PetroGlobe files "Answer" and countersues Bankers

PetroGlobe filed an answer and counterclaim, August 9, to Bankers Petroleum lawsuit filed July 16 against PetroGlobe.

PetroGlobe's answer stated the company "denies each and every, all and singular, of the allegations contained in Banker's original petition".

PetroGlobe and Bankers are oil and gas exploration and production companies with interests in Floyd and Motley County (the "contract" area).

Both companies are parties to a written Joint Operating Agreement (JOA), which was signed on June 15, 2004.

The JOA was executed to govern the operation of their jointly held properties.

Bankers had a 65% working interest in the "contract area" (has since sold some of it's interests), PetroGlobe has 10% and the remaining 25% working interest is held by TerraSpec Corporation.

Bankers is the designated operator of the oil and gas interests under the JOA, and "as such," said the counterclaim, "has contractual duties and obligations to the non-operators, PetroGlobe and TerraSpec."

The "Contract Area" that are part of the lawsuit are certain Cogdell Ranch leases.

In November 2006, the primary term of the existing Cogdell Leases was due to expire and Bankers, as the operator of the JOA, undertook negotiations to renew the leases on behalf of all the interest owners under the JOA.

In Bankers suit it claims PetroGlobe has no interest in the new Cogdell leases, and the new leases were not subject to the JOA.

PetroGlobe's counter claim states it was a working interest owner in the leases and was not "a named party to the renewed leases nor was consulted about

the terms and conditions of the renewed leases".

Bankers says PetroGlobe did not act in a timely manner on Bankers offer of a "proportionate part of the new leases".

PetroGlobe contends Bankers did not comply with the terms of the JOA, nor offer PetroGlobe their "proportionate share".

PetroGlobe's answer asks for a judicial declaration that "Bankers has no legal right to forfeit PetroGlobe's existing and future working interests and rights in the Cogdell Ranch leases under Bankers' December 19, 2006 proposal or the JOA."

It also asks for a declaration that "Bankers is contractually obligated to offer PetroGlobe the right to participate in the renewed Cogdell Ranch Leases and any wells thereon pursuant to...the JOA, and a declaration that PetroGlobe is entitled to its 10% working interest in the new Cogdell Leases."

LISD changes bell schedule

To better meet the education and safety needs of their students, LISD will have a different bell schedule and "drop-off" plan this year.

Lockney High School and Junior High will both have the same bell schedule for the eight period day. This is designed to make it easier to schedule the teachers the high school and junior high students share during the day and to keep the students on separate lunch schedules.

The warning bell for both schools will be at 8:15 a.m. with the first class of the day beginning at 8:20 a.m. The normal school day will end at 3:31 p.m. The high school will now have a "Zero" period starting at 7:45 a.m. for students who do not pass all their classes.

"This zero period will be a mandatory tutorial period for those students to make up missed work, retake tests, get extra help from the teacher, and/or do extra

work to help them pass their classes," said High School Principal Dean Thompson.

The zero period will not start until after the first three week progress reporting period.

LJHS Principal Todd Hallmark said the junior high students will have tutorial help the same as last year.

County Treasurer asks Commissioner's to reconsider cutting out part-time help

The Floyd County Commissioners met in regular session Monday, August 13, and heard a request not to cut from this year's budget a part-time employee at the Tax Assessor Collector's office.

Delia Suarez, of the County Tax Assessor Collector's office, asked the commissioners, in person and by letter, not to cut her departmental budget in the 2007-2008 county budget.

Suarez said in person, "I need this budget. We are having to add the 911 addresses now. Part-time help is hard to train just one or two days a week. Some parts of the month we are really busy."

In her written statement, Suarez stated, "My office, as well as the County Clerk's office, serves the entire county, not only one section of the county, but the whole county. Cutting my extra labor is cutting service to the citizens of this county. My total office budget is \$64,042.00, and I bring in more money than any other office in the County. My budget is among the lowest in the County."

Commissioner Bill Quattlebaum told Suarez, "We must cut our expenses in all departments. We must have budget amendments and yours was one of them. That is the way the process works. Do you want your 3 percent employee raise, or do you want part-time help?"

Suarez answered, "I want some raise, maybe 2 percent, but I need part-time help for sickness, emergency and job training."

No action was taken on the matter.

Commissioners also discussed the resolution to tax property "in transit". County Judge Penny Golightly told the court, "This is a formality. We have been advised to pass this just in case we have need of it in the future. This does not apply to any businesses in the county now."

Commissioner Lennie Gilroy made the motion to pass the resolution to tax "in transit" property. It was seconded by Commissioner Jon Jones. Commissioners Gilroy and Jones voted for the motion, while Commissioner Bill Quattlebaum voted against it. Commissioner Ray Nell Bearden

was absent from the meeting. Judge Golightly stated the motion passed 2 to 1.

