

Ice storm causes loss of electricity to local residents

Between 1,500 and 2,000 member/customers of Lighthouse Electric Cooperative were without power, following a severe weekend ice storm that paralyzed portions of West Texas. Most of the damage occurred in Floyd, Crosby, Hale, and Brisco Counties.

'Lighthouse expects to have two substations back on line today, with 500 to 700 meters still out," said Lighthouse Electric Cooperative General Manager Bill Harbin. "We still have lots of feeder lines and lateral lines unusable until poles and cross arms are replaced. Right now, we're expecting to have power restored to most residences by tomorrow (Wednesday) or Thursday.

Lighthouse EC crews are working around the clock to restore power in the wake of the ice storm that crippled the system over the weekend. Two substations and nearly 2,000 meters lost power due to the storm, and approximately 200 utility poles were downed, with hundreds of places," said Harbin.

cross arms and conductors broken.

According to Harbin the area sustaining the most damage was the east side of Floyd and Crosby Counties but all of the service area was affected to some extent. "Electricity started going off Sunday between 2:00 a.m. and 4:00 a.m.," said Harbin.

Lighthouse EC line crews are being assisted by four contract crews and line personnel from Bailey County EC. All Lighthouse EC resources are being brought to bear to resolve this crisis, said Harbin. "We've had no problems obtaining supplies," he said. "Texas Electric Cooperatives (TEC) and other suppliers are keeping us well-stocked. Three trucks delivered new utility poles from the TEC Pole Plant about 7:30 yesterday evening," Harbin said.

According to Harbin, Lighthouse linemen were working 16-18 hour days. "We have 20 local men working and they have been reinforced by 30 more from other

"We still have a tremendous ice load on many lines," said Harbin. "We may sustain additional damage as the wind picks up and as ice falls from the lines when the temperature warms up." Harbin said the co-op hopes to have power restored in all residences by mid week, "but that will depend on weather and how much, if any, additional damage we sustain.'

Harbin reported that "...even though we have additional customer service representatives manning the phones, members may get a busy signal, initially when trying to call in. Please try your call again. We appreciate your patience and we are working as hard as we can to restore power."

Harbin said, "Our members are the greatest folks in the world. We are grateful to them for their patience and courtesy. They keep encouraging us and offering to help, even though some have been without electricity since Saturday."

Obituary FISD Board renews Superintendent's contract

The Floydada ISD Board met Thursday, January 11, 2007, and after over three hours in closed session discussing Superintendent Jerry Vaughn's 2006 evaluation, the board approved Vaughn's three year contract through June 30, 2010 with a vote of 5 to 1.

Those voting for the superintendent's three year extension contract were Board President William Dean, Board Members Kerry Pratt, Marty Lucke, Lyle Miller and Bart Greer.

Voting against the superintendent's three year contract was Board Member Rachel Castillo

Board Member Amado Morales was absent from the meeting.

Before unanimously approving the payment of the December, 2006 bills, questions were asked by Board Members Pratt and Greer concerning a \$23,638.26 payment to Grimes and Associates.

According to Superintendent Vaughn, this expense was for a one day fact finding trip to Dallas and a partial fee payment to Grimes and Associates. "\$1,800 was FISD's cost to fly me, Principal Fred Bush and Principal Gilbert Trevino to look over several school facilities there. By flying in Grimes' personal jet, we were able to return the same day without having to spend the night in a motel," said Vaughn.

"That sounds a little expensive to me," said Trustee Bart Greer.

In a related matter, Vaughn told the board about several blueprint drafts that have already been submitted by Grimes and Associates concerning the future construction bond project at A.B. Duncan Elementary. "We have made several changes on these early drafts in order to get all the space and classrooms needed for all our programs," said Vaughn.

Brenda Jones, a representative of Central Plains Special Education, addressed the board during Public Comment. Jones stated her concerns for the Special Ed

children in Floyd County being neglected because of the recent

dissolvement of the Special Ed Coop between Floydada, Lockney and Petersburg.

"Caprock Services have 34 children being served. There are 8 from Floydada, three from Lockney and two from Petersburg. I am very concerned for these special ed children," said Jones

Board President Dean told Jones, "Speaking as an individual, and I hope for the board, we are not going to forget these children. It was not our choice to dissolve the (Special Ed) Coop. Those kids will still be served."

In a Coop related matter, Superintendent Vaughn told the board, "We are on a deadline to report to the state by February 1, whether we have a new (Special Ed) Coop, or if we are in another Coop. I am planning on meeting with the Honda Coop of Hale Center, New Deal and Shallowater this week. I have also had two inquiries of other districts wanting to join with us. We have three options now. We may have to have a special session to take action on this before February 1.

