Wreath laying ceremony is Saturday at Veteran's Park

The Lockney area Veterans will be conducting a Wreaths Across America Ceremony at the Lockney Veteran's Memorial Park, Saturday, December 15.

Patriotic music and guest seating will start at 10:00 a.m. in Lockney and eighty wreaths will be laid at the memorial crosses at 10:40 a.m. The wreaths laid at the crosses have been bought with local donations.

The actual ceremony will not begin until 11:00 a.m. with an opening speech by the Master of Ceremonies, Elton Bass.

Bass, a poet, of Plainview, will read a poem he has written about Veterans. State Representative Joe Heflin will deliver brief remarks followed by the guest speaker, Lee Gilbert.

Gilbert was born in Matador and raised in Fort Worth. Drafted into the Army in 1967, Gilbert served in Vietnam with the 25th Infantry Division from December 1967 to December 1968.

A graduate of TCU, Gilbert

At 11:40 a.m. the names of the Floyd County KIA's will be read. Special seating will be provided for family members to those killed in action.

This will be followed by the ceremonial wreath laying at the flag poles at 12:00 noon. In Lockney seven ceremonial wreaths will be placed at the flag poles to remember those who gave their lives in service. They will include specialty made wreaths for Army, Marines, Navy, Air Force, Coast Guard, Merchant Marines, and POW/MIA.

All of the wreaths at the flag poles are donated by Worcester Wreath Company in Harrington, Maine. (The full story can be found online at the Wreaths Across America website:

> There are only 2 Veteran's Memorials in Texas participating in this program and Lockney is one of them. The closest town in this area participating, other than Lockney, is Decateur.

The event will end, at approximately 12:25 a.m. with a closing prayer, a 21 gun salute, and Taps.

December 15th will mark the 16th anniversary of Harrington, Maine wreaths being donated to decorate the graves at Arlington National Cemetery and the 2nd year of a national campaign dubbed "Wreaths Across America" that brings remembrance wreaths to Veterans cemeteries and parks across the United States.

In addition to the donated ceremonial wreaths, U.S. Civil Air Patrol has joined Wreaths Across America to promote sponsored wreaths that will also be laid on Veterans graves and Memorial locations around the country.



Enrollment in Lockney ISD has dropped by only 2 students

since last year's enrollment. The total enrollment of Lockney schools stands now at 602

students. The elementary campus increased by 2 students to a total of 272. The largest class at elementary is the 2nd grade class with an enrollment of 45, followed by a 3rd grade class of 43. Kindergarten has the smallest number of children, at 27.

Comparing the elementary school numbers to last year can be misleading. Lockney Early Education class was a special education program and it hasnow been transferred to Lorenzo in the Special Ed Cooperative, so LISD no longer has an early edu-

cation class. The pre-kindergarten class shows a significant increase because 3 year olds have been added to what used to be only a class for 4 year olds.

Lockney Junior High totals also increased. The total is up five students to 140. Sixth grade has the highest number of students

The drop in enrollment can be seen at Lockney High School which is down to an enrollment of 188 compared to last year's enrollment of 197. The senior class is largest with 53 students and 9th grade has the second largest class with 51.

Commissioners vote to abolish personal vehicle tax

FISD enrollment

drops

Enrollment in Floydada ISD dropped by 12 students overall, but the elementary school shows an increase of 24 students. Total enrollment in FISD is 927.

Floydada Elementary enrollment stands now at 458 which is up from last year's total of 434.

Pre-Kindergarten shows the most significant jump from last year's total of 40 to this year's 62 students. The increase comes from the addition of 3 year olds to what used to be a class of only

In their regular meeting Monday, December 10, county commissioners voted 3-1 to abolish personal vehicles tax.

Jim Finley, Chief Appraiser, spoke before the board on the ever increasing difficulties of keeping track of personal property inventory. He said they don't have the man power to keep it in force and they would need a full time appraiser just to keep track of vehicles. Finley recommended that personal property taxation be dropped.

