McIntosh Lease Well now flowing good supply of gas

The McIntosh Lease Well #1077, located 11 miles east of Floydada and just north of the Matador Highway 62/70, started flowing gas last week on Monday, October 16, 2006. The gas was allowed to flow through a horizontal 'Blooie Line' (large pipe) and it was flared (ignited).

This large fire attracted a lot of attention of passersby and

county residents, who drove out to the site to watch the flaring from Monday through Wednesday of last week, which lasted over 48 hours straight.

The PetroGlobe Energy USA Ltd., owner of the drilling rig, has asked the general public to remain off lease roads and well locations for safety reasons, according to geologist and writer Tom Musser. (Read Musser's

Palo Duro Basin Oil and Gas Update Report in the Hesperian-Beacon weekly.)

"The gas well reached a depth of 9900 feet last Thursday, October 19th, and it is now shut-in pending completion and more testing," said Musser.

"This well was drilled with air-pressure and this is relatively new in this area. The rig has since been moved to Swisher County," concluded Musser.

FISD raises salaries for substitutes

The Floydada ISD Board met Tuesday, October 17, and raised all substitute teachers' wages \$5 per day starting November 1, 2006. The board also discussed the October 31st deadline for local residents and parents to sign up with the Blue Moon Solutions wireless internet service from the Reese Technology Center.

Concerning the substitute teachers' raise, Superintendent Jerry Vaughn said, "FISD is now paying substitute teachers \$45 per day, which is about \$4 below the average wage of other area schools. Our certified substitutes are now being paid \$55 per day. Long term substitutes, over 10 days, are receiving \$65 and \$75 per day for certified substitutes."

"I can work this \$5 raise, amounting to around \$7,000, this year into our already set budget, but next year we will have to add it into the budget up front," said Vaughn.

The vote for the \$5 raise for all substitute teachers was unanimous.

In other matters, Vaughn said, "The sign-up deadline for the Blue Moon Solutions wireless internet service is set for October 31, 2006. We only have about

one-half of the customers needed so far. We need others to sign up now."

According to Blue Moon, their wireless internet is the fastest internet available, with unlimited long distance telephone service and it will have internet television. Vaughn urged residents and parents to call this week the FISD office at 983-3498 for more information.

In other matters, the board approved a resolution from the Floyd County Extension Service to accept J.D. Ragland and Melissa Long as Adjunct Faculty members of FISD in order to keep the kids "in school" while on Ag trips.

The board approved the 2006-2007 Textbook Committee for the purpose of selecting needed books for FISD.

FISD Business Manager Sharon Rainwater presented the board with an Investment Report and a one-month Cash Flow Statement. The Investment Report showed a General Operating Checking Account of \$2,324,451.93 as of 9-30-2006, and a CD (Certificate of Deposits) amounting to \$3,387,000.00.

The Cash Flow Statement for September, 2006 showed a Fund

Balance of \$5,454,379.23, with an estimated average monthly expense of \$615,000.00.

The board accepted the resignation of Irma Vasquez and employed Amy Wade at R.C. Andrews Elementary and Ricky Coronado at FHS.

Superintendent Vaughn gave a closing report to the board. "All the contracts are done (completed) for our new (bond) construction to begin at A.B. Duncan Elementary. Our new science labs at Junior High are all finished and in use," said Vaughn.

According to Vaughn, FISD enrollment has dropped to 938 as of last week. This is down 36 students from this same time last year.

Vaughn gave the board members a handout showing recent changes and requirements of the administrative rules for the School FIRST accountability system. It will soon, in 2008, require school districts to disclose financial information about each superintendent and individual board member from the 2006 school year forward. School districts must begin collecting this information now in order to comply with the reporting obligations.

Council discusses repair costs of MMWA water tanks

The Floydada City Council met Tuesday, October 17, and discussed bids and grant options for repairing and painting three city water tanks maintained by the Mackenzie Municipal Water Authority.

Brandt Engineers of Amarillo presented the council a written 'probable costs estimate' for repairing and repainting the three water storage tanks of MMWA,

located at Tulia, Lockney and Rock Creek, to be a total of approximately \$1,008,550.00.

