Work brings Scotsman to County

Seeing John Bruce walking through Floydada in his colorful Kilt may raise a few eyebrows among West Texas farmers, but the stares only bring a huge smile from the Scotsman.

Recently transplanted from his home in Dunoon, Scotland, John Bruce is in Floydada as part of the site team for the RES Whirlwind Energy Project in Floyd County. John is the civil engineering site manager in charge of building roads and concrete for twenty six wind turbines.

Talking with John is like learning a whole new language. It may resemble the English language, but you have to pay close attention or the Scottish slang will leave you stumped as quickly as Texas lingo will puzzle a New

John's easy smile and good nature relaxes you quickly and conversation with the fun loving Scotsman is something you won't want to miss.

John Bruce is eager to promote his home country, and if wearing his Kilt around town helps then you may be seeing more of his family colors.

"The colors on my Kilt are the Bruce clan's (family) Tartan," said John. "You can often tell a man's last name by the colors in his Kilt.'

When John was asked the question that everyone wants to ask—just exactly what does a Scotsman wear under his Kilt? John answered with a quick grin, "That's for me to know and you to find out!"

According to John the Kilt attire worn for this story's picture is informal and would most likely be worn when travelling

with the "Tartan Army", Scotland's famed football supporters. The more formal attire includes brogues (black laced shoes), a bowtie, and a "Bonnie Prince Charles Jacket".

"Kilts are worn at weddings, and sometimes Hogmany (New Year's Eve) celebrations," said

And speaking of football, John is truly puzzled at the American version of football.

"You hardly even kick the ball so how can you call it football?" said John. "That's not football. Soccer (one of a Scotsman's favorite sports) is football. America is the only place in the world that football is called "soccer!"

Football matches and golf are both favorite pastimes for John. He misses the coastal town of Dunoon and the outdoor activities that Scotland offers.

"In Scotland you can have four seasons in one day," said John. "It is not as hot there, but there is a huge amount of natural beauty and natural features. It rains a lot and there is a lot of green. If you visit there you can ramble through the hills and heather and of course round off the day with a wee dram (a small measure of whisky).'

Visitors to Scotland can also find beautiful botanical gardens and castles to tour.

John credits the Mel Gibson movie, "Braveheart", with doing a lot for tourism in Scotland. "It raised the international profile of Scotland, generating interest and attracting new visitors to modern Scotland by presenting an important period in Scotland's history'

John says he has enjoyed seeing the flatter countryside in Texas and particularly likes viewing the sunrises and sunsets here. "The views are dominated by the Bens and Munro's (mountains) in Scotland, and I really like the way you can see for miles and miles in Texas when the sky and the little fluffy clouds change

John enjoys the Texas hospitality and believes the people he has met here to be as friendly as those in his homeland.

"People have been very curious about my accent" said John, "but it has all been in good fun."

John did have a little trouble adapting to driving on "the wrong side of the road", and to West Texas weather.

"I've seen it all in the 5 weeks since I've been here. I've seen my first tornado, a dust storm, hail, snow, flash flooding, and electrical storms.'

John agreed that a lot of Americans travel to Scotland to "trace their roots". According to John, sometimes the Scotsmen like to pull those tourists legs a

"We encourage them to go 'Haggis Hunting,'" said John with a grin. (Haggis really is a meat delicacy in Scotland-but the hunting of Haggis is a joke). We tell the tourists that the Haggis is a very small furry creature with one leg shorter than the other. The Haggis has evolved this way to allow it to run around the hilly Scottish countryside with ease – and to catch a haggis you get it to run in the opposite direction intended and it rolls down the hill and you catch them at the bottom.