He said a new law (Proposition 6) approved by voters November 6, allows persons who are self employed, and small businesses, to exempt one vehicle of only 13 counties, out of 254

This change will go into ef- erty.

fect January 1, 2008.

Finley said Floyd County would receive \$101,000 this year in personal property income.

According to Finley, currently 46 1/2% of all delinquent taxes on the books in Floyd County are for motor vehicles.

He said if the County dropped the personal property taxation the County could adjust their effective tax rate to receive the same amount of income as before. This adjustment would increase the current tax rate by 4.4¢ per \$100 valuation.

Finley said a home valued at \$30,000 would increase by \$13.00 a year.

During discussion, Commissioner Bill Quattlebaum expressed his desire to keep personal property tax because of budget problems the County has experienced.

Quattlebaum stated he felt the commissioners would be "derelict in taking away their source of income.'

Commissioners Jon Jones and Lennie Gilroy both stated the personal property tax was very unpopular among their constitu-

Gilroy made the motion to drop personal property tax for 2008. Commissioner Ray Nell Bearden seconded. Voting in favor was Bearden, Gilroy, and Jones. Quattlebaum opposed.

So our National Intelligence Agency, or whoever has control of what we know, or are supposed to know about the world, now says Iran stopped work on weap-

Let me see: a quick calculation, sans computer, indicates that was about four years ago. That's about par for our intelligence operation. It's not the first time they've been off that much. What it all means is anybody's guess.

ons nuclear enrichment back in

Mr. Bush had another of his press conferences last week, and while he clearly didn't believe his own intelligence estimates, gave credit to diplomacy for giving peace with Iran a chance. He may be right, but more likely, the cause may be that Israel feels less threatened (despite its public statements). And if Israel feels less threatened, our Congress and our Administration will feel less threatened, and we may be spared another war in the Middle East. For the time being, at least.

Even Pat Robertson must feel less threatened, since he installed his son in his own place as head of a giant broadcasting company, and merely installed himself as

Chairman of the whole kit and kaboodle. Pat has never been known to do anything that was not first cleared in Tel Aviv. In fact, we would not now be in Iraq if our being there was an abomination to Pat Robertson and/or

We have written before about the sorry state of our intelligence activities. It is certainly not because Americans have been niggardly with our funding of all the agencies that contribute. Indeed, American taxpayers have poured billions and billions into the various projects that make up our intelligence establishment, and, with few exceptions, the money has been wasted. My own personal memories of that debacle span many years. There was a time, for instance, when they "lost" a shipment (an entire shipment) of enriched uranium that left a port in the Far East bound for the Middle East. It just vanished. Another time the intelligence community was thrown into an uproar (for a few days) when we got reports of the Chinese, mounting, and testing, a live ballistic missile from somewhere in Southwest China to a

place in Mongolia. The only problem: it never happened, and a few days later we in the government were told otherwise. So it went. We will hasten to say that the then-head of our principal intelligence gatherers was not the same guy awarded the nation's highest civilian medal by President Bush when he bowed out as head of the CIA, which we happen to think was a travesty of justice. That guy just happened to be the individual who gave the nation the false report about "weapons of mass destruction" in Iraq, which was exactly what Bush wanted to hear

Any Administration must act on whatever intelligence it can get, and Bush has been poorly served in that regard. Still, he will

believe only that which he wants to believe anyhow. So in the final analysis, he gets about what he deserves. The big problem is, this country deserves better, but young George is determined he is going to do things differently than his father, the elder George. That is young George's definition of policy: do things differently

Now we hear that Mr. Bush is going to go to Israel, because he figures the time is ripe. In fact, he may even go visit both "sides" in that miserable situation. In our own humble opinion, he should have gone there many years ago, instead of worrying so much about where America's Jewish vote was going to go in the next election. He could have gone there, and told the Israelis that American aid was going to be drastically reduced if certain changes were not made in their Mid-East policy (which has rapidly become America's Mid-East policy), but then he would have had a fight with Dick Cheney, and that's one fight Bush doesn't relish. And he would have had another fight with a Democratic Congress: which is beholden to the Jewish lobby in this country even more than what used to be the Republican majority in Con-

It is not easy to be told one day that we should hate this country or that country, and then told the next day that that which we believed yesterday is no longer true today. Still, Americans should eventually get used to it. It's been going on since we can remember. And our memory goes all the way back to Eleanor and her husband.

