## Honor Flight offers trips for Veterans to D.C. Memorials

Marceen Lass, of Lockney, and her father, Dallas Schear, of Iowa, were both recent passengers on board the Honor Flight to Washington D.C. to view the WWII Veterans Memorial. The flight is free for Veterans and Marceen now wants to make sure other Veterans know about the opportunity that meant so much to her and her father.

Honor Flight is a non profit organization created solely to honor America's veterans for all their sacrifices.

The organization flies veterans to D.C., for free, to visit and reflect on their memorials. At this time top priority is being given to the senior veteran WWII survivors along with veterans that may be terminally ill. Approximately 2,500 veterans have been flown to Washington D.C.

Honor Flight first flew in May 2005 with six small planes flying 12 WWII veterans, departing out of Springfield, Ohio.

The first flight was spearheaded by Earl Morris, a pilot from Ohio. Morris asked his father, a WWII veteran, if he would like to be flown to D.C. to see the WWII Memorial. Morris' father was eager to go and asked if he could bring some friends.

"Morris was walking through the airport with his father and his father's friends," said Marceen. "Other pilots stopped him and asked him what was going on. When Morris told the other pilots he was taking some Veterans to D.C. to see the Memorial other pilots said they wanted to help and offered to take some Veterans too. Six small planes were filled up.

"One thing led to another and now it has mushroomed into commercial flights for the Veterans."

Honor Flight has now partnered with Honor Air in Hendersonville, North Carolina, and Hero Flight in Provo, Utah.

Together the program is expanding to include other cities across the nation.

According to the organizations website there are presently 1,500 WWII Veterans on the waiting list so for this reason non-veteran

spouses are not given a free seat. If a Veteran needs help from a spouse these cases are decided on an individual basis.

A spouse or a family member may be able to go as a guardian, which is how Marceen was able to travel with her father.

A normal ratio is 8 veterans to 3 guardians.

If a Honor Flight program does not exist in your state then the Veteran is invited to participate on a flight in his general region. You are responsible for obtaining travel to that region.

"My father and I had to pay our way to Dayton, Ohio to hook up with the group," said Lass. "But from there the trip was free. I've heard they are looking at having a flight leave out of Dallas in April of 2008."

Marceen met up with her 81 year old father in July in St. Louis and together they flew to Dayton to meet up with the group.

At 4:30 a.m. forty-nine WWII veterans gathered for the trip. Their ages ranged from 79-89.

"One man arrived at the airport at 9:00 the previous evening," said Marceen. "He was afraid that he would miss the trip because he lived several hours away. The airport staff let him sleep in the USO lounge for the night.

"Another man from Kentucky arrived at the airport at 3:00 p.m. in the morning. As he was walking in the airport, his cane got caught on the step and he fell. An ambulance was called but he refused to go to the hospital because he was not going to miss this trip. We had a nurse on the trip with us and she bandaged up his hand and put him in a wheelchair that was provided to the men if they needed one. After witnessing these men's perseverance to make this trip I thought to myself, no wonder we won the war with this kind of determination."

Marceen and Dallas' group left at 7:00 a.m. and flew to Baltimore. From there they took a 45 minute bus ride to D.C., arriving at the Memorial at 10:00 a.m.

The sight was one Marceen will never forget.

"The Memorial sits between the Lincoln Memorial and the

Washington Monument," said Lass. "Inside the Memorial there is the wall named the 'Freedom Wall Field of Gold Stars'. This wall is graced with 4000 gold stars each one representing 1000 men and women who fought and died in WWII. Beside the stars is the engraving, 'Here We Mark the Price of Freedom'.

"On each end of the Memorial is an arch entrance, each one representing the Pacific and Atlantic Campaign. There are 24 sculptured panels on its ceremonial entrance walls, twelve panels each showing the Pacific and Atlantic Campaigns. The Memorial is oval in shape with columns, each one with the names of the 48 states and the territories of the United States. There is even an engraving of the picture and saying of, 'Kilroy was here.'"

Scooters were furnished to the men at the Memorial by the Scooter Store.

