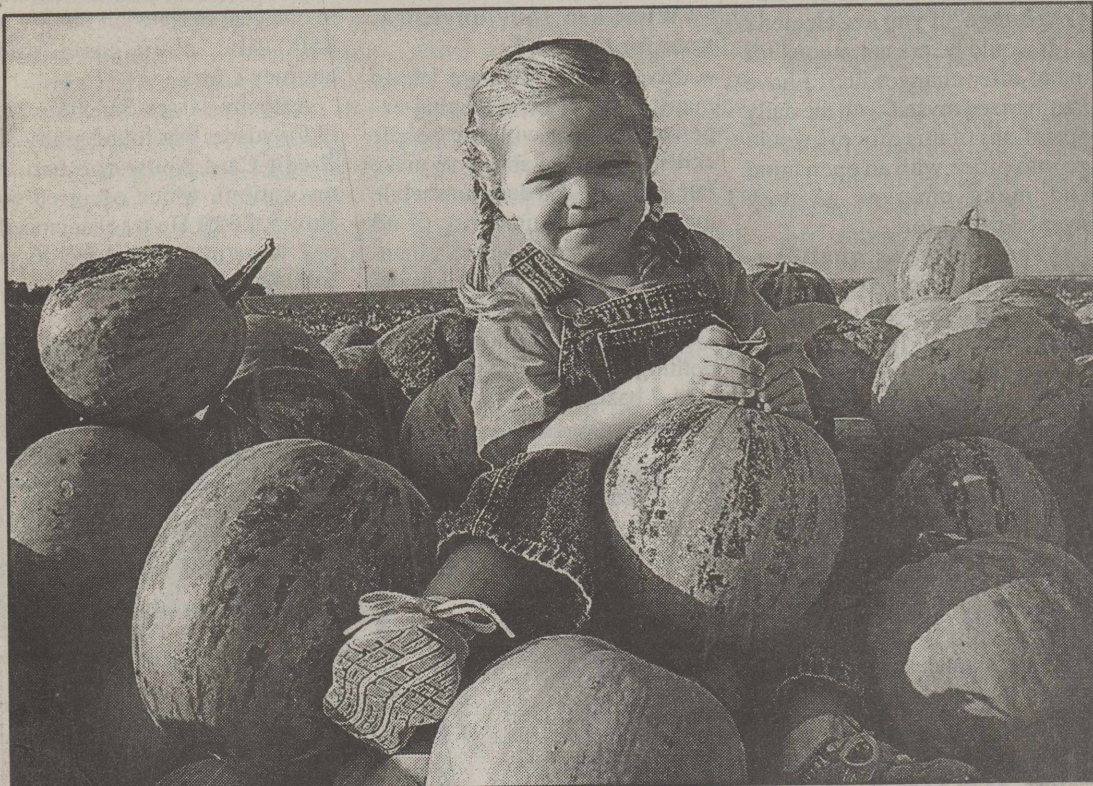

Floydada will celebrate Punkin Day on Saturday

Downtown Floydada will be packed this Saturday with visitors celebrating our annual Punkin Day.

This is the 20th year for the Harvest Festival and Chamber President Tomas Trevino says there will be "90 booths this year-spilling out onto the streets."

Events will begin at 8:00 a.m. with the 5K Run and the arts and crafts vendors will open at 9:00 a.m.. Entertainment at the pavilion will begin at 10:00 a.m.

A schedule of events, sponsored by Floydada's First National Bank, can be found inside this edition.

Chamber Manager Rachel Castillo said, "We have received

many phone calls and emails from Texas to New York. We incorporated our Punkin Day schedule on our website and it has brought a tremendous response as well as inquiries for our pumpkin growers."

The Chamber of Commerce booth will have Cow Patty Bingo tickets, t-shirts, raffle tickets for airline tickets, and entry sheets for the Pie Eating Contest and "Guess the Weight of the Pumpkins" trailer.

The pumpkin games begin at 11:00 a.m. and include: pumpkin toss, tricycle races, stickhorse races, wheelbarrow races, 3 legged races, gunny-sack races, and much more.

Entertainment begins under the pavilion at 10:00 a.m. with the Cactus Theatre. The "Group" performs at 11:00 a.m., followed at 12:00 noon with Michael Running Wolf—a native storyteller. Paloma Libre performs at 1:00 p.m., and the Highway 70 Band performs at 2:00 p.m.

