





Most talked-about feature of the new bill is a severance beneficiary tax of 1.5 per cent on natural gas. It was the first time the Senate had approved this tax. Many House members had said they would not vote for any bill that didn't include it. It will bring in an estimated \$15 to \$18,000,000 over two years if not ruled unconstitutional.

Three-fourths or more of the bill's revenue will come from selective sales taxes. Newcomers are a 3 per cent tax on jewelry and furs, a per cent tax on hotel and motel room rentals, 3 per cent on boats, motors, cameras, air conditioners, 25 per cent on tobacco products other than cigarettes.

Taxes on cigarettes will go up 3 cents a pack; liquor and wine, 20 per cent; motor vehicle sales, from 1.1 to 1.5 per cent.


Utility gross receipts will go up 20 per cent, and the corporation franchise tax will go up by 75 per cents per \$1,000 S. Post and Mrs. S. R. Rike. capital for one year, 50 per cents per \$1,000 thereafter.

#### The Tax Evaluation Problem

#### (THE TULIA HERALD)

Improper handling of the recent property evaluations undertaken by the city and school could set back true equalization in the city and school district for at least a generation.

Ever since we have lived in Tulia, we have heard the old, old story of inequalities in the payment of taxes. We have heard how there was inequality between city and rural property. When citizens were elected either to the school board or city council it didn't take long for them to discover that some people were getting away with murder, so far as taxes were concerned, while others were paying too much.

For nearly 69 years, school boards and city councils have tried to do something about the inequalities. For as long, the county's best citizens have served on equalization boards . But despite their conscientiousness, their honesty, their sense of fair play and justice, their desire to correct an unsavory situation, they have never been able to take the bull by the horns and do what needed to be done.

This is not offered as a criticism of the many equalization boards that have served. We don't know of a person in the community who could have done a better job under the circumstances.

Here are some of the things equalization boards have faced in the past:

A member of the board found that his employer was not paying his share of taxes.

A merchant discovered that one of his best customers needed a tax hike.

A member found that his closest neighbor and best friend was not paying his share.

To have lowered taxes where decreases were due would have meant insufficient revenue without tax hikes where they were due so things were allowed to ride.

Don't criticize these equalization boards. Not a one of us would have done differently under the circumstances. It is much easier to sit on the courthouse square and solve these problems in bull sessions than to serve on boards and solve them. -----