The Probable Construction Costs sheet showed the Tulia water tank repairs will be \$358,550.00, the Lockney water tank repairs will be \$433,450.00 and the Rock Creek water tank repairs will be \$216,550.00.

According to City Manager Gary Brown, who was absent from the meeting, but through a

written statement, showed Floydada's share of the repair expenses on the 1,500,000 gallon Lockney water tank to be 67 per-

During the LISD regular meeting, October 17, principals from each campus addressed the board and reviewed security measures already in place and new security measures they feel could be helpful.

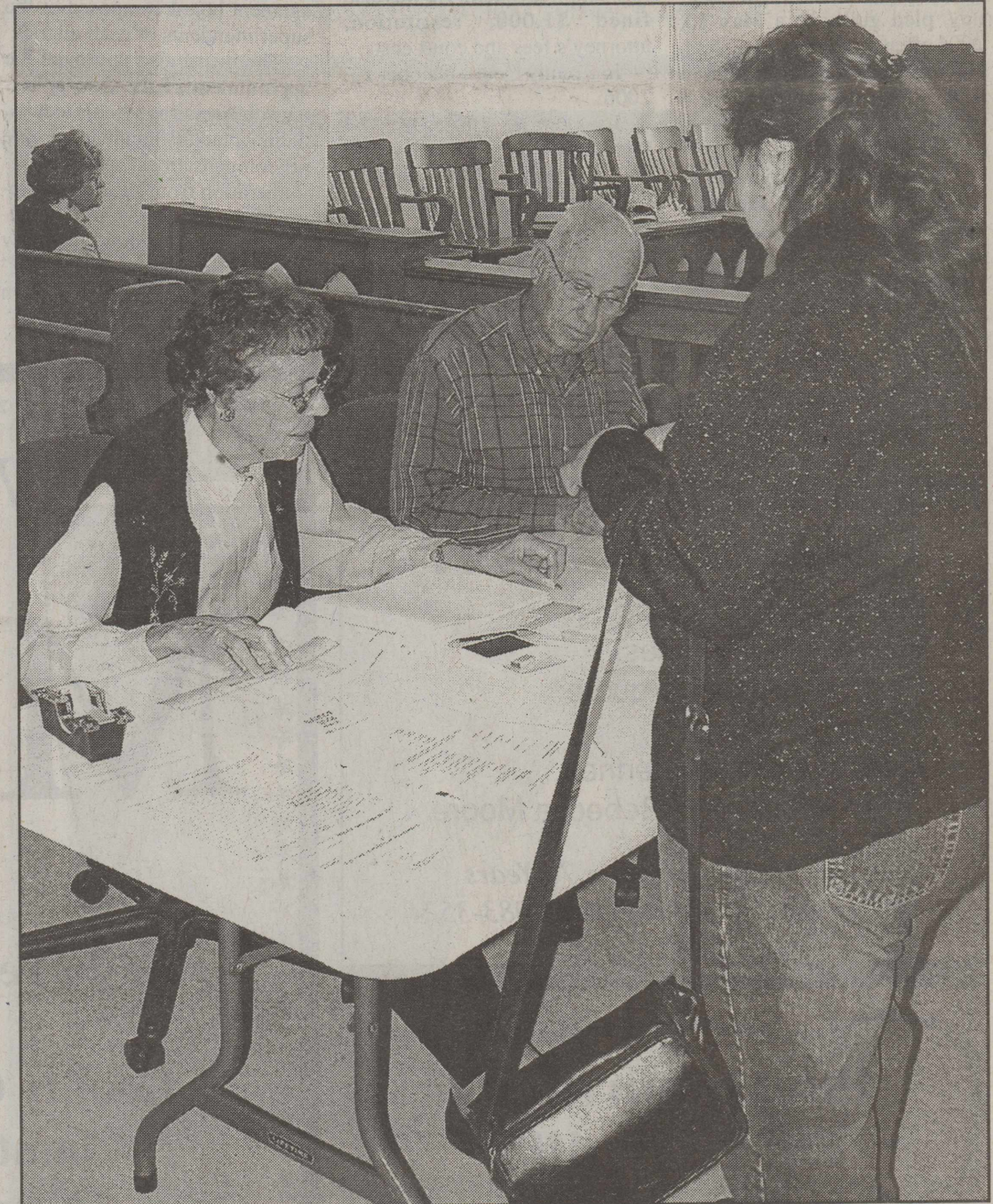
Because they share a common

School or Junior High.

