

Area included by PUC in first phase of wind development **County clears transmission hurdle**

Texas Public Utility Commission Chairman Paul Hudson brought good news for Floyd County with the designation of and expansion of CREZ Zone 2 to include all of Floyd County (instead of an original proposal of only part of the County), all of Briscoe County, and all of Motley County.

This decision, July 20, by the Commission serves as a promise that the State will help build power lines, thereby giving wind power developers the confidence to build turbines.

In an Austin American Statesman story, July 21, by Asher Price, Mike Aaron, a staff member with Virtus Energy said, "This gives certainty to wind developers that there will be transmission to those areas."

In 2005 the Legislature passed a measure requiring the utility commission to designate zones and transmission projects to boost the flow of renewable energy to more populated areas.

Transmission has been the biggest hurdle for the wind industry. This ruling paves the way and guarantees help in bringing those transmission lines to the area

According to the Public Utility Commission Spokesman Terry Hadley, 8 zones were designated in the Panhandle and West Texas.

The first round the CREZ zone designation process showed the proposed CREZ Zones 2, 4, 5, 6, 9, 10, and 19 met the criteria for the level of financial commitment shown to the area by wind developers.

Other proposed zones were eliminated in this first round by the PUC because of a lower level of financial commitment.

"The study will continue," said Hadley, "and ERCOT (Electric Reliability Counsel of Texas) has been asked to study the best way to develop transmission lines in the CREZ zones."

The final order by the PUC will come in August and will formally designate the CREZs, the power regions for each CREZ, the MW transfer capability for each CREZ, will designate the CREZ boundaries, will designate Wind Generation Developers by CREZ, and roughly define the requirements for the transmission network.

Also in the agreement LISD will retain the improvements constructed on its campus.

According to Cotham in 1992, LISD built a special ed building which is now being used for part of the business office. \$24,575 of that was retained for this improvement.

Also part of the mediation referred to Medicaid funds. It was agreed that Medicaid funds being held by CSSA should be allocated and distributed to Member Districts in accordance with the records of the book keeper/ business manager for CSSA.

Membership in Wind Association necessary to attract transmission lines

to accept the agreement in their regular board meeting, July 17. PISD voted the week earlier to accept the agreement. The Floydada ISD Board has not yet discussed the agreement in open meeting or voted to accept the agreement.

In the division of assets the Coop members were prorated with FISD at 45% and LISD and PISD making up the remaining 55% of the Coop

Of that 55%, LISD would get 60% and PISD would get 40%.

Physical property was the biggest point of contention between the members.

Because FISD was the largest part of the COOP and the administrative agent, the district had the most property. The property was paid for by all member districts with State and Federal funds given to them by for special education.

According to the Shared Ser- • vices Agreement, dissolution of FISD campus was the "barracks" the Coop would require an "affirmative" vote by the majority of the member districts, and funds and remaining assets would be prorated and divided among the member districts.

Cotham told the LISD Trustees most of the discussion centered around the wording of the above Shared Services Agreement and minutes from a Coop meeting presented at mediation by FISD Superintendent Jerry Vaughn.

"We (PISD and LISD) felt the wording on the agreement was clear that the Coop building (loproperty on that agenda. However, from this very meeting, minutes were produced that said the property would be given to Floydada. Anyone who knows anything about board meetings knows action cannot be taken unless it's on the agenda."

After lengthy mediation, the districts agreed that FISD would retain the improvements located at the high school property (the Coop building located at the S.E. corner of the High School), which was owned by FISD and paid for with CSSA funds. However FISD shall pay LISD and PISD, jointly, the sum of \$60,500.

"The original price of that building was \$188,000," Superintendent Phil Cotham told the LISD School Board.

"It was mediated down to \$110,000. LISD's share of that will be \$36,300 and PISD's share will be approximately \$23,700.

The mediation said, "at the option of FISD", the building would "either be sold at public auction and the net sale proceeds distributed 45% to FISD and 55% jointly to LISD and PISD; or FISD shall pay LISD and PISD the total sum of \$11,000" for their share of the barracks.'

FISD has 30 days from July 9,2007, to make it's decision how it proceed with paying LISD and PISD

According to Cotham, those barracks were originally purchased for \$49,000. "Now, if

"LISD's share of the Medicaid funds will be approximately \$25,000," explained Cotham.

The cash on hand at CSSA (in addition to medicaid funds) remaining after payment of all expenses and costs of CSSA shall be paid and distributed 45% to FISD, and 55% jointly to LISD and PISD.

According to Cotham this should amount to approximately, "\$36,300 to LISD and \$49,500 to FISD."

The "rolling stock" of CSSA shall be distributed as follows:

A 2006 bus shall go to LISD. A 2003 Ford Bus shall go to PISD. Three other buses shall goto FISD and a Ford Expedition shall go to FISD.

