Lockney Hospital praised by Texas Attorney General

Abbott has praised W.J. Mangold Memorial Hospital for improving the lives of Texas children by working to establish legal paternity when a child is born to unmarried parents. During fiscal year 2006, W.J. Mangold Memorial Hospital established paternity for 83 percent of children born to unmarried parents, making it a top performer among hospitals that deliver 99 babies or less to unwed parents each year. The statewide average for paternity establishment at birthing hospitals in Texas is 70 percent.

W.J. Mangold Memorial Hospital was one of 14 hospitals in the state recognized for exemplary achievement.

"Texas children are the future of our great state," said Attorney General Abbott. "W.J. Mangold Memorial Hospital's remarkable success means more children will benefit from the much-needed emotional and financial support of both parents. The Office of the Attorney General is proud to partner with hospitals across the State of Texas to ensure the brightest possible future for our children.

The Paternity Opportunity Program (POP), which was developed by the Attorney General's Child Support Division, trains and certifies employees of hospitals and birthing centers to assist parents with the AOP process while the mother and child are still in the hospital. POP provides hospitals with brochures and a video that discuss the benefits and responsibilities of paternity establishment. Hospital staff, in turn, give this information to unmarried

In addition to the 14 hospitals singled out for exemplary achievement, Attorney General Abbott also recognized 27 hospitals across the state for achieving six percentage points above the average. Eighty-nine hospitals were recognized for meeting the statewide average of helping 70 percent of unmarried parents legally acknowledge paternity at the time their children were born.

FISD, LISD, and PISD Superintendents clash over hiring new CSSA Coop Director

Superintendents from Lockney ISD and Petersburg ISD Hospitals must provide unwed came before the Floydada School Vaughn over who to hire as Director of Caprock Shared Services Arrangements.

The three ISD's, Petersburg, Lockney, and Floydada, are all a part of the CSSA Cooperative. Each superintendent represents their respective school boards at the CSSA Board Meetings.

CSSA is a state funded program to help schools with special needs children. CSSA programs use different approaches to special ed children. At present the Coop pays 5 full time employees plus an interim director, and 12-13 others are partially funded by the state--such as bus drivers, custodians, and speech therapists.

Because the expense is so great and the expert needs are so varied smaller school districts join their state resources together to hire personnel to fill these positions, purchase necessary equipment, and maintain separate offices and classrooms for the special needs.

Being the larger school district, Floydada ISD is the fiscal agent for the CSSA Coop. As the fiscal agent Floydada maintains the buildings and pays the salaries with the combined funds from each member of the Coop, and state funds.

The FISD School Board is also the board that oversees the CSSA Board made up of the three superintendents.

According to LISD Superintendent Phil Cotham, this year, LISD contributed \$64,457.00; of \$33,857.00 and FISD contributed \$80,606.00.

PISD Superintendent Joey Nichols voted to employ Karen

Quebe, a diagnostician with CSSA who has worked for the Coop since 1989. FISD Superintendent Vaughn voted against

Because Vaughn would not recommend Quebe, and because the FISD Board had to approve the hiring of the new director, both Cotham and Nichols appeared before the FISD Board to present their case for Ouebe and ask the FISD Board to hire her as the new director

Cotham spoke first to the Board and explained that the superintendents had met several times and reached the same impasse each time.

"I was elementary principal in Lockney for 13 years," said Cotham. "About 10 of those years Karen Quebe was the diagnostician for our special ed classes over there. She came and conducted our ARD (Admission, Review, Dismissal) meetings and did a lot of things for our school as far as special ed went.

"That is where a lot of my knowledge of her ability to work with special ed...her knowledge

Petersburg ISD contributed professionalism..and what I know dates and their experience does 'it.' not measure up to hers...

"I really don't know what the problems are with her (from Jerry Vaughn), other than he felt like there was going to be a problem coming up with that. I think that is why you have a board of managers. If there are problems we certainly should know about them and I have not been aware of any problems with her as an employee of the Coop in the past. Not one incident has been brought up to me. I think her experience, her professionalism, and her knowledge of special ed law makes her the candidate for the job. I would hope you would consider the boards recommendation on hiring Karen Quebe."

