FISD Board met Tuesday lic meetings until after a duly night, April 29th, and listened to several public comments concerning the possible resignation told this newspaper that he had of Coach Chris Brattain and after an executive session voted to hire Mac Sherman as the Junior High School principal, and Brian Place as next year's Band Direc-

"He has been another father for us," said Miller. "It would be a great loss to the school and community if he left. We love him and want him back next year."

Also speaking on behalf of Brattain were Latricia Miller,

Renee Weeks, and Tina Weeks. The board made no comments and can take no action from pubposted on an agenda.

But this week, Coach Brattain submitted his resignation on Wednesday, April 30.

"It was a very hard decision to make," said Brattain. "I appreciate the community and the kids. I decided to submit my resignation early so the district would have more time to find someone good for the basketball program.

keep track of my wandering young teenage son. It was with a cell phone.

At the time I was going to hold out and not get him a phone. It was just an added expense and frankly I thought it was a luxury he didn't really need.

But we broke down and got the phone and it turned out to be a good way to find him when I needed him.

When we first presented it to him we were immediately elevated to the status of "best parents in the whole wide world".

Eventually it was pointed out to him that we were just trying to keep track of him--like a "GPS System". Unfortunately our motives were then suspect and we fell off the pedestal.

Dell and Bill Gray of Floydada recently attended the Twenty-second Annual Theatre History Seminar at the Museum of Repertoire Americana, Mt. Pleasant, Iowa. Bill, a member of Advisory Board of the National Theatre Society, presented two papers during the three day meet-

One paper, entitled "The Making of Toby and the Tall Corn," recounted the 1954 filming of the Schaffner Players' "Toby and Susie Show," one of the last traveling tent repertoire companies. The film of the show was produced for "Omnibus," the Ford Foundation's Sunday-night feature on the CBS Television Network. Bill and his parents, Erman and Goldie, The Musical Grays, atre Museum the Deagan Impewere prominently featured in the film, and their music furnished the soundtrack for the made-fortelevision documentary.

Gray's second paper, "My Summer of 1953 - From Repster to Carny," recalled the eight weeks he spent as a drummer on the Royal American Carnival (the largest railroad carnival of all time). The text of both papers will be included in "Tall Tents and Taller Tales," Bill's forthcoming book about growing up on the road in show business.

Randy Neugebauer May 5, 2008 Farm Bill Update

I am pleased to report to you that there has been significant progress in the 2008 Farm Bill. The Conference Committee met until 1:30 am this past Thursday night and closed out many outstanding provisions, getting us closer to a final product.

All elements of the new Farm Bill were approved, leaving only a few remaining issues outstanding. During this last meeting, I offered my supplemental crop insurance program as an amendment that would have replaced the permanent disaster provision. This amendment would have saved money that could have been reinvested into crop insurance, creating more options for producers when making risk management decisions. It would also have eliminated proposed reductions in direct payments to producers. Unfortunately, this amendment did not pass.

We are expected to meet tomorrow to hopefully finish the conference report. Among one of the most important issues to finalize is the commodity programs. Optimistically, if the few outstanding issues are agreed to, we could see the 2008 Farm Bill go to the House and Senate for a vote within the next two weeks.

Completion of the Farm Bill is not only important to the 19th Congressional District, but to the entire nation. We cannot afford to move forward without a sound farm policy for our producers. Without it, we face the risk of becoming dependent on other nations for food and fiber as we already are for energy. Now is the time to roll up our sleeves and finally take this long overdue legislation across the

Supporting the Ensuring Continued Access to Student Loans Act of 2008, H.R. 5715

Last week, the House successfully passed H.R. 5715, the Ensuring Continued Access to Student Loans Act of 2008, by a bipartisan vote of 388 to 21. I voted in favor of this legislation. It is a bipartisan bill designed to protect students and families by ensuring that the disruptions in the financial markets do not prevent students from pursuing their higher education goals. This bill has passed both the House and Senate and has been sent to the President's desk and is awaiting his signature.

The Ensuring Continued Access to Student Loans Act of 2008 contains reforms developed on a bipartisan basis to respond to student loan market instability. These reforms include efforts to inject liquidity and restore investor confidence in the marketplace. It creates new flexibility for parents, provided through an optional grace period, which permits them to defer PLUS loan payments until after their children graduate. It also ensures that parents struggling with the difficulties in the mortgage market are not automatically denied the chance to help pay for their children's education through PLUS

Additionally, it expands loan availability through higher unsubsidized Stafford loan limits, and allows consumer protections for the Lender of Last Resort program, ensuring funds will be available should they become necessary. Finally, this legislation also includes expanded access to grant aid for high achieving, low-income students through the Academic Competitiveness Grants and Science and Mathematics Access to Retain Talent (SMART) Grants programs.

The purpose of this bill is to prevent a student loan crisis before it occurs. H.R. 5715 is a pro-taxpayer solution that protects students and families without increasing federal spending. H.R. 5715 is a first step, but it is certainly not the only step. Congress should continue to urge the Secretary of Treasury to provide more solutions to the liquidity crisis in a manner that is efficient and would cause the least amount of disruption to students and families.

Conservation Title - The new CSP, renamed the Conservation Stewardship Program provides incentives for adopting, improving and maintaining sound conservation practices on land in agricultural production. Harkin said the program would enroll just under 13 million acres each year (starting in 2009) through 2017, for a total of nearly 115 million acres. An additional \$1.1 billion was provided for CSP for a total of \$12 billion over 10
