# Fire destroys home Castillo family loses everything

A Floydada family escaped from their burning home, September 11, with only the clothes on their back

The cause of the fire was listed by the Floydada Fire Department as undetermined, however Cindy Castillo stated the fire started in the back bedroom. "We think it was an electrical fire," said

David and Cindy Castillo, and their 5 small children, were all in the living room of the home when they noticed smoke in the back of the house. David Castillo went to the back to check and returned to the living room telling Cindy to get everyone out.

David grabbed a fire extinguisher and returned to the back bedroom in an effort to put out the fire. The blaze was already too big for David. When he exited the home he collapsed from the smoke. David was taken to

W.J. Mangold Hospital and treated for smoke inhalation.

The Fire Department received the call at 7:54 p.m. and arrived at 8:02 p.m. The fire was extinguished.

Six hours later at 4:13 a.m., September 12, the fire department was called back to the fire as it was "rekindled".

According to the fire department's report, "What was left of the house was now completely involved. The roof had already come down and only the outside walls were standing...When units left the scene the structure was completely on the ground and a total

The contents of the home were not insured.

The Castillo's have moved into a house at 117 W. Marivena in Floydada. Anyone wishing to donated items for the family can deliver them to this house.

According to Cindy, beds have been donated for the children, but they are in need of a bigger bed for her and David.

The family needs a sofa, a dining room table, refrigerator, pots and pans, household items and clothing for the family.

Cindy said the family does have a washer and dryer.



WHEREAS, Residents of Lockney are gathering on September 15, 2007, to honor their city's centennial, and this occasion offers a fitting opportunity to pay tribute to this distinguished North

WHEREAS, This celebration marks the anniversary of the city's incorporation in the early years of the 20th century, but Lockney's origins actually date back to 1889; in that year, residents from the nearby town of Della Plain established a new community, which was named for J.H. Lockney, the father of one of the settlers; and

WHEREAS, Surrounded by the vast Texas plains, Lockney soon became a commercial crossroads for the ranchers and grain farmers who lived in the area; education was another important factor in the town's early prosperity; members of the Church of Christ established Lockney Christian College in 1894, and The Practical Business School opened its doors in 1906; and

WHEREAS, The arrival of rail service in 1910 spurred the city's growth, and trains delivered large numbers of new residents to Floyd County; railroads also allowed Lockney to become a ship-1900's and

WHEREAS, Today, Lockney continued to be a hub for the region's agricultural operations, as well as a center for manufacturing facilities, retail outlets, and service businesses, even as new economic opportunities unfold, Lockney residents still enjoy the same quiet, family-oriented character and small-town friendliness that have always been part of community life; and

WHEREAS, Throughout the past century, citizens of Lockney have drawn strength from their foresight and determination and from their enduring relationship with the wide open spaces of the Texas Panhandle, and it is a pleasure to join with them as they celebrate the city's heritage and it's many admirable achievements; now, therefore, be it



# **Attorney briefs Lockney Council on** legislative updates affecting cities

meeting Thursday, September 13 with a legislative update concerning changes affecting cities under 10,000 population.

Voss outlined the legal criteria cities have to follow to propose a budget that will raise more total property tax revenue than was generated the previous year.

Besides the legal paperwork, Voss told the Council if the city maintains an Internet Web site, the city clerk must also post the proposed budget and the adopted budget there.

Voss explained that adoption of

a budget that raises more prop-City Attorney Lanny Voss ad- erty tax revenue than was generdressed the Council at its regular ated the previous year requires two votes by the city council: (a) one vote to adopt the budget; and (b) a separate vote to "ratify" the property tax revenue increase reflected in the budget.

> Voss said these changes affect the budget process only; the legislature made no changes that affect the adoption of a property tax rate in 2007.

"The good news is a lot of bad legislation failed or was vetoed," Voss said. "Revenue caps failed as did the proposed enactment of some very costly unfunded mandates where they tell you to


do more, but don't give any authority to raise money for it. So this legislation was important for what did not pass as much as for what did."

In other business the council unanimously passed end of year "in budget" transfers.

The Council tabled an item requesting variance for business in a residential district at the 100 block of Northeast 3rd Street, pending receipt of a drawn map to scale and a written request.

Council members discussed passage of a tax rate of .37968 per \$100 value at their called budget meeting September 10.

Approval of a 2008 Budget was also tabled as councilmen are still working on it.



