This week's up-tick in export
sales volume is good news for producers worried about the po tential impact of recent changes
in forfeiture procedures for the 2006 Upland Cotton Market As sistance Loan (MAL) program. Export sales surged this week as 795,800 running bales ( RB ) of 2006-crop cotton were reported sold. The surge was a 2006 mar-
keting year high and eclipsed the previous week's sales by two and a half times.
China was the biggest pur chaser for the week buying
489,600 RB followed by Turkey 489,600 RB followed by Turkey
(108,400 RB), Pakistan ( 47,400 RB), Indonesia ( $39,100 \mathrm{RB}$ ), and Taiwan (23,400 RB).
Growers have been wondering when the export marke Would finaly come calling fo activity to be the leading edge of a wave that moves a significan amount of loan cotton into the market.
Without a significant level of carry-through, cotton industry

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF FLOYDADA, TEXAS READOPTING ARTICLE 8.900 OF THE CITY OF FLOYDADA CODE OF ORDINANCES, CURFEW HOURS FOR MINORS, PROVIDING A PUBLIC HEARING DATE, PROVIDING PUBLICATIONAND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

ARTICLE 8.900 CURFEW HOURS FOR MINORS
Sec. 8.901 Definitions
Curfew Hours
(1) 11:00 p.m. on any Sunday, Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, or Thursday until 6:00 a.m. of the following day; and
(2) 12:01 a.m. until 6:00 a.m. on any Friday or Saturday. Emergency. An unforeseen combination of circumstances or the resulting state that calls for immediate action. The term includes, but is not limited to, a fire, a natural disaster, an automobile accident, or any situation requiring immediate
action to prevent serious bodily injury or loss of life.
Establishment. Any privately owned place of business operated for a profit to which the public is invited, including, but not limited to any place of amusement or entertainment.
Guardian.
(1) A person who, under court order, is the guardian of the person of a minor; or

A public or private agency with whom a minor has been placed by a court.
Minor. Any person under 17 years of age.
Operator. Any individual, firm, association, partnership, or corporation operating, managing, or conducting any establishment. The term includes the members or partners of an association or partne ship and the officers of a corporation.
Parent. A person who is
(1) A natural parent, adopting parent, or stepparent of another person; or
(2) At least 18 years of age and authorized by a parent or guardian to have the care and custody
of a minor.

Public Place. Any place to which the public or a substantial group of the public has access and includes, but is not limited to, streets, highways, and the common areas of schools, hospitals, apartment houses, office buildings, transport facilities, and shops.
Remain.
(1) Linger or stay; or
(2) Fail to leave premises when requested to do so by a police officer or the owner, operator, or other person in control of the premises.
Serious Bodily Injury. Bodily injury that creates a substantial risk of death or that causes death serious permanent disfigurement, or protracted loss or impairment of the function of any bodily member or organ.
Sec. 8.902 Offenses and Defenses

## (a) Offenses.

A minor commits an offense if he remains in any public place or on the premises of any establishment within the city curfew hours.
(2) A parent or guardian of a minor commits an offense if he knowingly permits, or by insufficient control allows the minor to remain in any public place or on the premises of any establishme within the city during curfew hours.
(3) The owner, operator, or any employee of an establishment commits an offense if he knowy allows a minor to remain upon the premises of the establishment during curfew hours.
(b) Defenses.
(1) It is a defense to prosecution under subsection (a) that the minor wa
(A) accompanied by the minor's parent or guardian;
(B) on an errand at the direction of the minor's parent or guardian, without an detour
or stop;
(C) in a motor vehicle involved in interstate travel;
(D) engaged in an employment activity, or going to or returning home from an employment activity, without any detour or stop
(E) involved in an emergency;
(F) on the sidewalk abutting the minor's residence or abutting the residence of a nex door neighbor of the neighbor did not complain to the police department about the minor's presence; (G) attending an official school, religious, or other recreational activity supervised by adults and sponsored by the City of Floydada, a civic organization, or another similar entity that takes responsibility for the minor, or going to or returning home from, without any detour or stop, an official school, religious, or other recreational activity supervised by adults and sponsored by the City of Floydada, a civic organization, or another similar entity that takes responsibility for the minor;
(H) exercising First Amendment rights protected by the United States Constitution such as the free exercise of religion, freedom of speech, and the right of assembly; or
(I) married or had been married or had disabilities of minority removed in acco dance with Chapter 31 of the Texas Family Code.
(2) It is a defense to prosecution under subsection (a)(3) that the owner, operator, or employee of an establishment promptly notified the police department that a minor was present on the pre mises of the establishment during curfew hours and refused to leave.

## (c) Enforcement.

Before taking any enforcement action under this section, a police officer shall ask the apparen offender's age and reason for being in the public place. The officer shall not issue a citation or make offender's age and reason for being in the public place. The officer shall not issue a citation or make
an arrest under this section unless the officer reasonably believes that an offense has occurred that, based on any response and other circumstances, no defense in subsection

## (b) is present.

Sec. 8.903 Penalties
(a) A person who violates a provision of this article is guilty of a separate offense fo each day or part of a day during which the violation is committed, continued, or permitted. Each set forth in Section 1.109 of this code.
(b) When required by Section 51.08 of the Texas Family Code, as amended, the municipal court shall waive original jurisdiction over a minor who violates subsection (a)(1) of this article and shall refer the minor to juvenile court.
(Ordinance 03-5 previously adopted $7 / 14 / 03$ )
This Ordinance shall be effective on April 17, 2007.