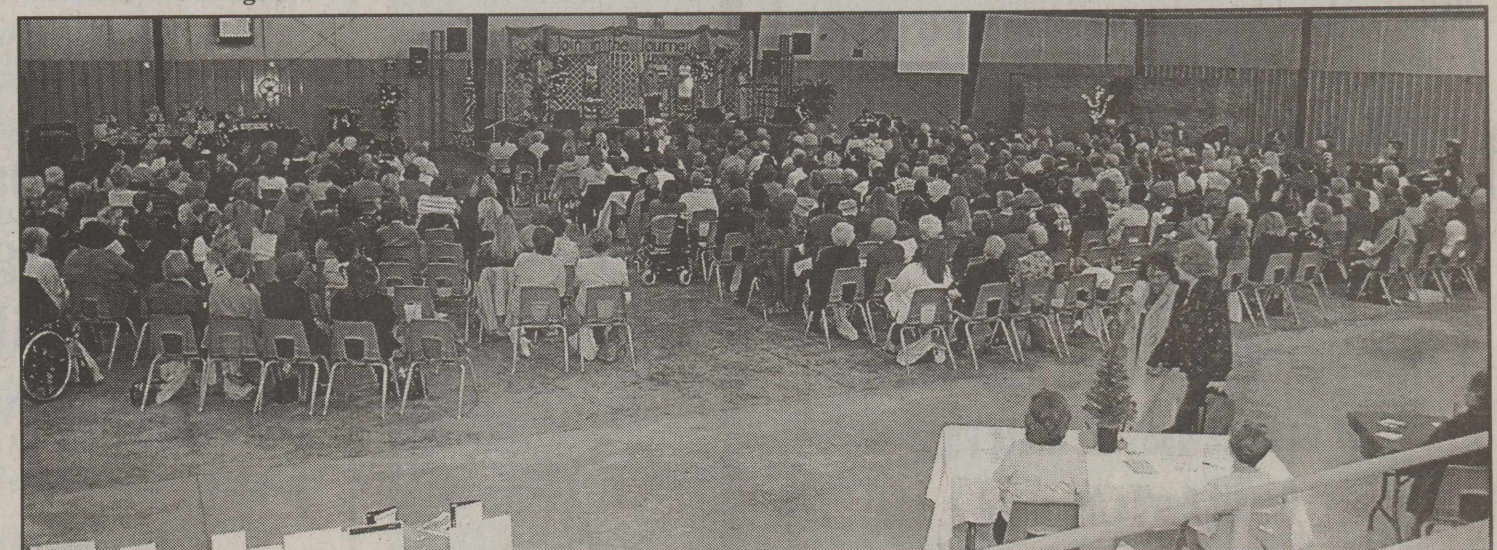
Thompson proposed different solutions for consideration, including: knocking out walls for windows, and/or cameras at the entrances with electronic locks and buzzers to call for admittance

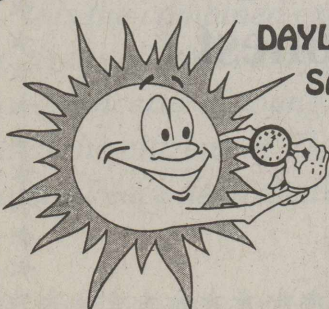

As readers of this column know, we seldom endorse candidates on the local level. Generally speaking, we figure local voters know more about local individuals than we do. We think, however, that the office of State Representative is high enough on the political feeding chain to make an exception. After all, the laws they pass, or don't pass, affect us all.

We, for instance, always supported Pete Laney...until he chickened out and flew off to Ardmore, Oklahoma with some other House members simply to escape his duties in Austin as a Representative for this District. (And for which Laney was elected, and for which he was paid.)