Floydada traveled to Stratford last Friday night hoping to ruin the Elk's homecoming. A breakout game by Floydada receiver "Pickles" Alvarado would not be enough however, as the Elks rushed fifty-eight times for 462 yards. A ball controlling offense coupled with a stout run stride and streaked down defense allowed the Elks to dominate most of the game. The final score was 35-14.

Stratford scored often in the first half amassing a 27-7 halftime lead. The Elk's touchdowns were scored by Alex Martinez, Hunter Buckles, and Craig Kautz (2). Floydada's lone bright spot in the first half was a forty-five yard scoring strike from Payte Beedy to Alvarado. Beedy took advantage of the Elks man-toman coverage all night, passing for a season high 205 yards and two touchdowns. The Floydada senior has thrown for 437 yards in three games this season.

The two teams traded punts and turnovers most of the third

quarter. An unbelievable "coffin corner" fifty-five yard punt by Stratford's Hunter Buckles left Floydada on their own five-yard line late in the period. With the score still 27-7, Beedy fired from his own end zone downfield to Alvarado who caught the ball in Floydada's sideline for a ninetyfive yard touchdown catch. Alvarado added the extra point and Lopez forty-five yard touchdown run. Kautz added the twopoint conversion, Floydada trailed 27-14.

Stratford answered Floydada's touchdown on a Jesus Rodriguez forty-five yard scamper. The extra point was added by Buckles for the Elk's final points of the night. The Whirlwinds failed to tally any fourth quarter points, and the final score was 35-14.

Floydada struggled on the ground against Stratford, running for a season low ninety-seven yards. Running back Aarrhon





It appears the Texas High Plains is once again poised to eclipse 4 million bales of production in 2007. This week's September Crop Production report from USDA's National Agriculture Statistics Service (NASS) indicates the Texas High Plains could produce an estimated 4.51 and Swisher. million bales of cotton in 2007.

Based on the NASS report, the 2007 season is currently on track to be the fourth crop in a row for the High Plains to produce more than 4 million bales.

Seasoned crop watchers have been quietly impressed with the productive potential of the 2007 crop for quite some time. But, as is always the case with early season production estimates, the September number is still a long way from being made. The main thing tempering current optimism is experience and the knowledge that the ability of the 2007 crop to meet or even exceed current forecasts depends on a favorable end to the growing sea-

Nationally, the United states is forecast to produce 17.8 million combined Upland and Pima cotton bales. Upland cotton production is forecast at 17 million bales, with an even 7 million Upland bales expected to come from Texas.

On a percentage basis this month's production estimate indicates Texas cotton producers will account for 41 percent of total U.S. Upland production.

Closer to home, the 4.51 million bales forecast for the Texas High Plains would equal an estimated 26.5 percent of U.S. Upland production and 64.4 percent of Texas Upland bales.

In the 23 Northern High Plains/ Panhandle counties located in Texas Agriculture Statistics Service (TASS) crop reporting district 1-N, an estimated 900,000 bales of cotton are forecast to be harvested from 540,000 cotton

TASS crop reporting district 1-S, which includes 16 High Plains counties, is forecast to produce 3.61 million bales from an estimated 2.48 million harvested acres. Yield per harvested acre in the High Plains is forecast at 800 pounds in district 1-N and 699 pounds in district 1-S.

The counties located in districts 1-N and 1-S, which include most of the counties in the Texas Panhandle and above the Caprock, closely mirror the composition of the 41 county Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. membership area.

# NRCS request public input

News

The USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service invites the public, and any agencies with interest, to participate in a Program Development Group (PDG) meeting to be held at The USDA Building in Floydada.

This meeting will be on October 9th at 9:00 a.m. The purpose of this meeting is to request participation and invite comments from a broad range of local agencies, organizations, businesses, and individuals that have an interest in natural resource conditions and needs.

The discussion in the Program Development Group will help the Local Work Group (LWG), led by the Floyd County Conservation District, to address for the FY2008 Environmental Quality Incentives Programs (EQIP). The LWG will make recommendations on resource concerns to be addressed for eligible practices, county priorities, and application ranking for counties.

One of the guiding principles of the 2002 USDA Farm Bill is that conservation programs are locally led. Through stake holder meetings, the public is given an opportunity to help local conservation leaders set program priorities. These meetings are open to the public.

The Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP) was established in the 1996 Farm Bill to provide a single, voluntary conservation program for farmers and ranchers to address significant natural resource concerns. Nationally, it provides technical and financial assistance to address natural resource concerns. Administered by the Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS), EQIP was reauthorized in the 2002 Farm Bill and awards cost share assistance to projects which provide significant environmental benefit.

