Marilyn, when visitors in the Holcomb home would ask, 'Who is the black woman?', Andy and Tommy Holcomb would say, 'That is our other Grandmother."

Another honored picture of Myria's is that of Rosa Parks. Parks made history in 1955 when she refused to give up her bus seat to a white man in the era of segregation. "Rosa was Laure's auntie," said Myria.

A member of Floydada's First Baptist Church since 1983, Myria gives credit for her long life to God. "The Lord blessed us to live a happy life together, and to help others by the help of the Lord Jesus. Every day, I would just ask the Lord to be with me."





Coronado Expedition II edges Whirlwinds

In 1541 Francisco Vasquez de Coronado led an expedition through Blanco Canyon south of Floydada. On September 8, 2006 Moe Coronado, no relation to Francisco, led another expedition through Floyd County. This time the scene was Wester Field. The Senior Quarterback threw three touchdown passes to lead the Slaton Tigers past the Floydada Whirlwinds in a hard fought 28-14 win. The loss dropped Floydada's record to 0-2, while Slaton improved to 2-0.

"Slaton had two big passes. Quarterback Moe Coronado made the throws and the receivers (Wes Bloxom and James Devroe) made the plays for touchdowns that really made a difference in the game," said Whirlwind Coach Rusty Purser.

Coronado's initial TD pass was for 40-yards to Bloxom on the first play of the second quarter to break a scoreless contest. The next big pass that Purser made reference to was a 16-yard scoring strike to Devroe with:02seconds remaining in the first half. This play again snapped a tied game. It was 7-7 and Slaton regained the momentum and the lead of 14-7 going into intermis-

Floydada never did lead in this game, unlike the season opener against Idalou. However, the Whirlwinds did have some bright moments. Junior quarterback Payte Beedy returned from a foot injury, and on his first possession directed the Whirlwinds to a 10-play 48 yard drive that ended with Beedy scoring on a 7-yard run on 4th and 4. This tied the game at 7-7 with 1:00 remaining in the second quarter.

Slaton immediately answered with a 6-play 60 yard touchdown drive to end the half when Coronado hit Devroe across the middle on a 16 yard TD with only :02 seconds left in the first half.

Slaton then added touchdowns in each quarter of the second half. Sophomore running back Andy Garcia made both of them on a 3 yard pass reception from Coronado with: 20 seconds remaining in the 3rd quarter, and on a 25 yard run with 4:22 left in the game that stretched the

Tiger's lead to 28-7. Floydada kept things interesting when Beedy scored on a 51yard run with 2:02 remaining. The Whirlwinds went 69 yards in 4-plays. Floydada then executed an onside kick when senior Brandon Rainwater bounced the 10yard kick over Slaton's front wall and Beedy recovered the ball. But, Floydada's hard luck continued when the play was called back due to the Whirlwinds being offsides.

"Honestly, we did not play good. We played hard again, but way too many mistakes. We just did not make the plays when we needed them", said Purser. "The 7-penalties for 55-yards killed

Some situations Purser was referring to - Floydada's first possession after a Tiger lost fumble at the Whirlwinds 30 that resulted in no score when the Winds were stopped on downs at Slaton's 17-yard line; the first drive of the second quarter that stalled at the Tiger's 25; a pair of interceptions thrown in the 3rd quarter; a punt return to Slaton's 20 yard line by Aarrhon Flores that was nullified by a block in the back penalty; a pass play

from Beedy to Flores that advanced to the Tiger's 5 yard line and was called back because of a holding infraction; and finally a successful onside kick that was erased due to Floydada being called for off-sides.

'Again, we were not out of the game even with 2-minutes left and trailing 28-14. Had we made the onside kick, who knows what would have happened", said

"Every week is a growing experience for this team. The more run (Rainwater kick) reps in game situations should make us better. We just need to turn the corner and learn to keep fighting adversity."