Commissioner Gilroy stated, "I don't think two votes are enough to do business for the county, but Judge, you can vote."

Judge Golightly voted for the motion. It passed 3 to 1.

County Treasurer Elva Martinez presented to the court the July, 2007 County Financial Report. It showed a Beginning Balance of \$793,871.50, Receipts at \$139,987.80, Transfers In and Out of \$167,030.56, Disbursed at \$213,887.79 and an Ending Balance of \$719,971.51.

Floyd County Extension Agent Melissa Long reported to the court. Long told the commissioners, "We had 9 teams who participated in Walk Across Texas Achievement Event. The total miles walked was 13,951. We had 12 county 4-H'ers who turned in Record Books for judging. 9 advanced to District and 3 advanced to State. The County 4-H Achievement Banquet will be Sunday, August 26. You must RSVP by the 20th."

Oil & Gas Update

Floyd County: All the PetroGlobe Energy USA Ltd. McIntosh Lease Well #176 mechanical repairs have been concluded and the well has been placed back on pump, currently pumping off Frac Fluid.

Motley County: On August 9, Bankers Petroleum issued their 2007 second Quarter News Release reporting on both their Black 4 Lease Well #1 and on their Cogdell "64" Lease Well #1. Bankers reported the well encountered a more thermally mature 280 feet thick Bend Shale Interval as well as numerous potentially productive Granite Wash Sand intervals. Bankers plans to test the Granite Wash Sands and fracture stimulate the Bend Shale Zone.

Bankers reported the Cogdell "64" Lease Well #1 had been fracture stimulated in the Granite Wash Sand Zone and was able

to flow at a rate of 325mof per day. August 10, Bankers filed an amended application for permit to recomplete the Cogdell 64" Lease Well #1 as a horizontal well bore. The horizontal recompletion formation penetration point will be located 1,593 feet from the north line and 1,230 feet from the west line of section 64, Block T, and the terminus location will 4,519 feet from the north line and 715 feet from the west line of Section 64, Block T. This would permit a horizontal section of approximately 2,990 feet in length. This would place the terminus location of the Cogdell "64" lease Well #1 Horizontal re-completion 115 feet northeast of the 1,962 plugged and abandoned well bore of the F.M. Eiring Lease Well #1 which was drilled to a total depth of 9,256 feet.

Karl Rove is quitting. Leaving Washington and going back to his adopted state, Texas. He will, according to all the news and analytical pieces, write a book and do some teaching, along with making speeches hither and yon. He will live in the Hill Country town of Ingram, near Kerrville, and give up politics.

We will believe everything the stories say about Rove, except the latter. He will not give up politics. It is part of his life, the big part.

We've known Karl ever since he was involved in the Clements campaign back in the late 70's or early 80's. If anyone ever wants to know how, or why, he got involved in politics they can go back to a guy named Brad O'Leary, who was, for many years, the chief fundraiser for former Sen. John Tower, the first Republican Senator since the Reconstruction period. Brad was an excellent fundraiser, but one had to watch him like a hawk. If one did not proof read his fundraising letters, one was likely to find the campaign committed to all sorts of things designed to raise money but not necessarily to establish policy. He could, and would, go through the state like a vacuum cleaner, leaving nothing but a bad taste among those who gave. Clements did not like that, and neither did many other givers.

Enter Karl Rove, who had some up-to-date computers and the political givers lists of Bill Clements and Peter O'Donnell of Dallas. Karl, in those days, had nothing going for him except the computers and the lists. Plus the

permission to use those lists for the right purposes.

Along comes George W. Bush of Midland. The Republican establishment settles on Bush, as opposed to Kay Bailey Hutcheson, who wanted to be Governor in the worst way, and was convinced she was the only person to knock off Ann Richards, who had beaten a rich, lazy, individual named Clayton Williams, from Pecos in West Texas. Clayton thought he knew everything there was to know about politics, and chose not to listen to anyone, so he didn't win. Clayton came close, but about all he did was whet the appetite of the state's growing Republican establishment, which had been invigorated by the win of Bill Clements years earlier. Bush filled that bill. And Karl Rove helped in the process.

That's about all Karl ever did, help. Everybody in politics needs a bag carrier, and Karl filled that bill in spades. One of the wisest things anyone ever said about Karl was a quote from Laura Bush, in which she said Karl was over-rated. He was indeed. But he was there and, accordingly,

got praised for everything Bush did right. He was the original Chancy Gardner.

Now, we are told, Karl will take up, among other things, teaching and writing books. We hope he will teach, or be involved in teaching, the task of imparting history to students of the future. He will probably have to pick and choose his classes carefully, or he could well become another one of those history teachers who, like Dave Shipley, become more politicians than historians. There are many of them around, cluttering rosters among our colleges and universities. The University of Texas, particularly the Lyndon Johnson School of Public Affairs, has more than its share.