## Sign-up for EQIP funds under way

Temple, Texas - Texas agricultural landowners interested in participating in the Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP) need to apply by Nov. 16, 2007, if they have not already done so to be eligible for the next round of funding, according to the Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS).

"Although EQIP is a continuous sign-up program, some producers may not have signed up yet," said Don Gohmert, NRCS state conservationist for Texas. "We will rank all eligible applications received by the end of the ranking period on Nov. 16 for 2008 funding. There is a strong possibility that EQIP funds will become available in October."

EQIP promotes agricultural production and environmental quality. Through EQIP, farmers and ranchers receive financial and technical assistance to help install conservation practices and to implement management systems that promote conservation. Financial assistance is on a costshared basis with the producer. The technical assistance is provided at 100 percent of the cost by NRCS.

According to Gohmert, there are a few changes in EQIP for

NRCS is adding another statewide resource concern to the program at the recommendation of the State Technical Committee. Funding will be provided in 2008 specifically for conservation practices that improve habitat for the pronghorn antelope in west

Also new in 2008 will be a process to streamline payments. Instead of the traditional percentage of cost rates, NRCS will offer flat-rate payments based on a schedule for each conservation practice. "Landowners will know up-front what the payment in dollars will be," Gohmert said.

"One important component of EOIP that remains the same is the input needed from the local level to make EQIP address the most pressing resource concerns there," Gohmert said. "Our local offices may be holding program development group and local working group meetings very soon to gather that input." NRCS offices and local soil and water conservation district officials will have more information about local meetings.

BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS SPECIAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 6, 2007

**PROPOSITION 1** (HJR 103)

HJR 103 would update the constitutional reference to Angelo State University to conform with the statutory transfer of that institution from membership in the Texas State University System to membership in the Texas Tech University System.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment providing for the continuation of the constitutional appropriation for facilities and other capital items at Angelo State University on a change in the governance of the university."

> **PROPOSITION 2** (SJR 57)

SJR 57 would authorize the legislature to permit the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board to issue up to \$500 million in general obligation bonds to finance educational loans to college and university students, and to enter into bond enhancement

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment providing for the issuance of \$500 million in general obligation bonds to finance educational loans to students and authorizing bond enhancement agreements with respect to general obligation bonds issued for that purpose."

> **PROPOSITION 3** (HJR 40)

HJR 40 would authorize the legislature to limit the maximum appraised value of a residence homestead for property tax purposes in a tax year to the lesser of the most recent appraisal valuation, or 110 percent, or a greater percentage as determined by the legislature, of the appraised value in the pre-

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide that the maximum appraised value of a residence homestead for ad valorem taxation is limited to the lesser of the most recent market value of the residence homestead as determined by the appraisal entity or 110 percent, or a greater percentage, of the appraised value of the residence homestead for the preceding tax year."

> **PROPOSITION 4** (SJR 65)

SJR 65 would authorize the legislature to permit the Texas Public Finance Authority to issue up to \$1 billion in general obligation

bonds, the proceeds of which would be dedicated to maintenance, construction, repairs, and equipment purchases, as authorized by the legislature for the following state agencies: the Texas Building and Procurement Commission; the Parks and Wildlife Department; the Department of the Adjutant General; the Department of State Health Services; the Department of Aging and Disability Services; the Texas School for the Blind and Visually Impaired; the Texas Youth Commission; the Texas Historical Commission: the Texas Department of Criminal Justice; the Texas School for the Deaf; and the Texas Department of Public

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the issuance of up to \$1 billion in bonds payable from the general revenues of the state for maintenance, improvement, repair, and construction projects and for the purchase of needed equipment."

> PROPOSITION 5 (SJR 44)

SJR 44 would authorize the legislature to permit cities with a population of less than 10,000 to hold an election to allow the city to enter into an agreement with a property owner to temporarily freeze taxes on property either in or adjacent to an area approved for funding under the Downtown Revitalization Program or the Main Streets Improvements Program administered by the Department of Agriculture.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to permit the voters of a municipality having a population of less than 10,000 to authorize the governing body of the municipality to enter into an agreement with an owner of real property in or adiacent to an area in the municipality that has been approved for funding under certain programs administered by the Texas Department of Agriculture under which the parties agree that all ad valorem taxes imposed on the owner's property may not be increased for the first five tax years after the tax year in which the agreement is entered into."

> PROPOSITION 6 (HJR 54)

HJR 54 would authorize the legislature to exempt from ad valorem tax one motor vehicle owned by an individual that is used by the individual for both business and per-

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional

amendment authorizing the legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation one motor vehicle owned by an individual and used in the course of the owner's occupation or profession and also for personal activities of the owner."