Besides games, food, and shopping, there will be rope making at the Museum and a book and bake sale at the Library.

"We appreciate our sponsors and pumpkin growers for their donations for Punkin Day," said Castillo. "And, we appreciate the community getting into the spirit of Punkin Day with decorating and participating in the festival."

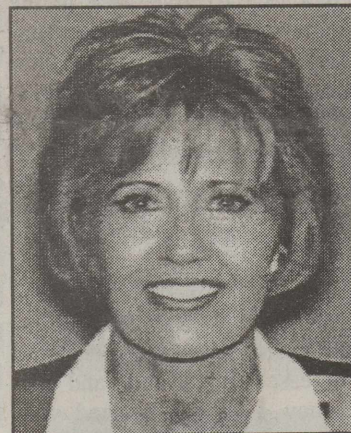

"We appreciate the readers who really got creative and had to go to some trouble to get our newspaper in the picture," said Gilroy. "Besides the celebrity

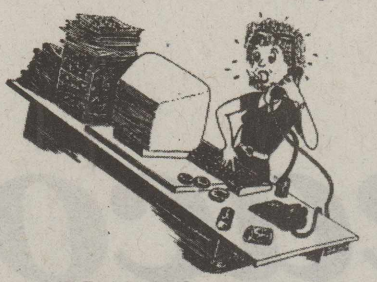

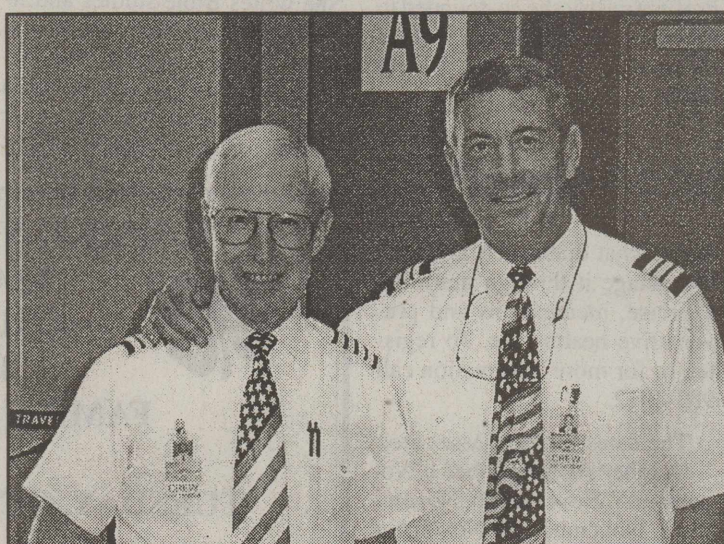

Donation enhances EMS training

The Floydada EMS hopes to train at least 100 citizens of Floydada on what to do when a person has a heart attack. The training program was greatly enhanced when the National Automobile Dealers Charitable Foundation and City Auto presented a Rescued Annie training unit to the organization in formal ceremonies today.

In presenting the CPR unit, which is essential for cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) training, Katrina Gooch, Director EMS said, "If the right kind of treatment can be given a heart attack victim within seconds after he or she is stricken, the chances are good that the life can be saved.

CPR training teaches a person how to keep the heart beating while professional help is coming.

Gooch said that since the massive involvement of Americans training in CPR, there has been an increase in long-term survivors from ventricular fibrillation. There are many cases where the training is given to citizens showing that many heart attack victims who otherwise die have been saved and returned to normal activities. The training takes from three to five hours of intensive practice and lectures.

In accepting the CPR training unit, Gooch said the organization

had set a goal to train at least 100 persons in the next year.

The CPR unit gives signals telling when the trainee is applying the right pressure in the right spot or breathing correctly into the victim's mouth. With the training, the students learn the "feel" of giving quick, lifesaving

emergency treatment.

Congress has left the fate of the proposed 2005-2006 agriculture disaster assistance package in limbo following adjournment for the November election season. By not making any real progress toward passage of a 2005-2006 agriculture assistance package, efforts to secure a disaster bill will now have to be revisited after the November elections and during the lame duck session of Congress that will follow.

With many close races being predicted and thin margins in Congress, the upcoming lame duck session could be extremely interesting to watch depending on how the election season pans out. Either way, most observers in Washington seem to agree that Congress will revisit the disaster assistance issue, most likely as

part of an omnibus appropriation bill.

Whether or not an emergency disaster assistance program is provided through a stand-alone bill or as part of a larger omnibus appropriation bill makes little difference to producers who have suffered weather related losses in 2005 or 2006.

