## Probasco survives crash near Flomot

Local crop duster feels lucky to be alive

Mitch Probasco considers himself lucky to be alive after a forced landing of his crop duster six miles north of Flomot.

Ten minutes after taking off from the Floydada Airport at 1:25 p.m., Probasco was in the process of flying over a field he was going to spray when it became apparent he was going down.

"I dumped the load and starting trying to pick the place I was going to land--which wasn't easy here. It's rougher than a cobb down there.

"I couldn't land on the highway because of the trees, so I picked the cotton field.'

Probasco says he was gliding but ran out of momentum under the power lines.

"I had to go under 2 sets of power lines," said Probasco.

Probasco says he had almost no time to process everything that

was happening. "It took about 15 seconds from the time I realized it was going down and actually going down," said Probasco.

"I give the glory to God for bringing me through this but 21 years of experience also helped me walk away from this.'

Probasco said his plane, an Air Tractor crop duster, is also the safest plane built.

The accident is being investigated by the NTSB but Probasco feels confident the findings will show the problem was in the fuel control unit.

Probasco says after landing he immediately jumped out of the plane to put some distance between him and the plane in case

of fire. "I still had my helmet on which, side and use the phone--they

is attached to the radio. I took off and after a few feet I was jerked back to the plane," said Probasco.

The cell phone service did not work in the area, so Probasco took off walking down the high-

"It surprised me that no one saw me go down," said Probasco. "Usually there are lots of people who see planes go down and show up at the site. Nobody saw

However it didn't mean there was no one looking.

Probasco says at the exact moment he knew he was going down, his wife, Patty, called him on the radio.

"I told her, 'My airplane quit, I'm going down and it's going to be ugly.

Patty immediately called other spray pilots, Dickie Lambert and Donnie McLaughlin, and told them of the situation. She also called the farmer, Neil Guest, whose field Probasco had gone

Lambert started looking for Probasco from the air and McLaughlin searched from the ground. However, the plane was hidden from view.

"Everybody was looking north of me," said Probasco. "I was invisible from the north. The plane was hidden by a berm."

"I walked about 3/4 of a mile before a woman picked me up," said Probasco. "She took me to a farm house close by, but no one

"The woman who picked me up opened their door and hollered for an answer. She then told me-

Probasco said he felt fortunate the woman who picked him up knew the people who owned this house and also fortunate the homeowners didn't lock their

"The first person I called was my wife," said Probasco.

Pretty soon Neil Guest showed up to pick up Probasco.

"Neil asked me where did I want to go," said Probasco, "I they're not home, but just go in-said, 'What do you mean, where

"He said, 'Which Hospital?" "I told him I didn't want to go

to the hospital. "He said, 'You just crashed a plane for crying out loud--don't you want to get checked out?""

But the most important thing on Probasco's mind was a wedding rehearsal that evening with his daughter.

So Guest took him home where Probasco cleaned up and went to the rehearsal.

The crash brought back bad memories for the Probasco fam-

Twenty years ago Probasco's crop duster went down resulting in a broken back for Mitch.

Probasco remembers that accident vividly. "It was October 19, 1987--Black Monday," said Probasco with a little humor. "The Stock Market and I both crashed on the same day."



## FISD adds money to contingency plan

The Board of Trustees for FISD held their regular meeting Thursday, September 20 and discussed cost savings in the **Duncan Elementary Construction** 

Joe Grimes, of Grimes & Associates, informed the board of some duplicated bidding items that were discovered while reviewing the bids. These duplications allowed for some cost adjustments to be made. These adjustments, in items including mill work, steel support columns, MDF boards (for gym), site work and paving, and concrete, will give FISD a savings of \$172,932.44. Mr. Grimes proposed this savings be added to the project's contingency allowance, in case it is needed elsewhere in the project. Trustee Bart Greer opposed this proposal, based on the original discussion that the contingency plan would be enough to cover the entire project. Others felt that the addi-

tion to the contingency allowance would be the best idea. In a 5 to 1 vote, with Greer the dissenting vote, the board opted to put the savings into the contingency budget. In addition, Mr. Grimes recommended a switch to the lowest bidder on the roofing project, GKS Commercial. The next highest bidder was D.K. Haney Roofing. He felt the savings, totaling \$44,898.00, should also be added to the contingency allowance. The board approved, this time in a unanimous vote, to go with the lowest bidder, and to add