"The bottom line," Cotham told the LISD Board, "is including the building, medicaid funds, and fund balance, LISD will get approximately \$104,000 from the mediation. PISD will get approximately \$70,000.

"FISD will keep the remaining fund balance of \$50,000."

After a discussion of the agreement the LISD trustees voted unanimously to accept the mediation. Trustees present to vote were: Aaron Wilson, Jesse Garza, Lonnie Hooten, Cheryl Edwards, John Quebe, and Robbie Long. Boyd Jackson was absent from the meeting.

Council outlaws tethering of animals Floydada Council will team up with FISD to upgrade field for Softball

The Floydada City Council met Tuesday, July 17, and agreed to cooperate with FISD on the use of the City's Little League baseball field, passed an ordinance on 'no tethering of animals in the City limits' and approved the 2007-2008 budget of MMWA.

The council unanimously voted to allow the newly organized girls high school softball team to use the Floydada Little League baseball park, just east of the high school, for their practices and home games.

FHS Principal Wayne Morren and Girls Softball Head Coach Brandon Gilliland both addressed the council concerning the imme-

diate need to have in place, and access to, a softball field for their games this coming school year.

Principal Morren said, "Softball rules say we need a solid surface, which usually is infield dirt and outfield grass. We are asking permission to remove the existing grass, level the field, pull out the clay and stock pile it, and replace it with sod, sand and sliding grass. FISD will pay for the grass and sod at about \$1500, and the sand at about \$300."

Softball Girls Head Coach Gilliland added, "This is a good opportunity for girls to participate and this field is almost perfect dimensions for softball. Really there is not that much work

to be done. It will be like a turf field, with cutouts at the bases. It will require some maintenance and we will return the mound to its original height for Little League play. Its a win win situation. It is already a better lighted field than most.'

Mayor Pro-Tem Sheldon Sue, who was filling in for absent Mayor Bobby Gilliland, told the council, "We need to draw up a contract, or formalize an agreement, with FISD so we will know who is going to do what. It will be in place for future councils."



The slow delivery of "Out of County" newspapers led one of our readers, Herschell Hinson, to write a letter to the "Consumer Affairs Representative for the Fort Worth District.

Mr. Hinson believes his paper, which is delivered to Collinsville, is being held up in the Fort Worth distribution site. I believe he is right. We also believe our biggest problems come from the Dallas and Fort Worth centers.

Hinson related in a letter that delivery was made, 40 years ago, in 3-5 days. He said over the past 6 weeks the time of delivery for him and this weekly paper are 17 days, 11 days, 11 days, 9 days, and he was still waiting after 11 days for the April 4th paper.

He said his Newsweek publication sometimes never shows up--however his grocery ad is never late.

Mr. Hinson sent me a copy of the Post Office Consumer Affairs Representative' letter to Mr. Hinson and then Mr. Hinson's letter back.

Hinson thought our readers might like to see the letters and encouraged those whose mail is getting hung up in Fort Worth to write Mr. Henry Gwozdz.

It will take up a lot of room, but I appreciate Mr. Hinson's efforts, and I want to help where I can.

(Edited letter to Hinson from Gwozdz)

Dear Mr. Hinson,

Our service standard nationwide on Periodicals Mail is 1-7 days and I am disappointed we are not meeting this commitment to you. Delays in subscribers' periodicals can be the result of many factors, i.e., printing, mail acceptance, labeling errors, trans-

(Editor's Note: Blah, blah, blah. Have any of you Out-of-County folks noticed any improvement with your delivery since all of those programs have been put in place? I for one have never had a conversation with a "cross-functional team", nor have I been contacted by one of those teams to "correct problems". And, I can guarantee all of our readers that the problem is NOT in the "originating" Post Office, or the "destination" Post

(The following is Hinson's partial response to Gwozdz)

Office.)

"In paragraph three you go through eight measures you have taken to upgrade your performance. We both know that's not working. It is about 280 miles from Floyd County to Collinsville, so within reason, 3 or 4 days should be MORE than adequate transportation time. I drive it at legal limits in 6 hours or less. I understand USPS must travel their own route, but nonetheless we know that when a publication takes 14 days and more, it is sitting on a Post Office floor for 8 to 10 days or more. Be hon-

I served over four years in the Military during WWII, in Texas, Nebraska, Idaho, California, Arizona, and Europe. We got our copy within two weeks ANY-WHERE. I have been on this ranch for the past 40 years, and until the past few years I got this Thursday publication on the following Monday. The service has gone down, terribly

Finally, the day I got your response, (May 10th) your carrier delivered the publication in question dated April 26th, enclosed,

was made by Council Member Clar Schacht, seconded by Council Member Ruben Barrientoz and passed unanimously by Council Members Sue, Schacht, Barrientoz, Monte Williams and Bettye King. Council Member Jon Nielson was absent from the meeting.