Listening to John spin his Haggis hunting tale will lead one to remember their "Snipe hunt-

Actually Haggis is the name of a traditional dish made of a sheep's 'pluck' (heart, liver, and lungs), minced with onion, oatmeal, suet, spices, and salt, mixed with stock and traditionally boiled in the animal's stomach for an hour."You serve it with neeps and tatties," said John. (Translated-turnips and potatoes)

Dunoon is not much bigger than Floyd County, said John. "The population is approximately 10,000. Dunoon is in Cowal (similar to Floydada being in Floyd County), and Cowal is in the province of Argyll.

Raised in Dunoon, John Bruce went to University in Paisley and studied construction.

He first went to work for the company, Sir Robert McAlpine, which owns RES in the United Kingdom. It was through this company that John made contacts and was hired by RES Americas and found his way to Floyd County for the Whirlwind Energy Project.

John stated that he feels privileged to be in Texas; "all those at RES have been overwhelmed and humbled by the support and enthusiasm shown by local services and businesses in Floyd County for the Whirlwind Energy

Floydada High School students participated in, and viewed up-close, a "Shattered Dreams" awareness program Monday and Tuesday, April 23-24.

This graphic program of 'almost' real life and death reenactment scenes shows the possibility of the deadly results of drinking and driving.

Floydada High School Special Ed speech teacher, Jennifer Olivares, was in charge of the program. Olivares told the Hesperian-Beacon, "I have put in over 150 hours on this project and I was very pleased with the results."

Monday morning, around 9:30 a.m., there was a 'simulated' two car traffic accident at the intersection of Whirlwind Alley and W. Georgia. Texas Highway Patrol Officer Sgt. John Gonzales was the first on the scene.


One car had three FHS girls in it. They were: driver, Crystal Alvarez (pronounced by Judge

Tali Jackson, DES -'dead at the scene'), two passengers, Morgan Norrell ('later died at Mangold Hospital') and Jennifer Rainwater ('seriously injured').

The other car, which rammed the girls' car, had three FHS boys in it. The (simulated DWI) 'drunk' driver was Eladio Saldana. He was injured, but lived. He was arrested and later that day in county court, he was charged and found guilty of intoxicated manslaughter and given a 15 year jail sentence. The other passengers, Chad Davis and Charlie Beedy were also injured and ticketed with (simulated PI) public intoxication.

Floydada Police Officer Reuben DeLeon coordinated the volunteers from the Floydada Police Department, the Floydada EMS, the Floydada Fire Department, Mangold Hospital and Emergency Staff of Lockney, along with Judge Jackson, Judge Smith, Becky McPherson and



tel will be located at the intersection of 2nd Street (Highway 70 North) and West Ross Street, according to Brown.

"We are going to need more electricity and we must put some dollars back into our system. It is a 1939 electrical system and the load keeps growing. We need major upgrades," said Brown.

Concerning the temporary buildings to be installed at R.C. Andrews Elementary, Brown said, "It takes 12 weeks to get the new equipment needed for this project and that will be about the time school will be starting again at the end of the summer.'

The Family Dollar Store should be ready for business by this Fall, according to Brown, but the Best Western Motel project is still in its beginning stages. Brown concluded, "The man who wants to build the Best Western Motel already owns Best Western Motels in Plainview, Lamesa and Big Spring. He said they are already housing 12 to 15 wind farm workers nightly at their motel in Plainview.'

The first phase of the funding race is over. There were a few surprises. Hillary Clinton led among those who call themselves Democrats, as expected, but Barack Obama was a close second. In fact, there are some who say the black senator from Illinois, who is avowedly antiwar, was first... simply because he had the most money dedicated

Mayor Rudolph Giuliani.

In Texas, of all places, Giuliani was first among the Republicans, with more than \$2 million, far beyond John McCain, who was second with a little more than \$960,000.

In our own opinion, Giuliani lead the Republican side in Texas based on public awareness of his role in New York City immediately after the 9-11 bombing attack. In either case, the Democrats were the biggest moneyraisers, nationwide, based, in large measure on contributions from rather large money-givers.

