The Gala will start at 6:00 p.m. and end around 9:00 p.m.

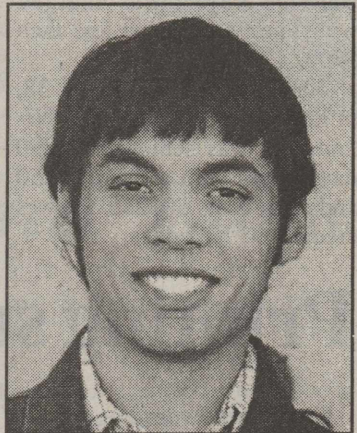

Michelle Araujo charged with selling alcohol to a minor at her liquor store

Legal problems are mounting for Lockney J.P. Michelle Araujo after Texas Alcohol Beverage Commission filed a complaint, March 16, against Araujo in Briscoe County for selling alcohol to a minor. Araujo was also arrested last week, March 10, with Aggravated Assault with a Deadly Weapon after she shot her husband, Romeo Araujo several times in the abdomen area.

Selling Alcohol to a minor is a Class A Misdemeanor that is punishable with confinement in jail for not longer than 1 year, and, or, a fine not to exceed \$4,000.

A person convicted of Aggravated Assault with a Deadly Weapon could be sentenced to 2-20 years in prison and a fine up to \$10,000.

Besides her duties as Justice of the Peace and Lockney City

Judge, Michelle Araujo works at Bruskie's Liquor, located in Briscoe County on Hwy. 378. Michelle and her husband, Romeo, both own the liquor store.

The TABC complaint filed in the Briscoe County Attorney Emily Roy's office, by TABC Officer James A. Martin, stated that Martin observed Michelle Araujo selling a six pack of Coors Light to a 17 year old female.

The Complaint stated the TABC was conducting an investigation into the selling of alcohol to minors with a "minor sting operation."

In a sting of this type a minor will enter the store and, under the watchful eye of a TABC officer, attempt to buy alcohol.

According to TABC, minors are not allowed to misrepresent themselves with fake identifica-

tion and are not allowed to dress in such a way as to appear older.

In the Complaint, Officer Martin stated, "The minor had a valid Texas License with the birth date of 11/24/89 and did not look older than her age."

"I entered the store before the minor, so that I could observe the attempted purchase of alcohol...The minor took a six pack of Coors Light to the counter. The clerk (later identified as Michelle Araujo) asked the minor for proof of age and the minor showed the clerk her driver's license. The clerk allowed the minor to purchase the beer."

This is the 2nd complaint of selling to a minor, filed by TABC, against Bruskie's within a year. The other complaint was against a different clerk working at the store.

Lockney celebrating 100th

Lockney's Chamber of Commerce will be celebrating Lockney's 100th birthday at the annual Chamber Banquet, March 31st.

Late in 1889 towns began to spring up and before the county was surveyed or organized several towns had come into existence. One of these was Lockney, named after J.F. Lockney, editor of the Floyd County Times in Mayshaw.

Several of the towns were moved to Lockney to make a larger town. When the land was surveyed it was found that Lockney was located on the corner of

four sections which made it necessary to move the town to a new site.

In 1895, James Artemus Baker bought 160 acres of land for the new town site of Lockney.

Baker's first store and post office were located where the City Bank building is currently located.

