# Apple honors FISD

Apple will present the Distinguished School Award to FISD and FHS on Tuesday, March 11, at 7:00 p.m. during the monthly board meeting.

Floydada High School is now in its third of the successful 1 to 1 immersion project. Floydada Junior High School also benefits from a four-year successful 1 to 1 project of its own.

Floydada ISD has issued 645 Apple MacBooks to students, staff, and administrators. The laptop initiatives in the district have been instrumental in improving not only education and teaching, but also providing the ability for high school students to complete more college course hours than ever before.

The district has also seen its TAKS test scores increase during the time the 1 to 1 programs have been implemented. Apple, Inc. has referred many school districts to Floydada to learn how to implement a successful laptop learning initiative.

# LISD enters into settlement agreement with Athletic Director

After an executive session with the school's attorney, LISD trustees voted 6-1 to enter into a 'separation agreement" with Athletic Director Joe Robertson.

In last month's board meeting the Trustees had voted 4-2 not to extend Coach Robertson's contract.

The "agreement", which was accepted by Robertson, calls for LISD to reimburse Robertson his 1 year salary and benefits, at a cost of \$67,480.

# FISD Trustees review construction

District facing costs to bring football stadium into ADA compliance

During their regular board meeting, March 11, Floydada ISD an Apple representative presented the district with plaque designating FISD as an Apple Distinguished Campus (see related story).

Earlier the board met and had a walk-through of the construction at Duncan Elementary and Joe Grimes, of Grimes and Associates, spoke briefly to the board later on progress being

Grimes presented the board with a "monthly progress report" booklet briefly explaining the stages each renovation is at.

The Cafeteria renovation building pad is complete and plumbing in the existing building has started. Piers are scheduled to start by March 17 and the concrete slab is scheduled by April 7.

The building pad is complete and footings are excavated for the administration, library and computer labs. All pier steel and grade beam steel is tied and ready for placement and the piers are in place.

Work on the new classroom wing addition in area "C" is on schedule and progressing as are renovations to existing classroom wings areas "D" and "E".

Grimes reported the work on the new physical education gymnasium was progressing well. The slab concrete is complete and the erection of the metal building should be completed by April 25, 2008.

FISD Superintendent Jerry Vaughn told the board that blue prints were ready for upgrading the football field and stadium to make it ADA compliant. The blue prints cost the district \$6,000 and Vaughn wanted to know if the Board wanted him to pursue getting quotes for the project.

The project will include upgrading sidewalks leading to the stadiums, restrooms and concession stands; make the restrooms ADA compliant; ramps into the stadiums and

handicap seating spaces. Vaughn told the board he felt some of the bathroom renovation could be done by Building Trade and he would like to sub contract out the concrete work locally.

"Anything over \$25,000 we have to go out for bids," said Vaughn.

The board voted unanimously for Vaughn to get quotes and bring cost estimates back to the

Dwight Teeple spoke to the board briefly and presented a proposal from the Floydada County Club asking the school district to consider a corporate membership to the Country Club.

Teeple told the board for an annual fee of \$5,000 the board could designate 10 people to be on the membership roll.

The corporate membership allowed these members to use the golf course and swimming pool, but they could not use the clubhouse for parties, etc. The members would also not have voting

"This is about 1/2 the price of a full membership," said Teeple. The board could take no ac-

tion on the matter because it was not on the agenda as an "action item", but general discussion of the board made it appear they were not in favor of this proposal.

Trustee Marty Lucke asked, "How do we pick 10 employees out of 200?"

Board President Kerry Pratt told the board if any trustees want to take action on this proposal to let him know so it could be put on next month's agenda.


Vaughn presented a bid of \$100 for a house located at 802 Menefee and recommended the board reject the bid. "I think we should re-advertise," said Vaughn. "I think it is a movable

The board voted 6-1 in favor. Pratt cast the dissenting vote.

In other matters concerning the sale of taxing entity lots, Pratt and Vaughn both recommended the next meeting address a resolution the board had made previously to never take less than \$300 for a property bid. Both Vaughn and Pratt said that it would be easier if the board had some discretion and just used the \$300 to strive for, but not be an absolute for selling.

Resignations were accepted from J.K Hester, a history teacher and coach, and Katie Hester, a special education teacher.

Who would believe it. Certainly, not I. We are now witnessing a race for the White House between a black man and a white woman (who says she is the wife of our first "black president"), and already race, gender, and religion have been injected into the contest. TDHCA will consider objections to its release of funds and the City of Floydada certification received by April 24, 2008 or a period of fifteen days from its receipt of the request (whichever is later) only if they are on one of the following bases: (a) the certification was not executed by the Certifying Officer or other officer of the City of Floydada approved by TDHCA (b) the (RE) has omitted a step or failed to make a decision or finding required by HUD regulations at 24 CFR Part 58; (c) the grant recipient or other participants in the project have committed funds or incurred costs not authorized by 24 CFR Part 58 before approval of a release of funds by TDHCA or (d) another Federal agency acting pursuant to 40 CFR Part 1504 has submitted a written finding that the project is unsatisfactory from the standpoint of environmental quality. Objections must be prepared and submitted in accordance with the required procedures (24 CFR Part 58) and shall be addressed to Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs at 221 East 11th Street, Austin, TX 78701. Potential objectors should contact TDHCA to verify the actual last day of the objection period.