PISD Superintendent Joey Nichols spoke of his experience with Quebe. He stated when he was the High School principal in Petersburg, Quebe was also his school's diagnostician.

"If you are looking at this job description you are looking at what is most important. Looking at the job description for CSSA most of the things it mentions are related to special ed. I've worked with Laura Taylor who is now the 3rd or 4th in command at TEA in the special ed division and I would put Karen's knowledge of

> After the superintendents spoke FISD President Bill Dean called for a closed executive session. At this point Cotham approached Dean's chair and handed him a letter from Karen Quebe (who was not present at the meeting).

> The letter requested that any discussion of Quebe and her job qualifications or employment be made in open session. The meeting stayed open.

In open session Vaughn, as the head of the Coop board, then presented the recommendation of the CSSA to employ Karen Quebe as the CSSA director.

Trustee Amado Morales asked if there was any way to look further into this and get together again.

Cotham said the superintendents had met 3 times and gone home to think it over, but had all come back with the same opin-

Trustee Kerry Pratt asked Vaughn, "What makes you think Karen can't do the job?"

Vaughn said, "... Several instances of things that have oc-

curred while I've been here." "Can you elaborate on those," asked Pratt.

"I don't care to because they involve students," said Vaughn. "If we can't go into closed session I'm sure not going to elaborate on the students." .

FISD looks at wheelchair access at stadium

FISD Trustees met in regular session, December 7 and discussed employment of a director for Caprock Shared Services (see separate story), handicap ramps for football bleachers, insurance, and audits.

Superintendent Jerry Vaughn addressed the board and stated there have been some problems with wheelchair access recently. Because of some unhappiness expressed by some wheelchair confined people, Vaughn asked for a proposal from Grimes and Associations.

The proposal presented to the board gave an estimate for: building wheelchair entry ramps on the north and south end of the bleachers, construction of wheelchair accessible/wider front aisles on the front of the bleachers, parking areas for wheelchairs, and wheelchair accessible sidewalk from the parking to the bleacher ramps.

This construction would have to be made for the home and visitor bleachers.

The home "student" bleachers would also require entry ramps on south end, wider aisle in front of bleachers, parking areas for

Also included in the proposal would be accessible sidewalks to the concession stand and toilets, enlarging the concrete area in front of the concession and modification of existing toilets.

The proposal stated the estimates are based on the cost of bringing contractors from Lubbock or Amarillo. However, if a welder could be found locally the cost could come down as much as 30-40%.

The estimated cost for the project was \$261,000.00 --\$333,000.00.

Trustee Kerry Pratt stated, "A quarter of a million dollars is outrageous. You couldn't get a quarter of a million for the whole setup over there."

"You could move the whole stadium for that cost," said Trustee Amado Morales.

'We don't have football for 6-7 months," said Board President Bill Dean. "Let's get another es-

The Board also reviewed the only bid presented to them for insurance for property, casualty, and vehicles for 2007. The bid came from Texas Assoc. of

wheelchairs and aluminum walk- School Boards Risk Management Fund.

The bid showed an increase of \$5,100 increase. Total cost for property insurance was \$39,114; for vehicles, \$21,939; and \$14,381 for other equipment liability. The total package would cost FISD \$79,434.00.

The trustees unanimously approved accepting the bid.

Trustees listened to an audit report prepared by Robison, Johnston & Patton. It showed the accounting policies of the District to be in good shape. The accountant said, "I applaud the business office in the way they deal with credit card receipts, fuel, and activity funds."

The cash flow statement for FISD showed a fund balance of \$5,654,562.37.

Vaughn presented the board with Student Performance/Superintendent Appraisal worksheet that is required by Texas statute to be considered when making a superintendent appraisal.

The appraisal will be made soon by the trustees.