Superintendent Jerry Vaughn then informed the board that, while enrollment across the district is down, FISD is over the approved 22:1 student to teacher ratio in grades 2,3, and 4. These

the savings to the contingency al-

grades are over by 2 to 3 students, in each classroom. Mr. Vaughn asked the board to approve sending in a waiver request to allow

the overage until December, when it will be reevaluated. The board unanimously approved the waiver request.

The next few meeting dates were set. An ITV meeting will be held September 25, for Board Training. The October meeting has been set for October 18. A regular meeting will be held on October 30, for Policy Review. All meetings will be at 7:00 p.m.

The board also approved, unanimously, the District and Campus Improvement Plans which includes the Highly Qualified Teacher plans and No Child Left Behind. These plans can be found on the FISD website. In addition, Floydada ISD was given a Superior Achievement rating on the FIRST (Financial Integrity Rating System of Texas) Report.

A resignation from school bus driver, Wilma Ward, was accepted. The Board of Trustees also went into a closed meeting to discuss real estate items. They

reconvened in open session and voted unanimously to give Superintendent Vaughn authority to negotiate prices on real estate.

Superintendent Jerry Vaughn honored the Students, Teacher, and Support Staff of the Month. The students included: Laci Gourdon, Pre-K, Alfonzo Mendoza, 3rd grade, Samantha Rodriguez, 8th grade, Tanner Sue, 12th grade. Educator of the Month was Amy Kellison, who teaches 4th grade reading at R.C. Andrews. Support Staff of the Month was JoAnn Rangel, from the Elementary Cafeteria.

The FISD bank statement at the end of August, 2007 showed a general operating balance of \$2,554,445.70 and a 123 day CD at FNB for \$3,387,000.00. This does not include the bond fund

## Older adults should be concerned with diabetes

Diabetes is a serious disease at any age but is especially serious for older adults. It happens when the level of sugar in your blood, also known as glucose, is too high. High glucose levels may be managed to help control the disease and prevent or delay future problems.


Your body changes the food you eat into glucose to feed the cells that make up your body. The cells cannot process the sugar alone so you produce a hormone called insulin to help. People with diabetes either do not make insulin, do not use insulin properly or both. As a result, they often feel tired, hungry or thirsty; they may lose weight, urinate often or have trouble with their eyes. It may also cause heart disease, strokes and even the need to remove all or part of a limb.

There are two types of diabetes. In Type-1 Diabetes, formerly known as juvenile diabetes, the body does not produce insulin. In the other kind of diabetes, the body produces insulin but does not use it in the right way. This is called Type-2 Diabetes, formerly called adult-onset diabetes.

Diabetes tends to run in families but other factors may add to the risk of developing diabetes, such as being overweight and/or underactive. There are many unknowns surrounding diabetes and research is constantly looking at what causes diabetes and how best to manage it. While questions continue to persist, there is a lot that is known. For example, we know that careful control of blood glucose, blood pressure

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or delay diabetes and its compli-

Research shows that some increase in blood glucose levels often comes with age. This may be caused by weight gain, especially when fat builds up around

Many people with Type-2 Diabetes have few or no symptoms. For some people, feeling run down is their only symptom. Other people may feel thirsty, urinate often, lose weight, have

blurred vision, get skin infections or heal slowly from cuts and bruises. It is very important to tell your health provider right away about any of these prob-

Your health provider may diagnose diabetes by reviewing your symptoms and checking your blood glucose levels. One test measures your blood glucose level after eating or drinking nothing for at least 8 hours, usually overnight. In another test, your blood glucose is checked and then you drink a sugary beverage. Diagnosis is confirmed after a repeat test on a different