Marceen says the group was served lunch on the grounds of the Memorial and after lunch they were driven to Arlington National Cemetery and the Iwo Jima Memorial.

They were then taken to the Lincoln Memorial, the Vietnam Memorial, and the Korean Memorial.

"Around 6:00 p.m. we had supper, got back on the bus to Baltimore and finally the plane ride back to Dayton," said Marceen.

"Once in the Dayton airport we were greeted by a crowd of volunteers waving American flags greeting the men back from their trip."

Marceen says this was a trip of a lifetime for her and her father.

"We got to spend some quality time together and have a few laughs. My father lost his older brother in WWII, so stopping by the 4000 stars was a very touching moment for him. It was also an experience trying to keep 49 elderly men in tow. It was like herding cats."

## Lockney J.P. Office closed

In their regular meeting, November 13, County Commissioners voted to temporarily close the Justice of the Peace Office in Lockney.

Commissioner Jon Jones voted against the motion and Commissioners Bill Quattlebaum and Lennie Gilroy voted in favor of closing the office. Commissioner Ray Nell Bearden is in the hos-

pital and was not in attendance.

Because a quorum of the court was needed Judge Penny Golightly also voted in favor of closing the office. The temporary closing will continue until an outcome in Judge Araujo's upcoming trial in January.

Jones stated he felt the office should be opened to help citizens. Commissioner Gilroy did not see a need to pay temporary help while Judge Araujo is still being paid by the County while she awaits trial.

The Commissioners decided to have an answering machine in the Lockney office direct callers to Judge Jackson's Court in Floydada.

Commissioners also signed a three year contract with AMA Techtel, the county's internet pro-

vider. Dennis Morgan, Budget Clerk, reported that negotiations were made to lower monthly internet charges from \$269 to \$149 a month. It was also agreed to resume the search for a new cell phone provider.

A motion to approve two new pedestrian cross walks at the Delta & Pine Land division of Monsanto in Aiken passed unanimously.

Ag Extension Agent Melissa Long gave a report on local meetings and 4-H activities. Ag Extension Agent, J.D. Ragland, gave a farm report. (See page 7).

An official county road map was adopted and passed unanimously.

Four farm contracts were approved for soil conservation purposes.

has a reputation of urging New Yorkers to vote for queers and transgenders of all types, whose main claim to fame is he happened to be Mayor of New York City when bin Laden struck.

It may well be that Giuliani will be the most logical choice to stop Hillary, probably the most dangerous person in America, and we may well end up voting for him. But as of now there are other choices in the race, and there is no need, none whatever that we can see, for Pat to ask Americans to come down on the side of Giuliani against McCain, Thompson, Romney, Huckabee and the rest of the field. No need, that is, unless Pat has cast principals aside, which he has been known to do, and decided that moral wisdom lies in his own political instincts.

Usually, Pat sticks with Israel. It would be interesting to know

just how much influence the AIPAC lobby in New York (that's the American-Israeli Political Action Committee) had to do with Pat's decision in this case. Pat has never been known to take a stand that alienated the Israelis. There is just too much money there, and Pat did not take a small broke t.v. station in Virginia and become one of the world's wealthiest people entirely on his own, without help. We suspect that some of those people who helped him along the way were the same people whom he helped when he helped fund the South Lebanese Army many years ago. (That's the bunch of mercenaries in the pay of Israel and Pat Robertson's benefactors that left South Lebanon and faded into Palestine when the going got tough, only to be supplanted by Hezbollah, with the way paved for what the Israelis, call the Second Lebanese War.)

Anyhow, Robertson's move puts him on the same side as some Texas, leading politicians, and on the other side from others. General Land Office chairman, Jerry Patterson, has indicated he is for Fred Thompson, and Governor Rick Perry has come out four-square for Giuliani. Where most of them are, is probably where most of their biggest money supporters are. Neither Cornyn nor

Hutchison has indicated publicly who they would rather see in the Presidency. We suppose Hutchison will go with whoever she thinks may help her most in her quest for the Texas, Governorship. Even when Ann Richards was Governor of Texas, Hutchison has aspired to that job. And who knows? She may have made a better Governor than George W.