In Austin, Texas, long noted as being one of the most liberal bastions in America, and where the Clinton name looms large, Hillary's principle fund raiser is a former Land Commissioner who has been successful among Democratic givers. In fact, so successful have the Democrats been in amassing funds that many long-time givers have ended up donating money to a number of different candidates on the left side of politics. The Winklemans, both Marc and Susan were in this category. They gave \$2,300 each to Obama, and for good measure gave also to the Edwards campaign and the Clinton campaign. So did Ben Barnes, the Austin lobbyist, and former Speaker of the House of Representatives, who got rich off politics. Barnes donated, according to the Austin American-Statesman, a total of \$25,000 to a variety of Demo-

to the Primaries.

On the Republican side of politics, Mitt Romney, former Governor of Massachusetts and a well-known Mormon, led the pack, closely followed by former

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(While all this was going on, while both Republican and Democratic candidates for President were busy rounding up dollars to make their prowess as fund raisers notable, Jews were holding a small gathering in New York City for Israel. That effort, and it wasn't much of an effort, brought in \$18 million in one evening. And some people wonder why leaders of both political parties in America pant after Jewish money and votes. As a group, they simply give more to politicians, and they obviously have a good bit to give).

We think the early funding was mostly for political showmanship. It will have little bearing on who ultimately wins the nomination in either Party. Obviously, Hillary is going to be the preferred candidate on the left, no matter how much Obama raises. And on the right, we doubt that all the candidates are yet in the race. Most people admire Giuliani simply because he projects the image of a strong individual, regardless of his private life. But we suspect former Señator Fred Thompson of Tennessee will be in the race before it's all over. And if he is, he will

beat Hillary. Despite all the hoopla, Hillary will carry a lot baggage into any race for the Presidency. The media would be on her side, but we think the people would be for Thompson, if he gets in the race. We have no idea whether he will get in the race, but our suspicion is that he

Storms have been rumbling around the Panhandle and South Plains recently, but according to our Editor, Alice Gilroy, Floyd

County has been spared, as of Monday afternoon. Several other places have been hit by tornadoes, but so far all we have gotten is massive rainstorms, thank goodness. City Council reduces electric rates

The Floydada City Council met Tuesday, April 17, and reduced electric rates to City customers, voted to purchase new updated hand held meter readers and heard the annual racial profile report by Police Chief Darrell

City Manager Gary Brown told the council, "The use of electricity has dropped dramatically (statewide). Floydada Power & Light has had a very good six

A Floydada Electricity Revenue/Expense chart, from October, 2006 through March, 2007 (6 months), showed Revenues at \$903,801, with Expenses at \$534,347, giving the City a \$369,454 overage.

Because the City is now buying electricity about .01 cent per kilowatt cheaper, Brown recommended dropping electricity rates to the customer by .01 cent per kilowatt usage this month, and another one-half cent per kilowatt usage next month. The vote was unanimous

In a related matter, the council voted to purchase new hand held meter readers for the electric department. According to City Secretary Karen Lawson, "We are having problems with our old meter readers downloading into our computers. They cannot be updated. It is time we do something different."

The six new Datamatic hand held meter reader computers will have a total system cost of \$4,984.50, including annual maintenance and a \$25,000 war-

Floydada Police Chief Darrell Gooch presented the annual racial profile report to the council. Gooch told the council, "Our report is pretty consistent with the past three years. Our solvency rate (solving crimes) is higher than last year. We also had our first fatality in the city in over nineteen years."

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Councilmember Monte Williams asked Gooch about the use of taser guns and high speed chases. Gooch responded, "We have one taser gun and it is used only for a hard take downs. We also have video and audio of its use. Concerning high speed chases, we call it off, if it is getting out of hand. We only have

The 2006 Activity and Racial Profile Report showed: Total Reported Offenses - 256, which included 189 Misdemeanor Offenses, with 161 cleared (85.2%); 67 Felony Offenses, with 59 cleared (88%); and 34 Traffic Accidents, with 1 fatality.

about one per year."