Karl has had his work cut out for him ever since he went with Bush. Karl certainly did not initiate this Administration's failed policies relative to the Middle East and Mexico, but he was at least a willing tool in that failure. He certainly could have, and may have, been behind Bush's "triangulation" theories, wherein the President sought to wean "Hispanics" and Jews away from

their traditional moorings as Democrats. As far as Hispanics are concerned, that effort has been going on for many years, but it was only during recent years that the push has been going on among Jews, without, we must add, any tangible results except changes in our own policies toward the Middle East. The results of Bush's Middle East policies have been thoroughly disastrous, in my own opinion. We have made enemies of one-time friends, and where we have friends, we have bought them. We see little difference between what we have now and what we would have had if John Kerry or Al Gore had won. There are differences, of course, in Supreme Court appointments and throughout the Judiciary, but how much of that is due to Bush's own inclinations, and how much to pressure from the President's backers is a question time alone will answer. We are grateful for the good things he did. We only wish he had done more of them.

Anyhow, Karl is leaving. We wish him well. He has done his best to serve a President who can't be much fun to serve.

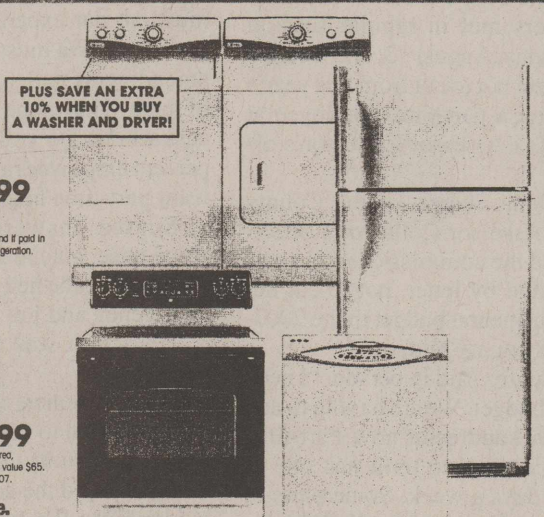

A wedding day brunch was held at the home of Luanne Boyd for all the out of town guests.

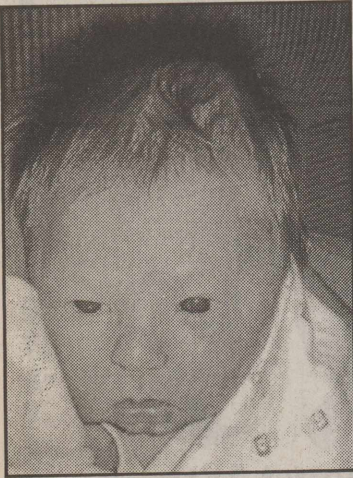

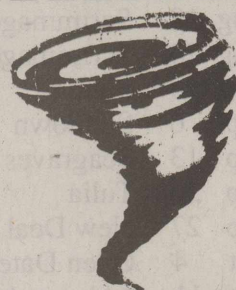

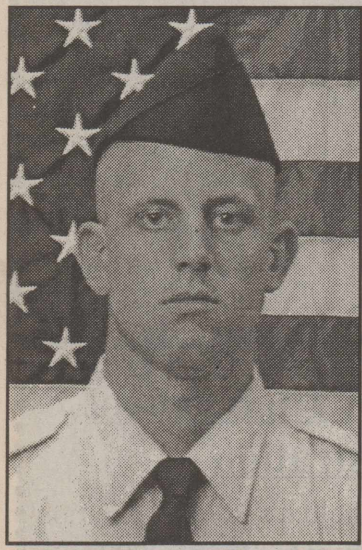

The season's first USDA production estimate based on infield surveys shows the 2007 crop is within striking distance of the four million bale mark for the fourth straight season, and adds support to the cautiously optimistic stance many growers are taking on this year's High Plains cotton crop.

According to the numbers released for Texas Agricultural Statistics Service (TASS) crop reporting districts 1-N and 1-S, the High Plains has the potential to produce 3.95 million bales of cotton from an estimated 2.99 million harvested acres. Projected yield per acre across the region is pegged at 634 pounds per acre.

Nationally USDA forecasts All Cotton production in the United States at 17.137 million bales and Upland Cotton production at 16.1 million bales of Upland cotton in 2007.

This year's initial High Plains cotton production forecast is 3.95 million bales, a slim 100,000 bales shy of the area's 2006 production level of 4.05 million bales.

In the August 10 report, TASS also made slight revisions to the area's planted and harvested acreage figures that were released June 30. According to the latest figures, the High Plains region appears to have planted 3.2 million acres of cotton and is projected to harvest 2.99 million acres. This provides a current abandonment estimate of right at 210,000 acres, or 6.5 percent.