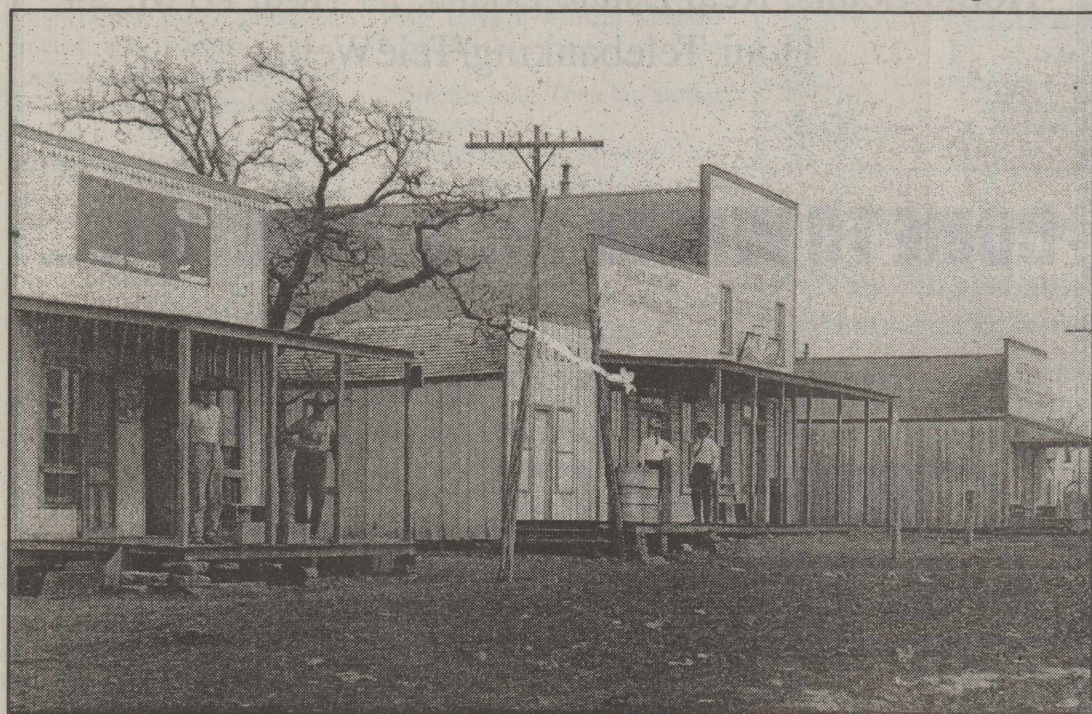
At that time Lockney was composed of a post office, school building, blacksmith shop, grocery store and a few dugouts for residences.

The growth of the Lockney public schools began in 1890 when D.F. Davis taught the first

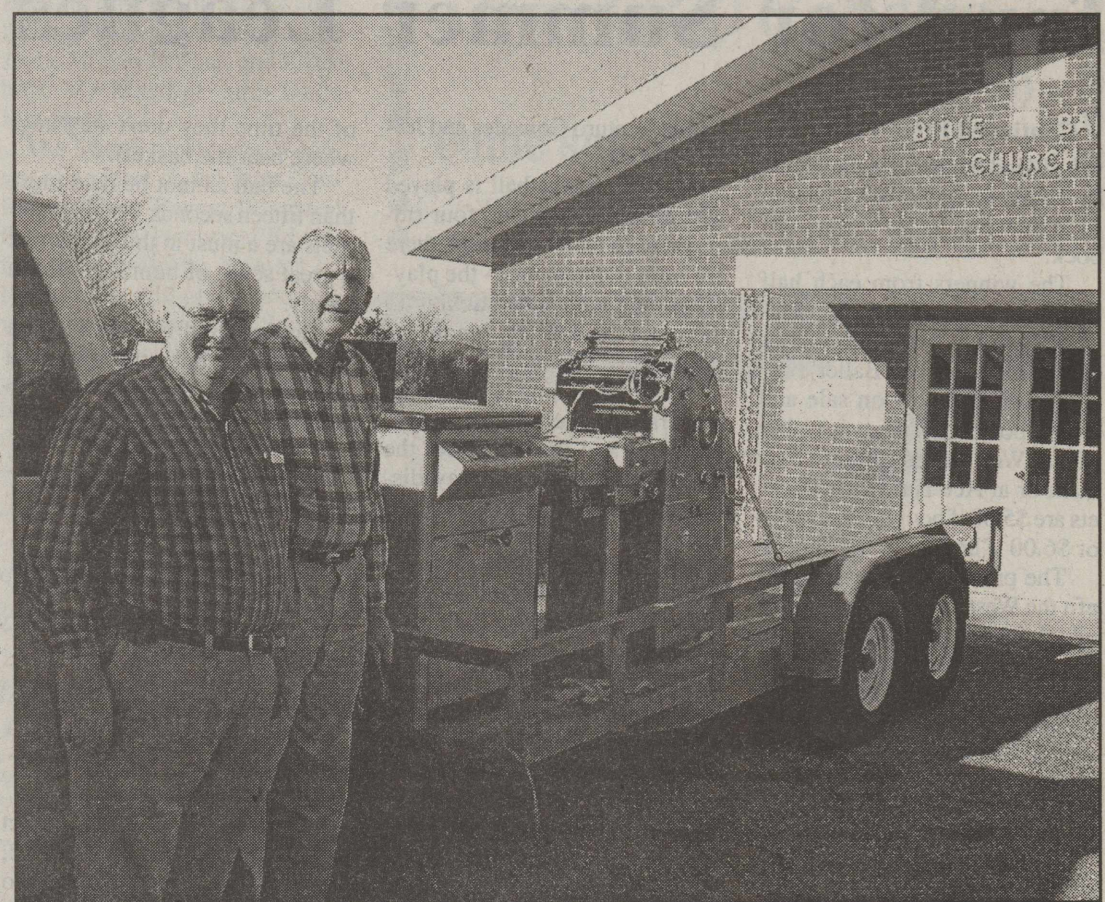
school in the community at a salary of \$50 per month. It continued as a one teacher school until 1895 when the public school and the Lockney Christian College merged together to be under the administration of the trustees of the public school district.