There are many things you may do to take control of your diabetes, among others:

1. Meal planning and eating correctly are key to managing

and cholesterol can help prevent blood glucose, blood pressure, and cholesterol levels. To plan meals and eat right, you need to understand how different foods affect your glucose levels. Ask your health provider to help you plan your meals or find another

> professional who can help you. 2. Physical activity is very important in dealing with diabetes. Taking part in a regular fitness program may improve blood glucose levels. A health professional may help you plan an exercise

> 3. Medications may also be central to controlling diabetes for many people. Your health provider may prescribe oral medicines, insulin, or a combination

> Eye Exams. People with diabetes should have an eye exam every year. Finding and treating eye problems early can help prevent more serious conditions

Kidney Check. A yearly urine test for a protein called albumin will show whether your kidneys are affected by diabetes.

Foot Care. Diabetes can reduce blood supply to arms and legs and cause numbness in the feet. People with diabetes should check their feet every day and watch for any redness or patches of heat. Sores, blisters, breaks in the skin, infections, or build-up of calluses should be checked right away by your health pro-

Skin Care. People with diabetes can protect their skin by keeping it clean, using skin softeners to treat dryness and taking care of minor cuts and bruises to prevent infections and other problems

Teeth and Gums. Working closely with a dentist is very important. Teeth and gums need special attention to avoid serious infections



# Whirlwinds surge past Post Antelopes in second half

It was a tale of two halves for kick eighty yards for two points, the Floydada Whirlwind football team last Friday night against the Post Antelopes

Playing at Wester Field for the first time in 2007, the Whirlwinds were less than spectacular during the first twenty-four minutes of the ballgame. The Antelopes took advantage of the turnover driving towards the Whirlwind's goal line as intermission neared. Fifteen seconds before the half Bradley Curtis plunged across the goal line on a two-yard run. Dalby's extra point attempt was successful, and Post took a 14-0 lead to the break.

On the second play from scrimmage of the second half Beedy found "Pickles" Alvarado on a seventy-yard touchdown pass. The momentum seemed to be in Floydada's favor, but it quickly subsided when Alvarado's extra point attempt was blocked. Post's Clint Windham returned the blocked



The young Whirlwinds will be back in action Thursday night at Tahoka.




nets. The PAT was wide right and Tulia held a slim 29-28 lead.



Johanns resignation expected to have little impact on Farm Bill development process

Thursday's resignation of Secretary of Agriculture Mike Johanns was met with little to no effect on the 2007 Farm Bill development process since it is unlikely that the Bush Administration's farm policy positions will change.

Figuring predominantly in his decision to make the move, is Johanns' planned run for the Nebraska Senate seat currently held by Senator Chuck Hagel. Senator Hagel has announced that he will not seek re-election in 2008.

One of the primary reasons that little impact is expected to be felt in the farm bill development process was the simultaneous announcement by President George Bush that USDA Deputy Secretary Charles Conner was being named acting Secretary of Agriculture.

Prior to moving to his current post, Conner was a key developer of Bush Administration farm policy positions. Since moving to USDA, Conner has continued to be a primary force in the development and articulation of Bush Administration farm policy positions. Conner was the main Administration representative during the House farm bill de-

Plains Cotton Growers Executive Vice President Steve Verett echoed that sentiment when asked for comment on Johanns' announcement.

"I see it as a total non-event," concluded Verett.

He explained that since the makes their failure to join the House of Representatives has already passed its version of the 2007 Farm Bill and the Senate Agriculture Committee is expected to begin formal work on their own version within the next few weeks, there is little time for the Administration position on farm policy to change.

The best information available right now indicates the most likely time frame for significant Senate action could be the third week of October. Things could move either before or after that time, but the September 30 expiration of the current bill seems to make this a likely target for Senate

An extension of spending authority for current programs beyond September 30 is planned to
