Swimming pool owners and future swimming pool owners in Floydada should be aware of a city ordinance outlining the conditions you have to meet to own a swimming pool of 2 feet or more in depth within the City

Any person failing to meet the lockable gates.

requirments for placement of their pool could face a fine not to exceed \$2,000 per day. Each day can bring a new fine.

According to the ordinance, the pool cannot be located in a front or side yard and it must be enclosed by a 6 foot fence with

The pool should not be placed closer than 8 feet from any property line

A copy of the requirements are available at Floydada City Hall.

"This ordinance was adopted for the safety of the citizens of Floydada and those who might be visiting Floydada", said City Manager Gary Brown.

## FISD approves prekindergarten open enrollment and elects officers

The Floydada ISD Board of Trustees met Tuesday, June 12, and elected new board officers for the 2007-2008 school year and voted 4 to 3 to begin an Open Enrollment PreKindergarten for 4 year olds. The board also reviewed the 2007-2008 preliminary budget and proposed tax rate and purchased a new school bus.

Kerry Pratt was elected as the new Board President for the new school year. Pratt received four votes, while past president William Dean received three votes.

Rachel Castillo was reelected as Vice-President and Marty Lucke was elected as Secretary of the Board, replacing Amado

Following much discussion, the board approved, 4 to 3, a motion by Dean, and seconded

class for four year olds who are not able to get into the Headstart Program.

Superintendent Jerry Vaughn told the board, "There are only 40 slots in the Headstart PreKindergarten Program. Many others are in day care and they are not getting any PreKindergarten training."

"Studies show 89 percent of the kids who attend PreK training are 'on track', with none 'struggling', while those who don't attend PreK training show only 70 percent 'on track', with 13 percent 'struggling'.'

'Seagraves and Ralls already have Open Enrollment PreK and Brownfield will begin it this year. We will need one teacher for up to 30 kids," Vaughn said.

# State mandates bring changes in teaching disciplinary students

Upon the recommendation of Superintendent Vaughn, the FISD Board unanimously approved, June 12, to contract out FISD's DAEP (Discipline Alternative Education Program) to Plainview at a cost of \$15 per student per day.

"We average about 6 kids per day in the program. This does not affect our enrollment, but we must provide transportation," Vaughn said.

Vaughn presented to the board a three page report from TEA (Texas Education Agency) concerning several noncompliance specific areas at PAC (Parent Adolescent Center) in Floydada.

Some of the PAC noncompliance areas noted on the report are: records indicated no parent, nor surrogate parent, was present, nor signed the required documents at the students' ARD (Admission, Review and Dismissal) meetings; the ARD committee meetings did not include an interpreter; not enough certified teachers are provided for several different educational subjects

taught at PAC; and PAC students are only receiving 240 minutes of education per school day, while FISD's class time per school day is 480 minutes. According to the TEA report, FISD must respond with a corrective action plan no later than July 9,

Vaughn told the board, "We must change our policy. We must provide the certified teachers, but PAC must provide the space for them to teach. Also, FISD only provides 450 minutes of educational class time per day, not 480 minutes. We will raise our instructional time at PAC to match FISD's time of 450 minutes and we must provide special ed instruction, also."

Board President Pratt commented, "Everybody in the 110th District, and others, are sending their kids here, but we must provide the services. That bothers

According to Vaughn, students come to PAC from Floyd County, Briscoe County, Motley County and Dickens County. "This mandate will cost us additional dollars," Vaughn added.

## FISD plans to set proposed tax rate

**Continued From Page 1** 

\$1,878,000.00 taxes collected to a projected \$1,350,068.00 taxes to be collected this school year. This is due to the lower proposed tax rate of \$1.04 per \$100 valuation this year, which is mandated by the state to be lower this year. Last year's tax rate was \$1.37 per \$100 valuation.

Superintendent Vaughn added, "Our proposed tax rate this year will have \$.123 cents added for the payment of our bonds. This will make our proposed tax rate this coming school year at \$1.163 (per \$100 valuation).'

However, projected State Revenue shows to be up to \$6,534,710.00, compared to \$6,107,612.00 received last year.

The 2007-2008 FISD budget and proposed tax rate is scheduled to be discussed July 10th and August 2nd following a Public Hearing, and then probably adopted by the board on August 21st, following a Public Hearing.

FISD new school year will start on August 27th, the earliest start date as mandated by the state

Concerning the new construction and renovations at A.B. Duncan Elementary, Grimes and Associates published a preparation and construction schedule. The schedule showed a site grading and asbestos abatement start date to be on July 30, 2007, a construction start date set for September 10, 2007 and a construction completion date set for February, 2009.

In other matters, the board unanimously approved the purchase of a 2007 International Navistar VT 365, 215 HP, school bus for \$77,844.00. Added features on the bus above specifications are: air ride suspension, air door and Vandalock security sys-

Three used buses were sold at auction for \$2,700.00."

Irrigated cotton acres shouldered the bulk of the load in 2006, offsetting the drought-related loss of more than one million mostly non-irrigated cotton acres, and helped the area once again surpass the 4 million bale produc-

tion mark. According to the final figures reported by the USDA National Agricultural Statistics Service (NASS) earlier this week, PCG's 41 county area accounted for 70 percent of the 5.8 million bales of Upland cotton produced in Texas last season and 19.5 percent of the 20.8 million Upland bales produced in the United

States. To eclipse the 4 million bale mark for the third straight time, High Plains producers had to navigate their way through a growing season with more than its fair share of ups and downs. The end result, which is clearly reflected in the county level production numbers, is that 2006

was a season of two extremes. The top producing High Plains county in 2006 was Hale County. Hale County farmers produced 483,000 bales of cotton in 2006 thanks to a healthy 885 pound average yield and a low 9 percent acreage abandonment rate.

The 2006 crop's Top Ten cotton producing counties in the High Plains region (reported in 480 pound bales) were: Hales,

basis the top performer in 2006 was Sherman County in the Texas Panhandle. A relative newcomer to the cotton business, Sherman County planted and harvested just over 23,000 acres of cotton in 2003 and produced 61,400 bales for an average yield of 1,265 pounds per acre.

Ranking second and third in yield per acre were Hutchinson (1,248 pounds), another young Panhandle cotton county, and Parmer County (1,211 pounds). Castro and Hartley Counties rounded out the top five High Plains counties all of whom averaged more than 1,000 pounds per acre in 2006.

On a straight yield per acre

In irrigated cotton, growers were lucky to avoid any significant early season weather damage and managed to grow a crop that produced, on average, 892 pounds per acre. Out of the roughly two million acres of irrigated cotton that was planted,