The college gave up its identity for a period of three years and the same teachers taught in the public school. Three or 4 teachers were used.

In 1898 the college again became a private school, and the public school, which had been using the college building for the

The two missionary efforts of, Bible Baptist Church of Floydada and of Metropolitan Baptist Church of Fort Worth, came together last week in a joint effort to ship printing equipment to Cuba.

Pastor Robinson and Bible Baptist Church gave four pieces of printing equipment to Pastor Adkisson and Metropolitan Baptist Church for their Cuban ministries.

Metropolitan Baptist Church

has a 'Cuban ministry'. For the past several years MBC's missionaries, along with other cooperating churches and their missionaries, have been able to enter Cuba and cautiously visit already established churches in Cuba.

When Castro took power over Cuba nearly 50 years ago, his government allowed the already established churches in Cuba to remain open, but no new churches could be organized.

Therefore there are still in ex-

istence today about 40 organized Baptist churches in Cuba. Through these churches the American missionaries are operating their ministries 'underground', so to speak.

Most of these churches have print shops in them and these print shops are used as the livelihood for their pastors and some members. They do printing for the public and for their own church's educational material.

To say the least, these print

past 3 years, moved the old building from old Lockney to the new townsite and remodeled it.

The new public school used two teachers for several years, increasing to 4 teachers by 1905.

In 1902 the Lockney Common School District became an independent district.

Lockney was almost wiped out three times by fire which destroyed valuable papers and records.

In September 1890, the Lockney Methodist Church was organized.

The first Missionary Baptist Church was organized in a dug-out home in December 1890.

The first newspaper to be printed in Lockney was the Lockney Ledger in 1898. It was followed by the Lockney Beacon in 1902. The First National Bank was established in 1903. The first cotton gin was established in 1903 by C.R. McCollum.

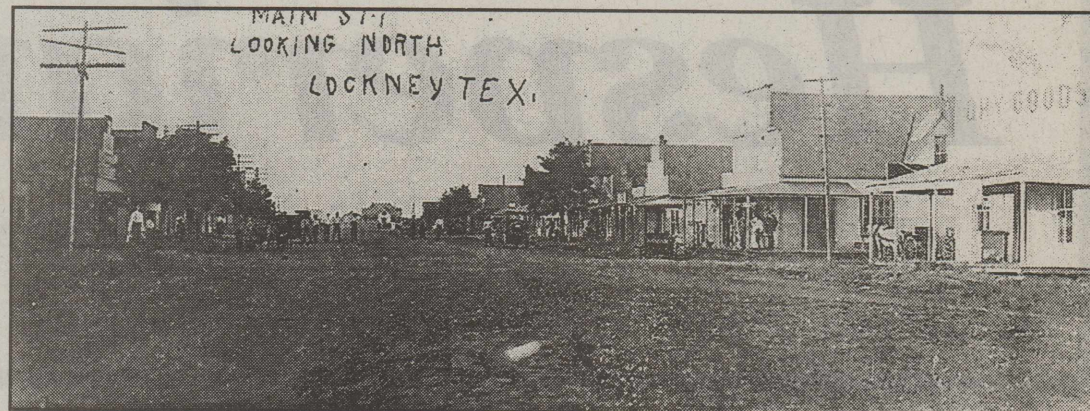
On the 12th day of August, 1907, Lockney's first council meeting was held.

The first Mayor was J.M. Crawford. Aldermen were: W.H. Freeman, George Brewster, W.T. Cooper, J.L. Norris, and W.R. Stovall. Brewster was elected City Treasurer and Stovall was City Secretary.

The first order of business was to fix a sanitary system for the City. The Marshal was asked to talk to all "heads of households" and have them clean their premises. It was also decided to abolish the public outhouse.

In the next meeting, the council voted that horses, cattle, mules, sheep, goats, and hogs would not be allowed to run loose within the city limits of Lockney. A fine of fifty cents per animal plus the cost of feeding and watering them while they were impounded would be levied against the owners.