We know too that election time is a time for misinformation to run rampant. Some of this is the result of ignorance, and some is the result of deliberate misinformation. Anyone who tries to campaign honestly has the cards stacked against him by those who look upon politics as merely a way to entice the gullible.

This election is no different than any in that regard. One would think, for instance, that the

general field of education would be the first place one could turn to for honesty in voting. Not so. Those involved in that field have special interests just like any other voter.

As a general rule those special interests revolve around money, just like the special interests of all other voters. We had heard, even in Austin, that Landtroop is a champion of Charter Schools (and therefore an enemy of public schools.) So we called him and discussed the matter. No, he says, he is not for Charter Schools, save perhaps in those inner city sites beset with failing public schools, a position we think highly commendable. As far as rural schools in West Texas are concerned, there is no reason to fear Jim Landtroop. In fact, there is ample reason to vote for him and hope he wins.

after identification.

In the enrollment reports the Elementary School Principal, Jean Anne Williams, reported 272 students; Hallmark reported 136; and Thompson reported 193.

Superintendent Phil Cotham told the board the UIL Legislative Committee has informed schools that by Aug. 7, 2007 all districts must have an Automated External Defibrillator on campus.

Each high school campus must also develop a plan for "implementation, coordination,

and maintenance" of their AED program.

The financial report of the District showed a September balance of \$77,500.12, with CD investments of \$3,188,799.85, for a total of \$3,266,299.97.

The Board approved the sale of parts of lot 6, Brewster Addition 2.

The Board approved an amendment to the ISD Policy

Manual concerning a "sick leave pool". The amendment, recommended by the Site Based Committee, states that "a District sick

leave pool shall be established from voluntary donations of local and state personal leave by individual District employees to assist a fellow employee suffering from personal illness or disability.

"The sick leave pool shall be composed of voluntary contributions for a specific individual, and donated days shall be designated to a specific pool. No staff member shall be allowed to contribute more than 10 days of his or her local and state personal leave days to sick leave pools in a school year."

The Board also approved the Caprock Shared Services Arrangement Agreement between Floydada ISD, Lockney ISD, and Petersburg ISD. The districts agree to cooperatively operate their special education programs. The SSA is governed by a management board composed of the superintendents of each district.

The board also approved the appointment of the County Extension Agents as adjunct faculty. Adjunct faculty members receive no compensations, salary, or remuneration from LISD. This appointment allows voluntary student participation in 4-H and they will not be considered "absent" from school when participating in 4-H related activities.