Trustee Rachael Castillo asked, "Can you without giving their names?'

"I move that we postpone definitely any action on this item until we have a unanimous recommendation from the CSSA Board.

"The key word is 'definitely'," continued Lucke, "and 'until' is another key word...we have unanimous recommendation from the CSSA Board.

"When you do it definitely, you are giving them either a time or an event...we're not telling them they have to have a decision by midnight or the next time we meet...we're telling them that when they have a unanimous decision to bring it back to us.'

Blue Moon Internet gets permission for placement from County antennae

The Floyd County Commissioners met Monday, December 11, and gave Blue Moon Solutions wireless internet permission to install their equipment on the county's 275 foot tower located west of town.

Marty Hale, Chief Executive Officer of Blue Moon Solutions, told the commissioners "We need a 200+ foot tower here with no interference and FCC regulated. Our equipment will only consist of one antenna with cable. It will not take up much space and it will reach up to 10 miles. We already have a 600 foot tower at our Reese Technology Center west of

Hale added, "We could begin installation on the tower within a week. We will install receivers on light poles all over town and the entire system should be up and running by the middle of January, 2007.

Hale added, "This WiFi project will make Floydada the most high tech town in rural America. Floydada is the first city in all of West Texas to have this technology. FISD already has around 675 laptops and this will virtually expand their campus to the entire county.'

"We also hope to expand into Lockney ISD, City departments, Police Departments, Fire Departments, Public Work vehicles, EMS and the Sheriff's Department," said Hale.

Over 400 larger cities, like Dallas and San Francisco, already have this technology, according to Hale. "This system will eventually cut costs for internet, television and utilities," said Hale.

In other matters, the commissioners gave permission to Petro Globe Energy, USA to use the right-of-way of County Road 271 near Dougherty to install a 4 inch gas pipeline for the McIntosh #1 Well from Hwy 70 for 4 miles to Atmos transmission line at CR

Petro Globe Energy spokesman Randy Hutton told the court, 'We need to get this gas (from the McIntosh Well) to the market. We will put the 4 inch pipe inside an 8 inch pipe and bury

both at least 4 feet deep below the bottom of the ditch.

The court approved three farm contracts. They were: Pct. 4, 14 miles east and 6 miles north of Floydada, to grade feed road for soil conservation, by Michael Stark; Pct. 1, 1.5 miles east of Hwy 62 on CR 290, to bury old improvements for soil conservation, by Jason Pyle; and Pct. 1, off Highway 378, to haul gravel, by Susan Dunavant.

\$32,000 was transferred by the commissioners from the Road & Bridge Fund to the four precincts at \$8,000 each to be used for general expenses.

County Treasurer Elva Martinez gave the court her month Financial Report for November, 2006. It showed a Beginning Balance of \$663,062.18, with Receipts at \$539,634.31. Transfers In and Out was at \$224,553.90, with Disbursed at \$203,107.66, leaving an Ending Balance of \$999,588.83.

Floyd County Extension Agent Melissa Long reported to the commissioners. According to Long, the Caprock Cotton Conference will be held January 16, 2007 at the Plains Baptist Assembly and a Beef Cattle Meeting will be held at the Unity Center in Muncy on February 6, 2007.

Long continued, "We will continue to do monthly nutrition education programs at the Floydada Senior Citizens' Center and at the Lockney Quilting Club. We will offer Do Well Be Well with Diabetes from January 29, 2007 to February 26, 2007. We will offer Food Protection Management classes on February 15 & 16, 2007."