Floydada did have some bright spots especially on defense again — The Whirlwinds were tough up the middle defensively virtually the entire game; senior Linebacker Tate Jones drew great reviews from both Purser and Slaton coach Eddie Kilmer; Floydada's defensive line Taylor Beedy, Sammy Rameriz, Enrique DeOchoa and Chris Hayter held their own against the Slaton offensive line that outweighed them over 30-pounds per man; and overall the intensity and effort was still there.

It does not get any easier for the Whirlwinds. This Friday, Floydada hosts the Stratford Elks. The defending 1A State Champions with a 15-1 record in 2005, are 1-1 on this season after falling to Childress 20-13 last Friday. Ironically, this will be Floydada's third consecutive home game and Stratford's third straight road trip.

'Stratford is good, no doubt about it. They are senior laden team just like Idalou and Slaton were, but for the first time we are going to face a team that suits up only 21 players like we do and plays a large number both ways," Purser said. "Our schedule is really tough, but if everyone will hang in there it should make us ready for a very tough district race." The coach was definitely sending out a message that the Whirlwinds aren't ready to quit.



PROVISIONS FOR COTTON MARKETING

ASSISTANCE LOAN PRO-

The U.S. Department of Agriculture's Commodity Credit Corporation (CCC) on August 29th announced that it amended regulations affecting the marketing assistance loan (MAL) program for the 2006 and subsequent crops of upland and Extra Long Staple (ELS) cotton.

The provisions help protect the quality of cotton and relieve regional storage congestion. They also modify storage incentives that benefit some in the industry and cause producers to delay cotton marketing.

In response to those issues, CCC initially published an advance notice of proposed rulemaking on February 13, 2006. Based on the comments received, CCC published a proposed rule on May 26, 2006. CCC developed the new provisions after careful consideration of all comments provided during the comment period. The provisions take effect with tomorrow's publication of a final rule in the Federal Register. The final rule is available for public inspection today (August 29, 2006) from time at the Office of the Federal Register, Suite 700, 800 North Capitol St., NW, Washington,

tion and modify storage incentives that can slow cotton marketing.

The revised regulations provide the following policy changes:

*Outside storage of loan cotton - CCC will allow cotton pledged for loan to be stored outside subject to special warehouse receipting, storage, reporting and

USDA ANNOUNCES NEW insurance requirements and approval by CCC. The regulations provide that the warehouse must be in an area that CCC determines as having inadequate approved indoor capacity to store the current crop. Previously, CCC loan regulations required loan cotton to be stored inside.

> for outside stored loan cotton -CCC will not provide storage credits to upland cotton loan collateral for any period that it is stored outside subject to a 15-day grace period. CCC will consider outside storage to begin at a warehouse on the 16th day following the day the warehouse was notified that the bale has been pledged as collateral for a CCC marketing assistance loan.

*Storage credit rates capped -CCC's maximum storage credit rate for the 2006 and subsequent crops of upland cotton will be the lesser of the 2005-crop tariff rate for the warehouse or \$4.37 per bale per month for warehouses located in Arizona and California or \$2.66 per bale per month for warehouses located in all other cotton-storing states. Warehouse tariff rates remain unregulated by CCC and may exceed the rate used by CCC for calculating storage credits. Previously, CCC based storage credits on tariff 8:45 a.m. to 5:45 p.m. Eastern rates established by individual warehouses.

*Bale eligibility requirements - To be eligible for loan, CCC The provisions enhance pro-requires cotton to be in good contection of the quality of cotton, dition and not wet cotton. The relieve regional storage conges- regulations will define wet cotton as a bale that, at a gin, exceeds 7.5 percent moisture at any point in the bale. CCC defines good condition as a bale of cotton that, by comparison with the photographic standards of the Joint Cotton Industry Bale Packaging Committee, is determined to be Grade A or Grade B. In the past, CCC regulations were less specific about these bale eligibil-

*Transfer of cotton loan collateral - CCC will allow producers, or producers' agents vested with this specific authority, to request the transfer of cotton loan collateral to another CCC-approved cotton warehouse. CCC will base loan settlements of trans-*Storage credits unavailable ferred cotton on rates applicable at the original storage location. CCC may limit storage credits based on the circumstances of the transfer. Previous regulations allowed CCC to relocate loan cotton but did not provide authority for producers or their agents to request the transfer. Any costs associated with the transfer of cotton loan collateral shall be paid by the requestor of the transfer and not by CCC

> *Producer liability for unpaid charges - CCC will bill producers for any unpaid warehouse compression fees or other unpaid charges for forfeited cotton.