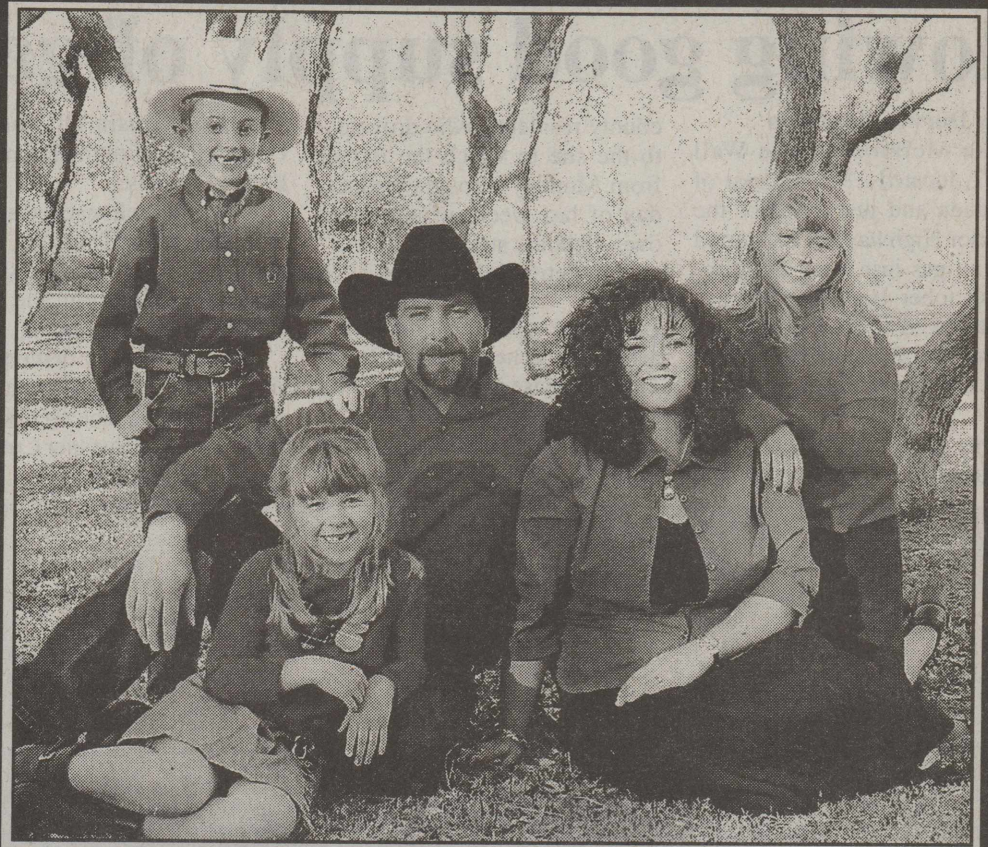

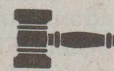

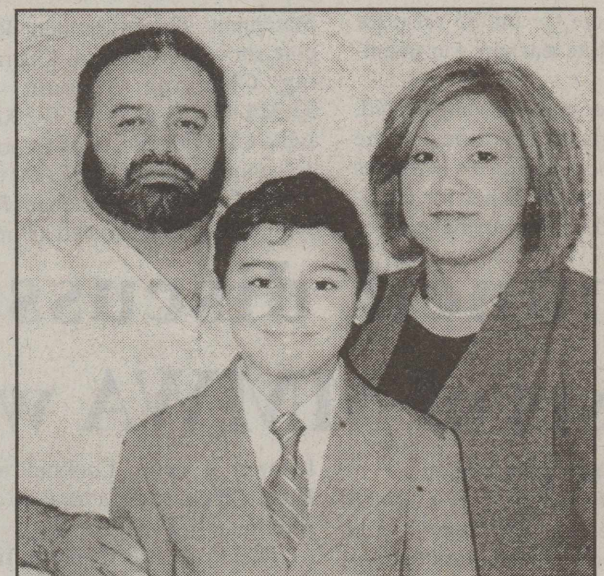

cent, with Lockney paying 33 percent.

Concerning the Rock Creek water tank repairs, Brown showed Floydada's share of the expenses to be 32 percent, with Tulia paying 43 percent, Lockney paying 16 percent and Silverton would pay 9 percent.

According to Brown's written statement, the Lockney water tank would be reduced in size and the engineers hope to have bids opened in December, 2006 or January, 2007.

The council gave approval to MMWA to seek grants, or other funding, so each town can pay off their part early, if the town can do so.

In other matters and with Floydada Police Chief Darrell

Gooch filling in for City Manager

Brown, the council read another report from Brown. This report stated that the collection of a \$.06 cent tax, previously approved by the council, for debt payments of around \$8,000 monthly on previous sewer repairs would not begin until January, 2007, due to a mix up in publishing the tax notices in the local newspaper.

Upon the recommendation of the Planning & Zoning Commission, the council approved a zoning variance requested by Lyn Marler to build a new carport closer than five feet from the property line located at 330 W. Ollie.

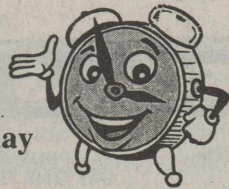
Gooch gave a brief report concerning the City's code enforcement on old structures around town. Gooch said, "Ms. Shotts is sending out letters to owners of these old buildings or houses to make improvements on them soon."

