

**Continued From Page 1** Jackson's readers are treated to stories of catching criminals across a wide swath of the Texas-Mexico border.

Jackson recalls his five year pursuit of Henry Lee Lucas and Ottis Toole. He sets the record straight about the role of the Texas Rangers during the United Farm Workers strike in the Rio Grande Valley in 1966-67.

Jackson also describes the frustration of trying to solve a cold case from 1938--the brutal murder of a mother and daughter in the lonely desert east of Van Horn.

He presents a gallery of cattle rustlers, drug smugglers, and a teetotaling bootlegger named Tom Bybee, a modest likeable man who became an ax murderer.

The Museum will open the doors for the event at 1:00 a.m. and Jackson will sign books from 2:00 p.m. - 5:00 p.m. and then speak at 6:00 p.m.

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

Lockney Health and Rehab has a new Administrator, Becky Myers and new Director of Nurses, Karen Oaks.

Myers is actually coming home, as she was born and reared in Lockney. "I remember babysitting for Dr. Gary Mangold's kids," she reminisced. "It's me and my husband, Mike Myers, who is now retired, and our four dogs." She is the daughter of Lavona Pitchford and Keith Holliday and the granddaughter of Cecil and Charlotte Carthel of Lockney. Her other grandparents are Bill and Chlorene Holliday of Floydada.

Myers, 42, began her duties in Lockney on April 28. "Mom was Director of Nurses at the Lockney Care Center when I was in first grade so I spent a lot of time here," said Myers. "Mom went to school in the 1980's and then served as both Administrator and Director of Nurses."

Myers lived with her grandparents while attending Wayland Baptist University where she earned her degree in Business Science and Occupational Education with specialization in Health Care.

"I have been very pleased with the parent company I work

for, Fundamental, as they have been very supportive and understanding of the small town dynamic. I am very glad to be back home. Karen and I have lots of plans for the facility and for being more involved with the community. We want to increase awareness and have the community feel more comfortable interacting with us," Myers said.

Myers and Oaks have worked as a team for the last 13-14 years. "I was working in Odessa, and the company sent Karen down as a nurse. We had met briefly. She has taught me so much how to look at patient care, how it is being delivered and how to prevent skin breakdown; just good care.

"We have worked almost all over Texas. For three or four years we did 'clean up'. We would be sent where the buildings had poor care issues and/or Health Department issues.

"I have tried to leave this line of work three or four times, thinking, 'I'm not doing it right,' and every time the good Lord would shut the door to keep me. Here in Lockney, He provided a house for us, provided a house for Karen, made it possible for my dad and step-mom to move closer with jobs in Floydada. Everything just fell into place.

" I was working as bookkeeper in Tulia while mom was serving as Administrator. She transferred to Lockney and I was left in Tulia. I noticed the way some things were done, and I thought they could have been done better. Grandad said, 'If you think you can do a better job, go do it.' So I went to college and signed up and here I am!"

New Director of Nurses Karen Oaks, 69 and a registered nurse, began her duties in Lockney May 5.

Oaks, who is originally from Illinois, said she was happy to see all the beautiful pheasants here as she had enjoyed watching them while growing up back home. She completed her nurses training at Danville, Illinois at the Lakeview School of Nursing.

Oaks said, "Becky and I came here from Rio Grande City, Texas which is on the border. I am enjoying Lockney and everyone has been so kind to me. I am widowed and my late husband and I have six children. Five of them are scattered all over and my son Bill lives with me.

"My new next door neighbor, Laverne Cooper, told me jokingly she had taught Lavona how to be an Administrator and Director of Nurses! Turns out Laverne had worked at the Care Center for years.

"I have been a nurse for 48 years, 40 of those in long term care.

"The main goals Becky and I have for Lockney Health and Rehab are 1.) to provide excellent nursing care for the residents and 2.) to see the building full and an addition added to it.

"I feel like I'm ending my career the way I started it - in a small town."


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# Clark and Kennedy exchange vows



Farm Bill negotiators gathered in the Longworth House Office Building in Washington, DC Thursday afternoon to announce a final agreement on the oft-delayed 2008 farm Bill.

Culminating a process started nearly three years ago, the press conference provided a glimpse of the bipartisan support that will drive the legislation over the finish line and to the desk of President George W. Bush by the end of next week.

Despite what appears to be considerable bipartisan support for the final bill, White House spokesmen continue to indicate a strong likelihood that the President will veto the legislation when he receives it. That warning has prompted a renewed effort in Congress to assemble a veto-proof margin of support for the bill.

"Cotton producers on the High Plains will be relieved to know that the finish line for the farm bill is now within reach and that Congress plans to approve the Farm Bill Conference Report next week," says PCG Executive Vice President Steve Verett. "We can't say that everything in the bill is like we envisioned it ought to be, but that is a sentiment virtually every constituency impacted by the legislation is feeling today.

"We will be actively encouraging our High Plains Congressmen and our Senators to vote for the final bill and to also work diligently to ensure the support of their urban counterparts."

Verett notes that agriculture is second only to the energy complex in economic importance to the Texas economy and it is hard to imagine a compelling reason for any member of the Texas Congressional delegation to vote against the bill.

The legislation contains monumental investments and implements significant reforms in several key areas including nutrition, commodity support, conservation and specialty crop provisions.

Among the most visible of the changes from cotton's perspec-

tive is the inclusion of a laundry list of cotton program reforms, mostly in the marketing loan program, and significant reforms in the area of pay limits that will also impact cotton producers.