The High Plains region's estimated 3.2 million planted acres is a 17.5 percent decrease in cotton acreage from the 3.89 million acres planted to the crop in 2006. This year's initial 3.2 million cotton acres is also the lowest number of acres initially planted to cotton in the region since the early 1990's.

Breaking the USDA Crop Report for Texas down to the district level shows that district 1-N counties planted 600,000 acres,

down 40 percent from 2006 plantings of 994,700 acres. Harvested acres in district 1-N counties are forecast to be 10 percent below plantings at 540,000 acres.

Yield-wise the northern High Plains crop appears to be down somewhat as well compared to last year with field surveys indicating potential yield at 796 pounds per acre, 93 pounds below 2006's average yield of 880 pounds.

It should be no surprise that most of the projected production decline in this area is attributable to the shifting of a significant amount of the area's better, irrigated land to grain crops and the slow start many fields experienced. Despite the acreage shifts and delays, total production in district 1-N is forecast at a respectable 895,000 bales.

Looking south, cotton producers in district 1-S planted 2.6 million acres according to TASS, an increase of 110,000 acres from USDA's June planted Acreage Report. The 2007 planted acreage figure is 283,000 acres less than the area 1-S producers planted to cotton in 2006, a decrease of 10 percent.

Based on the revised acreage forecast, this month's report indicates harvested acres in 1-S will total 2.45 million, a difference of 150,000 acres or 5.7 percent. District 1-S yields are forecast at 599 pounds per acre,

slightly below the 637 pounds per harvested acre achieved in 2006.

Taking into account the improved moisture situation in the majority of the 1-S production region and the continuation of favorable weather conditions, district 1-S yields appear to have the potential to rise to 2006 level with just a little help from mother nature.

As noted in recent weeks through a variety of sources, the 2007 crop has the potential to provide another outstanding result for High Plains cotton producers. Summer-like conditions punctuated by one or two seasonal rainfall events are the key to pushing the 2007 crop over and above USDA's current forecast.

Whether the region's prospects increase or diminish are, as usual, dependent on the weather and the pattern that establishes itself between now and late September.

This week's USDA Crop Production report verifies why there is a lot to optimistic about regarding the 2007 crop and sets the stage for measuring its progress from this point forward.

The counties located in districts 1-N and 1-S, which include most of the counties in the Texas Panhandle and above the Caprock, closely mirror the composition of the 41-county Plains Cotton growers, Inc. membership area.

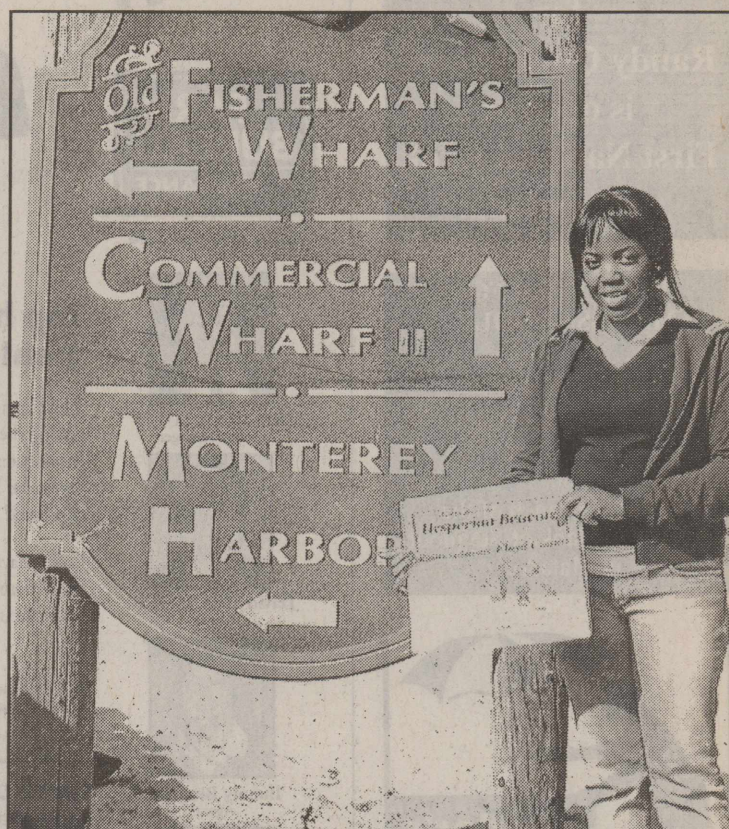

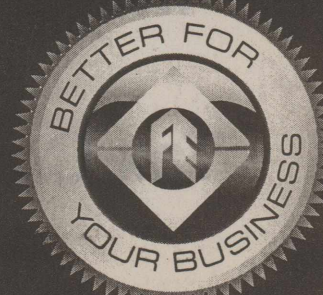