The council reappointed, or appointed, several citizens to the following boards: Airport Board - (2 year terms) Charles Craig, Jeff Johnson and Louis Lloyd; Floydada Economic Development Corp. Board - (2 year terms) Bob Alldredge, Pres. and Bill Harbin, Vice-Pres.; Housing Authority of Floydada Board - (1 year terms) Resident Pamela Hill; Planning & Zoning Commission and Board Adjustment - (2 year terms) Anne Carthel and Ralph Jackson.

In a financial recap of the City's ending fiscal year, Brown gave the council a written statement showing Income Budgeted at \$3,665,984, Income Received at \$3,910,747, Expenses Budgeted at \$3,726,108 and Expenses Spent at \$3,742,338.

In conclusion, a SPS/Xcel Energy report was handed out to the council showing electricity costs this winter should be down by about 11 percent.

South Plains Hobby Club News

The South Plains Hobby Club met at the home of Char Baker in Lubbock on October 11, 2006 for lunch, followed by a trip to the Lubbock Lake Landmark State Historical Park.

Members present included Ann Hartman, Betty Deavenport Virginia Taylor, Char Baker, Janis Julian, Carolyn Marble, Mildred Smitherman, Kay Gilbert, Shirley Weldon, Peggy Roberts, Donnie Bowman, Sandra Lass and guest, Ruth Wilkerson.

Char Baker had decorated the table in fall colors and design as well as made and decorated tiny "shape and bake" pumpkins for each of us. She also had prepared the delicious meal, which consisted of a chicken casserole, garden salad and dessert, coffee and tea. Ruth Wilkerson helped Char serve the meal. Although no one noticed when Char and Ruth served the dessert to each of us, two of the dessert bowls were different in shape, but not so much in color or pattern. Char told us to look carefully at our dessert bowls as well as the bowls of those seated around us. We then realized that Peggy's and Ann's were different.

Then Char said that the two bowls were the door prizes for the winners to take home. After thanking Char for the wonderful meal, the group presented her with a gift of appreciation: a metal hanging chime to hang in her garden.

Then as we were leaving for our trip to the Historical Park, Char gave each of us a wrapped favor containing several generous pieces of her homemade peanut brittle.

As we entered the parking lot of the park, we could clearly see some of the life size metal sculptures of extinct animals, whose

bones had been discovered at the Historical Park during excavations that have continued since 1939.

Prominent in the distance was a huge replica of a short haired mammoth. (We were told that the woolly mammoth most commonly represented in pictures as well as replicated in parks and museums lived farther north than Lubbock.) Later, following the tour of the museum, we saw at closer range, a replica of the giant short faced bear. This animal had legs at least as long as the average woman is tall and a cute flat face and sharp pointy ears, not unlike a domesticated cat. Unfortunately, like most modern cats, this prehistoric bear was carnivorous. Upon entering the museum, we were greeted by Sue Shore, Education Director, who gave us a brief history of the Landmark State Historical Park and introduced us to our tour guide, Dr. Bill Skillman, a Native American and retired professor of Psychology at Texas Tech University in Lubbock.

The museum building consists of several adjoining rooms, each with several life size dioramas. All of the animals, plants and people depicted in the dioramas are described by either pressing a button for a recorded message or from reading printed material placed beside the display.

One highlight of the tour included a huge vertical time-line describing the changes in climate, soil, plants and mammals in the South Plains area from nearly 12,000 years ago to the present.

Bill (as he asked us to call him) told us that Native American came to the Lubbock area about 11,500 years ago from North Eastern Asia and across a land bridge (that existed at the time) on into Alaska and then further south, probably seeking a warmer climate and game.

Bill said that groups of people have lived in the area since prehistoric days and historic periods when the Apaches and Comanches, followed by buffalo hunters and Anglo Americans arrived to live in and make use of the Landmark Area. He said that an ancient spring-fed watering hole located in Yellowhouse Draw, just south of the Museum, was used for thousands of years, until the spring went dry in the early 1930's.

After the tour of the Museum, Bill took us to a collection of artifacts discovered during various excavations over the years, including tools, musical instruments and weapons. He said that the few pottery shards on display had probably been acquired through trading with other Native-American groups, since the caliche and/or sandy soil characteristic of the Southern Plains area was not suitable for making pottery.