The council also passed an or-

dinance that there would be no riding of pitching, bucking, or running of horses on the streets of Lockney and that it would be unlawful for anyone to fire a gun in any street or alley.

An occupation tax of \$1.00 was levied against every business and a poll tax of fifty cents was levied against every voter.

A short time later businesses were asked to put sidewalks in front of their-businesses.

In 1911 the Northwest Texas Telephone Company was granted a franchiser for 25 years to construct and maintain a first class telephone system.

In 1912 a chemical fire engine was ordered for the protection of

the city. In early 1913 the city had four 60 candle lights installed; two at the corner of Main and College, and two at the corner of Main and Locust.

Early in 1915 a permit was issued for building and operating a light plant in the town. Street lights were being installed on a few corners and stores were being lit electrically.

The speed limit in town was 12 mph and a night watchman was hired to patrol.

On July 10, 1916 a resolution was passed that incorporated the town of Lockney into a City, stating..."the Town of Lockney to be known as a City of 1000 or more inhabitants."

The Lockney Longhorn Band will be the featured entertainment at the Chamber Banquet.

Proceeds from the banquet will go towards Lockney's downtown beautification projects.

Printing supplies going to Cuba

shops are very antiquated. They have equipment that is 50 years old. They lack supplies, such as, ink, paper and printing plates. These obsolete machines continually are breaking down. Any parts or printing supplies are deeply appreciated by these print shops.

Old used equipment may be worthless in the eyes of Americans, but to these Cubans it can be the difference in keeping food on the table for their families or dying for the lack of the basic needs of life.

The common people in Cuba are so poor they cannot afford to eat a basic diet that would include meat or other staple food products to give them their much needed daily vitamins. It is against the law to own animals. You cannot own a cow. All cows belong to the government.

Metropolitan Baptist Church is trying to share the gospel with Cuba, and have to work with our government officials. Much of the work, such as, printing materials, teaching seminars and other church related ministries are done with much secrecy.

The first 1.2 million tracts being printed partially in Cuba with their own presses is "Creationism vs. Evolution." This tract is not that controversial. It is not a 'gospel' tract, but it is getting the doors open in Cuba. There are plans to print another

one million tracts about "The Authority of God's Word" and 5,000 copies of a booklet entitled "The ABC's of Christian Growth".

One of MBC's missionaries received a visa from the Cuban government to come and teach 'religion' in the country. He went and taught 'religion' to some 40 pastors and church workers in different churches.

This is an open door to Cuban ministries. The US government has asked MBC in Fort Worth to keep them informed of their every move and trips into Cuba, as the government is monitoring things going on there.

Concerning these Cuban seminars conducted by MBC's missionaries and others, Pastor Adkisson states, "Without the work of Cuban men our efforts will be in vain. We understand that 'ministry' is people and the people of Cuba must be reached by their own. Several trips have been taken by many of our men to continue the training of pastors and missionaries in Cuba.

"We have planned to double those efforts this next year. Each trip costs between \$800 and \$1200. This includes plane flights, car rentals, hotels and food expenses. We see this as an investment in the lives of men that will live on beyond us.

"If catastrophe struck Cuba and American missionaries could no longer assist in the ministry

of Cubans, there would have to be independently trained Cuban men who would be able to not only continue to minister, but multiply their efforts. This is the reason for immediate training of nationals," concluded Adkisson.

The printing equipment sent last week will be taken to Fort Worth and stored in shipping containers. Eventually the containers will be shipped to Honduras and from there they will be sent to Cuba to be unloaded by the pastors there.

The printing press, the plate burner and the upright camera were donated to the Cuban ministry by Pastor Robinson. These items were given to Pastor Robinson a few years ago by Dave Taylor of Lubbock and Jim Huggins of Blanco Printing.

The multiple task copier, collator and stapler were donated by the Bible Baptist Church. Fred Thayer of Floydada had given this machine to the church last year.

"A big 'Thank You' goes to the PAC boys of Floydada, their supervisor, and Johnny Bill Sue for coming over to the church last Wednesday morning and helping load these heavy printing items," said Pastor Robinson.

"Thanks also to Pastor Adkisson Evangelist Dr. Wayne Hudson for bringing the trailer.

"I pray the Lord will bless everyone involved and that these items are a blessing to the people in Cuba."

