### About Wreaths Across America

The Wreaths Across America story began over 15 years ago when Worcester Wreath Company (a for-profit commercial business from Harrington, Maine) began a tradition of placing wreaths on the headstones of the Nation's fallen heroes at Arlington National Cemetery.

Over that period of time, Worcester Wreath has donated 75,000 wreaths which were placed by volunteers in a wreath -laying ceremony each December.

This year Worcester Wreath will double its annual donation to 10,000 wreaths destined for Arlington National Cemetery. The company will also donate 2,500 wreaths to the Maine Veterans Cemetery at Togus, and over 1,800 ceremonial wreaths, representing all branches of the armed forces will be sent to over 200 other state and national veterans cemeteries across the Country.

For the first time in 2007, ceremonial wreaths will also be donated to 24 veterans cemeteries on foreign soil, and aboard U.S. ships sailing in all seven seas.

All wreath-laying ceremonies, including a ceremony in Lockney, Texas, will be held concurrently on Saturday, December 15th, at 12:00 noon.

On Monday, December 10th, 51 wreaths will be donated for a special wreath laying ceremony at each State Capitol and one six foot wreath for the Nations Capitol.

# Veteran's Park will be part of nationwide wreath ceremony

The Lockney area Veterans website: have volunteered to conduct the Wreaths Across America Ceremony this year at the Lockney Veteran's Memorial Park, Saturday, December 15.

The ceremony will start at 11:00 a.m. in Lockney and will coincide with similar ceremonies across the United States on the same day at the same time.

In Lockney seven ceremonial wreaths will be placed at the flag poles to remember those who gave their lives in service. They will include specialty made wreaths for Army, Marines, Navy, Air Force, Coast Guard, Merchant Marines, and POW/

All of these wreaths are donated by Worcester Wreath Company in Harrington, Main. The full story can be found online at the Wreaths Across America

www.wreathsacrossamerica.org Eighty wreaths, bought with local donations, will also be placed at the white crosses in Lockney's Veteran's Park.

At the same time wreaths will be placed at the graves at Arlington National Cemetery in Arlington, VA., and at over 230 National and State Veterans cemeteries and monuments across the


December 15th will mark the 16th anniversary of Harrington, Maine wreaths being donated to decorate the graves at Arlington National Cemetery and the 2nd year of a national campaign dubbed Wreaths Across America that will bring the same remembrance wreaths to Veterans cemeteries and parks across the United States.

In addition to the donated ceremonial wreaths U.S. Civil Air Patrol has joined Wreaths Across America to promote sponsored wreaths from the general public that also will be laid on Veterans graves and Memorial locations around the country.

"We are in need of 80 wreaths to lay at the memorial crosses in the park," said Ed Marks, president of Lockney's Veterans Assoc. "The wreaths are available for sponsorship at \$15.00 per wreath. If you would like to sponsor one or more wreaths call Melissa Minick at 806-52-3752 for more information."

According to Marks, Lockney Veterans Memorial Park is the only park in this area to conduct such a ceremony.

"We are planning an Honor Guard ceremony," said Marks.







# Winds make good effort

Floydada played their last home game of the 2007 football season Friday night at Wester Field against the Littlefield Wild-

A win by the Whirlwinds, coupled by an Abernathy loss to Shallowater, would have put Floydada in position to make the Class 2A playoffs for the first time since 2003. Floydada put together one of their best efforts all year long, but 21 second-half points by Littlefield proved too much for the Winds to overcome.

Rebounding from a loss to Childress a week earlier, the Wildcats beat the Whirlwinds 21-14. The win put Littlefield in the playoffs for the third consecutive year. Abernathy, who defeated Floydada 21-7 two weeks ago, clinched a playoff berth with a convincing 39-6 victory over Shallowater.

Floydada's Aarrhon Flores fielded the opening kickoff two yards deep in his own end zone. A wall of blockers on Littlefield's sideline allowed Flores the seam he needed to break into the open. One hundred and two yards later, the Whirlwind junior had given Floydada an early touchdown lead. Fred Williams added the extra point, and the Winds led 7-

Having set the tone against one of the top district teams, the Winds continued their momentum on defense. The Wildcats were forced to punt on their first three drives of the first half, as the Whirlwind defense pitched a shutout in the opening half for the second week in a row.

Floydada's offense did not fair much better against Littlefield's defense. Although the Winds moved the ball well into Littlefield territory on three occasions in the first half, they could not come up with any

The Whirlwind's best opportunity came right before halftime.

from inside the Wildcat's five yard line. On fourth and goal from the three, Payte Beedy was dropped behind the line of scrimmage as the first half ended. The goal line stand by the Littlefield defense would prove to be huge in the outcome of the game. At halftime Floydada led 7-0.

Littlefield senior wingback O.J. Zapata, who rushed for over 1,500 yards a year ago, was held in check by the Whirlwind defense for most of the first half. Zapata proved it was only a matter of time before a dominating Wildcat running game would appear. He rushed for 110 of his game high 149 yards on the ground in the second half. On the opening drive of the third quarter Zapata carried five times, the last of which was a thirty-one yard touchdown scamper. Steven Hobratschk's kick missed wide right, and Floydada led 7-6.

Floydada's offense failed to move the chains on their next possession, punting the ball back to Littlefield after only three plays. #### Texas A&M University Crop and Ag Report

**Local Conditions**

COLLEGE STATION-With the passing of Halloween, and Thanksgiving pie baking a few days away, Texas pumpkin producers are bringing in the final harvests from the South Plains

"Pumpkin sales are still taking place, but starting to slow down," said Jett Major, Texas Cooperative Extension district administrator in Lubbock. "Yields and sales have been slightly better than last year."