In other matters, the council unanimously approved an ordinance stating "tethering (chain, tie, fasten or otherwise secure) a dog, or other animal, to a stationary object for any period is cruel and unusual punishment for the animal; tethering dogs or other animals is not allowed; providing a penalty of not less that. \$50.00, nor more than \$2,000.00."

City Manager Gary Brown told the council, "This is the ordinance that will prohibit having any animal on a tether. This will not be a popular decision, but I think it is the right way to go."

The council approved the 2007-2008 proposed budget of the Mackenzie Municipal Water

MMWA General Manager Van Breedlove. "The new budget stays about the same as last year," said Breedlove.

The proposed MMWA 2007-2008 budget showed: Total Contract Revenue: Floydada, \$60,396.00; Lockney, \$33,048.00; Silverton, \$30,732.00; Tulia, \$87,372.00 -Total Revenue, plus interest, at \$236,548.00, a \$5,750.00 increase from last year.

The MMWA 2007-2008 proposed budget also showed: Total Payroll Expenses at \$49,827.00, an increase of \$1,328.33, due to a three percent salary increase, according to Breedlove.

Other Expenses were Supplies & Maintenance at \$46,350.00. "This includes a \$4,000.00 increase for communications this coming year," said Breedlove. And the report showed \$900.00 for telephone.

Breedlove also discussed the progress on repairing the ground storage water tank in Lockney. "I haven't heard, nor talked to anyone on this, but we have sent in Authority, as presented by our paper work to Austin. We

hope to reduce the capacity of the tank and the engineers tell me that it will cost around \$750,000 to \$800,000 for repairs. This would be a short term bond issue and it will be next spring before we can start fixing it."

"The lake is at around 80 feet now. The recent rains haven't put much water in the lake, but we are okay for several more years. We are pumping from 500,000 gallons to 1 million gallons per

day," Breedlove concluded. In other matters, the council heard a briefing about the 2007-2008 City budget. Brown told the council, "We are still waiting on some numbers. Right now the budget is around \$125,000 out of balance in the negative. We must make some adjustments in the electric department.

"The electrical costs for the Duncan Elementary project will be around \$50,000 if we can hook up from the west side. However, if we have to hook up from the east side, it will cost the City from \$150,000 to \$200,000 to build the electrical lines adequate to serve Duncan when it

reopens," Brown said.

Brown added, "We need to upgrade all of our electrical system. We have already spent \$5,000 at R.C. Andrews Elementary (hooking up the portable buildings). We are having a three percent growth each year. Our load growth is better than most and our usage was good until this summer."

According to Brown, about

two million dollars plus will be needed in the near future for these upgrades. "Our poles are good, but we need to replace insulators, wires, crossbars, bracing and much more.'

Council Member Williams commented, "I think we need to wait on this until our sewer bonds are paid for in next three years. Our \$100,000 engineer study (electrical) should be put in our budget within these next three years.

The council took no action on "taxing goods in transit" in the City. "I cannot see where this would ever help or hurt us," Brown said.

I went to the nursing home and visited with Betty Veal last week. She is taking therapy and doing real good. Billie Cook is in the home too.


The other night they had hamburgers and the trimmings for supper so Betty and Billie took theirs outside to the patio and had a picnic. The weather was good so it was a fun time for them.

Playa lakes are a valuable resource

So how's your playa...is it holding water during this unusually wet year? Is it sporting a lush bloom of vegetation, in the water and on the land surrounding it?

If the answer to either question is yes, your playa lake is doing its job and should be appreciated as an asset, said a Texas Cooperative Extension wildlife specialist.

"Playa are a tremendous asset. But we don't often recognize them as such," said Ken Cearley, Extension wildlife specialist based in Canyon, at a June 27 Playa Lakes Appreciation Day. "They are a natural catchment structure in a semi-arid region. The water they catch and hold, and the plant communities they produce, is valuable for farming, livestock production and wildlife.'

Playa lakes are shallow, natural basins that dot the landscape of a large portion of the Central Great Plains. The early Spanish explorers documented them in the mid-1500s, describing them as 'small, plate-shaped, dry ponds' and tagging them with the Spanish word meaning 'beach.'

"We don't know why they were dubbed playas, and we're not entirely sure how they were formed," Cearley said. "But we do know there are more than managed for that purpose. "The vegetation that grows in

playas is mostly annual plants, many of which we consider weeds. But those weeds/plants produce food (seeds) and cover for wildlife such as waterfowl and pheasants."