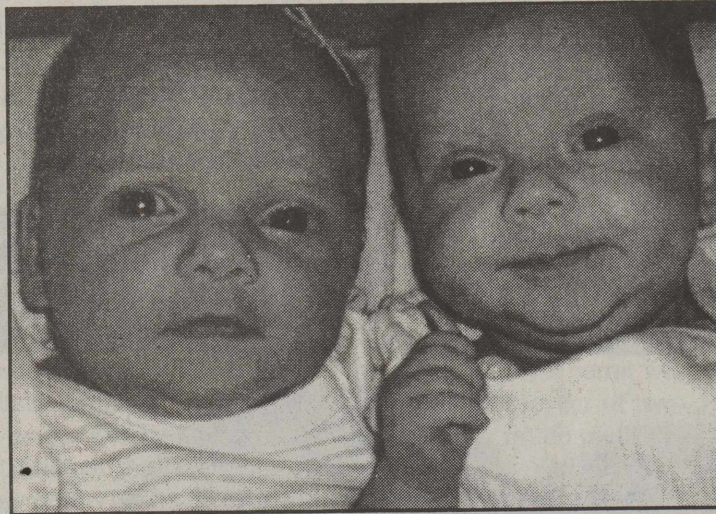

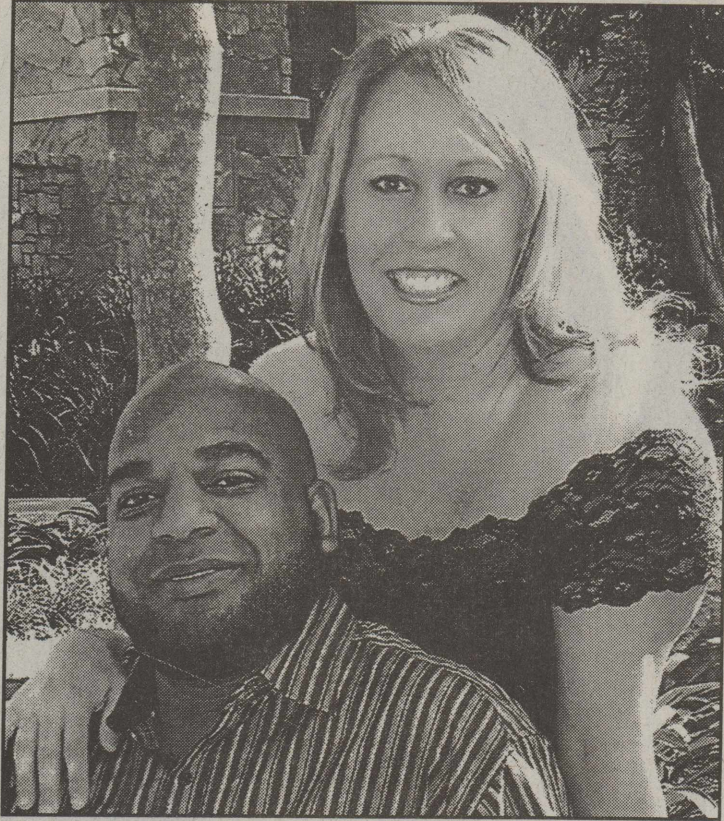

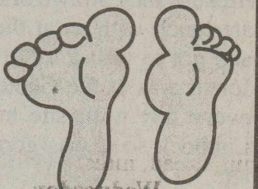

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
 SPECIAL ELECTION MAY 12, 2007

PROPOSITION 1 (SJR 13)

SJR 13 would amend the Constitution to authorize the legislature to adjust the public school ad valorem tax or tax rates for taxpayers who are aged 65 or older, or are disabled, and who are owners of an exempted homestead. The amendment would thereby allow the legislature to provide tax relief to such elderly or disabled taxpayers who did not receive tax relief as a result of the school tax rate reduction passed in the 79th Legislature, 3rd called session.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for a reduction of the limitation on the total amount of ad valorem taxes that may be imposed for public school purposes on the residence homesteads of the elderly or disabled to reflect any reduction in the rate of those taxes for the 2006 and 2007 tax years."

Senator Kent Conrad, Chairman of the Senate Budget Committee, oversaw approval of a \$2.9 Trillion FY 2008 Budget plan on a 12-11 party line vote March 15. The Senate panel's approval sends the plan to the Senate floor for final approval.

Included in the plan is the Senate's budget allocation for writing the 2007 Farm Bill and language authorizing up to an additional \$15 billion over five years to address new needs or the expansion of existing programs to meet changing program priorities.

The Budget Committee's addition of extra spending authority doesn't necessarily mean that there is that much extra money to work with when the Senate Agriculture Committee sits down to write the farm bill however. The kicker on the extra funding is that the Senate plan appears to require that spending offsets or a revenue increase be found to make the additional money available.