According to Long, the Floyd

Disappointment was the overriding emotion expressed by Texas farmers and ranchers following the Senate's failure to approve an amendment to the FY07 Agriculture Appropriations bill that would have expanded the existing 2005 only disaster program language to a 2005 and 2006 program capable of providing meaningful relief to

Texas agriculture. It is estimated that in 2006 drought and wildfires in Texas alone have caused well over \$4 billion dollars in agricultural

Plains Cotton Growers has communicated this fact regularly to legislators in the House of Representatives and the Senate for months and advocated the passage of a disaster aid package program that allows growers to qualify for assistance in either 2005 or 2006, in order to extend coverage to the broadest possible number of impacted growers, and includes a supplemental Di-

rect payment. The most recent effort to expand the current proposal was put forth earlier this week by Democratic Senator Kent Conrad of North Dakota and debated on the Senate floor Decem-

The amendment, which would have expanded the 2005-only program and designated the program's expenditures as emergency spending, failed to receive the 60 votes required to waive the budget rules requiring offsets to (DCP) began October 1, 2006 pay for the expansion by a mere and producers are already begin-

Senior Texas Senator Kay Bailey Hutchison voted for the proposal and the emergency spending designation. Senator John Cornyn, despite stating on numerous occasions his support for disaster assistance, voted against the proposal.

vote Cornyn said, "I strongly support the original disaster aid package to provide assistance for Texas producers who were harmed by drought conditions and wildfire. It's important to note that \$4 billion in aid will be provided if we pass this overall bill, which would have been nearly impossible with the amendment that was proposed

"The amendment would have increased deficit spending by nearly \$1 billion at a time when the American people have asked Congress for stronger fiscal restraint. And the White House said the President would likely veto the overall bill if it had included Cotton

this amendment." There is no doubt that a broadbased assistance package is needed to address weather-related loses, all of which stem from adverse weather patterns incurred in late 2005 and throughout 2006.

With the failure of the latest effort by such a slim margin it is certain that a renewed effort to broaden the currently proposed assistance package will occur. The most likely time for such action is after the Senate returns from its December break and starts working on the omnibus appropriations package needed to finalize the remaining FY07 appropriations bills.

In the interim, Texas producers are forced to sit and wait for word that help is actually on its way and that their 2006 losses will be covered.

For High Plains cotton producers, who saw well over one million acres of non-irrigated cotton failed because of the drought, passage of a disaster assistance package is at the top of their Christmas wish list.

Hopefully, Santa and his helpers in Washington will step forward and work together to pull together a comprehensive package that doesn't leave anyone out in the cold.

> The 2002 Farm Bill allowed DCP participants the option to

request a 50 percent advance Direct payment as early as December 1 following the start of the DCP sign-up period for the

2002 through 2007 crop years. Budget reconciliation changed that for the 2006 and 2007 DCP programs. Last year the 2006 advance direct payment was reduced to 40 percent for growers that requested the advance after the adoption of the FY06 Agricultural appropriations measure.

That same measure also specified that the 2007 advance Direct payment would be offered at the normal time, but at a significantly lower 22 percent rate. In both instances the final Direct payment date was left unchanged.

Producers began signing up for the 2007 DCP program on October 1, 2006 and are eligible to begin receiving their advance Direct payments on December 1. Growers requesting an advance Direct payment can receive the payment in any month between December 2006 and October

For producers already signedup in the 2007 DCP, county FSA offices are in the process of issuing the 22 percent advance 2007-crop Direct payment. The remaining 78 percent of the 2007 Direct payment will be paid beginning October 1, 2007.

The second significant change producers will notice for 2007 ais the different way in which the 2002 Farm Bill handles payments made through the Counter-cyclical payment pro-

For the 2002 through 2006 crop years the Counter-cyclical program, when a CCP payment was projected by the Secretary of Agriculture, provided growers the option of receiving a 35 percent advance payment after the first three months of the marketing year and another 35 percent payment six months into the marketing year.

Growers who did not ask to receive the first 35 percent partial payment could request a single 79 percent partial payment at the six-month mark, which allowed them an opportunity to shift income into a different tax

For the 2007 crop year the payment schedule is somewhat different in that the 2002 Farm Bill specifies that only one advance partial CC payment will be of-

fered six months after the start of the 2007 marketing year. The maximum amount of this partial payment, which would be paid in February of 2008, is 40 percent of the projected CC payment rate projected by the Secretary at that



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
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