Concerning the costs of joining another Coop or allowing another district to unite with FISD, Vaughn said, "It depends on the situation. It may be expensive, or not. The services will not go away. We will pay only for the students we have in the Coop. Our Special Ed funds should be sufficient for our needs."

FISD Business Manager

Sharon Rainwater gave the board a Tax Statement, a Cash Flow Report and an Investment Report. The Tax Statement showed a Current Tax Roll of \$1,974,201.76, with Net Collections of \$1,367,474.30 as of December 31, 2006, or 69.37 percent.,

The Cash Flow Report showed a Current Cash Balance of \$7,133,327.81, with a Fund Balance of \$5,663,799.75. The Investment Report showed a Total Cash Balance on 12-31-2006 at \$7,198,145.54, with Earned Interest a \$3,387,000.00 CD at \$160,882.51.

In a related matter and upon the recommendation of Vaughn, the board unanimously approved designating 33 percent of all CDs' Earned Interest each year to help sustain the computer TIP program. "33 percent from this year's CD's Earned Interest will be \$84,000," said Vaughn.

Vaughn said, "We have already received in the past three years more than \$560,000.00 from the state for the TIP program. This state help will run out this year. We need to be proactive and maintain the TIP computer program. We need to start earmarking money now for this program. We will need some new computers, hardware, software and licenses. Sustainability is the key to these types of programs."

The board accepted the resignation of custodian Juan Gomez at FJHS and employed math teacher Laura Zepeda at FJHS.

Kaleidoscope and M.A. Ulmer's building. Kaleidoscope was again broken into during the night of Thursday January 4.





Palo Duro Basin Oil and Gas Update Courtesy of Tom Musser

Floyd County: As of January 2007 the Apollo Energy Operating Company, LP Ceretha Watson Lease (223132) Well #1 Wildcat Field is listed on the Railroad Commission of Texas Oil and Gas Proration Schedule as shut-in with a 14(B)(2) extension. Apollo Energy Operating Company LP filed the RRC Form G-l Completion Report on May 9, 2006. The Ceretha Watson #1 was drilled from October 31 to December 8, 2005. The total depth is 10,500 feet; with a plug back depth of 10,456 feet. 13 3/ 8 inch surface casing was set to 467 feet. 9 5/8 intermediate casing was set to 3950 feet. 5 1/2 inch production casing set to 10,495 feet with multistage tool set at 7978 feet.

The Ceretha Watson #1 was perforated from 9824 to 9816 feet, from 9654 to 9644 feet, from 9606 to 9596 feet, and from 9524 to 9516 feet. Currently a packer is set above the perforations at 9426 feet.

Floyd County: Bankers Petroleum (US) Inc. stated in their January 10, 2007 news release the Misener Lease Well #1 had been fracture stimulated and tested in both the Granite Wash Sands and the Bend Shale Intervals. Bankers Petroleum (US) Inc. stated, "These stimulations have not resulted in economic production rates. Based on the highly naturally fractured reservoir indicated by logs on this well and the low flow rates experienced, the company suspects that the formations may have been damaged through the drilling or completion operations on the well." Bankers Petroleum (US) Inc. further stated they plan to January 10, 2007 news release evaluate the combined production of the commingled Granite Wash Sands and Bend Shale.

Floyd County: PetroGlobe Energy U.S.A. Ltd. stated in their January 11, 2007 update that they are proceeding with operations to be ready to sale gas from the McIntosh Lease Well #1077 within the first quarter of 2007. Further PetroGlobe released the four point Isochronal Flow Test data, starting an absolute open flow rate capability of 3,316 mcf per day of gas from the McIntosh #1077. In addition to this PetroGlobe Energy Information Pearl Exploration and Production Ltd., who is an investor in the McIntosh #1077, announced in their January 12, 2007 operations update that the McIntosh #1077 tested 150 barrels of condensate per mmcf of gas (which for this test would have been 497.4 barrels of condensate.)

As of Friday January 12, 2007 the completion paperwork (Form G-1) and the gas well classification report (Form G-5) had not vet been received by the Railroad Commission of Texas Oil and Gas Division, Midland District Office.

Floyd County: PetroGlobe Energy U.S.A. Ltd. stated in their January 07 operational update that the results of the Cox Lease Well #1013 are indeterminate currently, and a Shale Section will be evaluated.

Hale County: Drilling ahead continues on the PetroGlobe Energy U.S.A. Ltd. Ramsower Lease Well #1113.

Motley County: Bankers Petroleum (US) Ltd. stated in their

Cogdell, Jr. Estate Lease (#201274) Well #1001 was drilled by Legacy Exploration, LLC from May 16, 2003 to June 13, 2003 and was perforated from 8980 to 8936 feet, from 8824 to 8818 feet, and from 8654 to 8643 feet. All three of the operators of this lease and well: Legacy Exploration, LLC; Vintage Petroleum, Inc; and Bankers Petroleum (US) Inc. evaluated and tested Well #1001. Bankers Petroleum (US) Inc. assumed operation of this lease and well in May 2006.