> This new provision will be consistent with CCC loan policy that loan collateral must be unencumbered by liens or unpaid charges. Previously, CCC cotton loan settlement regulations did not require producers to refund CCC for any unpaid warehouse compression charges.

Livestock assistance grant available

The Texas Department of Agriculture (TDA) will administer assistance to eligible livestock producers in 216 droughtstressed Texas counties under the recently announced federal Livestock Assistance Grant Program. The livestock block grant is part of a broad-based national drought disaster assistance program for American farmers and ranchers announced by the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) this week. USDA will distribute \$50 million in state block grants to 20 states to help livestock producers recover losses suffered because of the ongoing drought. Assistance may cover such items as the cost of lost forage, supplemental feeding, the cost of relocating livestock to new pastures and the cost of emergency water sup-

TDA is currently working with statewide agriculture and livestock groups to establish the criteria for distributing the funds in Texas. TDA will also be working closely with the Governor's Office and USDA to set up the criteria, announce a sign-up period and distribute the funds from the block grant to our livestock producers as quickly as possible.

Only livestock producers in the eligible counties who suffered a loss of forage production because of the 2006 drought may receive assistance. Payments are limited to \$10,000 and cannot

Producers who chose not to receive an advance 2006 direct payment will receive a lump sum payment for the year in Oc-



ORDINANCE NO. 06-10

AN ORDINANCE FIXING AND LEVYING MUNICIPAL AD VALOREM TAXES FOR THE MAINTENANCE AND OPERATION OF THE CITY OF FLOYDADA, TEXAS FOR THE YEAR 2006 AND FOR EACH YEAR THEREAFTER UNTIL OTHERWISE PROVIDED DIRECTING THE ASSESSMENT AND COLLECTION THEREOF.

WHEREAS, the City Council finds that the tax rate for the year 2006 hereinafter levied for current expenses of property must be levied to provide the revenue requirements of the budget for the ensuing year; and

WHEREAS, the total valuation of taxable property within he City of Floydada, Texas for the year 2006 determined in the manner required by law is \$60,752,860.00.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF FLOYDADA, TEXAS:

SECTION 1. For the current expenses of the City of Floydada and for the general improvement of the City and its property, there is hereby levied and ordered to be assessed and collected for the year 2006, and for each year thereafter until it be otherwise provided and ordained, on all property situated within the limits of the City of Floydada not exempt from taxation by valid laws, an Ad Valorem tax at the rate of Forty Cents (\$.40) on each ONE HUNDRED DOLLARS (\$100.00) valuation of such property

SECTION II. The total Ad Valorem tax levied for the Maintenance and Operation Expenses of the year 2006, upon all property, real, business personal inventory and vehicles and mixed within the corporate limits of the City of Floydada, Texas is and shall be at the rate of Forty Cents (\$.40) upon each ONE HUN-DRED DOLLARS (\$100.00) valuation of said property for the purposes hereinabove described being allocated and apportioned among said purposes in the manner hereinabove set forth; provided, however that the City Secretary of the City of Floydada shall be, and she is hereby authorized as a manner of convenience in accounting and preparation of the tax roll to classify said levies upon the tax rolls as follows:

The levy of Forty Cents (\$.40) for current Maintenance and Operation Expenses shall be carried under the heading of the 'GENERAL FUND," for the subsequent use of the General Fund, but such classification shall not in any manner affect or alter the apportionment of the total tax levy among said purposes as set out in Section I of this Ordinance.

SECTION III. Resolution No. 276 adopted by the City Council on August 15, 2000, directs that all vehicles, travel trailers, motor homes, boats, airplanes and motorcycles [as defined in V.T.C.A. Tax Code Sec. 11.14 (c)] which are owned by a family or individual and which are not used for the production of income

shall be exempt from Ad Valorem tax by the City of Floydada. SECTION IV. As approved in a regular council meeting held on May 18, 1995, the City Council of the City of Floydada directed that a \$3,000.00 Senior Citizen Exemption be allowed. This exemption shall be administered by the Floyd County Central Appraisal District.