According to Ag Chairman Tom Harkin the plan approved by the Senate Budget Committee will not be sufficient to fully address all the items that need attention during the farm bill debate especially with the strings that are currently attached.

Harkin notes that even if it is realized, the extra spending authority is still \$5 billion short of the figure he and Ranking Member Senator Saxby Chambliss had requested from the Budget Committee over the next five years to write the farm bill.

It is best to note that the budget plan that will now move to the Senate floor for consideration is far from the last step in the process relative agriculture spending.

With the House of Representatives facing a similar dilemma when it sits down to produce a budget plan next week it should be clear that the budget process is far from over.

TBWEF approves lower assessments in four High Plains Weevil Eradication Zones

The Texas Boll Weevil Eradication Foundation Board of directors approved recommendations to lower 2007 assessment rates in four Texas High Plains eradication zones.

Benefiting from new assessment rates in 2007 will be growers in the Northern High Plains (NHP), Northwest Plains (NWP), Panhandle (PHH), and Southern High Plains/Caprock (SHP/C) eradication zones.

The new assessment rates are now on the desk of Texas Department of Agriculture Commissioner Todd Staples awaiting final approval to go into effect. Commissioner Staples is expected to act on the TBWEF recommendations within the next two weeks.

Producers and landowners in these areas are the first in the currently active High Plains eradication zones to benefit from lower assessment rates thanks to the success of the program and the leadership of the growers serving on each zone's grower advisory committee.

In addition to reducing boll weevil populations to levels that should allow them to be declared functionally eradicated in the near future, each of the zones approved for the lower assessment rates have cleared another equally important hurdle in their battle against the boll weevil.

Thanks to strong producer support, all of the four High Plains zones lowering assessment rates have repaid 100 percent of the money borrowed at the start of their programs to sustain full-scale eradication activities. As weevil numbers have dropped, a greater percentage of each year's assessment has been able to be directed at repaying these up-front expenses.

Each of the four zones was able to repay their program debt earlier than the projected repayment time frame approved by growers when the program was started.

The following is a run-down of the recently approved 2007 assessment rates.

Panhandle-Approved 2007 assessment rates for the PH zone is \$3.00 per land acre for Non-irrigated (dryland) cotton and \$3.00 per land acre for Irrigated cotton. Acres failed prior to the final Farm Service Agency certification date will be credited for 100 percent of the assessment due.

Southern High Plains/Caprock-Approved 2007 assessment rates for the SHP/C zone are \$3.00 per land acre for Non-irrigated (dryland) cotton and \$6.00 per land acre for Irrigated cotton. Acres failed at any time during the growing season will be credited for 100 percent of the assessment due.

Waste Pesticide Collection Dates

The Texas Commission on Environmental Quality, Texas Department of Agriculture and Texas Cooperative Extension are getting together to clean up the Texas countryside during the month of March.

As always these Agricultural Waste Collection Program events are free of charge and open to all Texas residents, not just farmers and ranchers. Participation is voluntary and confidential.

The joint effort is made of a series of six waste pesticide collection events across Texas. Three of this year's scheduled collection sites are located in the West Texas region.

Statewide, collection dates were set up for Bryan, Huntsville, Carthage, Pampa, Plainview and Brownfield beginning March 13 and ending March 29.

High Plains residents will be most interested in the Pampa (March 26), Plainview (March 28) and Brownfield (March 29) collection dates.

The Agricultural Waste Collection program will accept left-over banded or unwanted agricultural pesticides, home chemicals including pesticides paints and thinners, antifreeze, household batteries, aerosol cans, photographic chemicals mercury thermometers, herbicides, gasoline, cleaners, pool chemicals, fluorescent bulbs, used motor oil and oil filters, lead acid batteries and other automotive products.

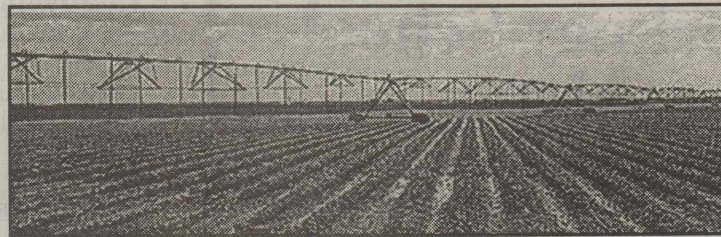

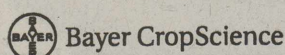