We still haven't heard where those are who aspire to be this state's next Democratic Governor. Giuliani is now a nominal member of a law firm in Houston, where about one-quarter of this state's voters reside. We imagine that's all just a matter of accident, but some people seem to think there was some advance planning involved.

One of the top Democratic candidates is a legislator from Houston named Noriega, or something like that. But he hasn't made his wishes known in the Presidential race. One Democratic gubernatorial contender, a trial lawyer from San Antonio, has already dropped out of the race. He has discovered that the race may take time away from his family, which he has also discovered is important to him. Noriega, we hope, took those things into consideration before announcing his intentions.

Railroad Commission of Texas Oil and Gas Division and is listed on the November 2007 Proration Schedule as 14(B)(2) Extension. This means that the Misener Well #1 is legally shut-in and in compliance with statewide rules.

**Floyd County:** On November 7, 2007, the Railroad Commission of Texas Oil and Gas Division granted PetroGlobe Energy USA Ltd. authority to flare gas for 90 days during the testing of the McIntosh Lease Well #1077. The testing will allow PetroGlobe Energy to determine the sustained flow of Well #1077 and will aid in determining the specifications needed for the gas processing plant for the McIntosh Lease.

PetroGlobe Energy USA Ltd. did not apply for authority to flare gas off of the McIntosh Lease Well #176, in their request to the Railroad Commission of Texas.

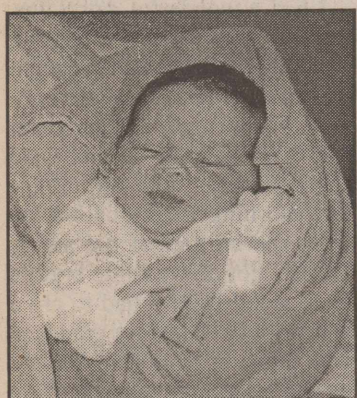

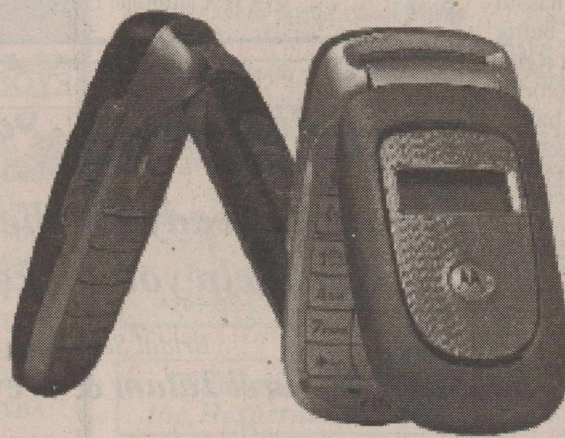

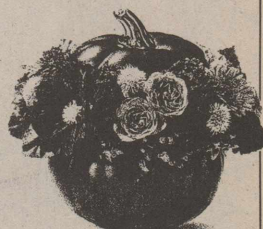

# Whirlwinds end 2007 football season against Shallowater Mustangs

Floydada ended their 2007 football season last Friday night against the Shallowater Mustangs. Although both teams had been eliminated from the playoffs the week before, it was a hard-fought game. Over the last two seasons these schools have developed a bitter rivalry, and it was clear that each team wanted to end the season on a winning note. Floydada played without junior tailback Aarrhon Flores due to injury. Quarterback Payte Beedy carried the workload rushing twenty-three times for 177 yards. Floydada was able to survive a late touchdown by Shallowater's Andrew Morris, as the Winds emerged victorious, 14-12.

Floydada began the first drive of the ball game on Shallowater's forty yard line after a fifty yard kickoff return by "Pickles" Alvarado. Floydada moved the ball inside of Shallowater's twenty yard line, but the Whirlwinds turn the ball over on downs. The teams traded punts as the first quarter neared an end. With two minutes to go in the opening quarter Shallowater moved the ball inside Floydada's ten yard line. On second and goal from the nine, Andrew Morris found the end zone on a quarterback keeper, scoring the first points of the ball game. Morris would miss the extra point and Shallowater led 6-0 at the end of the first quarter.