SECTION V. Each and every section and part thereof of this Ordinance has been carefully and specifically considered and dealt with by the City Council and in any event any section or part thereof of this Ordinance should be held invalid by any court of competent jurisdiction, the balance of this Ordinance shall stand and remain in full force and effect.

SECTION VI. The City Secretary is hereby directed and authorized to place into immediate operation all reasonable and customary efforts to carry out the provisions of this Ordinance and to record collection of the taxes as they are submitted by the Floyd County Central Appraisal District.

SECTION VII. This Ordinance shall become effective from and after the date of its passage.

ORDINANCE NO. 06-11

AN ORDINANCE FIXING AND LEVYING MUNICIPAL AD VALOREM TAXES FOR DEBT SERVICING OF SEWER IMPROVEMENTS OF THE CITY OF FLOYDADA, TEXAS FOR THE YEAR 2006 AND FOR EACH YEAR THEREAFTER UNTIL OTHERWISE PROVIDED DIRECTING THE ASSESSMENT AND COLLECTION THEREOF.

WHEREAS, the City Council finds that the tax rate for the year 2006 hereinafter levied for debt retirement must be levied to provide the revenue requirements for sewer improvement debt;

WHEREAS, the total valuation of taxable property within the City of Floydada, Texas for the year 2006 determined in the manner required by law is \$60,752,860.00.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF FLOYDADA, TEXAS:

SECTION 1. For sewer improvements debt of the City of Floydada, there is hereby levied and ordered to be assessed and collected for the year 2006, and for each year thereafter until it be otherwise provided and ordained, on all property situated within the limits of the City of Floydada not exempt from taxation by valid laws, an Ad Valorem tax at the rate of Six Cents (\$.06) on each ONE HUNDRED DOLLARS (\$100.00) valuation of such

SECTION II. The total Ad Valorem tax levied for debt servicing for sewer improvements for the year 2006, upon all property, real, business personal inventory and vehicles and mixed within the corporate limits of the City of Floydada, Texas is and shall be at the rate of Six Cents (\$.06) upon each ONE HUN-DRED DOLLARS (\$100.00) valuation of said property for the purposes hereinabove described being allocated and apportioned among said purposes in the manner hereinabove set forth; provided, however that the City Secretary of the City of Floydada shall be, and she is hereby authorized as a manner of convenience in accounting and preparation of the tax roll to classify said levies upon the tax rolls as follows:

The levy of Six Cents (\$.06) for sewer improvements debt servicing shall be carried under the heading of the "SEWER SINKING FUND," and shall only be used for the retirement of debt incurred for sewer line/lift station improvements.

SECTION III. Resolution No. 276 adopted by the City Council on August 15, 2000, directs that all vehicles, travel trailers, motor homes, boats, airplanes and motorcycles [as defined in V.T.C.A. Tax Code Sec. 11.14 (c)] which are owned by a family or individual and which are not used for the production of income shall be exempt from Ad Valorem tax by the City of Floydada.

SECTION IV. As approved in a regular council meeting held on May 18, 1995, the City Council of the City of Floydada directed that a \$3,000.00 Senior Citizen Exemption be allowed. This exemption shall be administered by the Floyd County Central Appraisal District.

SECTION V. Each and every section and part thereof of this Ordinance has been carefully and specifically considered and dealt with by the City Council and in any event any section or part thereof of this Ordinance should be held invalid by any court of competent jurisdiction, the balance of this Ordinance shall stand and remain in full force and effect.

SECTION VI. The City Secretary is hereby directed and authorized to place into immediate operation all reasonable and customary efforts to carry out the provisions of this Ordinance and to record collection of the taxes as they are submitted by the Floyd County Central Appraisal District.

SECTION VII. This Ordinance shall become effective from and after the date of its passage.

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