> Yet we live in hope. Someday, we'll have national political leaders we can trust. In the meantime we take what we have. Pat Robertson says we ought to vote for Giuliani, former Mayor of New York. Other political leaders in Texas say we would be better off supporting someone else. Land Commissioner Jerry Patterson seems to favor Fred Thompson. We thought, being Baptist ourselves, that we had finally arrived. Hardly.

It probably should be noted that Mr. Giuliani's law partner from Houston, Mr. Pat Oxford, was a young member of our staff way back in 1978. He now runs Mr. Giuliani's Texas effort. He, in 1978, wagered that John Tower, the then Senator running for reelection, would lose to some guy named Bob Krueger of New Braunfels. Needless to say, Tower won, despite his new wife

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



I shared with you a recipe at Thanksgiving in this column and I thought I would share another one for Christmas. This recipe was given to me by Margie Young last Christmas after she had brought some of the candy to us at the museum. This is GOOD.

> **Crock Pot Candy** (Chocoholic Alert)

1 lb. salted peanuts, 1 lb. pecans, 1 bar German Chocolate, 2 lbs. white almond bark, I large package (14 oz.) milk chocolate chips, Crock Pot (at least a 3 or 4 qt.

Layer the ingredients in the crock pot in order given. Do not stir. Place lid on crock pot, turn on low and don't remove lid for 3 hours. Stir until well mixed and drop in clusters on wax paper. 

Senate Leaders Reach Farm **Bill Agreement**

Senate leaders have finally reached agreement on how to proceed with the debate on the 2007 Farm Bill, opening the door for the process to begin on December 7. In reaching their agreement, the two sides will limit the debate to consideration of a total of 40 amendments, 20 from Democrats and 20 from Republicans and work to complete the bill by December 14.

According to the latest news from Washington, the first votes on farm bill are expected to occur as early as Tuesday, December 11. If he can maintain the schedule it appears is being developed, Senate Majority Leader Harry Reid (D-NV) appears to be focused on completing the farm bill by December 14.

Though significantly less than the nearly 300 amendments that were expected, the 40 amendments allowed under the agreement will still several days to work through and are virtually guaranteed to include consideration of several potentially damaging amendments opposed by most mainstream agriculture

groups. Growers and farm bill sup porters are encouraged to stay in contact with their Senators and ask them to support the Committee bill and oppose damaging amendments. Senators should also be asked to continue to work with the Agriculture Committee to reach agreement on as many of the 40 amendments as possible in order to further expedite the process.

Plains Cotton Growers officials note that a number of the amendments that will be offered pose a significant threat to the compromise reached by the Senate Agriculture Committee and will negatively impact southern agriculture.

Information about the most harmful of these amendments, along with contact information for Texas Senators John Cornyn and Kay Bailey Hutchison, is available on the PCG website (www.plainscotton.org). Growers are encouraged to take the few minutes it requires to communicate the importance of supporting the Committee bill and working to defeat harmful amendments. First Quarter Price/Marketing Figures Issued

Cumulative Upland Cotton marketings for the first three months of the 2007 marketing year totaled 3.084 million bales according to information released November 30 by the USDA National Agricultural Statistics Service.