Extension regional offices reported the following conditions for the past week:

Central: Windy conditions prevailed this week, and rain is needed. Temperatures have cooled to near normal for this time of year. Some small grain fields have experienced armyworm problems. Cotton harvest is very late. Pecan drop has begun, and many producers began harvesting.

Coastal Bend: Much cooler weather moved into the area. Cotton producers began deep tillage and stalk destruction. Ranchers are cutting hay and working

East: A cold front dropped temperatures significantly. Some areas received up to 2 inches of rain. However, other areas are still in need of moisture. Hay supplies are excellent, and many producers are still baling hay. Winter pastures are being planted in areas that have received rain. Producers in Anderson County are planting clover and ryegrass and preparing to plant pine seedlings. Livestock are in good condition. Calf weaning is nearing completion. Demand for cattle is strong; however prices are weaker for inferior cows and calves.

Far West: Topsoil moisture was reported as very short to adequate. Very windy conditions were reported with gusts up to 49 mph, but overall temperatures were milder. Val Verde County reported one-quarter inch of rain, but all other areas of the region remained dry. Range, pastures and cotton are all in very poor to excellent condition. Peanuts are in poor to excellent condition. Winter wheat is in very poor to

good-condition. Ranchers need rain because pastures are dry. Pawnee pecans, an earlier maturing variety, are all harvested. The rest of the pecan crop will wait for a frost to open the shucks. Red chiles are being harvested. Fall onions are already planted and emerged with good stands. The final cut of alfalfa is complete.

North: Soil moisture ranges from short to adequate. Rain condition. early in the week slowed wheat planting. Small grains are emerging slowly. With night temperatures in the 40s and 50s, growth of warm season grasses have slowed. Farmers are trying to sell surplus hay. Conditions are good for the current planting season, and winter annuals are doing well. Summer pastures and livestock are in good shape.

Panhandle: Soil moisture ranges from very short to surplus with most areas reporting short. Most areas need moisture to improve wheat and range conditions. Corn is still being harvested in some fields. Cotton ranges from very poor to excellent with most areas reporting fair. Producers began harvesting some fields. Peanuts are rated fair as the harvest continues. The sunflower harvest continues. Wheat ranges from very poor to good with most areas reporting fair. Range conditions are rated very poor to good with most areas reporting fair. Cattle are in good dried out soils. Some ratoon rice condition.

Having spent a lot of time center stage as high profile issues over the last month in Washington, DC, Plains Cotton Growers Executive Vice President Steve Verett knows the challenges facweek's farm bill debate in the

As he prepares to head back to Washington early next week, Verett says it is time to encourage each and every member of the Senate to support the hard work done by the Senate Agriculture Committee and ask them to support passage of the Food and Energy Security Act of 2007

when it comes to the floor. Following its relatively smooth trip through the Senate Agriculture, Nutrition and Forestry Committee, the Senate farm bill represents another important step in the process to develop U.S. agriculture policy that will be in effect through 2012.

The final, and most challenging part of the process in the Senate is now at hand and, according to Verett, it will be a vastly different landscape than what producers have seen traversed so far by their representatives in


Washington. "Compared to the restrained and respectful discourse that has allowed the process to move forward so far," explains Verett, "The Senate Floor debate could easily be far less friendly and seem considerably less structured simply due to the manner in which the Senate conducts busi-

Having been characterized as a potential "free-for-all" by Senate Agriculture Committee Chairman Tom Harkin, the Senate debate could take quite some time based on Senate rules and expectations that a sizeable number of amendments will be offered along the way.

Among the hot button issues expected to make an appearance during the debate is a controversial "AgJobs" amendment that would draw the politically divisive immigration reform issue into the realm of the farm bill debate.

Also expected are numerous efforts to try and alter the significant pay limit reforms that were hammered out by the Senate Agriculture Committee, make additional cuts in the federal crop insurance program over and above what was agreed to by the Committee and make additional changes to the proposed Average Crop revenue option that was included in the final bill.

The immigration and pay limit amendments may well take



during the debate, but equally important will be fending off the less publicized amendments that could undermine the bill's abiling agriculture during next ity to continue the highly popular and fiscally responsible safety net provisions that are the foundation of the 2002 farm bill.

Add in the possibility that the Senate may also need to set aside time to consider other pending items of business and it is not hard to imagine that the farm bill debate could take as long as 2 weeks to complete.

According to statements from Senate Majority Leader Harry Reid of Nevada, the goal will certainly be to get the bill done in one week's time, but even he has been compelled to leave the door open for a longer timetable.

Overcoming the challenges that lie ahead, says Verett, will take a concerted effort that should logically include a broad

range of interests, including commodity, conservation and food and nutrition groups, who each have a lot to gain in the bill's current form.

"Leaders from both sides of the aisle have worked hard toward a common goal and within or 2006 growing seasons. a very restricted budget allocation," explains Verett. "Despite these challenges they were able to growers and still make sub-

stantial changes in many areas such as pay limit reform, adding support for the fruits and vegetables, beefing up conservation spending and committing additional funds to food and nutrition programs nationwide."

Understanding that the Senate bill is the necessary "next step" in the process, Verett says Plains Cotton Growers will be working hard to support the bill that came out of the Senate and to prevent it from being undermined in any

"We are working closely with the National Cotton Council and others to secure passage of the Senate bill and to defeat the addition of amendments that would be harmful to cotton producers and the cotton industry as a whole," concludes Verett.






#### **JAMES FRANKS**