On the ensuing possession, Payte Beedy began to set the tone for the rest of the game. The

Floydada senior carried the ball on four consecutive plays, completed two passes, and rushed three more times. The result was a first and goal for the Whirlwinds from the Mustang seven yard line. On the first play, Beedy scrambled to his left and found Blake Greer in the back of the end zone for the score. Alvarado added the extra point and Floydada led 7-6. Both teams had another offensive possession before halftime, but neither could put any points on the board.

Floydada's defense forced Shallowater into a three-and-out on the Mustang's first possession of the second half, and the Whirlwind's took over at their own thirty-six yard line. In one of their most impressive drives all season long, Floydada used eight minutes of the third quarter en route to their final touchdown drive of the season. Using the legs of Beedy, Fred Williams, and Joe Louis Suarez, the Winds marched sixty-four yards to pay dirt. Williams capped the drive with a two yard touchdown plunge, his first of the season. Alvarado added the extra point, and the Whirlwinds held the advantage 14-6.

Midway through the fourth quarter Shallowater had the ball at Floydada's thirty-nine yard line facing a fourth down and 8. Andrew Morris scrambled for several seconds before heaving a pass while falling out of bounds. The toss found Jordan Scaff in stride for a sixteen yard pick up, giving the Mustangs a first down.

Morris continued to will Shallowater toward the goal line as the game clock winded down. Finally, with four minutes left in the final quarter, the Shallowater junior scored on a three yard touchdown run. The Mustangs lined up for the two-point conversion trailing, 14-12. Morris could not escape pressure from Whirlwind defenders and he was dropped behind the line of scrimmage.

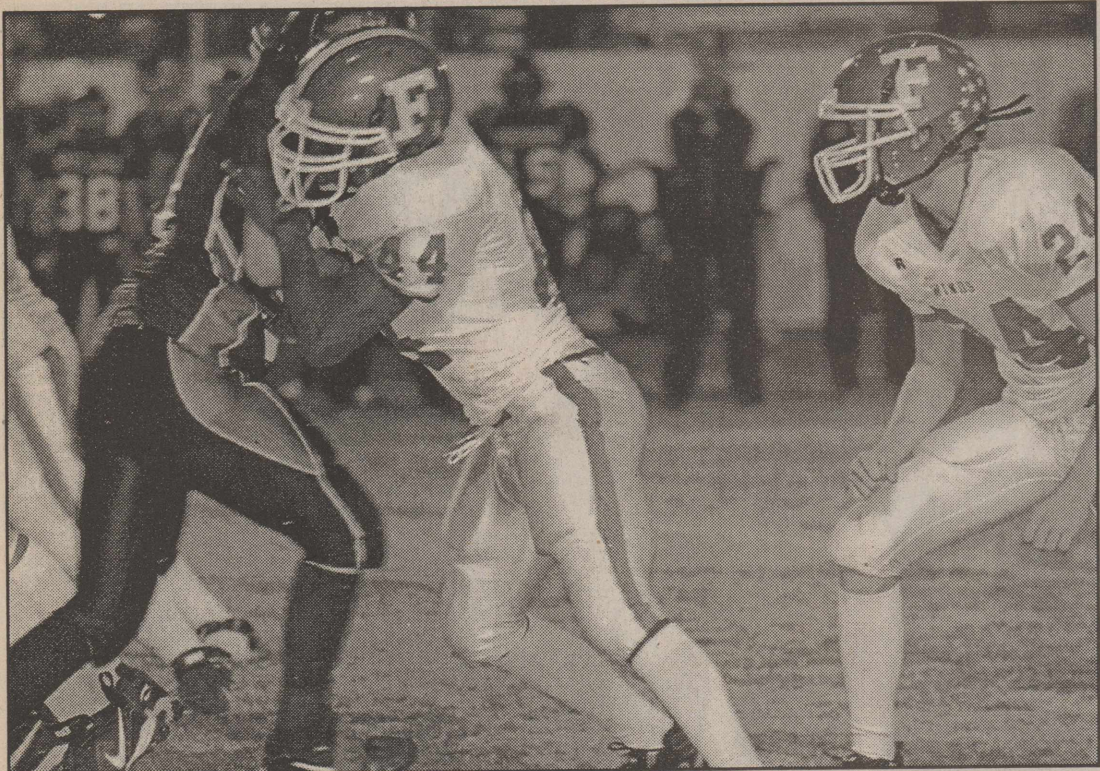
Floydada had the opportunity to drain the clock on their next possession, but the Whirlwinds could not convert on third and 8. Blake Greer's punt traveled forty-two yards, backing the Mustangs up to their own twenty-two yard line with forty-six seconds remaining in the game. Morris completed two consecutive passes moving Shallowater near midfield. As Morris dropped back for his third attempt of the final drive he received pressure and threw off of his back foot. Payte Beedy stepped in front of the receiver and intercepted the pass, sealing the victory for the Whirlwinds.