The report showed: Police Initiated Contacts - 352 Caucasian (39.2%); 65 African (7.2%): 478 Hispanic (53.3%); 1 Asian (.1%); and 1 Native American (.1%).

The Census Data showed Total Population at 3,676: 1,549 Caucasian (42.1%); 162 African (4.4%; 1,898 Hispanic (51.6%); 7 Asian (.2%); and 60 Native American (1.6%).

In other matters, the council voted 5 to 1 to charge \$1.00 per ton for loading dirt at the landfill, with a \$5.00 minimum and no coupons. Councilmembers voting for the motion was Monte Williams, Sheldon Sue, Ruben Barrientoz, Bettye King and Clar Schacht. Voting against the motion was Councilmember Jon Nielson. Nielson said he could not vote for it without the cou-

Washington, CPA to provide auditing services for fiscal year 2006/2007.

An ordinance was approved by the council to readopt the same curfew hours for minors in the City. The curfew hours for Sunday through Thursday, 11 p.m. to 6 a.m., and Friday through Saturday, 12 p.m. (mid-

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night) to 6 a.m. The only exceptions is going to work or school.

Upon the recommendation of Mayor Bobby Gilliland, the council appointed a committee, consisting of Police Chief Gooch, Councilmember Williams and a citizen to be selected later, for the purpose of allowing, or not allowing truck tractor semitrailers to be parked on per-

sonal property in the City limits. "I have called around and most cities do not allow it, because the streets don't hold up to the heavy weights," commented City Secretary Karen Lawson.

'We need some more information on this," said Gilliland.

The council approved Sammy Segura, Jr. to run the softball program at Annie Taylor Park. "We hope to set up a new concession stand there maybe next week," said City Manager Brown.

Concerning the hold up on the WiFi technology that was being installed by Blue Moon Solutions for the Reese Technology Center, Brown said, "There has not been a press release yet. We were told all the numbers and information given to Blue Moon by our residents has been turned over to a law firm in Lubbock."

Floydada Animal Control Officer Roy Moreno addressed the council concerning the tethering of dogs and other animals. "We have a problem with our ordinance, which gives a '72 hour limit' for tethering. Some residents are just taking their dog for The council approved a letter a walk after 72 hours, and then engagement from Dianne tethering them again for another 72 hours. I believe tethering should be strictly prohibited."

> Councilmember Nielson commented, "However, when a fence blows down, then we need to allow tethering temporarily."

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

"American Spirit" Magazine. ceived international attention as the home of The Widow of the South, the New York Times bestseller based on the story of Carrie McGavock and Mariah Reddick, a former McGavock slave, Carnton and the Battle of

Only the foundation remains of the first house built on the Antebellum Plantation at Carnton ca. 1815 by Randall McGavock. When Randall died in 1843 his son, John inherited the farm and began to make improvements to the house and grounds. John was married to Carrie.

The name Carnton derives from the McGavocks ancestral home in Country Antrim, Ireland and the Gaelic word 'cairn,'

which means a pile of stones raised to mark a memorable event or to honor a fallen hero. Thanks Noma Lou for such a wonderful presentation of this historic book. Everyone present enjoyed the book review very



Pruning For Beginners One of the most effective ways to keep your yard's plant life happy and healthy is pruning. The act of pruning, which has several definitions, essentially involves removing diseased, dead or dying, and other unneeded plant parts to improve the wellness, landscape effect, and value of the plant. While proper pruning can improve the health and appearance of your plants, improper pruning can greatly reduce lifespan and landscape potential. These tips can help insure your plant pruning is successful.