> PROPOSITION 7 (HJR 30)

HJR 30 would allow a governmental entity to sell property acquired through eminent domain to its immediately previous owner at the original purchase price, if the public use of the property has been canceled, if no progress is made toward that public use by a prescribed deadline, or if the property is unnecessary to accomplish that public use.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to allow governmental entities to sell property acquired through eminent domain back to the previous owners at the price the entities paid to acquire the property."

> **PROPOSITION 8** (HJR 72)

HJR 72 would clarify home equity loan procedures and protections and make conforming changes to the written disclosure provided to the borrower at the loan closing. The amendment would establish that the status of whether property is an agricultural homestead for the purpose of receiving homestead protection, would be determined by whether it was designated for agricultural use on the date of the loan closing. The amendment would provide that a declared state of emergency (e.g., following a natural disaster) would justify execution of a second home equity loan on the same property less than one year after the first home equity loan. It would provide that non-substantive omissions on a loan application would not affect the agreement. It would require a borrower to receive a copy of all executed loan documents, and a disclosure list of fees and costs at closing. It would prohibit the use of preprinted checks for the use of unsolicited loan advances to obtain a home equity line of credit.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to clarify certain provisions relating to the making of a home equity loan and use of home equity loan proceeds."

> **PROPOSITION 9** (SJR 29)

SJR 29 would authorize the legislature to exempt all or part of the market value of the residence homesteads of veterans certified as having a service-connected 100 percent disability rating. SJR 29 would also clarify in a family violence case and permit the legavailable to veterans who are less than 100 percent disabled

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to exempt all or part of the residence homesteads of certain totally disabled veterans from ad valorem taxation and authorizing a change in the manner of determining the amount of the existing exemption from ad valorem taxation to which a disabled veteran is entitled."

> **PROPOSITION 10** (HJR 69)

HJR 69 would remove constitutional references to the former office of inspector of hides and animals.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to abolish the constitutional authority for the office of inspector of hides and animals.'

> PROPOSITION 11 (HJR 19)

HJR 19 would require a vote taken in either house of the legislature to be recorded by record vote, if the vote was on final passage of a bill, other than local bills, a resolution proposing a constitutional amendment, or any other resolution that is not purely ceremonial. The record vote must be archived and available for public viewing on the Internet for at least two years.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to require that a record vote be taken by a house of the legislature on final passage of any bill, other than certain local bills, of a resolution proposing or ratifying a constitutional amendment. or of any other nonceremonial resolution. and to provide for public access on the Internet to those record votes."

> **PROPOSITION 12** (SJR 64)

SJR 64 would authorize the Texas Transportation Commission to issue up to \$5 billion in general obligation bonds for highway improvement projects, the proceeds of which will be used to pay for projects, costs, and payments owed under related credit agreements.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment providing for the issuance of general obligation bonds by the Texas Transportation Commission in an amount not to exceed \$5 billion to provide funding for highway improvement projects."

> **PROPOSITION 13** (HJR 6)

HJR 6 would authorize the denial of bail to a person who violates conditions of release person who violates certain court orders in a family violence case.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the denial of bail to a person who violates certain court orders or conditions of release in a felony or family violence case."

> **PROPOSITION 14** (HJR 36)

HJR 36 would limit a state justice or judge's service to December 31st of the fourth year of the term if he/she is elected to all or part of a six year term, and reaches mandatory retirement age during the first four years of

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment permitting a justice or judge who reaches the mandatory retirement age while in office to serve the remainder of the justice's or judge's current term."

> **PROPOSITION 15** (HJR 90)

HJR 90 would require the legislature to establish the Cancer Prevention and Research Institute of Texas, and would provide for its management, duties, and powers. It would authorize the issuance of up to \$3 billion in general obligation bonds to be used for operations and grants for the purpose of scientific research of all forms of human

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment requiring the creation of the Cancer Prevention and Research Institute of Texas and authorizing the issuance of up to \$3 billion in bonds payable from the general revenues of the state for research in Texas to find the causes of and cures for cancer."

> **PROPOSITION 16** (SJR 20)

SJR 20 would authorize the issuance of up to \$250 million in general obligation bonds by the Texas Water Development Board to provide financial assistance to economically distressed areas of the state to help provide adequate sewer and water supply services for residential use.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment providing for the issuance of additional general obligation bonds by the Texas Water Development Board in an amount not to exceed \$250 million to provide assistance to economically dis-