Only 62,000 bales off the pace set during the same period last season, the pace of shipments for the first quarter of the 2007 Upland Cotton marketing year is good news to growers. Equally favorable to growers with cotton to sell is the upswing that cotton prices have seen over the last two

The first month of the marketing year included August prices that averaged 44.9 cents per pound and total marketings of just over 1.7 million bales. September brought a significant jump in the average price received to 55 cents per pound, but a decline in total marketings to 2008. 373,000 for the month.

released November 30, October 2007 cotton marketings totaled 949,000 bales with an average selling price of 55.20 cents per

So far the 2007 Upland Cotton Weighted Average Price, calculated through October 2007, stands at 48.93 cents per pound. The preliminary mid-month price reported for November 2007 was 54.00 cents per pound.

With the first three months of the marketing year now past, the calculated 2007 Weighted Average Price is just over 3 cents below the 52-cent threshold where 2007-crop Counter-cyclical pay-

ment rates would begin to drop. If prices stay on an upward trend, it is possible that the projected 2007 Upland Cotton Countercyclical payment rate could be less than the 13.73 cent maximum when USDA determines if it will offer an advance Countercyclical payment in February

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Cotton Market Weekly

As the week progressed, cotton trading on the New York Board of Trade appeared to have been partly marking time amid some tweaking of positions ahead of USDA's key monthly domestic and world supply/demand estimates scheduled for release on Tuesday, Dec. 11.

The market also took note of USDA's weekly export sales report. Net export sales of U.S. cotton in the week ended Nov. 29 totaled 219,400 bales, down 12 percent from the previous week and one percent more than the four-week average. Major buyers were China, Mexico, Indonesia, and Turkey. Net sales of 13,200 bales for delivery in 2008-09 resulted as a sales increase for Mexico was partially offset by cancelations for El Sal-

Export shipments of 212,300 bales were 28 percent more than the week earlier and 21 percent more than the four-week average. Primary destinations were China, Turkey, Mexico, and Indonesia. Traders now say average shipments from now through the end of the 2007-08 marketing year need to average approximately 325,000 bales to reach USDA's target of 16.2 million bales.

'The figure still is within

reach, but sales need to increase sharply to make it happen," an analyst said. "For the time being, Chinese mills continue to give preference to Indian cotton thanks to the lower prices combined with a shorter transit time."

Meanwhile, in the week ended Dec.6, online trading by producers in Texas, Oklahoma, and Kansas totaled 17,588 bales compared to 27,012 bales the previous holiday shortened trading week. Average prices received by producers ranged from 54.96 to 59.86 cents per pound versus 55.49 to 61.58 cents per pound one week earlier.

In other news, in its Dec. 3 report the International Cotton Advisory Committee (ICAC) revised supply and demand numbers from earlier seasons for several countries. The adjustment had the net effect of a 1.8 million bale increase in 2007-08 ending stocks. The new 54.0 million-bale world ending stocks estimate now is very much in line with USDA's 54.8 million-bale figure. Both USDA and ICAC show 2007-08 production at about 119.4 million bales, but USDA's consumption estimate of 129.2 million exceeds ICAC's projection by 3.4 million bales, with most of the difference in cancellations centering on China's cotton use.

For now, the trade is monitoring the harvest of the U.S. cotton crop as it winds down in most states in the southern portion of the country. Texas seems to be the main interest as the harvest has progressed to the 90 percent level in the Lubbock area and field work is moving forward, weather permitting, across the rest of the Texas High and Rolling Plains. Roughly 25 percent of the state-wide cotton crop remains on the stalk, according to county extension agent reports. Thanks to the picture-perfect cotton weather all over West Texas since September, both qualities and yields probably will break

"Our poor market can't catch a ride from any direction, but they're looking at USDA's next supply/demand report," a market watcher said. "A private crop estimate suggests the U.S. crop will come in another 100,000 bales bigger than in the department's November estimate, but that shouldn't surprise anyone considering the difficulty the crop reporting board has had in getting its arms around the almost miraculous yields in Texas" he concluded.