Floydada ends their season at (5-5-2-3).

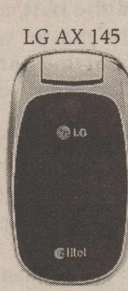

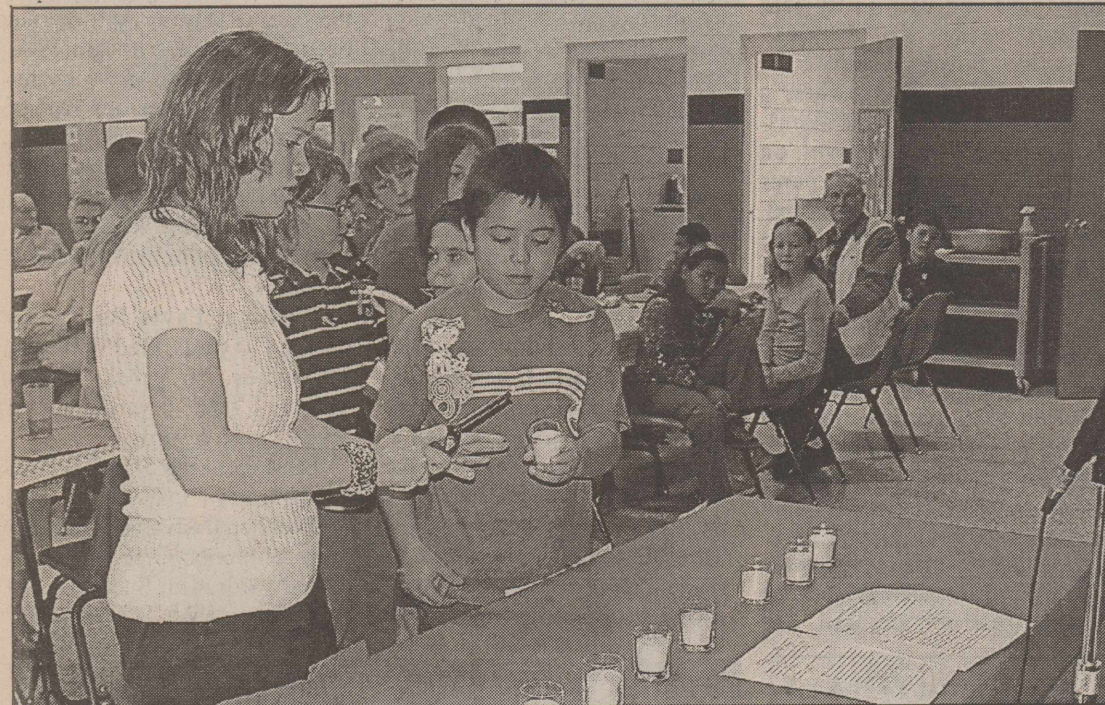

rolls. Sometimes we don't know which takes precedence, but visiting and playing with the grandkids is high on the list. The guys, well, we know what they do, in their order of importance. Eat, sleep, dream about watching the Cowboys and eating. I sometimes have this wild thought about going to Furr's or the Cracker Barrel for dinner. But then how would we have left-overs to eat the next day and the next?