When to Prune-

Pruning can be done at any time of the year. However, it is generally best to prune during late winter or early spring before accelerated growth begins; pruning at this time also makes it easier to see what branches you want to cut since the skeletal frame of the plant is easily visible. If you have a plant injured in a storm or other activity, prune it immediately to avoid disease or insect problems that may de-

Pruning Tools-

Taking into consideration the size and relative strength of the plants you are pruning is important in deciding what tools you

will need. Simple pruning shears will work well with thin, twiglike branches. Lopping shears will give you added strength for branches 1/2 inch in diameter to over 2 inches. A pole pruner will allow its operator to trim hard to reach places- but be sure to use precaution and keep the area beneath branches clear. Finally, hedge shears will work well for bushes and other shrubbery than can be cut into formal shapes.

Pruning Young Trees-

Pruning is the best preventive maintenance a young plant can receive. It is critical for young trees because it encourages them to develop a strong structure.

* As the tree grows, remove lower branches to gradually raise the 'crown' of the tree.

Remove criss-crossing branches and those that grow towards the center of the tree.

* Sometimes a tree will develop double leaders known as co-dominant stems. Co-dominant stems can lead to structural weaknesses, so it is best to remove one of the stems while the tree is young.

* Cuts made along a branch should be made laterally.

* Cuts should be made with the remaining bud facing outwards; this way the uncut branch will grow out from the tree rather than in.

* Make pruning cuts just outside the branch collar.

* Select strong, permanent

'scaffold' branches that are spaced 12-18 inches apart.

Pruning Established Trees-The pruning of large established trees should generally be left to trained professionals. The cutting of heavy, wide branches can be dangerous without the proper equipment. However, there are a few things you can do yourself, if you have taken all the necessary safety precautions.

* Remove lower branches on established trees to allow for more clearance for lawnmowers, sidewalks, etc.

Selectively remove weak, unneeded branches near the crown of the tree to allow for greater light penetration and air move-


Pruning Hedges-

When pruning your hedges, look for branches that are rubbing against one another, dead wood, suckers and water sprouts. Remove any branches that are growing straight up from the base of the plant with no lateral branches. Focus on the interior of the shrub rather than the exterior with most of your efforts centered on 'thinning cuts'. Cut branches or twigs off at their point of origin, which is either the parent stem or ground level.

This week's up-tick in export sales volume is good news for producers worried about the potential impact of recent changes in forfeiture procedures for the 2006 Upland Cotton Market Assistance Loan (MAL) program.

Export sales surged this week as 795,800 running bales (RB) of 2006-crop cotton were reported sold. The surge was a 2006 marketing year high and eclipsed the previous week's sales by two and a half times.

chaser for the week buying 489,600 RB followed by Turkey (108,400 RB), Pakistan (47,400 RB), Indonesia (39,100 RB), and Taiwan (23,400 RB).

Growers have been wondering when the export market would finally come calling for activity to be the leading edge of a wave that moves a significant amount of loan cotton into the

Without a significant level of carry-through, cotton industry officials say the potential exists for several million bales of upland cotton loan collateral to be forfeit to the Commodity Credit Corporation later this year.

The financial impact of forfeiture however is a consideration growers must weigh, especially if export sales volume continues to lag. In the October 27, 2006 issue of "Cotton News" PCG officials outlined the potential financial consequences of new loan forfeiture rules that went into effect August 30, 2006.

PCG isn't the only group working to make sure producers know the facts about 2006 loan forfeiture rules. The National Cotton Council has also recently added an informational bulletin

and other materials to its website detailing the new rules.

Joining the education effort this week is the Texas Farm Service Agency, which will be sending a letter to all 2006 Cotton MAL participants in Texas with details and an example of how 2006 forfeiture charges will be calculated.

Prior to the 2006-crop year CCC collected only unpaid warehouse receiving and any pre-loan storage amount listed on the China was the biggest pur-cotton's electronic warehouse receipt (EWR) from the producer when cotton was forfeited. CCC did not collect compression fees on forfeited cotton because compression is not charged against the cotton until it ships from the

CCC's decision to collect an U.S. cotton and need this week's amount equal to an unpaid compression charge from the producer at forfeiture will add significantly to the cot of forfeiting cotton. If the warehouse's storage rate is also in excess of the maximum monthly CCC storage credit amount, the amount of the storage fee above the maximum storage credit that is paid by CCC to clear the EWR will also be billed to the producer at forfei-

"Knowing exactly where you stand in terms of potential charges that could be billed to you when forfeiting cotton is information a producer absolutely must have this year," says PCG Executive Vice President Steve Verett. "It is vital that a grower carefully with the cost of forfeiture against the offer prices they receive for their 2006 crop cotton, especially when making a final-decision to sell or forfeit loan cotton.