With any piece of legislation as far-reaching and complicated as the farm bill the devil will be in the details, not all of which are known at this time. The only analysis that you can make at this time is that there will be a mix of positive and negative impacts on growers depending on their individual situation, crop mix and location.

Perhaps the biggest changes will be in the area of payment limitations and Adjusted Gross Income (AGI) eligibility requirements. Elimination of the 3entitiy rule in favor of direct attribution of payments to individuals and modifications to spouse eligibility rules are bundled with a new and somewhat confusing mix of AGI eligibility tests in the new bill.

As with all other aspects of the bill, Conference Report language and the final legislative text will be the key to divining the intent of Congress. House Agriculture Committee Chairman Collin Peterson indicated during Thursdays' press conference that this information, along with final Congressional Budget Office scoring for the final provisions would be made available early next week.

A comprehensive run-down of the pay limit, AGI and Commodity program changes will be provided as soon as the final legislative language and conference report are published.

CONSIDER OPTIONS BE-FORE BREAKING OUT CRP LAND

Officials with the USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) are urging farmers to consider USDA compliance and program eligibility before converting Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) acres to cropland production.

"More than 1 million acres in Texas covered under CRP contracts will expire in the next year

and a half, and we could see a lot of land use changes, especially in the Panhandle region," said Don Gohmert, NRCS state conservationist for Texas. "We want landowners to understand options available to them and what they need to do to remain in com-

pliance for USDA programs." Conservation compliance, which began with the 1985 Farm Bill, is still in effect. Compliance means that farmers need to control erosion on highly erodible land, which includes CRP acres, in order to stay eligible for USDA program benefits, including farm loan programs, disaster assistance, commodity price supports, and conservation programs.

According to NRCS, the most common ways farmers get out of compliance with USDA is by eliminating soil-conserving crops, such as forage species, and adding a tilled crop, such as corn or cotton. When the farmer changes his soil cover from permanent grass to annually-tilled crops, he/she should always consider conservation compliance when planning their rotations, in addition to commodity prices.

"The lure of high crop prices may have landowners considering plowing up grassland and planting it to a commodity crop," Gohmert said. "Not only are there compliance issues to consider, but landowners should also look at what is best for the land." According to Lori Ziehr,

NRCS state agronomist, much of the land enrolled in CRP was classified as highly erodible, meaning it is susceptible to wind and/or water erosion. "That soil has not changed over the years the land was in CRP," she said. "If those acres are returned to cropland, landowners will need to take certain measures to ensure those acres will not erode beyond a level that the soil can tolerate."

For example, Ziehr said that a certain percentage of the field may need to be planted to high residue crops each year or that contour windstrips be left at certain intervals to prevent erosion. In some cases, she said, fields may already have terraces that need to be maintained to remain in compliance and help lower the potential for erosion.


Before a landowner takes any action at all, Ziehr encourages them to visit their local NRCS field office to find out what a compliance plan would entail and if there are any financial costshare programs to help off-set some of the conservation costs. "A landowner has more options when his land is still in grass," she said. "Grazing former CRP acres is another option to consider."

CRP is a voluntary program through which farmers and ranchers to plant grasses and trees on marginal cropland acres in exchange for rental payments. The USDA Farm Service Agency administers CRP; NRCS provides technical assistance for the program.

Velma was born on the family farm north of Lockney on December 21, 1910, the fourth of ten children of W. A. Velma's mother, Lily Steele, was a direct descendent of Alphonso Steele, who after miraculously surviving a serious wound in the Battle of San Jacinto, became the last surviving veteran of the Texas war for independence from Mexico. His portrait hangs in the tundra of the Texas State Capitol.

Velma's education began in the one room Bobbitt School north of Lockney, and continued at the newly built Prairie Chapel School, a fine brick building with multiple classrooms that accommodated the burgeoning population of school age children north of Lockney.

On September 10, 1927 Velma was married to Doyle Harrison in a double ceremony

that also joined Velma's brother, W.F. (Cap) and Doyle's sister, Irene in holy wedlock. The couple lived and worked the quarter section Harrison family farm until the dual catastrophes of the Dust Bowl and Great Depression took the land, forcing Doyle and Velma to scramble for a place to live and work in Lockney. In several different two or three room houses between 1928 and 1939, Velma gave birth to five children. Over the years Velma lovingly cared for the home as Doyle supported his growing family by working for a dollar a day on Work Progress Administration road building projects, by trucking produce from far away places to the Ott Roberson grocery store in Lockney, by operating the creamery in a tin building, that still stands just off Main Street in Lockney and later by farming the 480 acres he and Velma were able to purchase in 1945, just three miles north of Lockney. Velma moved to a new home in Lockney after Doyle's untimely death in 1966.

Velma was a long-time member of the Prairie Chapel Church of Christ and later the West Side Church of Christ in Lockney. Until recently she was an active founding member of the Lockney Senior Citizens Association. Over the years she was a well-known fixture at sporting and social events featuring her five children and numerous grandchildren and great grandchildren at Lockney High School and other area schools.

Two brothers, Weldon Laverne of Lockney and Ray Gene of Amarillo and one sister, Lillian May of Lovington, New Mexico, survive Velma. Three daughters, Bettye Jackson and Doylene Dipprey both of Lockney, Bonnie Barrett of Lubbock and her youngest son Kelly Harrison of Austin, Texas and Cairo, Egypt, also survive her. Scattered across Texas and other states she has fifteen grandchildren, thirty four great grandchildren, and twenty five great-great grandchildren. 