As I often do, when I walk through the museum and look at the old wood cook stove or take a detour through the ranch house, I think about the early settler's and the traditions they began in the early beginnings of this county. Their memories of celebrating Thanksgiving have been passed from generation to generation. Imagine having to catch that wild turkey, grind your own flour and cornmeal in order to make stuffing, cakes and pies, make gather the wood with which to cook and for many, travel by horse and buggy to visit

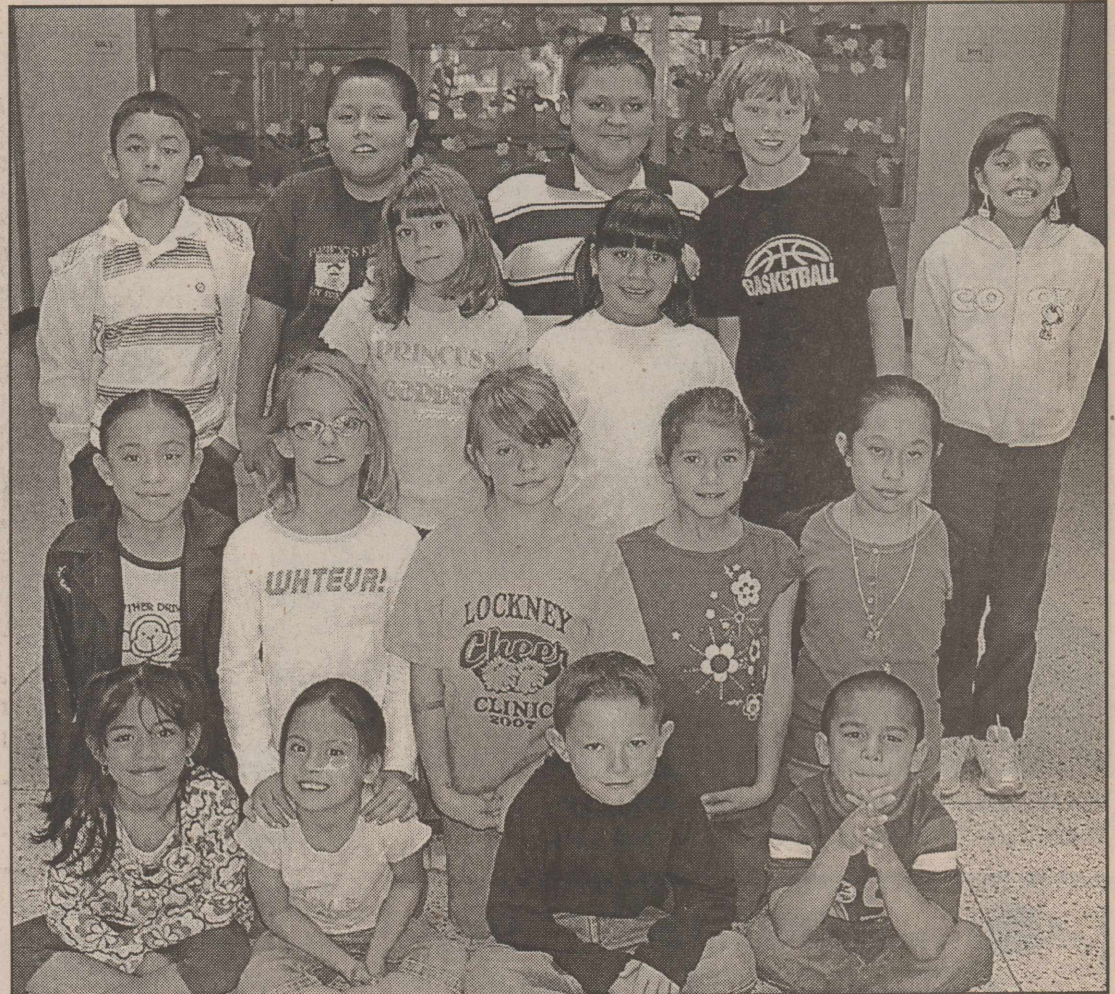
neighbors or family. Let's face it; the early pioneers had to work at celebrating and being thankful. I am grateful those memories have been preserved for us.