"The best case scenario would

be for this week's export sales volume to truly be a precursor for the rapid movement of a sizeable portion of the cotton that currently sits in the loan waiting for a willing buyer and better prices. If the market hasn't turned that corner growers need to be very aware of what the financial impact of forfeiting 2006 crop cotton will be and act accordingly when the time comes," concludes

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

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A brief study of personality

Understanding a little about what makes others "tick" helps in marriage, family, and work relationships. Most of the conflict in these areas stem from not knowing how others view things, how they see the world.

Currently, employees who have management responsibility in our agency are studying personalities. We have done this 2 - 3 times over the course of several years. It is beneficial when there are organizational and responsibility changes. Knowing what motivates others, how they view the world and think can drastically improve the working/living relationship.

The Enneagram is the most exhaustive, thorough, and comprehensive study of personalities I have seen. I plan to focus the next 9 articles on the basic types of people described in the Enneagram. This cannot be as thorough or have the depth as a group, face-to-face study but it should be helpful to readers.

The word Enneagram (pronounced "ANY-a- gram") is Greek that means "A drawing with nine points." It's roots go back hundreds of years to the Middle East and made its way to the USA in the 1960's. It has been passed along orally for centuries.

The nine types are numbered and named - #1 The Perfectionist, #2 The Helper (or Giver), #3 The Achiever (or Performer), #4 The Romantic, #5 The Observer, #6 The Questioner (or Devil's Advocate), #7, The Adventurer, #8 The Boss (or Asserter), and #9 The Peacemaker (or Mediator).

Keep in mind there is not a right or wrong personality type. There are strengths and weaknesses in all of them. As you read about each type, in the nxt few weeks, you are likely to find a little of yourself in each type. However, there should be one personality that just sits-in-yourlap so to speak; it fits, its the "aha experience," where you say, "That's me all right." Also, remember there are different degrees of each type. Some of it has to do with past experiences as a child and personal growth as you have developed through the years.

Here is a brief description of the nine types of personality. More detail will be in the future

Perfectionists are realistic, conscientious, and principled. They strive to live up to their high ideals.

Helpers are warm, concerned, nurturing, and sensitive to other people 's needs.

Achievers - are energetic, self-assured, and goal oriented. Romantics have sensitive feel-

ings and are warm and perceptive. Observers have a need for

knowledge and are introverted, curious analytical, and insightful.

Questioners are responsible, trustworthy, and value loyalty to family, friends, groups, and causes. Their personalities range broadly from reserved and timid to outspoken and confrontive.

Adventurers are energetic, lively, and optimistic. They want to contribute to the world.

Asserters are direct, self-reliant, and protective.

Peacemakers are receptive, good-natured, and supportive. They seek union with others and

the world around them. By the way, you can find a few books on the Enneagram and there is information on the Internet. My introduction to this study was through Texas Tech years ago and it has helped me understand more about how I am made and how to approach others. Don't be scared. Hang on. We will get started next week. If you are interested in following these articles I would suggest you cut this "introductory" article out for future reference. Space will not allow a review of everything each week. Also, you can either call or write me using the information below.

ARTICLE 8.900 CURFEW HOURS FOR MINORS

Sec. 8.901 **Definitions**

Curfew Hours.

Guardian.

