Optimistically, if the few outstanding issues Senate for to, we could see the 2008 Farm Bill go to the House and Senate for a vote within the next two weeks.

The Ensuring Continued Access to Student Loans Act of 2008 contains reforms developed on a bipartisan basis to respond to student loan market instability. These reforms include efforts to inject liquidity and restore investor confidence in the marketplace. It cre ates new flexibility for parents, provided through an optional grace
period, which permits them to defer PLUS loan payments until afte period, which permist thildren graduate. It also ensures that parents struggling with the difficulties in the mortgage market are not automatically denied the chance to help pay for their children's education through PLUS loans.

Additionally, it expands loan availability through highe unsubsidized Stafford loan limits, and allows consumer protections
for the Lender of Last Resort program, ensuring funds will be available should they become necessary. Finally, this legislation also in cludes expanded access to grant aid for high achieving, low-income students through the Academic Competitiveness Grants and Scienc and Mathematics Access to Retain Talent (SMART) Grants programs The purpose of this bill is to prevent a student loan crisis before and families without increasing federal spending. H.R. 5715 is a firs step, but it is certainly not the only step. Congress should continue to urge the Secretary of Treasury to provide more solutions to the liquidity crisis in a manner that is efficient and