What is important is that the assistance be designated as emergency spending. An emergency designation ensures Congress provides agricultural assistance in the same manner as other emergency assistance programs recently approved to help hurricane ravaged citizens and communities on the Gulf Coast. An emergency designation wasn't allowed when Congress passed the last agricultural assistance bill and unfairly included require-

ments for agriculture budget off-sets that forced Congress to take money away from other important programs to pay for the disaster assistance directed to farmers and ranchers.

It's ironic that budget off-sets were not required when Congress helped residents of the Gulf Coast, who at least had the option to buy full replacement value insurance on their homes and businesses, but seems to automatically head the list of requirements when discussing agricultural assistance for producers whose insurance options are limited and usually provide only partial coverage of a farmer's crops and livestock.

In mid-September High Plains Representatives on the House Agriculture Committee, Rep. Randy Neugebauer, of Lubbock

and Rep. Mike Conaway of Midland, participated in a Capitol Hill press conference to ask members of Congress to act quickly to approve a comprehensive disaster aid package and help U.S. farmers and ranchers cope with the effects of this year's drought and other weather related losses incurred during the 2005 and 2006 growing seasons.

Producer leaders from the High Plains, and all of Texas agriculture, continue to work with the region's Representatives in the House and both Texas Senators to pass a 2005-2006 disaster assistance bill when Congress returns. There seems to be plenty of support for an Ag disaster assistance package in Congress, the challenge is finding the right combination of legislation and political will to get the job done.

Cotton Market Weekly A service provided by Plains Cotton Cooperative Association

Cotton futures prices at the New York Board of Trade Wednesday managed to reverse their recent free-fall and finished substantially higher. The move was driven by technical factors that sparked spread trading and speculative activity.

The following day's session, however, gave up most of the gains as one trader called the performance "a big disappointment." Earlier, the week began with a startling report from the International Cotton Advisory Committee (ICAC). The committee released its monthly cotton balance sheet on Monday, and it contained revisions dating back to the mid-1990s with the focus on China.

"The bottom line was a sharp increase in China's cotton stocks which has rippled through to this season as a 6.9 million-bale gain in carry-in from last month's figures," one market observer noted. "For the world, it means a jump of 4.9 million bales for 2006-07 beginning stocks. Significant changes also were made to India's data. The world carry-out for this season grew 8.3 million bales from ICAC's previous projections, and of that, 7.6 million came from China," he concluded.

In other news, USDA's reported net export sales of U.S. cotton reached a marketing-year high at 254,200 bales in the week ended September 28. The figure was 34 percent more than the previous week and 30 percent more than the four-week average. Major buyers were Turkey, Indonesia, China, and Taiwan.

Export shipments of 104,700 bales were 38 percent more than the previous week and 47 percent more than the four-week average. Primary destinations included China, Turkey, Mexico, and Indonesia.

On the spot cotton scene, online trading by producers in Texas, Oklahoma and Kansas in the week ended October 5 totaled only 151 bales compared to the previous week when 1,702 bales were traded. The average price received by producers in the most

recent week was 43.30 cents per pound compared to a range of 44.59 to 47.61 cents per pound the previous week.

Meanwhile, U.S. crop conditions have improved over the last two weeks as USDA's weekly crop progress report placed 30 percent of the crop in poor to very poor condition compared to 32 percent the previous week. An average of 41 percent of the crop was rated in good to excellent condition, up two percentage points from the previous report.

Mostly open skies ruled across the Cotton Belt this week, allowing outside activities to expand at a rapid pace. Picking and ginning gained momentum in the Southeast and Memphis Territory un-

der favorable conditions. Work also peaked in Louisiana and Mississippi this week, and if good weather continues to hold, a vast majority of the Delta crop will be off the stalk by the end of the month.

Abnormally hot weather in West Texas is expected to boost development of the top crop in late planted stands. Many farmers have applied defoliant to more mature fields, and harvesting has begun on a small scale. Seed cotton supplies are increasing, and a few gins have started operations. If favorable weather persists, widespread work is expected to commence in a couple of weeks.

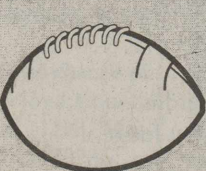

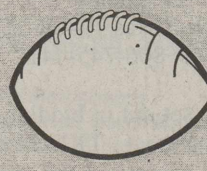