- 11:00 p.m. on any Sunday, Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, or Thursday until 6:00 a.m. of the following day; and
- 12:01 a.m. until 6:00 a.m. on any Friday or Saturday. Emergency. An unforeseen combination of circumstances or the resulting state that calls for immediate action. The term includes, but is not limited to, a fire, a natural disaster, an automobile accident, or any situation requiring immediate action to prevent serious bodily injury or loss of life.

Establishment. Any privately owned place of business operated for a profit to which the public is invited, including, but not limited to any place of amusement or entertainment.

- (1) A person who, under court order, is the guardian of the person of a minor; or
- (2) A public or private agency with whom a minor has been placed by a court.

Minor. Any person under 17 years of age.

Operator. Any individual, firm, association, partnership, or corporation operating, managing, or conducting any establishment. The term includes the members or partners of an association or partnership and the officers of a corporation.

Parent. A person who is:

- A natural parent, adopting parent, or stepparent of another person; or
- (2) At least 18 years of age and authorized by a parent or guardian to have the care and custody of a minor.

Public Place. Any place to which the public or a substantial group of the public has access and includes, but is not limited to, streets, highways, and the common areas of schools, hospitals, apartment houses, office buildings, transport facilities, and shops.

Remain.

or stop;

- Linger or stay; or
- Fail to leave premises when requested to do so by a police officer or the owner, operator, or other person in control of the premises.

Serious Bodily Injury. Bodily injury that creates a substantial risk of death or that causes death, serious permanent disfigurement, or protracted loss or impairment of the function of any bodily member or organ.

Sec. 8.902 Offenses and Defenses

- A minor commits an offense if he remains in any public place or on the premises of any establishment within the city curfew hours.
- A parent or guardian of a minor commits an offense if he knowingly permits, or by insufficient control allows the minor to remain in any public place or on the premises of any establishment within the city during curfew hours.
- The owner, operator, or any employee of an establishment commits an offense if he knowingly allows a minor to remain upon the premises of the establishment during curfew hours.
 - Defenses
- (1) It is a defense to prosecution under subsection (a) that the minor wa
 - (A) accompanied by the minor's parent or guardian;
 - (B) on an errand at the direction of the minor's parent or guardian, without an detour
 - (C) in a motor vehicle involved in interstate travel;
- (D) engaged in an employment activity, or going to or returning home from an employment activity, without any detour or stop
 - (E) involved in an emergency;
- (F) on the sidewalk abutting the minor's residence or abutting the residence of a next door neighbor of the neighbor did not complain to the police department about the minor's presence;
- (G) attending an official school, religious, or other recreational activity supervised by adults and sponsored by the City of Floydada, a civic organization, or another similar entity that takes responsibility for the minor, or going to or returning home from, without any detour or stop, an official school, religious, or other recreational activity supervised by adults and sponsored by the City of Floydada, a civic organization, or another similar entity that takes responsibility for the minor:
- (H) exercising First Amendment rights protected by the United States Constitution, such as the free exercise of religion, freedom of speech, and the right of assembly; or
- married or had been married or had disabilities of minority removed in accordance with Chapter 31 of the Texas Family Code.
- It is a defense to prosecution under subsection (a)(3) that the owner, operator, or employee of an establishment promptly notified the police department that a minor was present on the premises of the establishment during curfew hours and refused to leave.
 - (c) Enforcement.

Before taking any enforcement action under this section, a police officer shall ask the apparent offender's age and reason for being in the public place. The officer shall not issue a citation or make an arrest under this section unless the officer reasonably believes that an offense has occurred that, based on any response and other circumstances, no defense in subsection

(b) is present.

Sec. 8.903 Penalties

- A person who violates a provision of this article is guilty of a separate offense for each day or part of a day during which the violation is committed, continued, or permitted. Each offense, upon conviction, is punishable by a fine in accordance with the general penalty provision set forth in Section 1.109 of this code.
- When required by Section 51.08 of the Texas Family Code, as amended, the municipal court shall waive original jurisdiction over a minor who violates subsection (a)(1) of this article and shall refer the minor to juvenile court.