Motley County: Bankers Petroleum (US) Inc. stated in their January 10, 2007 news release that the next well they plan on drilling in the Palo Duro Basin will be near the D.M. Cogdell, Jr. Estate Well #1001. It has been reported that the well location has been staked in Section 64, Abstract-1157, Block T, Arnold & Barrett Survey. This would place the new well east of the D.M. Cogdell, Jr. Estate Well #1001

Swisher County: PetroGlobe Energy U.S.A. Ltd. stated in their January 11, 2007 operational update that the testing of the deepest potential oil zone in the Young Lease Well #1032 was noncommercial. PetroGlobe Energy U.S.A. Ltd. has stated that they will conduct additional evaluation and testing on various Up-Hole Zones for oil in 2007.


1950 **Study Club** news

Statistics indicate that foodborne illness continues to be health issue in the United States. Each year, 1 in 4 Americans will become sick, 1 in 1,000 will become hospitalized, and 5,000 will die due to a foodborne illness.

During the past legislative session, a statute was amended that allowed the Texas Department of State Health Services (DSHS) to require each food establishment to have one certified food manager.

Recently, the Texas Board of Health adopted rules to implement this statute. Many of you have already received a letter from the Texas Department of State Health services regarding this. Under these new rules, each food establishment permitted by the Texas Department of State Health Services must have one certified food manager. New food manager certificates will be valid for 5 years.

Texas Cooperative Extension, Floyd County, is offering a food manager certification training course. This program will be offered for \$89 on February 15 and 16, 2007 a the Hale County Extension Office, 225 Broadway, Suite 6, Plainview, Texas. Cost includes training, materials, and the State food manager certification examination. Deadline for registration is February 2, 2007. This program is designed to not only prepare foodservice managers to pass the certification ex-


amination; it will provide valuable education regarding the safe handling of food. Almost 50 cents of every dollar Americans spend on food is spent on meals prepared away from home. Therefore, careful attention to food safety will help keep customers safe and satisfied.

Foodborne illnesses are estimated to cost thousands of dollars in lost wages, insurance, and medical bills. With these statistics, knowledge of how to prevent foodborne illness is essential. The benefits of improved food safety include: Increased customer satisfaction; improved relationships with health officials; prevention of bad publicity and law suits due to foodborne illness.

By attending the course, foodservice managers will learn about: identifying potentially hazardous foods and common errors in food handling; preventing contamination and cross-contamination of food; teaching and encouraging personal hygiene for employees; complying with government regulations; maintaining clean utensils, equipment and surroundings; controlling pests.

Foodborne illnesses can be prevented by following simple food safety practices. For more information about the Food Manager Certification Training course of Texas Cooperative Extension, called "Food Safety: It's Our Business," call Floyd county Extension Office for more information or for a registration form.




I quote from the 1979 Floyd County History Book.

The Maurice Ewing Hall, a laboratory centrally located in the complex of the Marine Science Institute of the University of Texas at Galveston is a tangible expression of the value according his work.'

I will write more on Maurice's Floyd County relatives next week. I am getting most of this information from the 27 year old Floyd County History Book. The Floyd County Historical Museum still has a few of these books for sale at \$37.50. That was the original price they sold for. Most places are selling their history books for \$100.00 or more because there are so few of them left. This history book has the history of communities, schools, churches, families etc. It is a wonderful book that I use almost daily.







The list of challenges facing the cotton industry heading into the 2007 growing season is significant and the presenters who shared their thoughts about those challenges with the more than 2,300 growers and industry leaders that gathered in New Orleans for the 2007 Beltwide Cotton Conference spoke to a highly attentive audience.

Opening day speakers at the Beltwide's Production Conference discussed the importance of upcoming federal budget discussions and the need to formulate a sound response to the latest challenge put forth by Brazil as two of the many issues facing the industry heading into the Farm Bill debate.

Highlighting the speaker list was Secretary of Agriculture Mike Johanns who provided the keynote address, but confined his comments to general themes that continued to lay the groundwork for what many expect to be a very different view for future U.S. farm policy.

Sticking with the Administration's long-standing position that changes should be made in the current policy to more readily insure that U.S. farm programs are fully compatible with WTO trade agreements and also provide a more equitable distribution of farm program dollars. Johanns reiterated his intention to submit a different vision for U.S. agricultural policy.

Johanns noted in a press briefing following his address that the Bush Administration is preparing to release their proposal for future U.S. farm policy around the first week of February.
