Raissez is new Sheriff for Floyd County

Paul Raissez was sworn in as the 19th Sheriff of Floyd County, Friday, February 2.

After accepting the resignation of Sheriff Royce Gilmore, the County Commissioners entered into executive session shortly after 3:00 p.m., Friday, to consider the applications for the position of Sheriff.

After approximately 15 minutes the Commissioners reconvened in open session. Commissioner Ray Nell Bearden then stated, "Since it is our policy to appoint the most qualified person for the job, I make a motion we appoint Paul Raissez Sher-

Commissioner Lennie Gilroy made the second and Commissioners Jon Jones and Bill Quattlebaum also voted in favor.

Sheriff Raissez will fill the 2 year unexpired term of Gilmore. Other applicants for the position were: Richard Zavala, of Lockney, Clarence Douglas Walding, of Floydada, and Charles Dunn, of Floydada.

Raissez, 32, was born in Floy-relationship dada and attended school in Floydada until the 3rd grade when he moved to Lockney.

He attended Lockney schools from that point on and graduated

College, in Levelland, for one year and then went to work at the County's first Sheriff, D.W. Floyd County Sheriff's Office in Jenkins, who served from 1890-May of 1996 as a jailer.

He graduated from the Lubbock County Sheriff's Academy in 1998 and was hired as a deputy, by Sheriff Gilmore, in 1999.

Raissez currently lives in Lockney and is the single parent of a 13 year old son, Reon. The Sheriff's parents, Al and Arlene Raissez, also live in Lockney.

Raissez has one deputy assisting him at the Sheriff's office, Trey Dolloff. The Sheriff is currently advertising for another

ounty produces 2nd biggest cotton crop

bale count is set at 220,698 bales ginned in the county. According to records, this is the second biggest cotton harvest in Floyd County since 1949.

The 2004 record cotton harvest was 262,621 bales ginned. The 2004 bale count was the largest since 1949, according to Economist Dr. Carl Anderson of the Texas Cooperative Extension at College Station, as reported in the April 14, 2005 issue of the Hesperian-Beacon.

According to Anderson, in 1949 the region harvested 7.5 million bales of cotton on twice the number of acres, while the 2004 regional cotton harvest was 5.5 million bales on half the number of acres planted in 1949.

Floyd County Extension Agent J.D. Ragland reported in his December, 2006 newsletter, "40,000

acres of cotton failed in 2006 due The 2006 Floyd County cotton to the dry conditions, leaving only 151,822 acres harvested. When the failed acres are omitted, the average 2006 yields don't look too bad.'

Floydada Coop ginned the largest number of 2006 cotton bales in the county at 53,786, compared to 37,500 ginned in

Lockney Coop ginned the second largest number of 2006 cotton bales in the county with 33,574, compared to 31,704 in 2005. The cotton quality this year was real good, according to their

D&J Gin of Lockney came in a close third with 33,298 bales ginned in 2006, compared to 47,754 bales ginned in 2005. Their bale count was down this year because of the lack of any dryland cotton this year, according to their office.

Barwise ginned their seconded biggest number of bales ever with 28,000 bales for 2006, according to their office, compared to 21,535 bales in 2005. Their quality was very good, according to their office.

Scott Gin of Floydada ginned 23,417 bales of cotton in 2006. This set a record for them with the largest number of bales ever ginned, according to their office. This was compared to 12,408 bales ginned in 2005.

McCoy Gin Manager Scott Graham reported 16,726 bales ginned in 2006, compared to 8,939 bales in 2005. "The quality was excellent this year," said

Randy Pernell, Gin Manager of Darty Gin, reported 15,246 bales ginned in 2006, compared to 21,820 bales ginned in 2005. "We lost a lot of acres this past summer to hail storms," said Pernell.

Blanco Gin Manager Jody James reported 10,600 bales

ginned for 2006, compared to 13,500 bales ginned in 2005. James told the Hesperian-Beacon, "We still have about 300 bales of cotton in the field to be stripped and to be ginned at a later date. I am adding those 300 bales to our count for 2006."

Don Marble, of Marble Brothers Gin, reported 6,051 cotton bales ginned in 2006, compared with 7,426 bales ginned in 2005. Marble said, "The drought got our dryland cotton this year, but our irrigated cotton was real good





Ammend, says he arrested Englund because, "you can't take the law into your own


Englund says criminals can escape by the time a deputy can arrive from Cambridge because it is 15 miles away.



Secretary of Agriculture Mike initial changes to the payment Johanns rolled out the Bush Administration's Farm Bill Concept paper earlier this week and provided an interesting counterpoint for the Farm Bill debate.