Landowners can apply a few management techniques to keep playas healthy and functional, the specialist said.

"If you have a playa lake on farmland that's grazed, or rangeland, consider fencing it off," Cearley said. "Do all you can to maintain or encourage a buffer strip of native vegetation around the playa. A good, functional buffer strip should be at least one to two times as wide as the playa basin it protects.

"The buffer strip will protect the playa from silt and sedimentation resulting from runoff. It also provides a home and food source for wildlife, such as pheasants, quail and other species. The fence will help you plan and control grazing.'

Light to moderate grazing, removing no more than 25 percent of vegetative growth per year, is recommended for overall plant health and to encourage plant and wildlife diversity, he said.

Landowners who want to manage playas and the buffer strips around them for pheasants, for example, should consider light grazing or complete deferral. A good rule of thumb is to protect the area from grazing during the growing season, he said.

land planning process, the specialist said.

"Internet sites such as the Texas Natural Resources Information System (http:// www.tnris.state.tx.us) provide free digital maps and aerial photographs that will help you manage your land," Cearley said. "Or you can generate your own maps using GPS/GIS coordinates and mapping software."

Managing playa lakes for wildlife is good land stewardship, Cearley said, but it can also add supplemental income from ecotourism, bird watching, photography and hunting. "Some local rural economies are generating significant income from wildlife enthusiasts who want to experience the great outdoors," he said.

"Managing playa lakes for wildlife, and as part of your larger land enterprise isn't just good land stewardship, it's also good business.'



Underground Water District to maintain Floyd County office


Floyd County Abstract, Inc. in Floydada continues to house the water well permitting office for the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No.

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30,000 of them in the playa lakes region in Texas, Oklahoma, New Mexico, Kansas, Colorado and Nebraska. They range in size from less than an acre to several hundred acres, and they cover a total of more than 400,000 acres."

Wet or dry, playas help support more than 246 species of wildlife, waterfowl and other birds, mammals, amphibians and reptiles. They also help recharge the underlying Ogallala Aquifer, a vast underground water source for the Central Great Plains, Cearley said.

"Some of the precipitation captured by playas returns to the aquifer along the perimeter where the clay basin, or bottom, meets other soils surrounding the lake," Cearley said. Prescribed burning can also be an effective tool for playa management, he said.

High-tech tools such as handheld global positioning system units can help landowners map playa lakes, their vegetation and wildlife resources, and integrate them with an overall management plan, Cearley said.

"Satellite-driven GPS technology, along with Geographic Information Systems software can help you digitally map almost any resource in layers," he said. "For a typical playa lake you might have an aerial photograph layer, a topographic layer, a layer representing periodic water surface area delineation, or a layer showing vegetation types and wildlife distribution."

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



AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF FLOYDADA, TEXAS AMENDING

CHAPTER 2, ANIMAL CONTROL OF THE CODE OF OR-**DINANCES BEING AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF** FLOYDADA, TEXAS, WHEREAS THE CITY OF FLOY-DADA DESIRES TO AMEND ANIMAL CONTROL RELAT-ING TO THE TETHERING OF DOGS AND OTHER ANI-MALS; AND PROVIDING FOR REPEAL OF CONFLICT-ING PROVISIONS; PROVIDING A PENALTY OF NOT LESS THAN FIFTY (\$50.00) DOLLARS NOR MORE THAN TWO THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$2,000.00) FOR VIOLA-TIONS; PROVIDING THAT EACH DAY VIOLATIONS ARE PERMITTED TO EXIST CONSTITUTES A SEPA-RATE OFFENSE; PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE FOR THIS ORDINANCE; AND PROVIDING FOR **PUBLICATION.**

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Floydada, Texas maintains a substantial and legitimate interest in requiring stringent and safe standards with regard to animals and animal control within the City Limits of the City of Floydada, to promote the health, safety and welfare of its citizens;

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Floydada, Texas, finds that tethering a dog or other animal to a stationary object for any period is cruel and unusual punishment for the animal.

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Floydada, Texas, finds and declares that it is necessary to restrict the tethering of dogs and animals.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF FLOYDADA, TEXAS: THAT CHAPTER 2, ANIMAL CONTROL, CODE OF ORDI-NANCES IS AMENDED AS FOLLOWS:

Part 1. Ordinance. That the City Code of the City of Floydada, Texas, Section 2.600 is hereby amended, which section shall read as follows:

SECTION 2.600. Tethering Dogs and Other Animals Not Allowed.

> A. Definition: Tether means to chain, tie, fasten or otherwise secure an animal to a fixed point so that it can move or range only within certain limits.

> B. It shall be unlawful for any person to tie or tether a dog or other animal to a stationary object for any period.

> This Ordinance shall take effect upon its passage, and it is so ordained.