The Lubbock Lake Landmark State Historical Park is located just north of the Loop where it crosses the Clovis Highway (U.S. 84). The Park and Museum are open Tuesday - Saturday 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. and Sunday 1:00 p.m. to 5:00 p.m. Guided tours such as ours can also be arranged, including those for area schools.

The next Hobby Club meeting will be held November 8, 2006. The group has planned a trip to Post for lunch and a tour of the OS Museum to see the Museum's Christmas displays and art work.

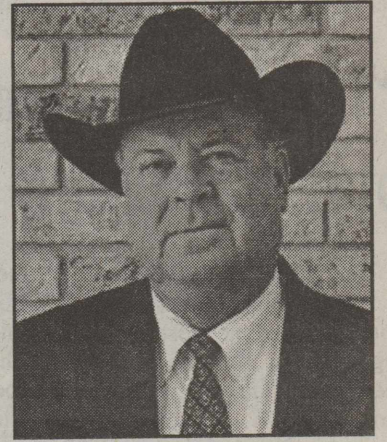
yon, Vernon, Lamesa, Cisco and O yes, Floydada. Wow! Are you impressed? I am.

Horsford leads Abernathy past Floydada 28-7

Tate Horsford had his best night the season by rushing for 243 yards and 4-touchdowns to lead the Abernathy Antelopes to a 28-7 win over the Floydada Whirlwinds at Wester Field on October 20. The win puts Abernathy is tie for first place in District 3-2A with the Childress Bobcats with 2-0 records in district.

For the season Abernathy is 5-2, while Floydada's records are 3-4 and 0-2.

Abernathy started the game with two long sustained drives in the first quarter that ended in turnovers deep in Whirlwind territory. The scoring threats were stopped respectively at the 8-yard line with a fumble recovery by Floydada's Tate Jones and at the 3-yard line when Pickles Alvarado intercepted a pass for the Winds.

Floydada was unable to generate anything offensively on the first two possessions as they were constantly operating in the shadow of their own goal line.

Abernathy finally broke the ice on their third series after starting at Floydada's 36 following a punt out of the end zone. Horsford capped the 6-play drive on an 8-yard scoring run. Abernathy led 7-0 with 8:49 remaining in the second quarter, and that's the way score stood at halftime.

The field position game changed midway in the 2nd stanza when Sammy Ramirez recovered

an Abernathy fumble at the Lopes 24. The Whirlwinds drove to Abernathy 3 yard line before Brandon Rainwater missed on a 20-yard field goal attempt, the first kick of any kind that he had missed this season.

Abernathy increased its lead to 14-0 after its initial possession of the second half when Horsford scored on a 3-yard run with 8:25 remaining in the third quarter.

Each team exchanged fumbles on consecutive plays near midfield late in the third quarter. Floydada's Chris Hayter recovered the latter fumble at the Whirlwinds 49. Floydada then executed its first real sustained drive of the game when Paul Marmejejo scored on the first play of the 4th quarter on a 1-yard plunge.

Floydada had cut the Abernathy lead to 14-7 and was maintaining momentum of the game.

The next series Floydada's defense forced the Antelopes to punt after only 3-plays. The Whirlwinds were positioned to possibly tie up the score by executing a fake punt on a Payte Beedy pass that advanced inside the Abernathy 40. The very next play 6'6" defensive tackle Ryan Myatt intercepted a Beedy shuttle pass at the 37. Then Horsford literally tore the hearts out of the Whirlwinds by scoring on bursts of 57 and 64 yards on the next two possessions.

Horsford had 408 yards and 8-touchdowns on the 2006 season

entering this game. The Senior runningback (pre-season Lubbock A-J "Super Team" member) had been playing with a knee brace in prior games after a sprained knee injury early in the season. Horsford did not have on the brace against Floydada, was close to his form in 2006 when he rambled for 1,486 yards and 14-tds.

The next game for the Whirlwinds will be the annual "Floyd County Championship" against the Lockney Longhorns on October 27th at Mitchell-Zimmerman Field in Lockney.