Since detailed analysis of the proposal will take some time, the early reactions from Congress and commodity groups have been understandably mixed. From Congress initial responses have expressed appreciation for the thought, time and effort that USDA put into development of the proposal clearly punctuated with a reminder that it will be Congress that decides what ultimately becomes part of the 2007 Farm Bill.

Most of the responses also take note of the fact that the proposal appears to contain some individual components that merit full consideration.

"The fact of the matter is that producers shouldn't take too much of the Administration's proposal to heart," says Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. Executive Vice President Steve Verett. "Ultimately it will be Congress, not the Administration, that writes the 2007 Farm Bill and the proposal released January 31 will be viewed as a set of ideas on the table for consideration."

Verett notes that despite the fact that many of the changes proposed by the Administration probably won't gain much traction, there are some positives to be found.

He points to two important concepts that are clearly espoused in the proposal. The first is a commitment to support the three main components of the 2002 Farm Bill - the marketing loan and the direct and countercyclical programs. The second is the Administration's recognition that additional budget authority will be necessary to meet the new needs they helped identify.

The Administration proposal would require approximately \$5 billion in new spending authority to be fully implemented. Specifics of the Administration's proposal include: Maintaining the marketing assistance loan program in its present form with changes in the mechanism used to determine the loan rates for program crops; maintaining the Direct Payment Program with

rates for cotton and rice to partially offset impact of marketing loan rate adjustments and with increases on some other crop payment rates in the out years; maintain a modified Counter-cyclical payment program with a revenue based trigger and payment rate calculation mechanism; maintain the Federal Crop Insurance Program with a downward revision in the program's loss ratio target and adding the ability to purchase GRP/GRIP insurance policies in tandem with individual Multi-Peril Crop Insurance/Revenue insurance policies; and, modify current Payment Limitation rules by replacing the current 3-entity rule with a single \$360,000 payment limitation provision (\$110,000 limit on Direct payments, a \$110,000 limit on Counter-cyclical payments and a \$140,000 limit on marketing loan program benefits).

Perhaps the only concrete thing that can be said about the Administration proposal a this time is that some of it warrants further review and it will not be dismissed wholesale as a potential source for positive enhancements to the current program.

It is also clear that many of the proposals, such as the proposed revamping of the loan rate discovery mechanism, are problematic and not likely to be viewed favorably by Congressional farm bill writers.

USDA Deputy Secretary Bruce Knight provided an accurate an insightful comment on what the Administration proposal "is" and "is not" when presenting the Administration's proposal to an audience in Sioux Falls, South Dakota on January 31.

"There still is a great deal of discussion on the specific details raised by the [USDA's] proposed farm bill and the bill undoubtedly will go through changes as input is sought on its ideas," Knight "This is an opening document

that is meant to open a discussion," he concluded. "We want to make sure to have substantive discussions on how you can improve farm policy.

Upland Cotton average price received by growers through November 2006

Cumulative Upland cotton

marketings for the first five months of the 2006-marketing year totaled 6.325 million bales according to information released January 31 by the USDA National Agricultural Statistics

That figure is 1.432 million bales off the pace set through the same period last season.

According to USDA estimates December 2006 cotton marketings totaled 2.062 million bales with an average selling price of 49.30 cents per pound. So far the 2006 Upland Cotton Weighted average Price calculated through December 2006 stands at 47.35 cents per pound.

With the first five months of the marketing year now past, the calculated 2006 Weighted average Price is still almost five cents below the 52-cent threshold where 2006-crop Counter-cyclical payment rates would begin to drop although prices also continue to show an upward trend. The preliminary mid-month price reported for January 2007 was 49.50 cents per pound.

The following table shows the average price received each month by farmers and the associated weighted average price based on prices and cumulative marketings from August 1 through December 31, 2006.

The 2006 Counter-cyclical payment rate authorized under the 2002 Farm Bill will be based on the 12-month Weighted Average Price Received by growers. For cotton the 12-month Weighted Average Price will reflect price and marketings for the 2006 marketing year. The 2006 cotton marketing year began in August 1, 2006 and ends July 31, 2007

Dr. Roy Cantrell to head up Monsanto Molecular Breeding **Technology Initiative**

Two of the key programs he has helped implement are the "Cotton Incorporated Fellowship" program provides financial support for research fellowships in the area of cotton breeding with the goal of identifying and training the next generation of cotton

The CI Sustainability Initiative is a program designed to set the record straight about what it means to have sustainable cotton production system and to educate consumers about the true environmental impact of modern cotton production systems.