I thought it would be interesting to share a recipe I found in a cookbook at the museum that would make us thankful to be living in the 21st century. The name of the recipe is "Roast Turkey." The instructions are: If the weather is cold enough dress turkey a week before time to use. Let it hang on north side of house to freeze. To cook, place on blocks above 3 inches water in covered boiler. Let steam until tender, season with salt and pepper and stuff. Lay several pieces of fat pork on the turkey, place in roaster and bake until tender. This recipe was in the 1952 Lighthouse Electric Cookbook in the section of "old recipes (at least 50 years)" making this recipe over 100 years old.

I thought I would include a recipe that I have made several times on holiday occasions. It has been a while, but saw this in a

newsletter and plan to make it for Thanksgiving this year.

**Orange Slice Cake**  
4 beaten eggs, 2 c. sugar  
1 c. butter or margarine  
4 c. flour, 1 tsp. soda  
1 1/3 c. buttermilk  
1 lb. chopped dates, 1 c. raisins  
2 c. chopped pecans  
1/2 c. grated orange peel  
1 lb. orange slice candy cut in small pieces  
Beat eggs then add sugar and butter. Mix dry ingredients together in a bowl. Alternate dry ingredients and buttermilk. Add fruit. Bake at 250 degrees for 2 1/2 hours.  
**Glaze:**  
1/2 c. orange juice, 1 c. sugar  
Bring to a boil and pour over cake. This works well in a large bundt pan or two small ones. It makes great gifts when baked in loaf pans.  
This Thanksgiving Day remember to pass along a memory to a younger generation. Some day, they too, will remember and pass it on.  
Enjoy your day of Thanksgiving and we will too...at the museum.

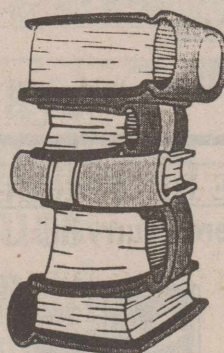

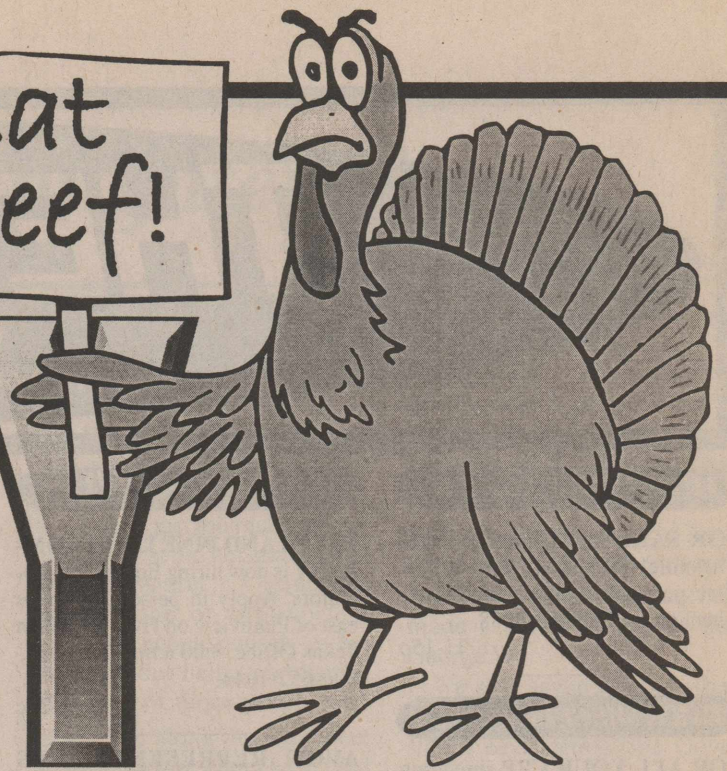
